\$120,000 will be used to construct a new sewage plan designed to serve a population of eight to ten thousand. The present sewer plant, constructed in 1927 to serve 2,000 persons has been virtually condemned by the Texas Water Quality Control Board. The plant has been overloaded for the past several years by some

\$130,000 of the total bonds voted, will be used for improvement and additional water facilities. A recent study reveals that certain facilities must be added so that Spearman will be assured of adequate water for consumer and industrial use. The old wells have been falling off in production due to a decline in the water table, and per-capita increase in water usage has

been increasing steadily. A new well is already drilled and test pumping indicates this is a good well. Drilling has been paid for out of current funds, but to make use of the well, equipment is needed. Also, the commission recommends that funds be made available to acquire additional water rights for future development of the City of Spearman.

This is a revenue bond, and will be paid for from the net revenues of the water, sewer and gas systems. It will be necessary to make a small increase in the water, sewer and gas rates to meet the cost of such improvements and in addition, take care of anticipated increase in costs of operation and maintenance in years

to come. Minimum gas and water rates would remain the same.
