I have been a farmer and taxpayer in this community for the past twenty-one years. I am now completing my first term on the Spear man School Board.


I feel qualified to request a second term for several reasons

He has been our dentist for 42 years. I haven't been any closer to him than the hundreds of other area citizens who have rubbed elbows with him for these many years but it is impossible to live in such a small community as ours with such a man without him leaving lasting impressions on us all.

None of us will forget our very first encounter with Doctor, for an introduction to a dentist's chair is rarely ever pleasant!

Three things come to mind when I remember him: He cured my first toothache. helped me get over my fear of rats, and presented me with my very first bouquet of Bacara roses. These experiences (in this order) might seem strange to you, but I'll certainly never forget them.

I was 13 years old and had spent a sleepless night crying with the toothache. My grandmother had poulticed the tooth during the night but by morning I was ready to head for the dentist office and have it PULLED. If you have never suffered the nagging, bone throbbing, nerve shattering ache from a bad tooth you have missed something. I wanted it pulled, and quick, and I certainly didn't like it when he told me to sit back in that chair and shut up so he could FIX hat tooth. Fix it he did, and I still have it!

During WW II when Spearman's population consisted mostly of women and young girls, I helped Mr. and Mrs. Robinson in their cafe which was located in the building which now houses Cummings Refrigeration. The building had wooden floors, was old and slightly "used" so to speak... with the bravest RATS you ever saw. The dish washer kept a heavy stick by her side to whop the critters with as they bravely dashed out to steal scraps from under her feet! TAX MAN SAM SEZ: According to some folks, it ought to be worth something to live in Texas. Well, it is. The Texas community property law gives taxpayers three extra income tax benefits. First, you may qualify for an additional \$100 dividend exclusion. Second, you can claim an additional \$1000 capital loss by filing separate returns, and third, you can qualify for an additional \$228 in retirement income credit. There is also a new benefit available this year in a few rare cases -- if you file separate returns you can claim an extra \$150 medical insurance deduction.







on board as three huge pumps worked away at keeping the flooded B, C and D decks as free of water as possible.

Next day, March 22, just after noon, passengers were put aboard a Tender ship for Trinidad, Here the Spearman vacationers picked up a newspaper which carried the story printed below. At Trinidad they were put on buses and transported to the airport. Hours later they were flown back to Miami.

Mrs. Lee said "Diamond Rock" is beneath the ocean's surface but is located some two hours out of Trinidad. Rather than travel the regular channel, the Captain had chosen a short-cut route.

In looking back on the experience, Mrs. Lee said she wasmore frightened now than she was at the time of the accident.

The Port-of-Spain Trinidad Evening news carried this story: An S.O.S. from an Italian tourist liner March 21 sent shipping pilots, tugboats, seamen and local agents from Trinidad on a hurried dash to the Grand Bocas. The liner, Federico "C" with about 463 passengers on board, struck Diamond Rock in the Bocas around 5:30 p.m. Local agents for the ship reported that in addition to the tourists there were 330 crewmen on board. No one was injured.

Mr. Gary Griffith, acting Operations Manager at Alstons Limited, said a call came through to the company radio that the ship had struck Diamond Rock. "After this we made arrangements for the safety of all those on board, he said.

The accident occurred two hours after the liner was on its way out of Trinidad.

A spokesman from the Port Authority said the captain of the liner was advised that it was not safe to bring the ship into port. So it is anchored at the moment on a sand bank off the Port-of-Spain Harbour in 60 feet of water. It is listing on its starboard side.

Agents were unable to give a rough estimate as to the damage done to the liner, all they could say was that the "ship is still taking a lot of water.





WASHINGTON - The House Republica Task Force on Crime today called on Congress for "prompt considera tion" of federal legislation designed to make it more difficult to hijack airplanes.

The GOP Crime Group noted that Congressman Louis C. Wyman (R-N. H. ), a Task Force member, had introduced a bill (H. R. 1469) in Jan-uary 1967, which would protect the cockpit and crew by requiring structural changes within the aircraft and would require declaration and per-


