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SAVING OIL.

President Hoover told the press lately: "There will be no oil leases or disposal of government oil lands, no matter what category they may lie in, of government holdings or government controls, except those which may be mandatory by congress. In other words, there will be complete conservation of government oils in this administration."

Such a policy is not unexpected, but not the less welcome and reassuring. The government will surely find plenty of uses in the future for all its oil supplies, as fuel for the navy and in other ways.

Meanwhile, what of private oil pools? Are they to be drained wastefully and dumped ruinously on the market in the same old familiar way, until the nation's industrial supply of petroleum is permanently exhausted?

And what of the natural gas, still wasted by billions of cubic feet?

Nature, good to us so far, isn't creating new supplies of these precious products as we use up the old.

PAYING FOR INFLATION.

Theodore H. Price, a cautious observer of the recent skylarking in Wall street, writes this: "A decline in building (very noticeable since the beginning of the year) is important not only to the lumber, steel, cement and other materials industries, but to the makers of furnishings, equipment and machinery. That it has occurred despite record amounts of new capital raised during the last few months seems to indicate that much of that capital has gone not into fresh enterprise but, through investment trusts and other channels, into marking up the prices of enterprises already in operation." In other words, money which should have gone to constructive enterprises has gone to raise the price of existing stocks. The stock market has soaked up so much new capital that there is not enough left to sustain the vital and fundamental building industry. So one of our biggest industries declines, and tends to drag down with it various other industries. This is one of the heavy prices paid for stock inflation.

AVIATION ARITHMETIC.

An aviation expert predicts 1,500,000 airplanes in this country in 1936. That, be it observed, is only seven years hence. It looks like an absurdly optimistic forecast until you begin figuring and plotting curves in the approved statistical way. All that is needed to make good this huge figure is for airplane production to double every year for these few years. It is doing so now, and there is no reason to expect a let-up. Readers with lively imaginations may enjoy little forecasting of their own on what such increase in air traffic will mean to travel, trade, industry and local business development in hundreds of communities.

VALUES.

Mr. Coolidge, in his recent role of post-presidential author and small town citizen, has been getting a lot of publicity while his better half has been neglected. Let's square things by turning to "Grace" for a minute. Mrs. Coolidge, talking simply and frankly to a woman reporter the other day, said something well worth repeating. Reminded of her remarkable return from the white house to a dwelling within the means of a humble office employe, Mrs. Coolidge smiled and replied: "Well, I guess most folks would think it funny, but we don't. I think if more people valued the simple things of life, the country would be better off. There is too much spending among those who can't afford to spend. After all, you can enjoy the perfume of a flower, and you don't need to buy it on the installment plan. There's the sunshine and the fresh air, too, which can be enjoyed without going into debt. These are the things which mean most to us." They can afford other things, but they prefer

these. The really "funny" thing is that so many Americans don't seem to be able to enjoy anything unless it costs a lot of money.

SPEED LIMITS.

The death of Lee Bible and destruction of his racing car at Daytona Beach ought to be the last of such tragedies. Sport is sport, but sportsmen ought to know when they have enough. Mechanical progress is desirable, but mechanics ought to know when they have reached the limit. It is apparent that little is to be gained by further experiments in speed with motor vehicles on the ground. Major Seagrave or some other daredevil with a super-car may reach 250, or even 300 miles per hour, before his inevitable smash-up, but what's the use? Motor cars may turn faster, and produce more power; cooling systems, steering gears and tires may improve; racing courses may be made smoother and safer, at great expense. But the human factor remains about the same. Brains, nerves, eyes, will stand just about so much. We know more than the cave man did, but our bodies are no better than his, our senses no more dependable. Our lives, most of us think, are worth more. And there is more of a social shock when one of us meets a violent and unnecessary death. Let the speed fiends take to the air, as the animals have had sense enough to do when they reached the limit on the ground.

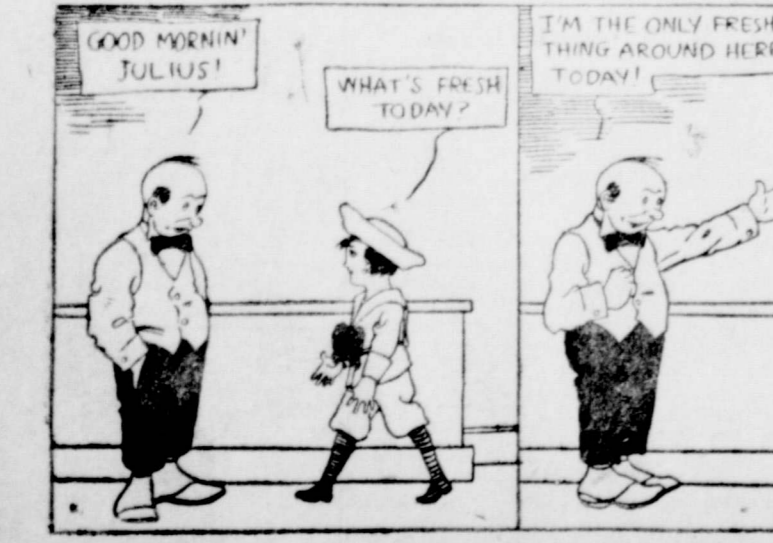

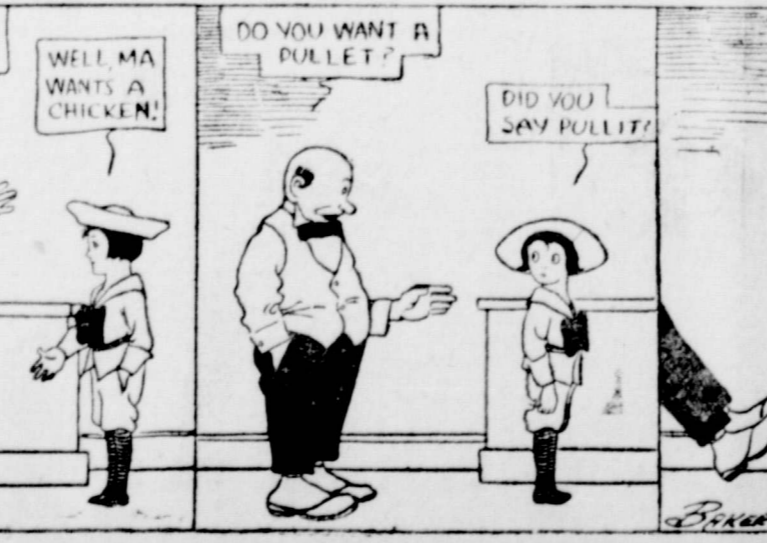

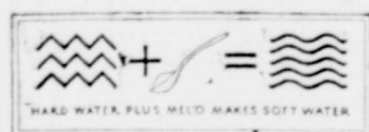
