I asked three people to show me the typesetters before I found one who even KNEW what they were. The woman in the lobby at the switchboard couldn't tell us where ANY department was...nor how many people worked there. So modern...every type of machine conceivable efficiently clicking away at it's own particular job of getting a newspaper out on time. Big color presses pounding out

30,000 papers per hour, sending them down long conveyor belts to where tractors with giant hoists scooped them up in piles and gently laid the stacks down in FRONT OF 36 BOYS who were HAND INSER TING section after section. With a sight of relief at seeing manuel labor, I felt right at home as I stood and watched these young men get printers ink from head to toe. They laughed and joked while they worked and I felt a little sad at the sight of so many machines which had robbed so many workers of jobs so badly needed. It's a changing world.

Yet THEY make mistakes too! Except theirs are more costly. The color man showed us a color grocery section they State University this past sehad to do over. 


