To Make European Tour

Barbara and Linda Hand, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Hand will leave Friday, July 13, for a month long tour of Europe. The girls will leave from the Wichita, Kansas airport where they will fly to the O'Hare Airport in Chicago, and then to the J. F. Kennedy Airport in New York City. The girls will enjoy a tour of New York City before boarding the jet which will take them to their first stop, Paris, France. In addition to touring Paris, they will also tour London, England, Rome, Italy, and Munich, Germany.

In Germany, the girls will live in the homes of the Bavarian people and enjoy the sites of King Ludwig II castles, Oberammergau, boat excursion on Ammersee, Hellbrunn Zoo, and the Zuspitze, the highest mountain in Germany. They will also see Ober-Lulz-bury, Hitler's hideout during the war.

Eggers To Visit Spearman Tuesday

Ed Eggers, Republican candidate for Governor of Texas, on a campaign tour of the Texas Panhandle, is scheduled to arrive in Spearman at 2:30 PM, Tuesday, July 9, for a down-town shaking visit with friends and potential voters. Eggers will leave Gruver at 10:30 AM on Tuesday to enroute to Spearman and will depart Spearman at 10:30 PM for Borger, on a 2-day visit to cities throughout this area, from one of eight children of a Lutheran minister's

family, Eggers today competes in the field of law as a successful tax attorney specializing in oil and gas. He is a partner in the firm of Eggers, Sherrill, Pace and Rogers of Wichita Falls. He announced his candidacy for the Republican Governorship February 1st of this year. The public is invited to be on hand next Tuesday at 2:30 at the downtown business district, Spearman, to meet Mr. Eggers.

Council Takes No Action

No action was taken at the meeting Monday night when General Telephone Co. officials met once more with the City Council.

The Council requested the company to furnish additional financial information which would be of assistance in making a decision whether or not to grant the company's request for a telephone rate increase.

The city council is the governing body in this decision. However, if the council denies the company's request, General Telephone could take the final decision to District Court. In other business before the board, departmental reports for the month of June were heard as follows:

Completing Work On Masters

More than half of the 281 candidates for degrees at Southwestern State College, Weatherford, Oklahoma this summer are completing work on their masters programs.

A total of 165 have made application for master of teaching degrees. Among these number are three Spearman teachers: Marshall Ernest Benton, Nell Gossett Benton, and Lois Castel Miller Hull.

Summer convocation is scheduled for 8:30 PM, July 26, at Milam Stadium.

Farmers Warned Of Maize Disease

Farmers should be on the lookout for MDM (maize dwarf mosaic) in their grain sorghum fields this summer points out Robert Adamson, Hansford County Agent.

In 1967, the experiment station studied the effect of MDM on seven grain sorghum lines and six hybrids involving these seven lines. The lines and hybrids differed widely in their reaction to this disease. The virus, was observed to cause stunting, delayed flowering, sterility, reddening of the leaves and a reduction in yield as high as 47.6 per cent.

MDM overwinters in rhizomes of johnsongrass. As this grass emerges in the spring, aphids feeding on the johnsongrass acquire the virus. These aphids then move from the infected johnsongrass to susceptible crop plants and transmit the virus to these hosts.

Symptoms vary depending upon the type of host plant and its stage of growth, states the agent. They may appear when the plants are only a

few inches high. Early symptoms generally include mottling, light and dark green patches usually in the form of broken lines between the veins and green islands on a light green or chlorotic background. As the plants develop, stunting and chlorosis become more evident. Under certain environmental conditions a red-leaf symptom may occur on some varieties. Some plants appear to recover from the mottling symptom as they approach maturity. Malformed heads, as well as reduction in size of heads, are among late-appearing symptoms. Extremely susceptible plants infected early in the growing season frequently fail to head.

Mr. Adamson says he has a list of grain sorghum hybrids that were observed last year and these hybrids are rated as to the degree of susceptibility to MDM.

Farmers should become suspicious if chlorotic symptom occurs in their sorghum on heavy pullman soil.
