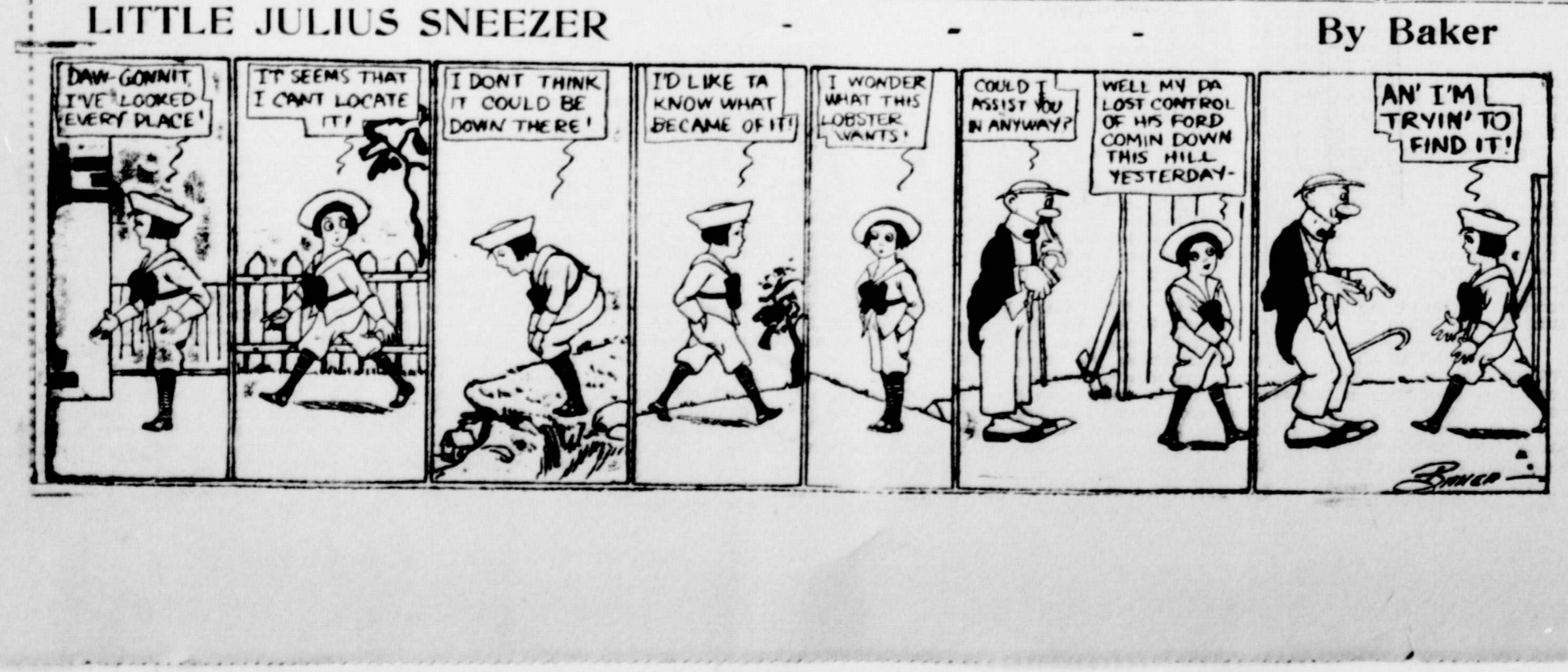

\$42,000 DAMAGE SUIT FILED IN DISTRICT COURT

EASTLAND, Feb. 26.—E. J. Hatten and wife have brought suit in the district court against G. A. Davison of Eastland and F. A. and J. H. Smith, who compose the firm of Smith Bros., builders of portions of Eastland county's highway system, for \$42,000 damages for the death of their 15-year-old son, Charles, who was killed by an explosion. Seventeen thousand dollars actual and \$25,000 exemplary damages are asked. Plaintiffs' petition alleges among other things that Charlie Hatten was killed when dynamite and blasting powder exploded in a powder magazine near the Hatten home three miles south of town. Carelessness and negligence on the part of the defendants in permitting the explosive to be exposed and in not warning the plaintiffs of the danger, is alleged. Young Hatten was killed on the evening of April 19, 1928.

JUDGMENT AWARDED DEFENDANTS

EASTLAND, Feb. 26.—Mrs. Boyd Davenport and husband of Ranger will be given judgment in the suit brought against them by Mrs. Evalena Timmonds for \$15,000 for the death of her husband who was injured some months ago and died when his car was struck by a car being driven by Mrs. Davenport. The accident happened on the highway between Ranger and Breckenridge. Timmonds was a traveling salesman. Judge Elzo Been, before whom the case was tried, stated this morning that out of the 57 special issues submitted in the case, the jury answered a sufficient number of them favorable to the defense and that the judgment he would render would be for them.

FORMER CITY COMMISSIONER ABILENE DEAD

ABILENE, Feb. 26.—W. E. Harris, 60, former city commissioner of Abilene and member of the local police department for more than a year and a half, died suddenly at his residence here Sunday morning at 4:15 o'clock. His death was attributed to heart attack.

Born in Mason county, Mr. Harris came to Abilene in 1905 and was employed by the Abilene Cotton Oil company. Later he was made manager of the Citizens Lumber company and held that position for several years. He resigned in 1929. He was a member of the city commission here three years prior to this.

TITLE BID

CHICAGO, Feb. 26.—The right to meet Andre Routsis for the title of featherweight champion of the world will be fought tonight when Tony Canzoneri, former champion, and Ignacio Fernandez meet here. The bout is scheduled for 10 rounds and will be the second meeting between the two. Canzoneri took a decision from the Filipino in New York about a year ago.

BIG 10 RACE NARROWS

CHICAGO, Feb. 26.—The Big Ten basketball championship race has narrowed down to a battle between Wisconsin and Michigan, with the Badgers virtually assured of at least a tie for the title. Wisconsin assumed the commanding position by defeating Purdue 27-24, last night. The defeat practically puts Purdue out of title consideration, although there still is a mathematical possibility of the Boilermakers gaining a three way leadership tie.

OIL NEWS OF SOUTHWEST

HOUSTON, Feb. 26.—Average daily estimated production of the Gulf Coast-Southern Louisiana oil fields last week was 144,217 barrels, an increase of 1,085 barrels over the previous week.

SNYDER, Feb. 26.—L. D. Ladd and J. S. Maxwell, Fort Worth, have purchased the 10,000-acre drilling block on the Scurry-Fisher county line, assembled by J. R. Mims and Jack Scarborough, it was announced here Monday. They will complete the wildcat test well now drilling below 200 feet on section

216, H. & T. C. survey, planning to drill it to 4,000 feet if necessary.

PECOS, Feb. 26.—Lockhard & Co.'s Wheat No. 1-A in Loving county produced 300 barrels of high gravity oil in 24 hours ending Monday night, following a shot late Sunday. After the cleaning out, oil men estimate the new well should settle down to about 150 barrels daily. It is the eighth producer in the field.

PRINTER'S MISTAKE

AUSTIN, Feb. 26.—State Labor Commissioner Charles McKenney is given nine times as much salary as the governor under the new labor department salary bill. Printed copies of the bill give him \$36,000 a year. Investigation shows it's a printer's mistake. The bill really proposes \$3,600.

MEXICAN SHOT DEAD TRYING TO ROB BANK

BASTROP, Feb. 26.—A Mexican who had been caught in the act of burglarizing the First National bank here was shot to

death when he attempted to scale a high board fence in his dash for liberty. Joe Jenkins, night watchman, discovered the Mexican in the bank and notified Sheriff Woody Townsend and a deputy sheriff. As they approached the bank the Mexican dashed out a back door and was shot as he attempted to climb a fence. The burglar failed to secure any loot.

Cisco Lobo Cagers Go to Abilene Wednesday Night to Meet Eagles in First of Bi-District Series

Wednesday night, Coach "Crip" Golightly will take his Lobo basketball team, champions of district 9 in the University Interscholastic league, to Abilene to play the first of a two-out-of-three series with the Abilene high school Eagles for the bi-district championship and the right to go to the state meet, held this year at A. & M. college, March 8 and 9. Friday night the Eagles will come to Cisco for the second game of the series. If a third game is necessary it will be played Saturday night, the place to be decided by the toss of a coin.

The Lobos won the district title last week when they won two games from the Stephenville Yellow Jackets. This made the third district flag that Coach Golightly's teams have won in as many years. In 1927, the Lobos won Golightly had charge of basketball his team won 27 games of 29 played, losing one game out of three played with Ranger and then losing to the state champions, Athens, in the state meet. The following year the Lobos played 23 games and won 21 of them, again losing one of the series of three to Ranger, and losing by the narrow margin of one point to Forest avenue high school of Dallas in the state meet. This year the Lobos have played 19 games and have won 15 of them but have not lost an official contest. They lost two practice games to Breckenridge and then defeated the Breckenridges in two official games. They also lost two practice games to the Denton high school team, one of the favorites in the state race. Both games were played in Denton. The Lobos have scored a total of 577 points in 37 for their opponents in 19 games played so far this season.

The leading scorer of the Lobo pack is Wendell Whitehead, forward, who has looped 56 field goals and 18 free throws for a total of 118

points, in the 18 games in which he has taken part. "Cotton" Pippen, who plays either forward or center for the Lobos is next with 46 field goals and 19 free throws for 111 points. Pippen has been sick during a great deal of the present season and his total points has been cut down on this account. O. C. Ray, guard for the Lobos, is third with 36 field goals and 24 fouls for 96 points, in 19 games. G. Van Horn, guard and captain of the Lobos, comes next with 75 points made on 19 field goals and 35 free throws. Ollie Little is close behind G. Van Horn with 72 points. The other scorers in order are C. Van Horn 46, Price 30, Yeager 20, Kellogg 9, Daniel 4 and Smith 2. Price has made 8 free throws out of 9 tries in last the percentage column in this respect with an average of .888. C. Pippen is next with 19 goals made in 23 attempts for a percentage of .826. Whitehead is third with 18 free goals in 27 attempts for a percentage of .666.

When the Lobos and the Eagles meet in any branch of athletics there is almost always an intensely interesting combat. This was very true last year when the Lobos met the Eagles for the bi-district title of 1928. The first game was won by the Lobos in the last minute of the game when Cotton Pippen, with Abilene leading 18 to 17 with 40 seconds to play, looped a beautiful field goal from the sideline close to the middle of the court to give the Lobos the same 19 to 18. The second game was equally as hard fought and was won by the score of 21 to 18.

The Eagle team of this year has been going strong. The only basis of comparing them with the Lobos is in the fact that they defeated Breckenridge 21 to 16 while the Lobos were lucky to win from the Breckenridges by the scores of 18 to 17 and 26 to 24, the second game going

into two over-time periods. The Eagles had no trouble in winning their district tournament played at Roby last Friday and Saturday. They won the final game from Goree by the score of 38 to 19. The Lobos were hard-pressed in their final series for the district title and beat Stephenville 30 to 25 and 25 to 20 in two close games. The Abilene district played all the district games in a tournament while this district used the home and home bi-district method.

The Eagles have three outstanding players, Jack Smith, left-handed forward, Salyer, center, and Allen, guard. Smith has been their strongest scorer but Allen is possibly more valuable for his all-round play. Salyer is very tall and can control the tip-off against most high school centers. The Eagles have another tall player in Gross, who towers above the ordinary high school player as a tall tower over a scrub oak. Gross is the Eagles' defensive star.

The Lobos hope to have their full strength in the starting line-up Wednesday. If they are able to do this it will be the first time in many moons. Sickness has had the Lobos crippled nearly all season. First one Lobo and then another

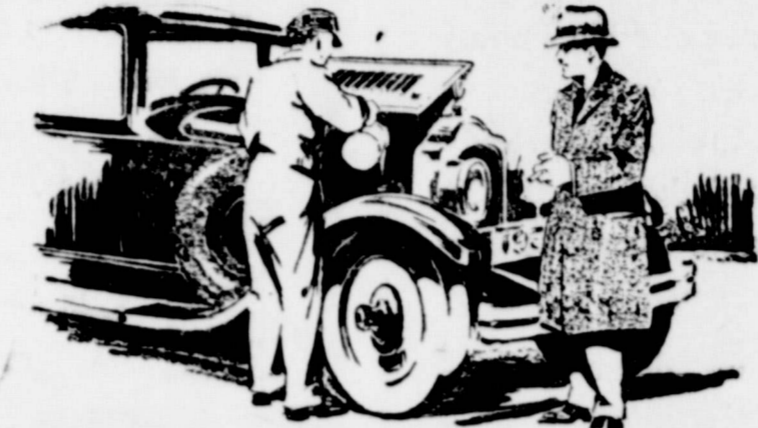
GASOLINE WAR.

50 PER CENT REDUCTION IN AUTO FEES PROVIDED IN BILL

New Schedule Would Be Based on Weight With Horsepower Rating Omitted; Measure Passed by House

AUSTIN, Feb. 26.—The automobile license on a Ford coupe will be reduced to \$7.65 and on a Ford sedan to \$8.66 under the schedule of rates placed in the auto registration bill passed by the house of representatives. The bill makes approximate reduction of 50 per cent generally in the registration fee now effective.

The fee will be based on weight, omitting the horsepower rating. Up to 2,000 pounds the charge on passenger cars will be 28 cents a hundred; from there to 3,500 pounds, 36 cents a hundred; from there to 4,500 pounds, 48 cents a hundred and above that 56 cents a hundred pounds.

Tractor fees begin at 25 cents a hundred pounds and run to \$2. The lowest trailer rate is 39 cents a hundred pounds and the highest \$6 a hundred pounds.

The fees will be collected by counties as at present. All the fees up to \$50,000 are to be retained by the counties; between \$50,000 and \$300,000 half is to be kept by the county and half go to the state highway department.

A companion bill, still to come before the house, provides for a gasoline tax of four cents a gallon. By the terms of a bill engrossed last night it will be necessary to make a certificate at the time the vehicle is registered that it was rendered for a valorem tax.

One other bill was acted upon late last night. It revises present law regulating operation of guns. Before being engrossed it was amended to strike out a provision that gunners should make duplicated report to the state department.

LIQUOR CACHE IN CHURCH
WARRENSBURG, N. Y., Feb. 26. The law of sanctuary is not recognized in this country but an ingenious bootlegger at Sodom near here recently decided that Union church constituted the safest cache for a liquor load while his car was being repaired. With some companions, the bootlegger, lifted the carpet from the floor of the church, pried loose some boards and stowed away the contraband. Somehow noisy urchins discovered what was taking place and banged open the door of the church. The bootlegger proved himself a diplomat by bribing the children to silence. Nevertheless, the news seeped out and an interested audience watched while the liquor was carried out and whisked away in the car.

LOBOES NEED ALL STRENGTH BEAT EAGLES

Coach Goughly of the Loboes has piloted his basketball teams to three consecutive district championships in the three years that he has coached. In the past two years his teams have gone to the state meet. The first time they went to the state meet they were eliminated in the second round by the Athens team, state champions of that year. Last year they were edged out by Forest avenue high school of Dallas by the score of 22 to 21. This week they will be battling the Abilene Eagles for the right to go to the state tournament held at A. & M. March 8 and 9.

\$6,000,000 FOR FARMERS.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—President Coolidge signed a bill Monday creating a fund of \$6,000,000 for emergency relief of farmers in the storm and flood stricken areas of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida and Alabama.

HAWKS TO HOUSTON.
HOUSTON, Feb. 26.—Captain Frank Hawks, Houston flyer who recently set a new record for a non-stop flight from California to New York, will arrive in Houston about 9 p. m. Wednesday. He will fly here from New York in the Lockheed air express monoplane in which he set the record. Houston will be the first point to be visited on a tour of principal cities of the nation.

EQUIPMENT FOR TESTING COWS HERE

Equipment for testing milk ordered by the Cisco Parcel Post Cow Testing association has arrived and is now being installed in the vocational department of the Cisco high school where all milk will be tested under the supervision of E. H. Varnell, vocational agriculturalist. The equipment includes a large electric tester with a capacity of 36 bottles. In addition to this there are a dozen parcel post boxes for making the small cans in which samples of milk are sent to the laboratory each month for the tests. These boxes vary in size, some containing six cans, some 12, some 18 and others 32. There are about 35 different milk producers signed up with the association. The number of cans represented is 274. Testing will be carried forward throughout the month, the cows having been divided into three groups, one group to be tested between the 1st and 10th of each month; another between the 11th and 20th; and a third between the
