Nominations for Hoover's Cabinet Confirmed by Senate

MEXICAN TROOPS MOVING ON REBELS

Probability of Engagement Seen as Federal Forces Forge Toward Stronghold of Revolting Elements

CISCO CITY, March 5.—The probability of an engagement between federal and rebel forces in the Vera Cruz area was seen today as the government's hurried efforts to concentrate troops along the front.

Throughout the night, troop movements continued unceasingly. Plans for the attack on the Vera Cruz area and toward strategic points leading to Vera Cruz and Sinaloa.

REBELS CONTROL RAILROAD

EL PASO, March 5.—Revolutionists are in control of the Mexican National railroad south of Jimenez, officials at Chihuahua City, Mexico, announced today. Trains are running southward only as far as Jimenez. Passengers for Mexico City have been obliged to abandon the trains there to wait until the embargo is lifted.

A freight and passenger embargo has been placed on Southern Pacific lines in Mexico, company officials announced here today. No trains are running south from Nogales and no through tickets are being sold here. Service from Agua Prieta to Nacozari also is disrupted.

President Takes up Mexican Situation as First of Official Problems After Entering Office

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The Mexican Government will be permitted to purchase such arms and munitions as it may need in the near future to cope with present conditions in Mexico, it was learned here today.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—One of President Hoover's most bitter opponents in the pre-convention campaign became his first lieutenant today when Senator James Watson of Indiana was elected Republican leader of the senate at a party caucus.

Favorable Action Taken on List of Appointments 15 Minutes After Presented by New President Today

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The senate today confirmed the cabinet nominations of President Hoover. The cabinet slate follows: Secretary of State—Henry L. Stimson, of New York, lawyer, 61; secretary of war under President Taft; until recently governor-general of Philippines.

Favorable action was taken 15 minutes after the list had been submitted. Immediate confirmation had not been expected, it having been previously reported the nominations would be referred to committees because of threatened opposition to some of the appointees.

MAN FOUND HANGED ON OIL LEASE

EASTLAND, March 5.—The lifeless body of Charlie Cazod, Eastland oil field worker, was found today at noon hanging from the limb of a tree on the Bond lease, seven miles north of this city. Cazod was known to have been alive at 7 o'clock this morning. The body was found by other employees of the Reclamation Oil company.

BIG TERMINAL FOR ANGELO IS IN PROSPECT

SAN ANGELO, March 5.—San Angelo will become one of the biggest Texas terminals of the Santa Fe, if the Interstate Commerce commission grants the request of the directors of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railroad to lease the Orient lines in Texas to the Panhandle & Santa Fe, a Texas corporation.

COOLIDGES GREETED AT HOME TOWN

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., March 5.—The news in this quiet town today was that the Coolidges had come back home. They came back as they left—over the twenty-mile branch line that meanders down to Springfield. An engine, an empty day coach and a special car made up the unpretentious train that rattled into Northampton shortly after midnight, an hour and ten minutes late.

Senator Woodward shouted in battle pass small measure over veto. The bill so far as it remedies an injustice is a good thing. Senator Love declared, first to debate for the opponents. "But the trouble with this bill is that it not only does a good thing but also a bad thing."

Senator Woodward brought out that the legislature four years ago passed a measure validating titles to streams within towns and cities of 40,000 population. "If this act is invalid," he declared, "then that law is invalid."

Senator Woodward closed by making a plan that this bill be passed and become a law so that a test case might be brought before the supreme court to determine its constitutionality.

Rep. John H. Veneta of Joshua, who tendered his resignation when a similar bill was passed earlier in the session, again fought this one. He will not resign again but invited all other counties wanting experiment stations to bring forward bills, saying he would not oppose them but give all an equal chance.

Bank failures during 1928 were only about half as numerous as they were during the years previous, according to the American Bankers association.

The liquidation of a bank does not necessarily mean a loss to depositors, as the laws governing that subject are so drastic as to give ample protection to a bank's customers.

That the record of failures declined rather generally throughout the whole United States indicates further that there has been a rather broad dissemination of improved banking technique and fairly stable economic conditions.

During the last year or so, it may be noted, there has developed a tendency toward mergers in banks. In many states, banks are now allowed to maintain branches in the headquarters city, and in some instances a bank may operate branches throughout the state.

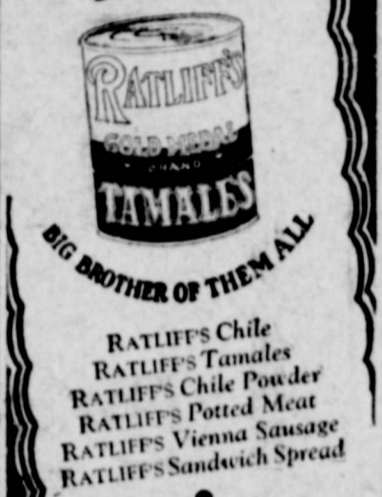

CHANGE NAME OF NEW CISCO ICE COMPANY

The name of Cisco's new ice company has been changed, it was announced today by H. H. Bettis, who is associated with George H. Coyle, in the organization of the new firm. Originally known as the Cisco Ice company the title of the company will be, instead, the People's Ice company.

A building for the company is now

being erected on what is known as the Moody lot at the intersection of E avenue and Sixth street. This structure of brick and one story in height, will cost approximately \$15,000. The capacity of the plant will be 20 tons of ice daily.

Cisco, Texas

List of Those Keeping an Eye on Governorship Growing Rather Long; Miller, Love and Pollard Foremost

BY RUTH BALDWIN COWAN
AUSTIN, March 5.—Say, Puss, who is going to be the next governor of the state of Texas?

The party interrogated, a non-descript tabby of uncertain ancestry, settled herself on the top step of the senate rotunda.

"Well, the list of those who have an interested eye on the job is getting rather lengthy. If it keeps on, there won't be many folks left to vote," the Capitol cat said with a flip of her right ear.

"But who? Name 'em."

"Why are you newbs houndin' always in such a hurry? That is why most of you never get anywhere."

"Capitol political talk has it that the present lieutenant governor, Barry Miller, of Dallas, Democrat, and the present senator from Dallas, Tom Love, Hooverite leader, will make the biggest splash when they five in. And there are the best of indications that they will plunge."

"Any others?"

"Off hand, I can name fourteen more Democrats, four Hooverites and two Republicans who are being mentioned as gubernatorial possibilities."

"Name 'em."

"The Democrats include: Claude Pollard, attorney general; R. L. Bobbitt and Lee Satterwhite, both former speakers of the house of representatives; W. S. Barron, Barron, present speaker; Lynch Davidson and T. W. Davidson, both former lieutenant governors; Mrs. Edith Williams; Sara Houston Terrell, state comptroller; Senator Walter Woodward, of Coleman; Ross Sterling, state highway commissioner; W. Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer; Clarence Gurley; Earle B. Mayfield, Texas "lame duck" senator; Thomas L. Blinn, "lame duck" congressman.

"The Hooverites being mentioned are: B. D. Sartin, Alvin Moody and V. A. Collins.

"Eugene Niche and W. H. Holmes are being spoken of as the Republican standard bearers in the governor's race."

"Two other Democrats, E. D. Senter, former senator, and Charles E. Baughman, former commissioner of warehouses, have already announced their intentions of setting in the primaries."

"But Puss, what about Governor Dan Moody?"

"Oh, it is said he will run against Morris Sheppard for United States senator."

"Who do you think are the strongest candidates so far, Puss?"

"Lieutenant Governor Barry Miller, Senator Thomas Love and Attorney General Claude Pollard."

"Tell me a little something about each, will you?"

"Well, Barry Miller is a lawyer. He has served in both the house and the senate, and also as district judge. He has always had strong labor support. He is now serving his third term as lieutenant governor, and that has only been done once before in the history of Texas.

"He is the legislature's candidate for governor. I want to tell you it is a mighty good thing to have the law-makers with you when you are chief executive."

"More folks don't stop to think that it won't do the people a bit of good to elect a man because of his platform if he hasn't got the legislature with him. How is he going to get his platform enacted, if he doesn't have? Ever stop to think of that?"

"Look at the hard time Governor Moody is having getting his measure through the 41st legislature. A number of his major administration measures, the civil service bill, for example, are corpses already. And others, such as the prison bill, are getting pretty well discarded."

"Miller will poll much regular Democratic vote and a large labor vote. He is a 2nd degree Mason and his wife, Mrs. Miller, is a Catholic. He is a reformed wet. Furthermore, he should draw a good-sized women's vote for he favored a bill, introduced this session, putting bare into the words, 'Community property.'

"And how about Tom Love?"

"Through wise newspaper publicity he is known as the man who is troubled about exercising his conscience in political affairs."

"You remember he started out to run against Barry Miller for lieutenant governor in the recent general election on the Democratic ticket? Now Senator Love keeps his good complexion by drinking milk. And he let it out that he was not going to support Al Smith, the Democratic nominee for president, because Al Smith admitted that he thought there was something wrong with prohibition."

"The Democratic party ran up at Senator Love and told him that if you won't play with us we won't play with you. And they didn't want his name on the Democratic ballot."

"Senator Love was very indignant and he told you that he thought a man ought to be allowed to follow his conscience at the polls."

"The senate doesn't take Senator Love seriously as a senator, and it

is to be wondered how he would get his administration measures through if elected governor. It stands to reason that a large portion of the senate will be re-elected next session.

"But Senator Love has formidable strength. As a dry of the driest he will poll considerable prohibition vote. He will likely get the largest party-better's vote. But it must be remembered that many Democrats voted for Hoover in the general election who will stay with the party in a state election."

"Senator Love ran even, on a large women's vote. And you know they say the women's vote played havoc at this last election for the Democrats."

"And how about Claude Pollard?"

"Yes, yes. He is a regular Democrat and a dry. There two elements represent strength for him. He will make strong competition for Miller."

"Do you think, Puss, in the end that the Democratic party will let Senator Love put his name on the primary ballot?"

"Yes, despite all of the 'backlash and ache' bills that have been introduced in the legislature this session aimed at the Hooverites, and which if passed would give executive committees of political parties to look into a candidate's political past before putting him on their ballot."

"What do you think of Ross Sterling's chances?"

"If the proposed constitutional amendment to launch a \$175,000,000 highway bond issue passes not only the legislature but a vote of the people, that will increase Sterling's strength. But he has one very bad handicap—money. Lynch Davidson has the same trouble."

"Since Texas went Republican in the presidential election, don't you think that that would increase a Republican's chances for becoming governor?"

"Undoubtedly to some extent. But just because the state went Republican in the general election, it is no sign it will do the same in a state election. The Republican who would be governor of Texas must be a strong man and I don't believe he is on the horizon yet."

"Though Sara Houston Terrell and W. Gregory Hatcher are being mentioned as candidates for governor, it is my hope that when the time comes they will be candidates for re-election to their present offices, state comptroller and state treasurer, respectively."

"Who do you think will be in the off-off, Puss?"

"Well, Barry Miller will be one of them. Perhaps, Tom Love the other."

"Who do you think will be governor?"

"Now I'll ask you one."
