UP-TO-DATE FINANCE.

The United States steel corporation is engaged in a remarkable "capital readjustment." It has a "funded debt," that is to say a bonded debt of \$271,000,000. It is going to wipe out this debt by an issue of common stock.

This "Steel Trust" was the first corporation to issue common stock on a big scale. At the time of its organization, such stock was generally regarded as merely so much "water."

It is preferred by a public in a cheerful gambling mood, because bonds, like bank deposits, pay only so much interest. The common stock may pay more—though it might conceivably pay less.

Presumably this modern method will work out all right in the case of the father of modern industrial corporations. The question is whether it will work out so well with a lot of smaller concerns that will follow the example.

Most of the investors, however, are in no mood to worry. Our prosperity will soon be floating on a sea of common stock.

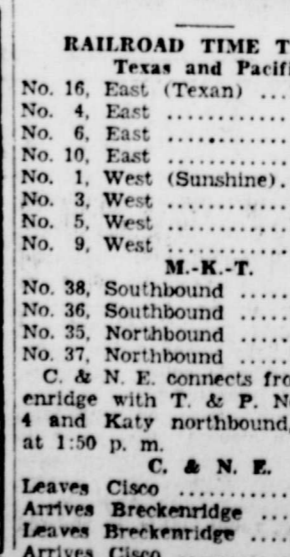

## BALLOT FOR CITY ELECTION IN APRIL COMPLETED

### Mayor J. M. Williamson Unopposed for Re-Election; Seven in Lists for Two Commissioner Positions

### AWARDS FOR ROAD WORK ANNOUNCED

AUSTIN, March 23.—Appropriations of state aid for road and bridge work were announced by the state highway department totaling more than three-quarters of a million dollars.

Highway 79 received approximately \$300,000 for concrete paving in Archer and Wichita counties. Matagorda county was awarded \$23,432 for highway 71 and \$28,000 for highway 58.

State aid for bridges and approaches across the Neches river between Silsbee and Evadale was fixed at \$100,000, and \$147,144 was allowed as aid on highway 32 in Freestone county.

Other aid announced included: \$31,189 on highway 4 in Childress county; \$62,254 on highway 82 in Ward county and \$27,804 on highway 77 in Scurry county.

### CAMBRIDGE IS WINNER OVER OXFORD

LONDON, March 23.—Cambridge celebrated the 100th anniversary of its first boat race with the dark blue of Oxford by winning the annual classic on the Thames today.

The light blue oarsmen of Cambridge swept over the finish line at Mortlake seven lengths ahead of the exhausted Oxford crew, winning its 40th victory since 1829 and drawing with its ancient rival in total races won. One contest ended in a dead heat.

The time was 19 minutes and 23 seconds.

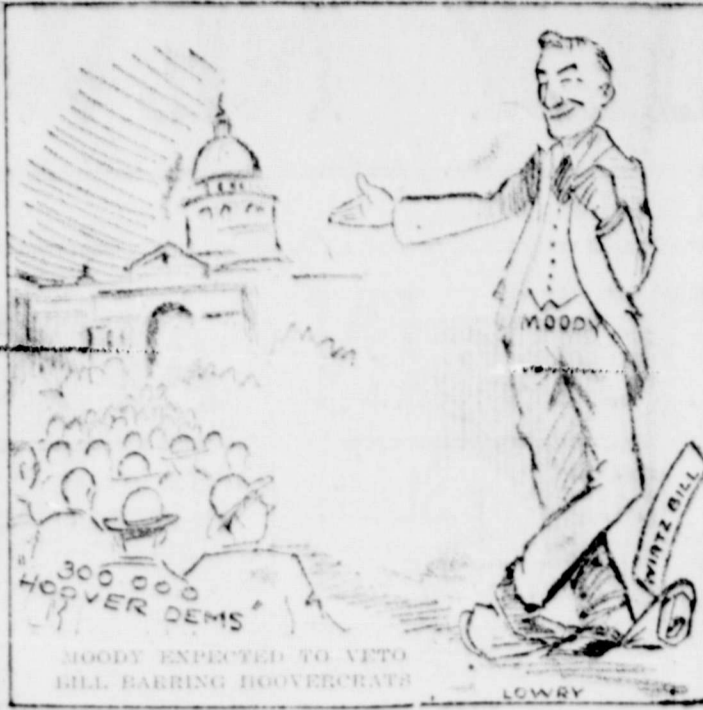

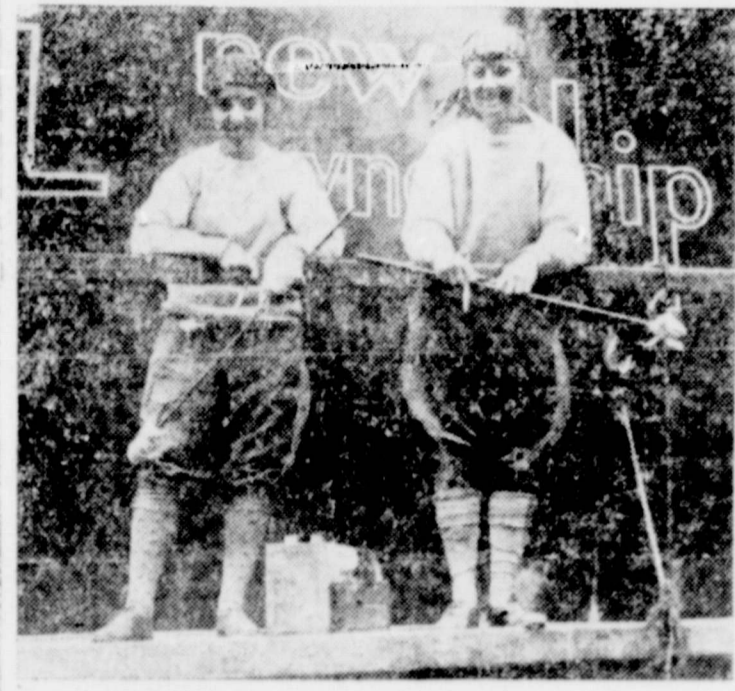
## MISTRIAL IS DECLARED IN GALLOGLY CASE

# CISCO MAY INVITE TEXAS GRAND COMMANDERY CONCLAVE

## Local Sentiment Being Sounded Before Invitation Is Presented at Meeting Held at Greenville

The Cisco Commandery Knights Templar No. 47 is very seriously considering extending an invitation to the Grand Commandery Knights Templar of Texas to meet in Cisco in 1930, according to John F. Patterson, recorder for the commandery. The Grand Commandery meets this year in Greenville on April 9 and the invitation of the Cisco Commandery would be extended at that time and meeting.

Whether or not the invitation will be presented and efforts to bring the big convocation to Cisco made will depend altogether upon the desire of Cisco to entertain the large gathering. Mr. Patterson and other officers of the commandery here declared. Expressions from the chamber of commerce, from the city and from other local civic organizations are being solicited in order that the commandery may be able to arrive at a decision upon the matter.

A committee consisting of J. M. Witten, as chairman, and William Reagan and D. K. Scott was appointed by the commandery to sound out sentiment locally and to report to the commandery the advisability of taking the step considered.

The commandery met Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock for a meeting that continued throughout the remainder of the afternoon and well into the evening and it was considered possible that the question would come up for consideration and decision at that time. A degree team from Fort Worth was present to assist in putting on the work at this meeting.

The Grand Commandery in its convocation brings to the host city an attendance of between 1,000 and 1,500 knights. In addition to these large numbers of women, wives and other relatives of the knights, attend so that the total gathering of people from all over Texas and from other states, also, represents a total much greater than that. The character of visitors is of a sort to well repay the efforts of a city in entertaining the convocation, officials point out.

"We do not want to bring this big gathering of people to Cisco and have them go away regretting that they came," Mr. Patterson said. "Unless the whole city gets behind the move and helps the Commandery to make the convocation a success we are not going to undertake the task. It is a big

job and will require a great deal of work to carry out as it should be carried out."

I. Nicholson is commander of the Cisco organization. John F. Patterson is recorder. The Commandery has about 275 members although the most of these do not live in Cisco but in the towns and communities surrounding this city. There are Knights Templar located in other states who are affiliated with the commandery here.

## MOVIE THRILL MEANT DEATH FOR MECHANIC

HOLLYWOOD, March 23.—While cameras in three other planes recorded the tragedy, a mechanic was carried to his death in a huge German Gotha bomber which could not be brought out of the tailspin into which it had been put so movie audiences might be given a thrill.

For 18 months Phil Jones worked aboard the great plane as a soarer through battle scenes of "Hell's Angels," an epic of war in the air. And then, as fate would have it, he plunged to earth yesterday, in the shot that was to have been the last of the picture.

While Jones tossed helplessly in the forward cabin of the plane from which he could not escape, Al Wilson, noted movie stunt flier, drifted to safety in his parachute. A scene that was all too realistic in its resemblance to the screaming death drops of the World War, cost Jones his life. As the great plane reared along at an elevation of 7,500 feet, Wilson threw it into a tailspin.

Then, came the signal from the camera planes, and he released the lamp black that was to have been the smoke of death in a burning plane, for picture purposes.

"I felt the left wing go and I yelled to Phil to jump," Wilson said. "After we had fallen 2,000 feet, I pulled my safety belt and was thrown over the motor into the air."

## OIL NEWS OF SOUTHWEST

HOUSTON, March 23.—Another important extension in the Riceport Bend district in Austin county was recorded Thursday when the Humble Oil & Refining and Valley Oil corporation completed No. 1 J. W. Wilson, flowing 300 barrels a day, 82 per cent of which was 19 gravity oil at 2,580 feet. The well extends the field between 1,500 and 2,00 feet to the southeast.

Despite proration restrictions rapid water encroachment has taken place in the Roberts-Settles field in the Howard and Glasscock county area. A committee of engineers has recommended that measures be taken to decrease the output of pumping wells.

SEMINOLE, Okla., March 23.—Production in the greater Seminole field Thursday was off more than 15,000 barrels, for a total production of 378,738 barrels from 1,786 wells. The production on Wednesday was 394,716 barrels from 1,783 wells.

DALLAS, March 23.—Two additional bubble towers and one heat exchanger are included in the \$29,000 worth of new improve-

ments to be installed by the Simms Oil company at their refinery on the Eagle road west of Dallas, according to announcement by officials of that company. Addition of the new equipment will increase the capacity of the refinery from 4,000 barrels in 24 hours to 6,000 barrels daily, it was announced.

DALLAS, March 23.—Simms Oil company has announced the spudding in of their Elwood No. 2 in section 29, Mitchell county. It is an offset to the Elwood No. 1, which encountered a good flow of sweet gas at 615 feet. A 1,750 foot test by rotary tools has been spudded in by the Simms company as an offset to the Rio Grande Development company's well in Duval county. The lease has already produced three good gas wells.

PAMPA, March 23.—Marland company's No. 1-Findley, a wildcat in Gray county, two and a half miles from production, came in Thursday for 160 barrels an hour at 2,845 feet. As an offset to the Texas company well which has made 1,500-barrels of oil in a year, the operator's Oil company No. 3-Jackson, in section 28 came in for 4,500 barrels daily.

SEMINOLE, Okla., March 23.—A decrease of 4,666 barrels of crude

oil on the gauges yesterday was recorded in the greater Seminole and St. Louis oil areas. The total production was 374,132 barrels from 1,790 wells.

### World War Veterans Here Can Still Get Government Insurance Says Post Commander Clifton

Many veterans of the World War in this community do not know they can still obtain United States government insurance. C. C. Clifton, local post commander, said yesterday in calling attention to a recent amendment to the World War Veterans' act, passed at the request of the American Legion.

The United States government insurance is for veterans who served in the military or naval forces of the United States during the period of the World War, April 6, 1917, to July 2, 1921, and who paid, or were eligible to apply, for term or converted insurance.

"They must now be in good health. The maximum of the United States government insurance allowed to a veteran is \$10,000 and the minimum is \$1,000. It may be had only in multiples of \$500.

"In many instances, a veteran carried a policy for a time and then surrendered it for the cash surrender value. The amount of insurance that may be taken now is reduced by the amount of insurance so surrendered.

"The following are the steps that a veteran should follow in applying for the government insurance:

"He must supply satisfactory evidence to the United States Veterans' bureau that he is in good health. This is not a departure but required of the veteran who obtains a policy from any reliable insurance company.

"The veteran must fill out the printed application for the plan and amount of insurance desired. These application forms are similar to those used in obtaining policies from any established company.

"The veteran must submit sufficient remittance to cover at least the first monthly premium on the amount and the plan of insurance applied for. Premiums are payable monthly on the first day of each month, but may be paid quarterly, semi-annually or annually at a saving.

"The application forms for United States government insurance and full information may be obtained from regional offices of the United States Veterans' bureau, from the central offices of the United States Veterans' bureau, Washington, D. C., and in many cases from the service officer of the Legion post.

"The following seven plans of policies are issued by the government: ordinary life policy; 20-payment life policy; 30-payment life policy; 20-year endowment policy; 30-year endowment policy; endowment at the age of 62 policy; and 5-year convertible term policy.

"One of the splendid things in connection with carrying United States government life insurance policies is that there are no restrictions. The insured may designate any person, firm, corporation or legal entity as beneficiary, either individually or as a trustee.

"United States government policies are free from the usual life insurance restrictions as to residence, modes of transportation, occupation and military or naval service.

"The veteran who has already taken care of his government insurance is requested to pass the information along to his buddy in order that all may share in the liberal government provision for its veterans."

### CONDITIONS IN STOCK MARKET ARE UNSETTLED

NEW YORK, March 23.—Highly unsettled conditions again existed in the stock market today and prices fell to further lows on the current in some short coverings had spent its force in the early trading.

The decline at no time was aggressive, however, and support was in evidence for pivotal shares based on continued optimistic industrial reports and on the fact that the federal reserve board at Washington made no statement on the credit situation at its meeting yesterday.

Trading was comparatively quiet with tickers well able to keep up with trading on the floor. Still, General Motors, Consolidated Gas and other pivotal shares were forced down from 1 to 3 points but showed some recovery toward the

close. Stocks generally met strong resistance around yesterday's low levels.

Most of the buying represented short covering and pools withdrew from the market until more settled conditions developed. Traders were also desirous of staying out of the market for the time being.

So far as credit conditions were concerned, the financial community was left in a highly unsettled state.

The fact that the federal reserve board made no statement following its meeting yesterday and that Secretary Mellon attended the deliberations gave no light on the situation and led to uncertainty.

The announcement of the formation of a money pool at Chicago also increased apprehension over the money outlook.

Despite the selling in the general list, heavy short covering in several recent weak spots forced advances in these issues. International Nickel moved up fractionally, while Simmons company came back sharply from yesterday's previous closing levels. However, the general market displayed an extremely heavy tone through the closing dealings.

### LINDY WAS ONLY TAKING THINGS EASY

LUBBOCK, March 23.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, who dropped from view for a few hours on March 16, was merely "taking it easy" at a lonely ranch along the Texas-New Mexico state line, near Bledsoe, Texas, a letter from that place revealed today.

Lindbergh landed on the U. D. Sawyer ranch, 16 miles from Bledsoe, explained "that he was tired, and had been flying a great deal lately and wanted to rest in quiet." He spent Friday night, Saturday morning and ate dinner Saturday before continuing to Albuquerque, where he next came into public view.

Lindbergh made a tour of inspection of the ranch and seemed quite struck with ranching life, according to Miss Eula Sawyer, daughter of the ranchowner, who was with him for the trip over the ranch.

# INVESTIGATION BRADY CASE IS COMPLETED

BRADY, March 23.—With more than \$2,000 of the loot stolen in Wednesday's "flapper" robbery of the Farmers and Merchants State bank recovered, officers said today they had about completed their investigation of the case. Examining trial for the five young men and women suspects, all of whom are charged with robbery with firearms, will likely be held the first part of next week. Officials of the bank disclosed that only \$2,214 had been taken in the robbery, practically all of which was found hidden in hard cans in a dumping ground near town. At first it was believed the loot would amount to \$5,000. Meanwhile the three girl suspects, Lucille Awaft, 24; Irene Curtis, 20; and Billie Ballard, 20, apparently looked upon the robbery as a lark. They asked jail attendants for copies of newspapers, because they said, they wanted to see "what they had to say about the notorious bank robbery." R. C. Turner, alleged leader of the gang and identified as the man who held up the bank while his companions remained outside in an automobile, was more reticent. "This is a h— of a mess," he said. Coy Nigh, the fifth member of the gang, was indifferent. A cowbird banded in Illinois almost a year ago was caught last week in Tyler.

# Two Wolves Caught by F. B. Mathews, County Trapper, Near Cisco Bring Total He Has Captured Here to Four

Two wolves, a male and a female, were being displayed here Saturday afternoon by F. B. Mathews, Cisco, county trapper who caught the two Saturday morning in traps set on the Katy railroad right of way a few miles north of Cisco. The wolves were caught hardly 50 yards apart. This makes four wolves that Mr. Mathews has trapped within the past few days. He has "fastened" six but one of these tore off a foot at his approach and escaped and another took the trap with him and has not been located. The wolf which tore his foot from the trap jaws was said by Mr. Mathews to have been the largest he ever saw. Mr. Mathews estimates that by killing the four wolves he has saved farmers and poultry raisers in this section about \$300. A flock of 175 chickens in the neighborhood of

# COAST GUARD HEAD WILL BACK ACTION IN SINKING "RUNNER"

## Says British Schooner, Sunk by Cutters Off Louisiana Coast, Had Caused Trouble for Five Years

WASHINGTON, March 23.—Rear Admiral Billard, commandant of the coast guard, will stand squarely behind the action of officers of the two cutters which sank the British schooner "Im Alone" off the Louisiana coast, he said today.

He said the schooner was a "notorious rum runner."

"The record of the 'Im Alone' is well known to every coast guard officer on the Atlantic and Gulf coasts," Billard said.

"In the last five years we have had dozens of records of our vessels spotting her but she always has been too fast for them."

The incident off the Louisiana coast was precipitated by orders from headquarters here March 21 to officers of coast patrol boats Walcott and Dexter, to seize the schooner after she had been sighted near Trinity shoals.

**SHIP SUNK AFTER CHASE.**

PASCAGOULA, Miss., March 23.—After a thrilling chase in the Gulf of Mexico, the coast guard cutter Dexter shot and sank the British auxiliary schooner Imalone, off Belize, yesterday, coast guard headquarters announced today.

## Van Alstyne Chief of Police, Wounded in Successful Effort Prevent Bank Robbery, Dies

VAN ALSTYNE, March 23.—Chief of Police W. L. Echols, wounded early Thursday in a successful attempt to foil a gang of bank robbers here, died at 2:40 this morning in the Wilson N. Jones hospital at Sherman, where he was taken following the shooting.

Echols was shot when he encountered two bandits in an alley between two banks here. Wounded to throw up his hands he endeavored to draw his gun and fire, but his gun jammed. One of the bandits shot several times, and Echols received two bullet wounds, one in the abdomen and one in the leg.

No trace of the bandits had been found today. The automobile in which they left town following the shooting was found stuck in the mud near McKinney. It is thought the bandits walked from their stalled car to McKinney and stole another car there to continue their flight. The coupe of Gene Martin was stolen from the yard in front of his house in McKinney the same night.

Rewards totalling \$1,250 have been offered for the arrest and conviction of the bandits. \$1,000 by Van Alstyne and \$250 by Governor Moody. Ranger Captain Tom Hickman and Sergeant Gonzales were in Van Alstyne Friday conducting an investigation.

No definite funeral arrangements for Chief Echols have been made as yet but it is thought the services will be held here Sunday afternoon.

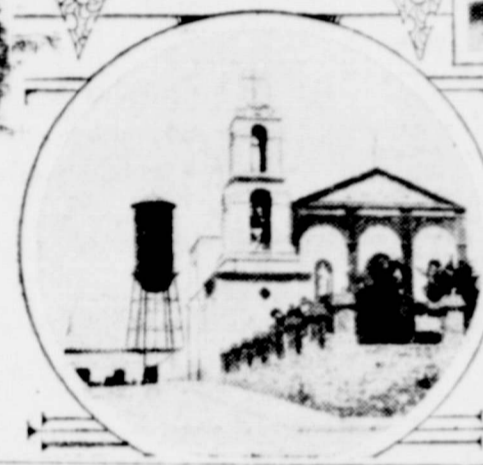

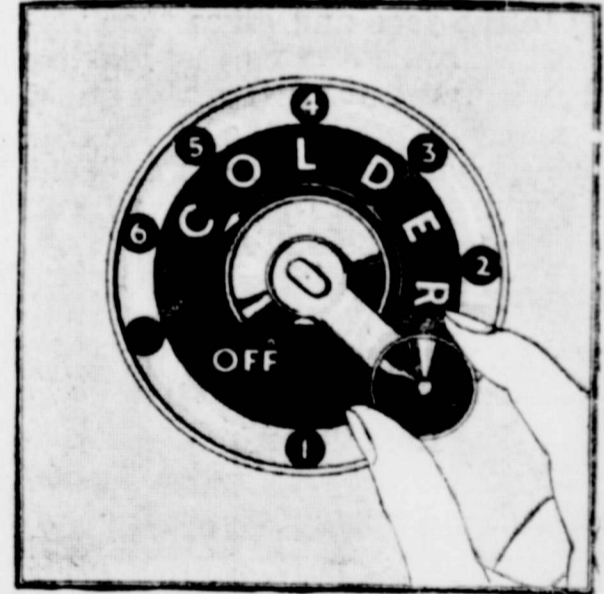

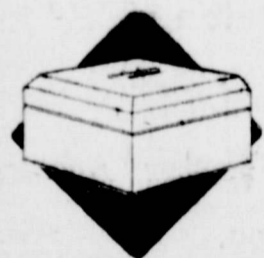
