NINE DEAD IN WEEK-END ACCIDENTS

Investigation of Ranger Gasoline Plant Blaze Made

SEARCH FOR LOST PLANE UNAVAILING

4 Navy Fliers Return to Base After Futile Hunt for Missing Sikorsky and Four Passengers

WASHINGTON, March 25.—Four airplanes from the naval air station at Norfolk, Va., returned to their home base today after a futile search for the Sikorsky amphibian plane with four passengers aboard which has been missing for more than 80 hours.

Other planes, coast guard ships and land parties, however, continued the search for the amphibian which took off from Norfolk at 5:45 a. m. Friday for New York and hasn't been seen or heard from since. Aboard the plane are Harry Smith, pilot of Miami; T. Raymond Finucane, prominent yachtsman and real estate operator of Rochester, N. Y., and Frank Abels, Woodhaven, N. Y., and J. A. Boyd, mechanics.

PLANES AND SHIPS JOIN IN SEARCH

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The rear of sea and air motors sounded above and along the Maryland, Delaware and New Jersey coasts today as a small army of planes and boats sought carefully for the Sikorsky amphibian airplane with four passengers missing since last Friday.

SINKING OF BRITISH RUM SHIP PROBED

NEW ORLEANS, March 25.—Investigation into the sinking by shell fire of the British schooner Imalone by the coast guard patrol boat Dexter as a rum runner, continued here today in secret session.

Seven of the crew of the schooner were landed here yesterday in irons and under heavy guard. They were confined in the customs house. The body of the eighth, who lost his life when the ship sank and who was said to be Leon Mangray, native of St. Pierre, Miquelon, a French possession, and a naturalized British subject, also was brought ashore.

Chestnut and Smith Corporation Loss Placed at \$50,000 When Fire Destroys 5 Tank Cars and Shops

RANGER, March 25.—Officials of the Chestnut and Smith corporation today were investigating the fire which Saturday night destroyed the tank car shops of the organization, causing a loss which will range between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

The fire started when a member of the night workers broke an electric light bulb while on top of a car loaded with gasoline. A terrific blast preceded the fire.

Fires, Automobile Mishaps and Oil Field Tragedy Take Heavy Toll of Human Life Over State

(BY UNITED PRESS.) Automobile accidents, fire and one oil field mishap took a toll of nine lives in Texas over the week-end.

At Houston Miss Pearl Brown, 20, was killed when the car in which she was riding with a male companion collided with the trailer of a delivery truck. Her companion escaped unhurt.

Graf Zeppelin, on Non-Stop Flight From Germany to Palestine, Now Over Italy in Perfect Weather

NAPLES, March 25.—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin arrived over the eastern section of this city at 5:35 p. m. today, circled the bay, flew over Capri and proceeded southward. The weather was good.

Before departing for its Mediterranean tour the ship circled Lake Constance. Then it disappeared in the direction of Basle, Switzerland. The exact route the ship will take was not disclosed, but Dr. Hugo Eckener, commanding the flight, as he did the Friedrichshafen-New York trip last year, said the probable route would include Basle, Switzerland; Besancon, France; Marseilles, Corsica, Genoa, Milan, Rome and Palermo.

EASTLAND, March 25.—Benney Phillips of Pyote made bond in the sum of \$1,000 in each of two cases filed against him in justice of the Peace Jim Steele's court at Eastland in which he is charged with the possession of and transporting liquor.

Two men were burned to death in a fire which destroyed four small buildings at Borger. The men, one of them identified as J. W. Farmer of Borger, 60, were asleep in the rear of a drug store when the fire broke out and apparently failed to awaken them in time to escape.

Flood Conditions Improving With Advent of Warm, Clear Weather; 8 Bodies of Boy Scouts Recovered

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., March 25.—Chaotic flood conditions in the south improved today with the advent of warm, sunny weather, but sorrow lingered over sections of Tennessee where many human lives were claimed by raging torrents resulting from cloudbursts.

Stopping of the almost unprecedented rains of the last few weeks was welcomed by the homeless, left stranded by receding waters. Most of them are in Alabama, Tennessee, Florida, and some in Georgia.

STAGE BRAINS.

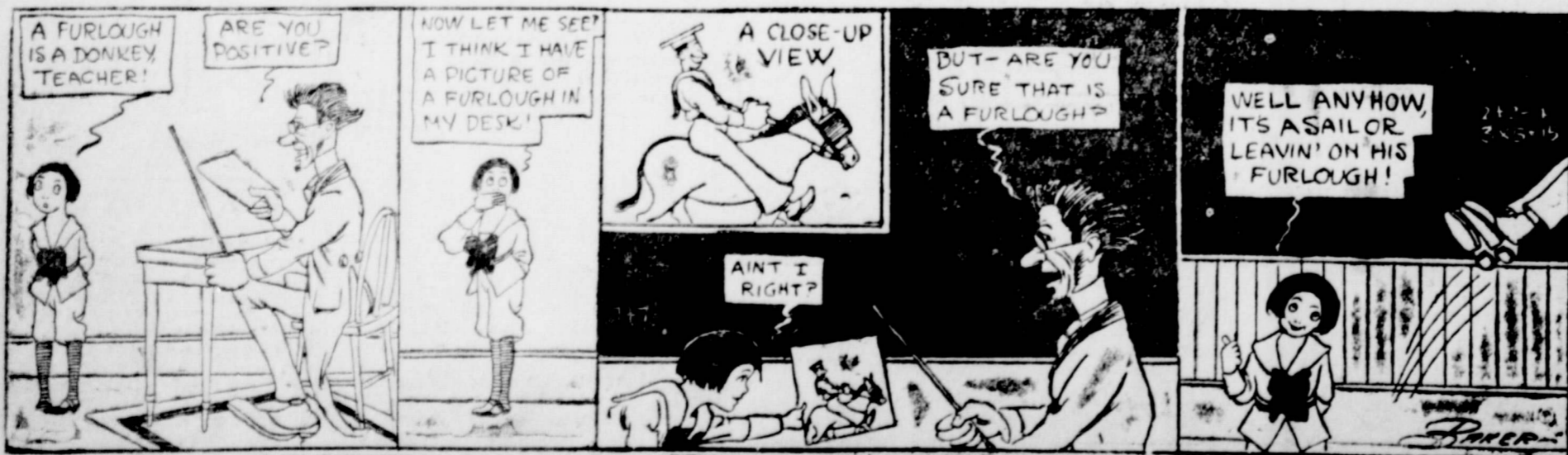

'HOOVER 860,000 WELL SPENT' SAYS CHURCH LEADER

'OMAHA, Neb., March 25.—The Northern Baptist church donated sixty thousand dollars to the Hoover for president campaign fund and figure that Hoover is easily worth that amount, Dr. W. H. Bowler, of New York, executive secretary of the board of promotion of the church, told a gathering of Omaha and Council Bluffs ministers here. "Dr. Bowler said that he was revealing what happened to the sixty thousand dollars which the laymen of the church contributed last year for the missionary fund, because he was told to come before them to ask for seventy-five thousand dollars to make up a deficit caused by the sixty thousand dollar donation. The deficit must be made up by May 1. The speaker told the gathering he was revealing this information for the first time but that every official of the church figures that the sixty thousand was well spent because they feel that President Hoover will dry up the country and just the law breakers in general."

ALCOHOL FOR 'ANTI-KNOCK' WASHINGTON, March 25—A process of manufacturing alcohol for use as an "anti-knock" element in gasoline from ordinary sugar canes has been discovered in Australia and a company formed there for marketing it, the commerce department has been advised by its representative in Sydney.

A plant, which has been erected in Queensland, will, it is said, be able to produce between 500,000 and 600,000 gallons of the fuel yearly.

Experiments, it is said, resulted in the production of a 90 per cent pure alcohol.

The London General Omnibus company, a large transportation company, has been conducting experiments looking toward use of the new fuel element, it is understood.
