MUCH PRISON LAND IDLE, SAYS SAYLE

Dry Investigation May Involve Indiana Standard Oil

YOUNG CHAIRMAN REPARATIONS MEET

American Unofficial Delegate to Conference at Paris Accepts Post to Preside Over Its Sessions

VEATCH WILL RETAIN SEAT THOUGH PEEVED

AUSTIN, Feb. 11.—John A. Veatch, veteran legislator from Johnson county was at his seat in the house of representatives this morning, having reconsidered a determination to resign because of what he considers legislative extravagance. Veatch's decision to remain was caused by the house passing a black land experimental station bill. Veatch says practical farmers do not need it. "Legislators say they do for economy but they do not live up to it but scratch each other's backs," Veatch said his decision to remain in the house follows request from Governor Moody and Speaker Barrat. He has served in six previous legislatures.

PARIS, Feb. 11.—Owen D. Young, American unofficial delegate to the conference of reparations experts, accepted the chairmanship of the conference at its first plenary session here today. Young confirmed his acceptance to newspaper men and he said: "I guess I am chairman after a long struggle. I am sorry but I am not in position to talk now."

PARIS, Feb. 11.—The reparations conference opened at 2 p. m. today in the blue room of the Hotel George V. and settled down to juggling the billions involved in the German settlement of war debts.

Owen D. Young, unofficial American delegate, apparently was presiding. Emile Moreau, governor of the Bank of France, opened the meeting from the chair, but a short time later, when the door of the blue room opened for a moment, Young apparently occupied that seat.

An organized movement on the part of Germany for revaluation of German resources—tantamount to an official repudiation of certain phases of S. Parker Gilbert's last report dealing with the prosperity of Germany—generally in authoritative circles.

One of the conferees' most important tasks will be to establish just how much money Germany can assume to guarantee interest on the loan planned to commercialize reparations payments.

S. Parker Gilbert, it now appears certain, will be called upon to make a specific statement in this connection. He recently reported as agent general for reparations that Germany's economic situation was good.

Accord Between Vatican and Italy Signed at Noon Today Recognizes the Holy See as Independent State

ROME, Feb. 11.—The Vatican and the Italian government of Benito Mussolini today became reconciled. The reconciliation was announced today by the Vatican. The historic St. John Lateran treaty, signed in 1870, ending the dispute which since 1870, Benito Mussolini, premier of Italy, representing Victor Emmanuel III, and Cardinal Gasparri, papal secretary of state, representing Pope Pius XI, signed the historic Lateran treaty, which was signed at noon, an official announcement said. The momentous agreement opened a new era in the history of Italy, which in 1870, the Roman Catholic church, which had been recognized as a temporal sovereign—ruler over

the little papal state—as well as spiritual head of the church, and 58 years of voluntary "imprisonment" of the popes in the Vatican was ended.

The ceremony, clothed with the utmost solemnity and dignity, was held in strict secrecy and only a handful of men witnessed the signing of a new chapter in history. The first document of the two-part agreement is a treaty of peace. The king recognizes the sovereignty, freedom and independence of the pope. The pope recognizes the king of Italy. Italy agrees to pay an indemnity understood to be about \$82,634,000 for the papal territory taken over by the government in 1870. The Vatican is given a tiny state over which it exercises complete territorial sovereignty.

The second document is in the nature of a concordant settling details of future relations between Italy and the holy see. A dramatic moment occurred when Cardinal Gasparri presented the gold pen, with which he had signed the documents, to Premier Mussolini on behalf of the pope. It was the first act of such nature since 1870, and was symbolic of the new cordiality between the holy see and Italy. The cardinal turned toward Mussolini, handed him the pen and said: "Your excellency, I am instructed by his holiness the pope, to offer you this as a gift from his holiness as a souvenir of this event." Mussolini accepted the pen graciously.

PETE COOLES



One of Cisco's progressive young business men is Pete Cooles, who, despite his Irish moniker, claims Old England as the land of his nativity. He was born in London—a Christmas present to his parents—in the year 1890. But he is a true American citizen, with American ideals, as he came to the United States when a boy of 16 years.

Mr. Cooles and his partner, Charles S. Sandier, are proprietors of a lumber and building material business on East Tenth street, where they also conduct a hide and junk business. He is comparatively a recent citizen, as he moved to Cisco to make his home in June, 1925, when he purchased the hide and junk business formerly conducted by W. E. McWhorter. Mr. Cooles was joined in September of the same year by Mr. Sandier and the business has been successfully operated by these gentlemen since that time. He has proven himself a progressive citizen in his contribution to the material growth of Cisco, by aiding in the construction of several new residences in this city.

While it was not until 1925 that Mr. Cooles located in Cisco, he says he had attempted to locate here 18 years ago, but could not purchase the business he wanted. But during all that time he kept Cisco in mind, and finally made this city his home.

Soon after his arrival in the United States he was one of the crew of 40 who went with the federal engineers to the Panama canal zone in the early stages of the building of the canal. He was one of eight of that crew that returned to the states, the others having died of fever.

After his return to the states he finally located at Midland, but said in the 15 months there no rain fell and he decided to go further east locating in Fort Worth, where he resided until his removal to Cisco.

LINDBERGH LANDED TODAY AT BELIZE

BELIZE, British Honduras, Feb. 11.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh landed here at 10:50 a. m. today on his northbound air mail flight from Cristobal, Panama Canal Zone. Lindbergh left Managua, Nicaragua, at 7:20 a. m. he was accompanied by a second Sikorsky amphibian mail plane piloted by Lyman E. Merritt. He omitted making a stop at Tehu, Honduras, originally planned in the itinerary.

Probe of Reports Indiana Concern Makes Product Convert Industrial Alcohol Into Beverage Demanded

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—An investigation by the federal trade commission to determine whether legitimate manufacturing and merchandising organization facilitate bootlegging activities was demanded in a resolution introduced by Representative Sprout, representative, Kansas, today.

The resolution asks whether "Col. Robert W. Stewart as a directing official of the Standard Oil company of Indiana originated, approved, or had knowledge of any sales promotion policy which contemplated augmenting profits of his company through sales of Stanolax to any person or persons known to have been engaged in the manufacture of intoxicating beverages in violation of the Volstead act."

Sprout said he understood chemists of Standard Oil of Indiana have been instructed to prepare oils that could be used to remove denaturants from industrial alcohol. "We want to find out if this is true," he said. "We have heard rumors that sale of Stanolax is one of the chief reasons for the great

prosperity of the Standard Oil of Indiana." He said the investigation is in general line with the nationwide prohibition inquiry suggested by President-elect Hoover.

CHICAGO, Feb. 11.—The statement of Winthrop W. Aldrich for John D. Rockefeller, Jr., attacking Colonel Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, was a "cowardly and dastardly libel," Alfred L. Hopkins, attorney for Stewart, said in a country statement today.

Hopkins challenged the truth of the Aldrich statement and accused Rockefeller of attempting to "deceive the stockholders and the public" in his move to oust Stewart from the Indiana Standard directorate.

Hopkins was chief of defense counsel in Stewart's trials in Washington for contempt of the senate and perjury in connection with the Continental trading deals. "I am willing to go so far as to quit my position if I am wrong," Hopkins said. "If Aldrich will quit if he is wrong."

RICHARDS WON'T DISCUSS PREDICAMENT

DALLAS, Feb. 11.—After two nights spent in the Dallas county jail, Ben C. Richards, Jr., son of a former mayor of Waco, apparently is convinced that silence is the better part of valor. He declined to discuss the verdict of a jury in Judge Grover Adams' district court Saturday night which found him guilty of forgery and fixed his punishment at three years in the state penitentiary.

"Is it a fact that your attorney will enter a motion for a new trial?" Richards was asked. "I would rather not speak on the subject at this time," the prisoner replied.

APPOINTMENT OF PAT NEFF IS FAVORED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—A favorable report on the nomination of former Governor Pat M. Neff of Texas for reappointment to the board of mediation was authorized by the senate interstate commerce committee today by a vote of 8 to 6.

TWO PEOPLE ARE KILLED IN ACCIDENTS

HOUSTON, Feb. 11.—Two persons were dead and many were in hospitals today as a result of accidents over the week end. J. M. (Mac) Smith, city fireman, was instantly killed when the coupling of a fire hose came loose and struck him, breaking his neck. He was fighting a fire. Mrs. C. W. Scherffius, died from injuries received when she slipped from the fourth floor of the Bristol hotel to the roof of the Travelers hotel, fifty feet below. A. M. Johnson, Jr., 19, was unconscious after being injured in an auto collision at 1 a. m. Sunday. His condition was critical. Others received less serious injuries in auto accidents.

QUEENS MEET BUCKARETTES THIS EVENING

The Cisco Lobo Queens and the Breckenridge Buckaretttes, bitter rivals on the basketball court will meet this evening at 7:30 o'clock at the Cisco high school gymnasium for the second time this season. In the first game between these two teams, played at Breckenridge the Queens were victorious by a margin of two points. The contest this evening will be fully as close and hard fought as the first. The proceeds from the game will be used to defray the expenses of taking the Queens to the West Texas A. A. U. basketball tournament at Snyder.

DIRECTORS OF C. OF C. MEET TUESDAY NIGHT

The regular monthly meeting of the directors of the Cisco chamber of commerce will be held in the directors' rooms Tuesday evening. This will be an important meeting, according to President E. P. Crawford, who requests a full and prompt attendance of the directorate. Considerable time will be devoted to the appointment of committees and working out a program of activities for the present year's work. President Crawford invites any citizen of Cisco interested in the city's progress to attend these meetings and offer constructive suggestions, but the meetings are not executive, but open to all.

WOMAN FLIER ESTABLISHES NEW RECORD

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 11.—Eighteen-year-old Bobby Trout, who would "rather fly than wash dishes," established a new endurance record for women fliers today. At 7:27.39 a. m. Pacific coast time, she had exceeded by one hour the previous mark of 13 hours, 16 minutes and 43 seconds set by Miss Elmer Smith of New York.

Miss Trout equalled Miss Smith's flight at 6:27.30 a. m. But by rules of aviation competition an endurance record stands until it has been bettered by one hour.

HOOVER PARTY AT EDISON'S FOR BIRTHDAY

FORT MYERS, Fla., Feb. 11.—President-elect Hoover arrived at the Edison home here today at 10:30 o'clock, for the 82nd birthday celebration of Thomas A. Edison. He and Mrs. Hoover and members of the party were met at the dock on the Edison estate by the inventor and then shook hands with Ford and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Firestone and local officials, headed by Mayor Elmer Rough. "Hello, fishermen," Edison greeted the president-elect and the two shook hands. Hoover smiled warmly and then shook hands with Ford and Firestone as the cameras clicked. The party retired to the house for a few minutes before beginning a parade through the city.

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Bad Management Responsible for Present Crowded Conditions Former Acting Manager Writes to Senate

AUSTIN, Feb. 11.—There are thousands of acres of fine uncultivated land on four of the lower prison farms that could be put into use and the prisoners there made an asset to the state, H. W. Sayle, former acting general manager of the prison system, wrote to Senator W. D. McFarlane, chairman of the senate penitentiary committee.

This letter together with two by B. B. Monzingo, former farm manager, were introduced into the senate this morning by Senator McFarlane. Sayle's letter was ordered printed in the Senate Journal as was one of Monzingo's. The second by Monzingo was referred to the penitentiary committee. Sayle's letter was signed, but the signatures of Monzingo's were typed. Sayle attributes the crowded condition to bad management, according to his letter. The colored farmers were better looked after under his care than the tenant farmer among that class of people on the outside, he wrote.

"The only trouble that I ever had was the fact that the state had so many of these large farms, when they would start pardoning prisoners they would always make us short on labor," Sayle wrote. In 1927 if I had had the men that they had in 1928, I could have easily made \$500,000 to \$600,000 more for the state than I did.

Mr. Baker, (Col. R. H. Baker is chairman of the prison board) said to me two or three times "You are going to make such a large crop this year that I don't believe we will ever get the legislature to give the board plenary power to dispose of these farms." I thought of course that he was joking, but since Monzingo seems to view the matter as he does, he must have meant it."

NOT ENTITLED TO PAY TOLEDO, O., Feb. 11.—The circuit court of appeals today ruled that former police chief S. A. Lengel, of Canton, who was convicted and later acquitted of participating in the assassination of Don R. Mellett, crusading editor of the Canton Daily News, is not entitled to reinstatement and back pay.

House Refuses to Bar as Primary Candidates Those Who Bolted Their Party Prior to Last General Election

AUSTIN, Feb. 11.—The Texas house of representatives today refused to bar as primary election candidates those who bolted their party farther back than the last general election. Recess was taken before voting on a proposal to bar the Hoover Democrats.

The vote against excluding all who ever bolted their party was 70 to 42. The vote to exclude those who have bolted in ten years was 67 to 43.

Debate on barring the Hoover Democrats was to be resumed this afternoon. While Hoover Democrats are not specifically named, the members referred to them frequently. Luke Mankin, author of the bill, declared Tom Love of Dallas, prominent Hoover supporter, already is preparing to run for governor next time.

CONGRESS IS CALLED FOR MARCH FOURTH

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—President Coolidge today issued a proclamation calling an extra session of the senate to convene at 12 o'clock noon March 4. The president's action conforms with the usual procedure of calling the senate into session on inauguration day to receive cabinet appointments for confirmation and such other business of the incoming executive as may require immediate action.

EDISON FAVORS \$24,000,000 DRY FUND INCREASE

FORT MYERS, Fla., Feb. 11.—Thomas A. Edison declared himself in favor of the additional \$24,000,000 sought in congress for prohibition enforcement, announced he had found 40 rubber substitute plants which can be cultivated on a large scale and condemned increasing stock speculation as leading ultimately to panic, in his annual interview here today on his eighty-second birthday.

TEACHER NOT GUILTY. WACO, Feb. 11.—A jury reporting Sunday morning found Cecil Brown, Abilene school teacher, not guilty on charges of forgery. The case had been on trial all week and went to the jury Saturday night. The defense claimed Brown was not responsible for his acts because of injuries inflicted by a blow on the head.

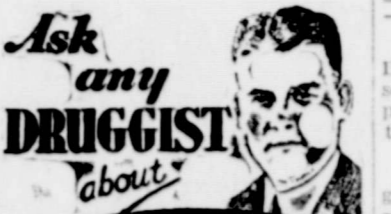

TRAIN OF MEXICAN PRESIDENT DYNAMITED SUNDAY EVENING

Stringent Precautions Are Taken to Prevent Outburst of Disorders; Lives of Mexican Leaders Threatened

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 11.—Stringent precautions against disorder were taken by the government today after a disturbed week end in Mexico during which the special train of President Emilio Portes Gil was wrecked by a bomb, another passenger train was dynamited, a bomb was discovered in the office of Aaron Saenz, political leader, and serious disorders occurred in the capital.

The happenings came within 24 hours of the execution of Jose De Leon Toral, whose funeral caused disturbances in which at least three were killed and more than 30 wounded.

President Portes Gil, with his wife and baby daughter, reached the capital safely at 1:20 a. m. on a heavily guarded train. He smiled as he reached the platform and was embraced by several close friends.

The attempt on his life was made at 7 a. m. yesterday between Conofort and Rinconillo in the state of San Luis Potosi, on the main line between Laredo and the capital. The president was returning from Tamaulipas, where he had turned over his duties as governor of the state to his successor.

The presidential train, one of the most luxurious in the world, was wrecked by a bomb as it approached a bridge. The customary pilot train, carrying troops, had crossed the bridge safely, but the bomb was so timed that it blew up the presidential train, wrecking the engine and first two cars. The car carrying the president and his family remained on the rails.

Troops were called out at once and began an extensive search for the perpetrators, with orders to execute summarily any they caught. The military escort of the presidential train took into custody for questioning about 20 persons found near the wreck.

Meanwhile, police announced at midnight that an unexploded bomb had been found in the office of Aaron Saenz, a leading candidate for the six-year term for president in the election to be held next November. Saenz was a member of both the Obregon and Calles cabinets.

The capital had quieted down during the night after demonstra-

tions during the funeral of Toral, assassin of President-elect Obregon. Police made 34 arrests; it was estimated unofficially, and 17 of the injured had been treated in hospitals.

The pilot train accompanying the president to the capital brought the body of Augustine Martinez, fireman of the presidential train, only death victim of the wreck. He was standing on the rear platform of the tender when the explosion occurred.

A report received by the newspaper Prensa said that on Saturday the president received an anonymous warning written on a piece of satin, reading:

"Slave, command your soul to God. There shall not reach Mexico City."

ACCIDENT SHOT.
BORGER, Feb. 11.—A bullet accidentally discharged from the gun of a fellow-officer struck and killed Joe Hutson, chief of police here, Sunday morning. Tom Hughes, a police officer, was putting his gun in its scabbard and dropped it to the floor. The impact discharged the gun, the bullet striking Hughes in the right ankle and then ricocheting from the cement floor and hitting Hutson's thigh. Hutson died from loss of blood. Hughes will recover. The dead officer is survived by his wife and five children.
