DOUBLE TRAGEDY IS REVEALED TODAY

Police Investigating Series of Burglaries Last Night

SENTER SCORES "BANTAM LAWYERS"

CONDITIONS IN LEGISLATURE ARE DEPLORED

Makes Attack in Messages to ETCC Convention.
BRYAN, May 6.—Young, inexperienced lawyers have taken hold of Texas government and driven out men of mature judgment. They have created a "bantam lawyer dynasty."
The shyster lawyer to be found everywhere, is the chief architect of the present deplorable conditions. This attack upon members of his own profession was made by E. G. Senter, Dallas attorney, in a message sent to the East Texas chamber of commerce convention in session here.

He suggests a series of remedies. First, Mr. Senter urges that the people of Texas be aroused to the perils which now threaten the general welfare and to persuade them to hold representative mass meetings in every county not later than December, to conscript candidates for the legislature. There may be found in every county, he said, persons of high standing, tested experience and solid character, men and women, who will respond to the public demand of this nature, who would not, as a matter of personal ambition, seek legislative office.

Due to mounting costs of state government, he says the most grave situation in the state's history faces the next legislature. Speaking of the "shyster lawyer," Mr. Senter charged he is "ambitious, avaricious and conscientious" and has "prostituted the law, made perjury a science and converted the court house into a battle ground where trickery and fraud are master weapons—his trade must be abolished and he must be declared a criminal.

Remedies Suggested.
"To him the agencies of law are instruments to achieve sinister purposes. Courts are his thumb-screws and legislatures his jump-jacks."
As remedies he suggests:
1. A law license issued by the district court upon full investigation of the applicant. The license to be recalled upon proof of improper conduct.
2. An executive committee of three, to be appointed by the governor, should be created to whom all complaints against lawyers on account of misconduct in such capacity should be referred, with power to cancel law licenses and to institute prosecutions.
3. Fees for legal service should be fixed by statutes.
Mr. Senter said these remedies are time-tested and effective. He branded the "shyster" politician as an ally to the shyster lawyer. "He exists in almost every community and in many places figures as a leader in all public activities. It often happens that he without visible means of support. His trade is politics."
Mr. Senter pleaded that "if we let have a boss let him be a boss on all our respect. Let him be a boss whose life has not been spent in ways and occupations so mysterious that only legend reveals them to us."

RESIDENCES ARE ENTERED BY PROWLERS

Shots Fired by One Man Routs Would-be Intruder.

Police today are investigating a series of burglaries which occurred here last night. In one home, that of C. H. Fee, at 402 West Fifth street, the thieves secured between \$20 and \$30, including two \$10 gold pieces.

At the home of W. D. Elder, 104 West Tenth street, prowlers who removed the screen from a bedroom window, made off with a pair of trousers containing several dollars in change together with Mr. Elder's keys, his pocket knife and some papers. The thief or thieves pulled the nails from the screen, removed it and reached in to take the trousers from a cedar chest near where Mr. Elder was sleeping.

In one attempt last night, however, a thief was foiled. G. L. Kent, of 608 West Second street, was awakened about one o'clock this morning by a flash light which he thought at first to be lightning. He sat up on the side of the bed and glanced out the window for a look at the sky. He stared into the face of a prowler hardly six inches away.

The man had a flashlight which he was flashing on and off apparently examining the screen. He did not see Mr. Kent, apparently, until the latter, taken by surprise, shouted. The prowler took to his heels and Mr. Kent, snatching up a pistol which he had under the bed, ran to the porch and fired twice. He could not determine the effect of his shots.

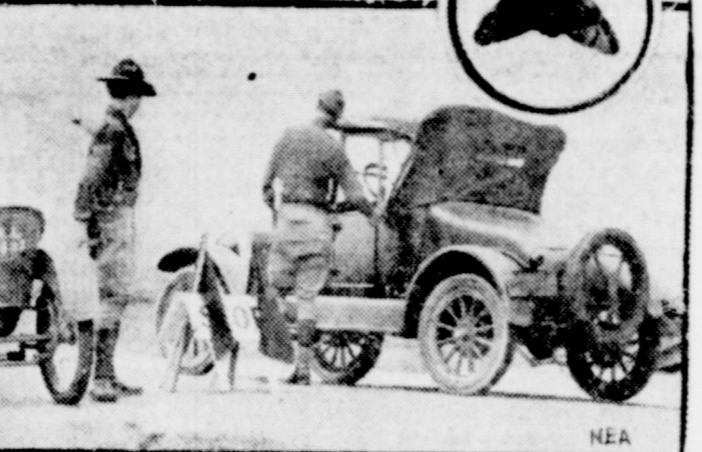
Police, who were informed, arrived promptly but were able to find but meager clues.

Posses Seek Ticket Agent Who Is Said to Have Been Kidnaped From Mexia Station by Bandit

MEXIA, May 6.—Posses searched today for R. Lyle Justice, 35 night ticket agent at the Southern Pacific station here who was believed kidnaped by robbers who robbed the station cash drawer and safe of \$365 early today.

A negro train porter saw Justice going out of the station with a man who wore a brown coat between 2:05 a. m. and 3:25 a. m. He suspected nothing until passengers seeking tickets found no agent.

The cash drawer and safe were open and the contents gone. Chief of Police A. R. Mace organized a posse to search in every direction from Mexia for Justice.

2,000 Reported Dead in Eastern Quakes

TEHERAN, Persia, May 6.—Advices received here today 2,000 persons have been killed by earthquakes in the community of Korrassan, Persia, on the Soviet frontier.

The villages of Kushan, Shirvan, Kilan and Bojvan, near the Turkish border, were wiped out.

Trapper Mathews Catches Eleventh Wolf Last Night

F. B. Mathews, Cisco government trapper, made a full haul last night. In one was a female wolf, in another a skunk, in a third an opossum and in the fourth a rabbit.

The wolf is the 11th to be caught by Mr. Mathews this season. The catch was made on the Ward ranch five miles north of Cisco.

DR. SIMMONS, OF EASTLAND, DIES SUNDAY

Dr. John W. Simmons, 55 a resident of Eastland and Fort Worth, died Sunday at 10 a. m. in a Fort Worth hospital. Because of his professional interests, Dr. Simmons resided in Eastland but his family lived at 2205 College avenue, Fort Worth.

Dr. Simmons' death ended a long sickness during which a series of operations were performed both in Fort Worth and Eastland hospitals. A native of Greenville, Ky., he received his education in the University of Tennessee and came to Texas as a young man.

He was active for many years in general practice in Parker county and later at Strawn, where he was chief surgeon for the Strawn Coal Mining company. For the past 15 years he had practiced in Eastland. He was active in civic affairs, and was a member of the Eastland county, the Texas state and the American Medical associations and belonged to the Masonic order, the B. P. O. E., and the Methodist church. He was past worshipful master of the local Masonic lodge.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at Central Methodist church, Fort Worth. Rev. Casper S. Wright, pastor of Central Methodist, and Rev. G. W. Shearer, pastor of the Methodist church at Eastland will officiate. Members of W. W. Peavy Masonic lodge of Fort Worth will have charge of services at the grave in Greenwood cemetery. The body will lie at the church from 1:30 in the afternoon until the funeral hour.

YOUTH AND YOUNG WOMAN ARE VICTIMS

Shotgun Wounds Are Found in Both of Bodies.

HOUSTON, May 6.—A double tragedy—perhaps a double murder—was revealed today with the finding near Aldine, 15 miles north of Houston, of the bodies of a pretty young woman and a young man. The two apparently had been companions Sunday and early today.

The girl's body, with a gaping shotgun wound between the shoulder blades, first was found lying on its back across the road about a mile north of Aldine.

The woman's body was said by the telephone operator at Spring, Texas, to be that of Miss Olena Wuensche, of Spring. Young Stone had been killed by a shotgun charge which tore through his chest directly over the heart.

His body was found about 20 or 30 steps from a Chrysler touring car. It was identified by the father, J. Stone, of Westfield.

TEXAS PRODUCTION OF OIL AND GAS.

Oil and gas producers of the southwest, in convention in the city of Dallas, were reminded by Edgar Pew of the Sun Oil company that the development of the oil and gas industry in the southwest began with the production of 48 barrels of oil in 1889 from a shallow well four miles south of San Augustine.

Pew had his facts and his figures. He said since 1889 up to this time the southwest had produced 2,791,755,000 barrels of crude oil.

IN PROHIBITION KANSAS.

Cherokee is a county in Kansas. John P. St. John in the long ago was governor of Kansas and he made Kansas a dry state—constitutionally.

For 10 days federal operators and county officers raided liquor places or places where liquor was sold in Cherokee county. They captured 1000 gallons of Kansas-made whiskey and they filled the Cherokee county jail with alleged moonshiners.

Late in the winter months William G. Sheppard, one of the clearest thinking and clearest writing correspondents of America, journeyed to Kansas and Colorado to discover, if possible, whether the states were dry.

He found the Coloradans making vast quantities of whiskey out of beet sugar alcohol "which was sold everywhere." He made a survey of Kansas, and let it be known to the readers of his articles that Kansas was one among the wettest of western states.

Manufacturers of Kansas whiskey made what is known as sugar corn whiskey from the alcohol distilled from corn. Minnesota farmers in certain sections of the state are manufacturers of sugar corn alcohol whiskey. Indeed, they are said to have put the Canadian run runners out of business.

100 Bills Are Awaiting Action During Remainder of Special Session

SECOND CALLED SESSION WILL BE NECESSARY

Appropriations Topic Is Yet to Be Submitted.

By RAYMOND BROOKS

Daily News Austin Correspondent. AUSTIN, May 6.—The third week of the 30-day special legislative session finds a prison concentration bill passed by one branch, the state income tax reported out for action, the civil service bill killed for the second time, and more than a dozen revenue bills untouched. Water priorities, banking and insurance reform, and more than 100 bills of varying nature are awaiting action in the remaining two and a half weeks.

Governor Moody has not submitted the volunteer appropriations bills, and when the session adjourned over from Friday to Monday the chance that he will send them to the lawmakers at this session was lessened. The bills now awaiting action and the appropriations will require a second called session, if all are to be considered.

Harmony Reached.

The house, which clearly showed early this year it would not give a prison board power to select a site for a new prison plant anywhere in Texas, reached an unusual degree of harmony Friday to pass a bill permitting the state to build its new prison plant on any of the penitentiary land it now owns. It would forbid the sale of the Ramsey and Darrington farms in Brazoria county, and other farm land in Harris and Fort Bend counties, adjoining these farms.

Senator T. J. Holbrook in the senate will continue to fight for the principle of wide open relocation, he announced. He charged that opponents of the administration program had pushed the house bill through, and promised he will fight its adoption by the senate. He held a steady majority in the upper house through his long fight for prison relocation at the past session.

The usual surge of spring politics has made little showing in this session. Prospects are for one or more announcements for speakership of the house by either Representative Fred H. Minor of Denton or Ray Holder of Dallas, and Ben Woodall of Marshall. In the senate the probable race for governor by both Lieut. Gov. Barry Miller and Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas is still in the offing. Both the senate and the house has a probable entry in the attorney general's race, in Senator A. J. Wirtz of Seguin and Representative Cecil Storey of Vernon.

Besides the house prison bill, two other measures affecting the prison system have been passed. One in the senate is the "parole bill" which will reduce prison population by making it easier to turn well-behaved prisoners out before expiration of their terms. The house has increased the pay of guards, sergeants and assistant farm managers, to permit hiring a better type of men and putting down the escape of convicts. Hearings have been set for this week in the house on the following revenue measures. Monday, all intangible assets tax bills; Wednesday, all bills for occupation tax on gross production of oil.

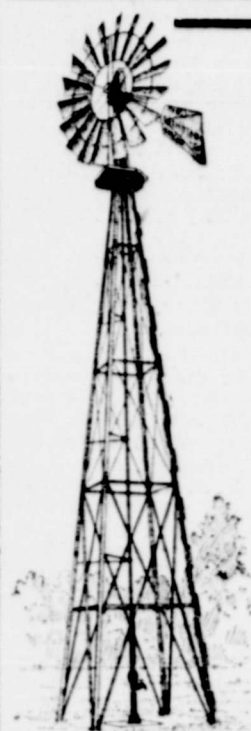

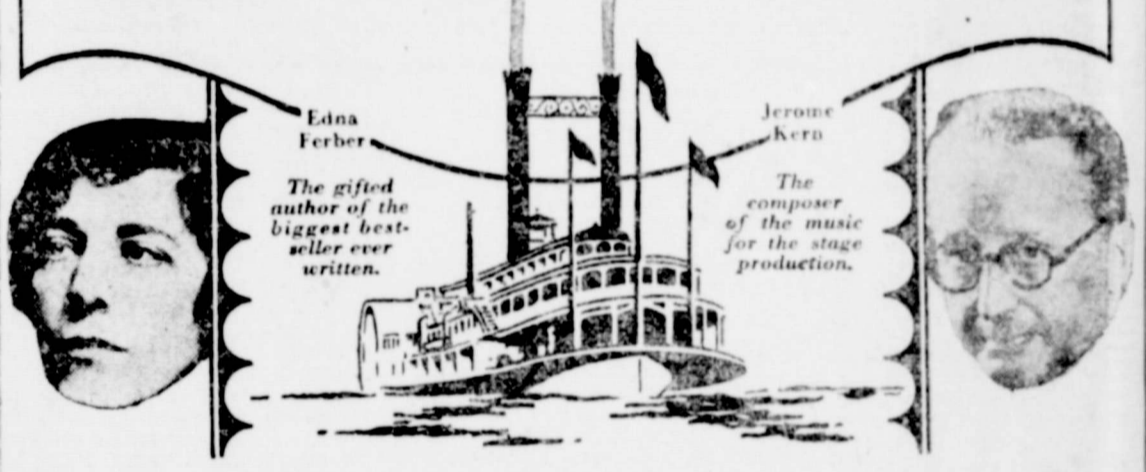
