Chesty Walker Died

(Chesty) Walker, famed coach of the Phillips Blackhaws for 18 years, died unexpectedly Tuesday morning at Swedish Hospital in Seattle, Wash. He would have been 64 years old on Wednesday July 17.

He had been hospitalized for several weeks but was reported Monday to be improving.

Walker, who compiled a 173-24-6 record during his coaching career that began at Phillips High School in 1939, was inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame in January.

He left Phillips in 1957 to accept an assistant coaching job with the University of Washington. He was a scout for the New Orleans Saints Professional football team at the time of his death and worked with the Dallas Cowboys organization.

Born July 17, 1904 in Lindale, Walker attended high school in Memphis, Texas.

Survivors include his wife, Gwen; two daughters, one brother and five sisters, one of which is Mrs. Thelma Vaughn of Spearman.

Board Hires Supt.

Max Baggerly, president of Spearman School Board, announced today that James A. Cunningham has accepted the position of Superintendent of Spearman Public Schools.

Board members hired Mr. Cunningham in a meeting held Tuesday night at a salary of \$15,000.00. They also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Jerry Ralls, Mrs. Ralls, who has been grade school music teacher, has resigned to move to Houston where she has accepted another job.

Vacancies are still not filled for school counselor, two junior high teachers, and one to replace Mrs. Ralls.

Cunningham, 41, has served as superintendent of Whiteface Public Schools since 1963.

Rearred on a farm in Collingsworth County, he graduated from Samnorwood High School and entered Texas Tech in 1944 where he attended one year prior to entry into the army. He served two years as paratrooper in the 82nd Airborne Div., and returned to Tech in 1947. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture with a major in Agricultural Ed. He taught one year in the Collingsworth Veterans school before being employed at Whiteface in the fall of 1951 as a science teacher in junior high and assistant coach.

In 1959 he completed requirements for his Master of Education degree and has completed twelve additional hours of Doctoral program work.

He was selected to Who's Who in American Education and Who's Who in Texas Today in 1968. He has served as vice president of 4-county Texas Association of School Administrators organization and is a member of Phi Delta Kappa.

Mr. Cunningham is very active in church and civic work. He is a Key member of Lions International and has served as president of the Whiteface Lions club, Zone Chairman of District 2-T-2, and president of Little League baseball. He is currently serving of Great Plains Municipal Gas Corp.

Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham and their 9 year old son Mark, will be moving to Spearman in the near future.
