WOULD CLOSE TEXAS FISHING WATERS \$416,706,000 Required to Complete Texas Road System HEATED ROWS MARK JOHNSTON TRIAL

Attorneys, Senators and Witness Involved in Squabbles During Second Day of Impeachment Case

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 12.—Heated rows in which attorneys, senators, and a witness took part featured the second day of Henry S. Johnston's gubernatorial impeachment trial on charges of incompetency. As an anti-climax, Senator Fletcher Johnson made his way to the press table and tried to whip a newspaper reporter. Presiding Chief Justice Charles W. Mason interfered and prevented any blow being struck.

The prosecution is seeking to establish what motive prompted Johnston to pardon Dewey Crosswaite, escaped slayer of Thelma Lovejoy, without studying records of the case. The pardon of Crosswaite is one of the cleverest articles of impeachment against Johnston, all of which are claimed to have resulted through incompetency.

PRESIDENT GOING HOME. WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—President Coolidge will leave on the afternoon of March 4, after the inauguration ceremonies for his old home at Northampton, Mass. It was learned at the white house today.

WOULD ISSUE BONDS. WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Authority to issue \$7,185,000 of equipment trust certificates to be applied toward purchase of \$9,395,000 of railway equipment was sought from the interstate commerce commission today by the Missouri Pacific railroad.

TO SELL SHIPS. WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The U. S. shipping board informed the senate commerce committee today it has decided to sell the U. S. lines and American Merchant line steamers to the Paul W. Chapman Co., at New York.

LIFER HUNTED. HOUSTON, Feb. 12.—Bill Taylor, life termer from San Augustine county, who escaped from Harlem prison farm Monday, was hunted here today. Police had been asked by farm officers to watch for the man who, they thought, headed for Houston.

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—J. O. Woodward of Coleman, recently defeated after serving 25 years as district judge, is picked here as likely choice of Governor Moody to succeed the late James F. Swayne of Fort Worth as member of the state industrial accident board. Judge Woodward is father of State Senator Walter Woodward. The place on the board vacated by Judge Swayne's death must be filled by an attorney.

SPROUL CHARGE ON STANOLAX CALLED ABSURD

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—Officials of the Standard Oil company, Indiana, characterized as "absurd" statements by Representative Sproul, Kansas Republican, that the Standard company had manufactured a mineral oil used by bootleggers in removing denaturants from chemical alcohol. The oil, Stanolax, is purely a mineral laxative, the officials asserted. Sproul asserted chemists of the company had been instructed to prepare it so that denaturants could be removed from rubbing alcohol and the like.

REPARATIONS CONFERENCE GETS TO WORK

PARIS, Feb. 12.—The reparations conference got down to business today under an American chairman and with the experts of the six other nations apparently looking to Owen D. Young and J. P. Morgan for impartial guidance and advice in settling the financial problems left by the world war.

The position of the United States was made clear as an interested third party, ready to collaborate when the others reach an agreement. Morgan explained the United States position in a few words at yesterday's organization meetings, at which Young was elected chairman unanimously.

OLDEST EMPLOYEE DEAD. AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—H. G. Collins, 87, probably the oldest employe on the state's payroll and a teacher of music at the state institute for the blind since 1884, dropped dead Monday apparently from a heart attack. Collins had recently been a victim of influenza and it is thought that he got up too soon.

NORTHCOAST IN PRISON. SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Feb. 12.—Gordon Stewart Northcott, doomed slayer of three southern California youths, entered San Quentin prison here today. He arrived at 8:30 a. m.

BILL SMITH GIVEN STAY OF EXECUTION

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—Another reprieve was ordered today by Governor Moody for Bill Smith under sentence to be electrocuted Thursday for killing Sheriff Bob Smith of Fisher county. Alsmists are still investigating the claim that he has become insane since conviction.

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—Governor Dan Moody announced today that he will stay the electrocution of Robert F. Blake, sentenced to die Friday for killing J. Fred Conner, tutor, mobile salesman, in Swisher county July 16, 1925. The state board has been investigating a commutation plea.

SUPPLEMENTAL ESTIMATE DRY FUNDS MADE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—A supplemental estimate of funds required for the prohibition bureau and customs service is being prepared by the treasury department for submission to congress. Under Secretary Ogden L. Mills said today. He said the additional prohibition appropriation to be asked would be small compared with the \$24,000,000 proposed in the pending deficiency bill.

INQUIRY INTO BOOK PRICES IS SERIOUS

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—The investigation into the prices paid by the state of Texas for textbooks purchased for the public schools, ordered by the senate and house, is beginning to assume a serious aspect. Senator A. J. Wirtz, of Guadalupe, chairman of the investigating committee, announced that his committee would meet later in the day to vote on issuing subpoenas for several witnesses.

LOCAL BANKS CLOSED HONOR OF LINCOLN

The 120th anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, the martyred president of the United States, who was slain in the old Ford theater by John Wilkes Booth, over-zealous Southern partisan, is being observed in Cisco by the two banking institutions, whose doors are closed for the entire day. Neither the local postoffice nor the public schools are observing the day.

Coolidge to Sign Cruiser Bill at Once

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—President Coolidge expects to sign the cruiser construction bill within the next few days, it was learned at the white house today. The budget bureau has informed the president that the appropriations under the bill would require a total of approximately \$50,000,000 for fiscal year ending June 30, 1929, and June 30, 1930.

2,000 HIDALGO CITIZENS ON WAY TO AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—Austin police were today called upon to prepare to prevent a possible march on the capitol and picketing of the legislature when Rio Grande Valley citizens arrive here Wednesday to protest against the legislature's failure to hear their election contest. Messages received by members of the legislature today said 2,000 residents of Hidalgo county are enroute here in protest.

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE HEAD SERVING TIME

PURTNAMVILLE, Ind., Feb. 12.—Surrounded by bootleggers, forgers and thieves, the Rev. E. S. Shumaker, superintendent of the Indiana Anti-Saloon League and an ordained minister, today began serving his 60-day sentence on the Indiana prison farm for contempt of the state supreme court.

KILLED IN CAPE. BIG SPRING, Feb. 12.—J. C. Cordell, oil field worker, was shot and killed today in a cafe at Fort San, an oil field town 16 miles southwest of here. Bedford Forrest, an employe of the cafe, was arrested and placed in the Howard county jail.

DISFAVOR NEW COURTS. AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—The house judiciary committee today reported against creation of two additional civil district courts for Dallas county.

Holbrook Bill, Under Plea of Conservation, Would Close All Salt Water Inlets Along Coast



Charles S. COLEMAN MAN KILLED WHEN CAR HIT TRAIN

BROWNWOOD, Feb. 12.—Joe Beale, 24, truck driver of Coleman, was killed instantly this morning at a crossing three miles west of here when he ran into the second coach of a Santa Fe passenger train. The truck was hurled into the cattle guard where Beale's body was found by trainmen. His wife survives.

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—Fish again had the attention of the senate this morning. They were the objects of floods of oratory most of yesterday afternoon. Following the opening of the senate this morning, Sen. T. J. Holbrook of Galveston, waded to the middle of the floor and launched into longwinded arguments in favor of his bill to close all salt water inlets along the Texas coast of the Gulf of Mexico to trawling and seining.

Senators Archie Parr of Davall and J. W. Stevenson of Victoria, whenever they could get the senator from Galveston to yield the floor for a minute, stouled opposition. Senator Parr had offered a substitute bill to the Holbrook measure which would leave open all the salt water inlets in the coast line of his district not already closed by law. His district extends from Port Aransas to Port Isabel.

GOVERNMENT BUILDING PLAN SENT TO HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The government's 1930 public building program has projects totaling \$46,760,500 of which \$9,210,000 congress was asked to appropriate immediately was sent to the house by President Coolidge.

The projects asked included: Little Rock, Ark., postoffice and court house, \$1,300,000; appropriation \$275,000. Fort Worth, Texas, increased cost of project from \$1,200,000 to \$1,400,000.

Adoption of New School Code for Texas Will Go to Special Session if Wishes of House Are Adopted

AUSTIN, Feb. 12.—Adoption of a school code for Texas will go over to a special session of the legislature if wishes expressed by the house today are followed. After taking up the bill on special setting, the house ordered it recommitted to the committee on education. The proposed law is a codification of existing school laws with a number of changes. Most discussed of the changes is a proposal to have county school superintendents appointed instead of elected.

Commercial motor trucks operation will go under the railroad commission under terms of a bill offered today by Leonard Tillotson of Sealy. The bill calls for the state assuming control in practically the same way as motor busses were taken under regulation two years ago.

and sought considerable explanation from Senator Holbrook. Senator Julien Hyer of Fort Worth made a motion to table Holbrook's bill and the substitute indefinitely, this move was described by Lieut. Gov. Barry Miller as a "grated way to kill a bill." This was lost by a vote of 10 yeas to 17 nays. Then by a close vote of 13 yeas to 14 nays, Senator Parr's substitute was lost. Senator Stevenson then sent up an amendment to the Holbrook bill which would allow the net to be used but would prohibit the use of the drag net and the seine. Before a vote could be taken the Senator moved to recess until this afternoon.

The Holbrook bill, as it stands, would, if passed, be a severe blow to the fishing industry in Texas, those opposing it assert. By preventing the use of the seine and drag net the supply of sea foods now available would be further cut down and Texas would be forced to import more and more of its sea foods, although its coast line is swarming with fish. The bill in effect deals a severe blow to a necessary and large industry in favor of the less than one percent of the population that are classed as sportsmen.

"THUMBS DOWN" ON CAPPER'S EMBARGO PLAN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Republican leaders of the present and near future, from the white house to Miami, have turned thumbs down on the Capper resolution proposing to "put teeth" in the Kellogg anti-war treaty by authorizing the president to proclaim embargoes against violators. President Coolidge made known today he thought the measure too sweeping.

DALLAS, Feb. 12.—Motion for a new trial for Lee Roy Merriman, sentenced to death for an attack on an Oak Cliff girl, was overruled by Judge Grover Adams today. Attorneys for Merriman gave notice of appeal to the court of criminal appeals.
