

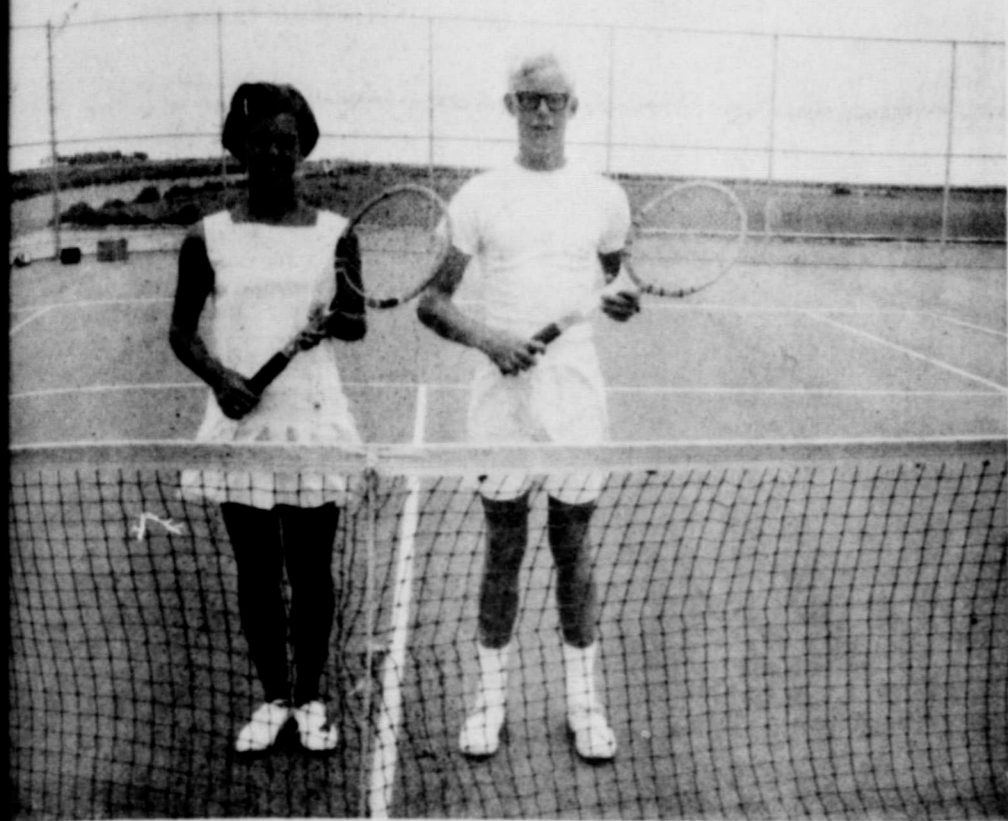

The first half of the District 18 American Legion baseball race is over, and just one team, Borger, still is without a loss on its record.

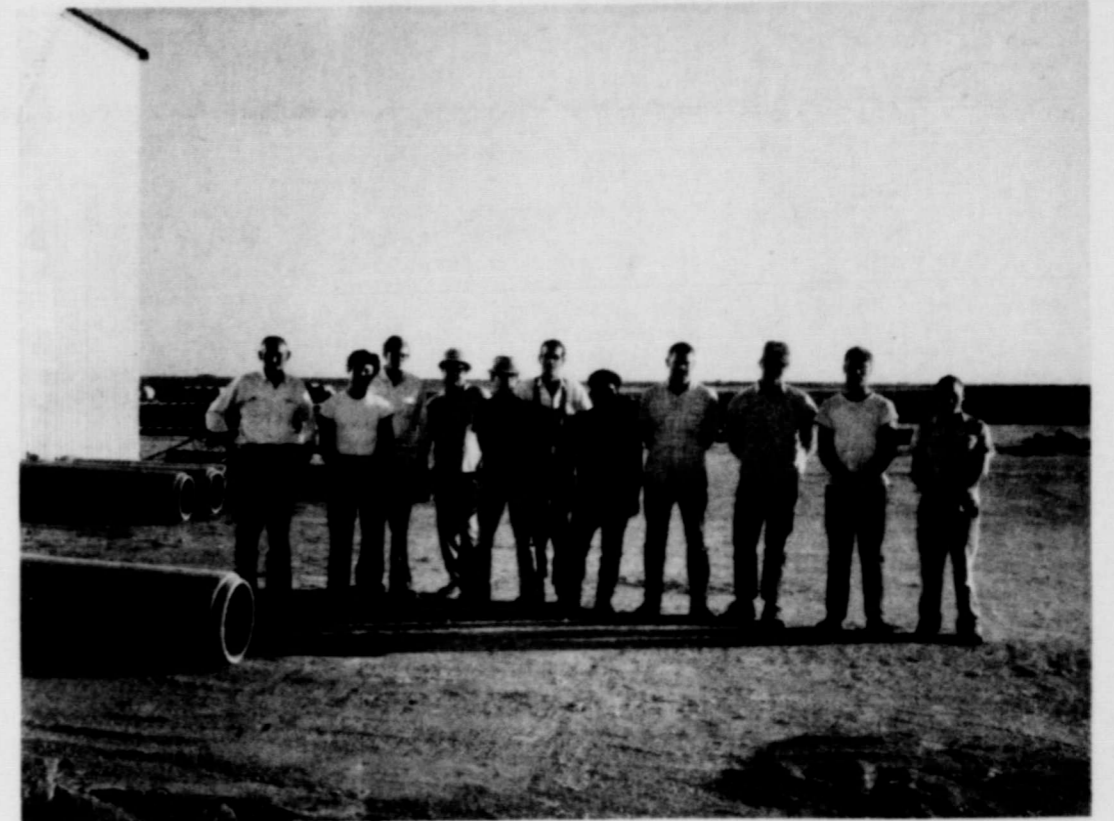

Amarillo, which lost its first three games, has won three in a row and the Dusters are not completely out of the picture. The Dusters still have to play Palo Duro and Borger again, and should they win both of them they still have a good chance to make the playoffs.

Pampa is 2-3, Spearman is also 2-3, Dumas stands 2-4, Perryton has a record of 1-4, and Wheeler is 1-5 to round out the North Zone.

Canyon and Tascosa are currently deadlocked for the top spot in the South Zone with marks of 4-1. Caprock and Hereford stand 3-2, Clarendon is 2-3, Groom is 1-4, and Tulia is 0-4.

THIS PLANT CREW at Gifford-Hill Western turned out the millionth foot of cement irrigation pipe this week. The Spearman business, one of 8 irrigation pipe plants owned by the company, has turned out approximately 500,000 ft. of pipe per year.

## Gifford-Hill Plant Marks 1 Million Ft. Production

Gifford-Hill Western manufactured the one-millionth foot of irrigation pipe this week. The lock-seal pipe rolled off the assembly line Wednesday morning at the plant, and consisted of 10, 12 and 15 inch joints.

The half-million dollar plant, constructed here in 1965 to meet the increasing demands for irrigation pipe, began operations Jan. 11 of that year. On that date, 170 joints of six-foot long 12 inch pipe was manufactured. This was a short production since this was the day the plant held its official opening and the number of visitors slowed down production.

When the plant is in full operation, some 500 joints daily roll off the assembly

our expectations", he said, "we are very pleased with operations here."

Since its official opening, the amount of business pouring into the plant has necessitated the increase of personnel which now numbers more than 40 employees with an annual payroll of more than \$240,000. This includes 6 office workers, 5 engineers, 12 plant workers plus shop and field construction crews.

"This plant is running par with Texas' four other Gifford-Hill pipe plants," Jim Burks said Wednesday. Burks, Division Manager for this North Plains office said Gifford-Hill has 4 of these plants in Texas, and one each in Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado and Arizona. These plants turn out from 400,000 to 600,000 foot of pipe each year. The Spearman plant, according to Burks, could be termed average and above, production-wise.

## Strikers Reject Proposals From General Telephone Co.

AN ANGELLO--Over \$100,000 was added Friday (June 21) to original \$3 1/2 million proposal by General Telephone Company of the Southwest in an effort to reach a settlement with the Communication Workers of America, according to Owen N. Rabourn, director of personnel and chief negotiator for the company.

"We have made every effort to solve the wage differences which are primarily in the traffic (operator) classification," Rabourn said. However, the union insisted the offer was not enough and rejected the entire proposal.

The company's package was made and discussed during a session Friday with Ed Koenig of the Dallas office of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service who adjourned the meeting because "no apparent progress was being made."

The company's package included retroactive wages until June 9, if the union accepted the proposal by midnight, June 21.

Rabourn said, "All of the company's proposals to which the union objected have been withdrawn except two in an effort to establish two-way bargaining."

Southwestern States became a part of General Telephone Company with a merger earlier this year and negotiations have included efforts to merge

contracts of the two companies. Some 4300 employees are involved in the contracts which expired May 31.

General of the Southwest and Communications Workers of America began negotiations for a new contract early in May. Federal Mediator Koenig recessed negotiations June 4. The increased wage offer came after negotiations were resumed June 18.

Rabourn said the company has not been notified officially that the International CWA approved a strike in the Southwest Company nor has a date been set to his knowledge. The union has given the company no indication when bargaining may be resumed.

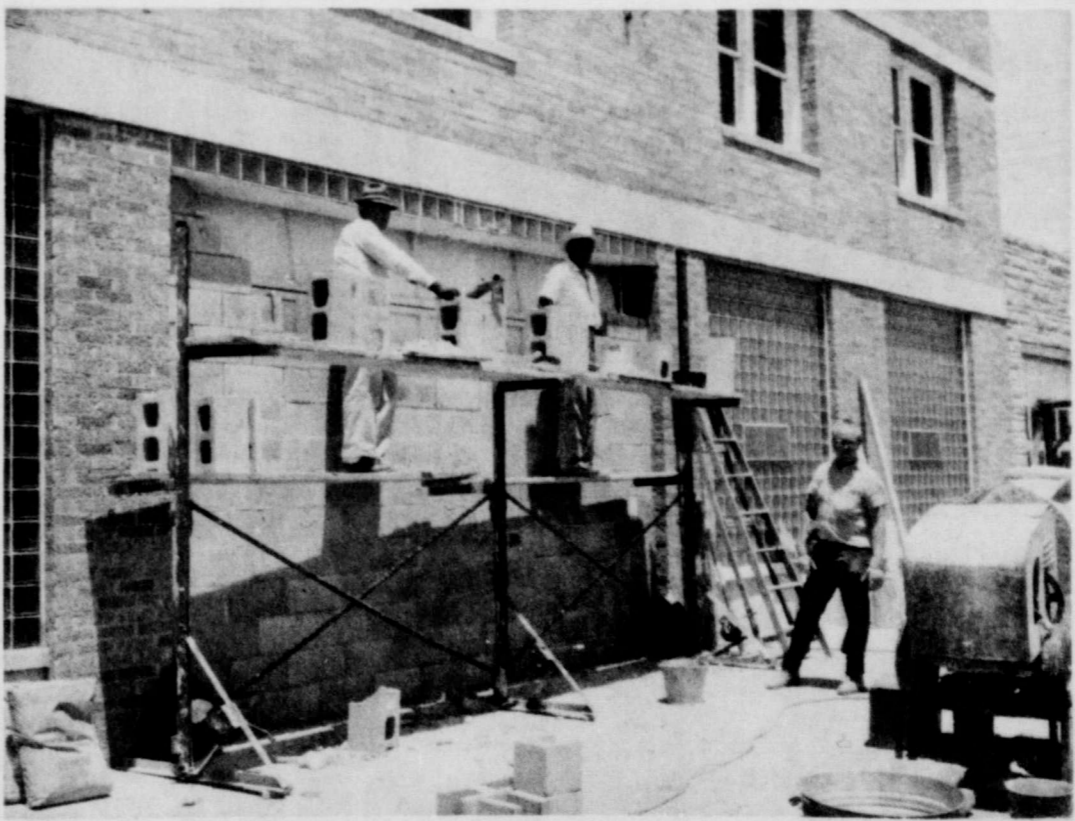

## To All Gun Owners

When a report of a theft is turned into the Sheriff's office, you must give a complete description of such property which is the only means by which you may identify same if and when it is ever recovered.

According to Sheriff J. B. Cooke, one of the main thefts throughout the country these days, is the theft of guns. The only way to properly identify a gun is by its serial number. So if you are a gun owner, it is of prime importance that you keep a record of such.

It is of no concern to the local Sheriff whether or not you turn this serial number in to his office, but it would be to your advantage if you YOURSELF keep the number on file in case of theft.

Sometime back, this newspaper carried a notice to gun owners advising them to register serial numbers with his office so deputies could have a better opportunity to recover stolen weapons. This article was strictly for owners benefit, and by no means something which would be REQUIRED.

The Sheriff does have facilities for a quick check with the National Crime Information Center in Washington, D. C. where a complete file is kept on all stolen weapons, if the serial number is available.



The groom is stationed at Randolph Air Force Base and the bride will teach music in North East Independent School District.

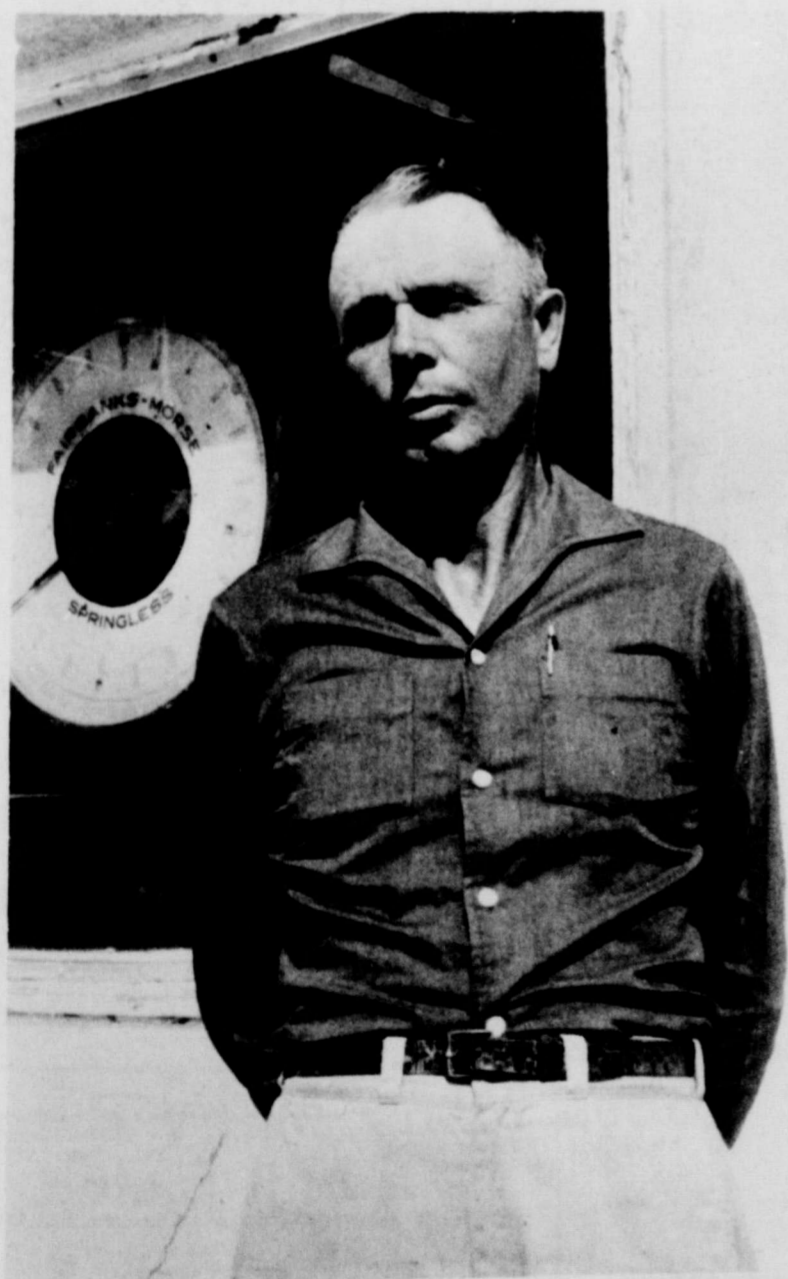

If you want to read a very good book, read **THE WIND LEAVES NO SHADOW** by Ruth Laughlin. This is the story of Dona Tules Barcelo and the life she lived in and around the territory of Taos-Santa Fe. It is the TRUE story of this rich, powerful and beautiful woman and several instances in the book speak of this table. She is buried in St. Frances Cathedral, Santa Fe.

Back a couple of years ago when J.D. & Rubyjo were searching out Spanish ideas around which they would build their new home, they spent much time in Santa Fe. While trading for the carved doors, which adorn their recently finished home, they found the table stored at Southwest Spanish Craftsmen. It was for sale, with several persons bidding for the antique. Rubyjo is not one for "antiques" as such, but she fell in love with this huge piece and they placed their bid. They won't tell how much they paid for it, but J.D. did say it took him over a year to pay off his note!

The late Gerald Cassidy, an artist well known in and around Santa Fe, acquired the table in 1900, from the original owner. A man by the name of Arthur Hall (also an artist) was the next owner. A Mr. Mason bought it from him and later placed it for sale.

The Wilbanks' state the table is NOT for sale... but the Historical Society is begging them to WILL the table back to the state so it can be placed in the Santa Fe museum.

It goes perfect in their 24x36 foot den, along with other unique Spanish appointments, and they say it comes in handy for many uses. After reading "The Wind Leaves No Shadow", I could sit at that table and day dream for hours... it could tell many tales... reveal many secrets.

Another enjoyable evening spent recently was when we fished all day at the lake and went by for a catfish supper at Punkin's Fish Trap. This cafe, owned by Punkin & Willie Lois Edwards, former Gruber residents, is located out of Berger near the Buena Vista Drive-In theatre. Punkin's specialty is a catfish, secured weekly from

The piece was specially made for a gambling table for Dona Tules Barcelo, owner of a gambling Sala in Santa Fe in 1830. She was a notorious gambling queen, a powerful woman in the Southwest when all that territory belonged to Mexico. The table weights 400 lbs. and has a special drawer in the center which slides through and can be opened from the other side! You can imagine all sorts of reasons why the near-secret drawer was made to be used from either side of the table! Another sneaky little thing about the table is that it shows signs of having been wired, at one time or another, for some type of special and secret device. The wire, buried deep inside, runs down one of the huge legs, and comes out the bottom. Two
