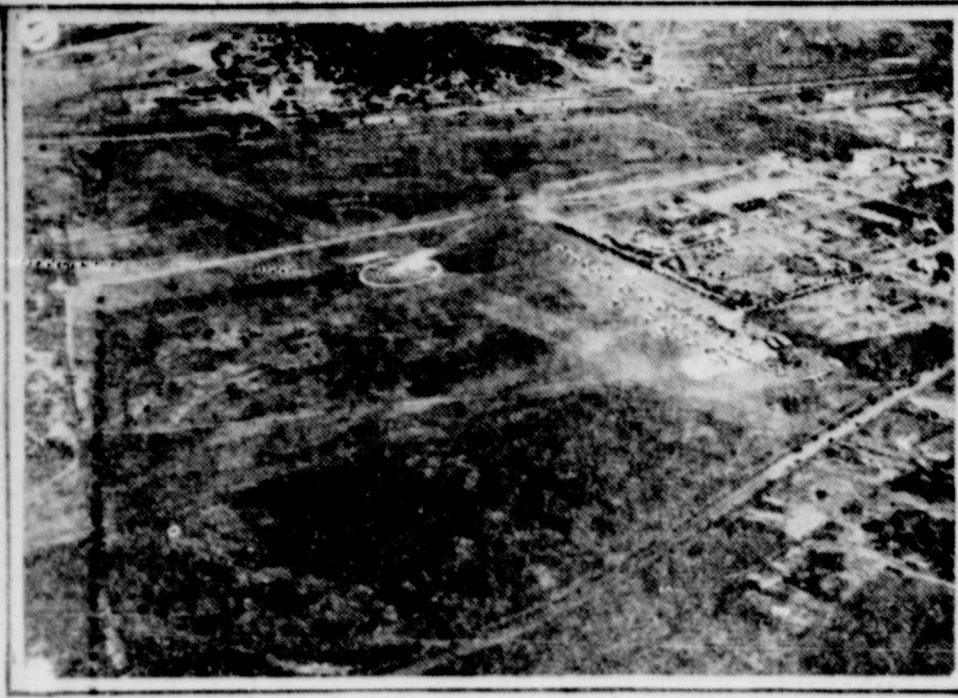








SCENE OF OIL BELT FLYING SCHOOL, RANGER

Students Sought For Flying School

RANGER, May 7. — Positions with splendid pay are beckoning to capable flyers, there being six fields in Texas now that are seeking skilled pilots and the remuneration offered is as high as \$600 a month, said C. J. Moore of

Ranger, chairman of the committee to secure sufficient students to arrange for a flying school in Ranger. From \$500 to \$750 a month is the salary range to air mail pilots. These figures are given by Moore to answer the question sometimes heard: "If I learn to fly—what then?" The committee is working hard

to secure enrollments and expects to have the necessary number within 10 days. Desdemona, Cisco and Eastland—as well as Ranger—are represented in the enrollments to date. The Ranger school would serve a territory 75 miles square. The course of training will be the same as that at any other

standard school and will qualify the student for pilot, limited commercial or transport license, depending upon the course in which he enrolls.

cent, up to a maximum of 47 1-2 per cent as compared with 40 per cent.

Dairy products were given increased protection as follows:

Whole milk, fresh or sour, 5 cents gallon; fresh or sour cream, 48 cents; skimmed milk, fresh or sour, and buttermilk, 1 3-4 cents gallon, condensed or evaporated milk, unsweetened one and four tenths cent pound; sweetened 2 1-4 cents; all other 2 cents; butter, Oleomargarine and other butter substitutes, 12 cents; cheese and substitutes 7 cents, but not

less than 34 per cent ad valorem; chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys and guineas, six cents pound; baby chicks of poultry, 4 cents each.

The flexible tariff provision empowering the president to alter tariffs up or down by 50 per cent is left unchanged.

However the bill proposed to change the basis which the flexible changes are to be computed. The present law provides that the president may alter rates to equalize the cost of production at home and abroad.

Because of the difficulties en-

countered in ascertaining foreign costs, the bill would change the basis to "conditions of competition the principal market or markets of the United States between domestic articles and like or similar competitive imported articles."

Raw cotton was kept on the free list.

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., May 7.—Himself in a solitary prison cage here for life, Robert Stroud, 42, Alaskan murderer, now yearns to prolong the life of other caged beings. For 13 years Stroud's solitude has been broken only by the music of canary birds.

lege. His only visitor was his mother.

Stroud, born in Seattle, migrated to Alaska at an early age, killed a rival over a dance hall girl, slew a prison guard here, and was saved from hanging by a last minute pardon to devote his life to birds and song.

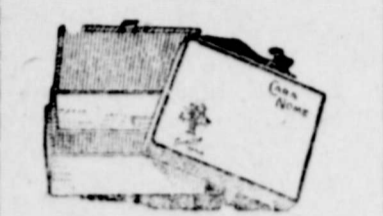

## Dozen Groups in Southern Asia Are Awaiting Solar Eclipse to Have Five-Minute Totality May 9

EDITOR'S NOTE: When, for a few minutes on May 9, the moon passes between the sun and the earth and a solar eclipse becomes visible in parts of Southern Asia, it will be an important moment to physicists and astronomers gathered to observe the phenomenon. In the following, the first of two articles, are described scientific preparations for the event. The second article, to appear tomorrow, will deal with the effect the eclipse is expected to have upon the Einstein hypothesis.

NEW YORK, May 7.—On the other side of the globe twelve groups of scientists today are preparing their instruments for a rare manifestation of nature—on Thursday the moon will pass between the sun and the earth, eclipsing the latter in a thick, dark shadow. The brief and somehow eerie blackness of a solar eclipse will sweep in from the Indian ocean to Sumatra, endure there in a period of totality for about five minutes, move eastward through the Malay states to Kedah, Southern Siam, Southern Indo-China, the Islands of Iollo and Cebu in the Philippines and then out over the Pacific where it will be dissipated. To the layman the eclipse is only an odd and rather awesome spectacle. Before the darkness comes there is a faint, yellowish light more like a calcium glow than sunshine. The moon's shadow, on a summer shower. Birds go to roost, and animals are frightened. The data for speculation on cosmic atmosphere is distinctly chilled and dew falls.

### Travels 40,000 Miles

But to the scientist an eclipse is a period which even in its limited duration gives opportunities to learn the secrets of the universe and animals are frightened. The data for speculation on cosmic

laws, tests for the ingenuity of physicists and astronomers.

That is why, for instance, Dr. S. A. Mitchell of the University of Virginia has traveled 40,000 miles to witness four solar eclipses and yet these journeys have afforded him only 11 minutes of observing time.

And that also is why the 12 expeditions, representing six nations, are now assembled in the countries to be affected. Months of preparation, millions of dollars expended in equipment and travel all will have been wasted if clouds or rain obscure the view for those few fleeting minutes.

But with so many scientists so widely spaced along the route of the obscuration it is hardly likely that all will fall in their attempt to observe, photograph and record the phenomenon. And with five of the dozen expeditions setting out to check the Einstein theory it is probable that the truth or falsity of the noted German hypothesis will be proved.

**Swarthmoreans in Sumatra**  
In Sumatra are assembled scientists from Swarthmore college under the leadership of Dr. J. A. Miller, a group from Potsdam, Germany, one from Harvard, one from Holland and one from Australia. On the Malay peninsula are expeditions from Greenwich Observatory and from Göttingen, Germany.

In Siam will be separate camps of savants—the representing Cambridge university and the other the University of Kiel. In an island off the tip of Co-

chin China the astronomers from the French Bureau des Longitudes have set up their instruments. And finally, in the Philippines will be stationed representatives of the United States Naval Observatory and from Hamburg, Germany. The Naval Observatory expedition has erected a 63-foot camera with which to photograph the inner layer of the corona. The Swarthmore College scientists have a similar camera in Sumatra and will make the same use of it. As the shadow reaches the Philippines one hour after it has left Sumatra it is hoped that the photographs taken by these two American stations will show any differences that occur in that luminous circle surrounding the sun.

**Ruler to Watch Eclipse**  
The moon's shadow this year will be observed by one member of royalty—King Rama VII, ruler of Siam, will visit the British station at Pattani, thus following in the footsteps of his progenitor, King Rama IV, whose knowledge of astronomy gained while he was a Buddhist monk enabled him to calculate with extraordinary accuracy the time and place of the eclipse of 1868.

There is a good yarn in King Rama IV or King Menkut, as he was popularly called. Astronomy was his chief diversion from cares of state and he decided that the eclipse of 61 years ago would be totally visible in Siam. His fellow scientists of the day were convinced he was in error.

But as the appointed day neared he took his entire court and officials of state to the east coast of the Siam sea and there, in the direct path of the expected shadow, set up a three-story wooden palace surrounded by innumerable thatch and bamboo houses. The ruler and the scientists who had doubted him assembled near

him in the hour he had predicted for the event. The first contact was invisible because of clouds. Then the sun pierced through and was seen to be eaten slightly away by the converging moon.

### Cheer for King

Even then the skeptics were unconvinced because their own figures were against the possibility of totality.

But the shadow grew larger, the sun was all but obscured, and finally the royal camp in the jungle was plunged into total darkness except for the flaring corona and the stars overhead.

Then a thing happened that probably never before had occurred in Siam. One of the court officials who had been in disagreement with the monarch jumped from the required sitting posture and led a cheer for the king. This lapse from rigorous court etiquette was forgiven, however.

Soon after the king returned to Bangkok, but he had caught cold in the jungle dampness and his death followed within a few weeks.

Thus an eclipse still has a fatal significance in Siam and among the superstitious there was sorrow when it is present ruler announced his intention to view the one coming Thursday.

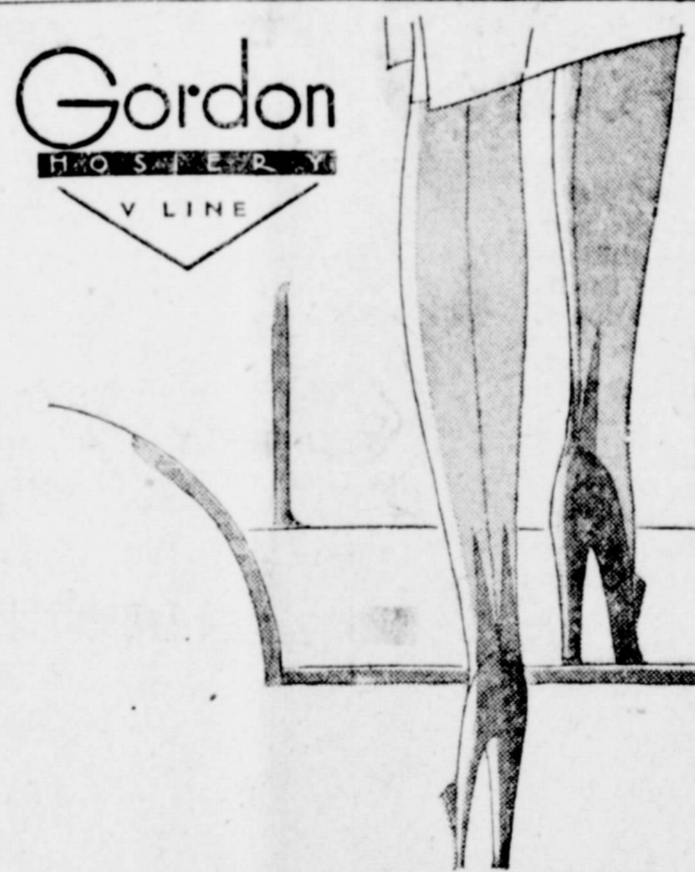
