The Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce has selected a most unusual plaque which will be presented to the store lucky enough to win the "best decorated" contest.


Judging of these two events will take place sometime Saturday morning.

former city resident, died September 8 after a long bout with cancer. Spiller died Sunday, Sept. 8 in a Fort Worth Hospital. He was graduated from



PROPOSED **AMENDMENTS ANALYZED**

Under discussion here this week is Amendment No. 7. one of 14 to be voted on at the general election Novem-

This proposed amendment adds a new section to Article 8 and is comprised to five subsections that set forth procedure for diminishing and eventually aboloshing all state ad valorem property taxes, with the exception of the 10 cents per \$100 valuation tax for college and university building programs. In essence, the 5 subdivisions provide that:

(1) After December 31, 1978, no state ad valorem taxes shall be levied on property within this state for state purposes except part of the tax levied which now provides for payment of Confederate pensions, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State

Building Fund. (2) Rates for the state ad valorem tax for support of Texas public schools, (now

evaluation) are phased out by the proposed amendment in a diminishing series for the years 1968-1974, no tax thereafter for school purposes.

(3) The advalorem tax of 2¢ on the \$100 valuation now levied for widows of Confederate veterans, Texas Rangers and their widows shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. The legislature is authorized to establish a trust fund to meet these needs.

(4) Unless otherwise provided by the legislature, after December 31, 1976, all delinquent state ad valorem taxes, penalties and interest, less costs of collection shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning.

(5) Fees paid by the state for both assessing and collection state ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two percent of the state taxes collected.

The state ad valorem tax

has long been the subject of attack on the basis that it is poorly and inequitably administered, Certainly, underevaluation, evasion, and lack of uniformity in the assessment rate from count to county, among different kinks of property and among individual owners of the same kind of property in the same county do exist. Ad-option of the amendment would overcome these inequities making it equal and uniform.

Complete abolition of the tax by gradual reduction over a period of years as proposed by the amend-ment, would create no undue pressure on the state fiscal structure. It would benefit counties and local subdivisions of the state, now finding it ever harder to meet growing government needs with present revenue sources by making the ad valorem tax exclusively available to them. ARGUMENTS AGAINST

Phasing out of the ad valorem tax at a time when it is ever harder to obtain funds needed for state government operations, as proposed by the amendment, would necessitate an increase in other taxes, possibly the state sales tax, to provide compensating revenues. Tax experts are already predicting an increase in the present sales tax, and, further increases

in view of the 1% levied by most Texas cities, would overburden those least able to pay. The ad valorem tax, though it may sometimes be inequitably assessed, is drawn from those most able to pay. Abolition of the tax would inevitably benefit the 'haves" at the expense of the "have nots.

STUDENTS NEED TO FILE TAX RETURNS

In a few more days, millions of our young Americans will give up their summer jobs--or play -- and head back to schoolor college. Those students who have summer earnings will want to file an income tax return next January 1 or before April 15, to get a refund. If income tax was withheld, they need to keep their Form W-2. (Their employer usually gives them a W-2 shortly after the end of their employment.) Those making less than \$600 are not required by law to file, but they won't get a refund of their income tax withheld unless they do file. Social security taxes are not refunded. Each year quite a few students lose 840 or 85 simply because they lose their W-2. They don't want to face the tongue lashing their exboss would give them if they went and asked for another W-2. Most students soon find that income tax will be an important part of their life from now on, and that they need to be careful to keep their records.



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

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
