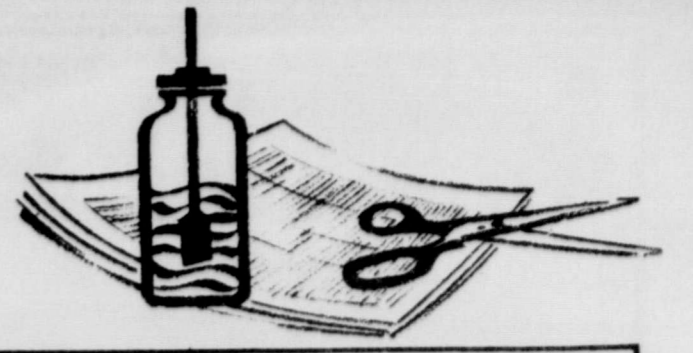

THE CIRCUS IS COMING SEPT. 29

Advance spokesmen for the big tented Carson & Barnes Combined Circus today officially announced that their famed 4 ring circus billed as "America's 2nd Largest Circus" will exhibit in Spearman for one day only, Sunday, Sept. 29. Sponsored by the Spearman Jaycees, the show will have only one performance scheduled for 2:30 P. M.

The big show is presenting as its featured star, the celebrated TV hero and star of his own long-time television series on CBS-TV network, "SKY KING", otherwise known as Kirby Grant. The popular "SKY KING" will appear in person at all performances of the circus.

The Carson & Barnes Circus, now in its 68 annual nationwide tour of the U. S. and Canada, is considered the 2nd largest of the traveling tented circuses and carries the largest menagerie in America today - the circus spokesman emphasized that it is "A real old fashioned, exciting American traditional-type of 4 ring circus under a real big tent and is the first American Circus to present its performance in 4 rings, making every seat a ringside seat, European style. A special note of interest to circus goers, all seats first come first served basis. Early comers will have a ringside seat at no additional charge.

The circus advertises the only traveling zoo and menagerie on tour anywhere in America or Canada today

with any circus which includes scores of rare wild animals including the largest hippo in captivity, rhinos, zebras, camels, bears, wild jungle cats, apes, monkeys, etc., plus the gignatic herd of performing elephants starring "Joske", the largest elephant on the North American continent.

There will be 24 top circus acts and features in the 1968 all new production which includes Newman's Hollywood Pace Bears, Alfredo Borrolo performing lions, The Plunket Troupe, Miss Joan Jenner, Sensational Trapeze star, formerly featured on Ringling Brothers & Barnum and Bailey, Grubb educated liberty horses and ponies, the Riding Lepensky Troupe along with a full lineup of high wire thrillers, dazzling aerialist, tight-wire wizards, juggling champions, beauteous aerialist famed for hanging solely by her hair from a dizzy height near the top dome, acrobatic stars and gorgeous "Big Top Starlets" performing in mid-air ballet fantasies. A contingent of hilarious clowns is also promised. The big show will arrive at daybreak on circus day and the vast and always interesting to watch unloading and setting up of the "Tented City" will take place immediately after arrival, circus spokesmen added.

Everyone is invited to the circus grounds to watch the activity and the feeding of many of the animals which is free to the public.



J. D. Helms Named To Dist. Demo Post

Austin---J. D. Helms, local attorney with the firm of Lynn, Helms & Countiss, has been named by delegates from the 31st Senatorial District (Panhandle area) as District Committeeman.

The action taken by Delegates to the Democratic State Convention this week saw Helms emerge from a field of four candidates as a successor to Dick Brown, who is giving up his committeeman post to seek election as congressman from the 18th district. The congressional seat is now held by U. S. Rep. Bob Price of Pampa, a Republican.

After Brown had made it known prior to the convention that he did not plan to seek another term as committeeman, four names were then submitted: Helms, who is Hansford County Democratic Chairman; Clayton Cook of Vega, who is County Chairman of Oldham County; Buster Carter of Pampa, district campaign manager for Brown; and Fritz Thompson of Borger, former member of the Texas House of Representatives.

Thompson, so the word went, was a committeeman choice of Lt. Gov. Preston Smith. But word came to the delegation Monday prior to the caucus that Smith as head of the Demo-

cratic party in Texas though he preferred Thompson was willing to go along with whomever the district selected.

Carter was the first to withdraw and that left Thompson, Helms & Cook. Then Helms & Cook got together in a motel and when that meeting ended Cook had agreed to withdraw. That left the race between Helms & Thompson.

Randall County in a caucus preceding the district caucus voted to support Thompson on the first ballot.

Both Helms and Thompson were nominated at the district caucus and when 15 counties of the 28 had voted it was apparent that Helms had a clear majority.

At that point the balloting stood at 71 for Helms to 29 for Thompson. Moore County, which had earlier cast four votes for Thompson and three for Helms then asked that it be allowed to change its vote to seven votes for Helms and that he be elected by acclamation. The caucus made it unanimous.

Claudia Brummett of Amarillo was reelected by unanimous vote as District Committeewoman. Other caucus selections were Clayton Cook of Vega to the state committee to

nominate party officers; John Coleman of Wellington state committee on canvassing and party nominee; L. O'Brien Thompson of Amarillo, state committee on platform and resolutions; Charles Bell of Hereford, state committee on permanent organizations, and Ruth Osborne of Pampa, state committee on credentials.

Helms attended the National Democratic Convention held in Chicago recently as an honored guest of the Texas delegation.

He returned to Spearman Wednesday from Austin where he has been attending the Democratic State Convention.

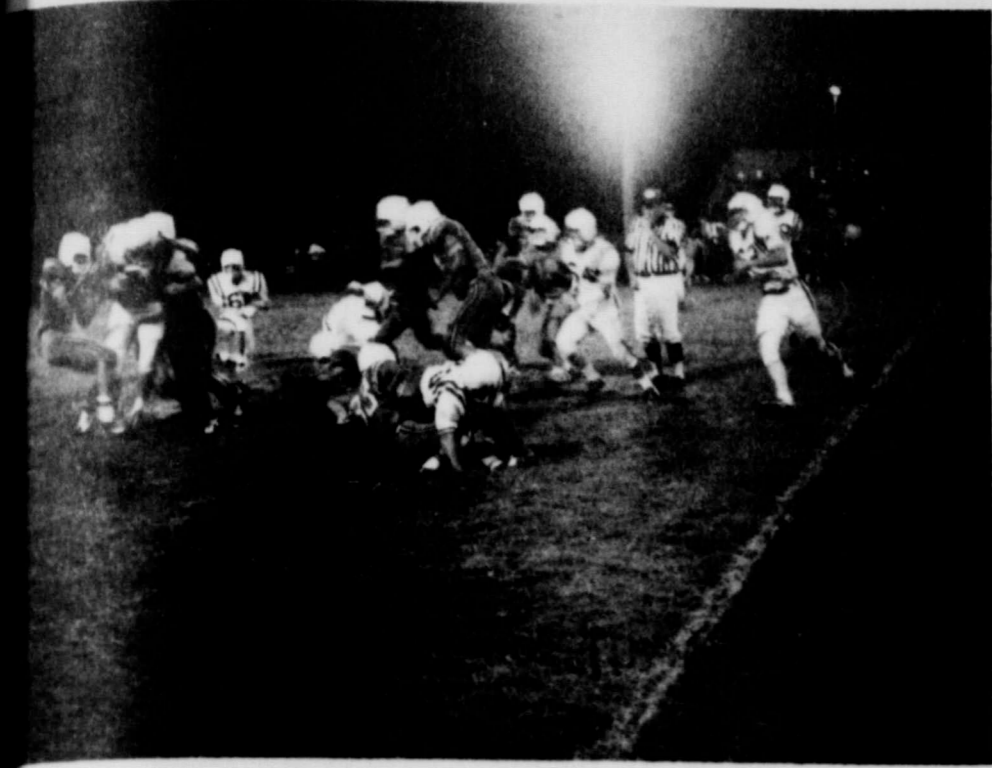

Strong Defense Stops Sunray 40-0 Romp Here Fri Nite

Spearman's Jynxing Lynx had their football season bang here Friday night when they steam-rolled a good Sunray team.

This was a team effort with no individual stars, and the Lynx displayed a fine defense to match their high-gear offense.

In the opening quarter, Sunray kicked to the Lynx, and Bobcats actually matched Lynx in defense, as well as offense for the first six minutes. However, late in the first quarter, a pass from Sunray to Jenkins went for 20 yards, put the Lynx on the board. Quarterback Davis kicked the extra point, and the Lynx ahead 7-0.

In the first quarter with 19 seconds left, Sunray kicked to the Lynx, and Bobcats had driven to mid-field, and looked like they were going to be able to pick some good yardage against Lynx. However, on a down pitch-out lateral, Sunray fumbled and the Lynx pounced on the ball for the Lynx. The Lynx had up some fine running from the 31 yard line, and with Smith going last 12 yards, up the middle, put another 6 points on the score-board. Davis kicked the extra point and the Lynx ahead 14-0.

In the second quarter, the Lynx intercepted a Sunray pass, and from the 10 yard line, they were faced with a long, 90 yard march, and only 30 yards left before the half. Sunray attempted a pass, which was almost complete, but Davis faked a hand-off to one of his backs, slipped the ball quarter-back Smith's arms, and Smith "shook, rattled, and rolled" 90 yards for a touchdown. The try for the extra point failed, and the Lynx ended 20-0, favor of the Lynx.

Two outstanding defensive plays were made by Lynx players in the first half. One was by Thomas Ward, and the other by Jackson. The fine Spearman Lynx championship marching band formed at the half. The Lynx cheer crowd at Lynx Stadium is extremely proud of their band, as well as their football team, and all of the players wish to thank Frank Porter for his fine band for their performance Friday night. Spearman wasted little time in the third stanza. After receiving the kickoff, Sunray hit Hutchison for 25 yards, and from the 23 yard line, Davis shake-hipped his way across the goal line for points. An attempted run for a 2 point conversion failed, leaving the score 26-0. The Lynx once again mixed in a series of aerial, and Davis gains to set up a touchdown. Davis hit Hutchison for another 25 yard pass play, and for a first down on the 40 yard line. Hutchison swept end for a first down on the 7 yard line. In the next play, Jenkins blocked over, behind excellent blocking to make the score 32-0 with 3:59 left in

the third quarter. Davis kicked the extra point, to make it 33-0.

The newspaper staff is extremely pleased with the place-kicking of Davis. It has been so long since we have had anyone who could place-kick, we feel that Davis will be a great asset to the Lynx team, with his kicking, running and passing ability.

The last touchdown Friday night, was set up on a pass interception by Joe Hutchison. From their own 44 yard line, Sunray attempted a pass, and Hutchison picked it off, returning to the Spearman 40 yard line.

With 2:00 minutes left in the 3rd quarter, Smith rambles up the middle for 15 yards, a penalty puts the ball on the 19 yard line, Davis fades back to pass, breaks into the secondary and side-steps his way across the goal line. Davis kicks the extra point, and the scoring for the evening ends at 40-0.

This Friday night, the Lynx will journey to Canadian, to meet the high-flying Canadian Wildcats. Canadian upset a good Booker team last Friday night, 14-13 in a thriller. Canadian is bigger and rougher than the fine Sunray team, and the Wildcats have always played outstanding football. FOR THE SECOND TIME IN THE HISTORY OF THIS NEWSPAPER, ONCE AGAIN, WE WILL HAVE TO FAVOR THE LYNX BY THREE OR FOUR TOUCHDOWNS IN THE FRIDAY NIGHT GAME.

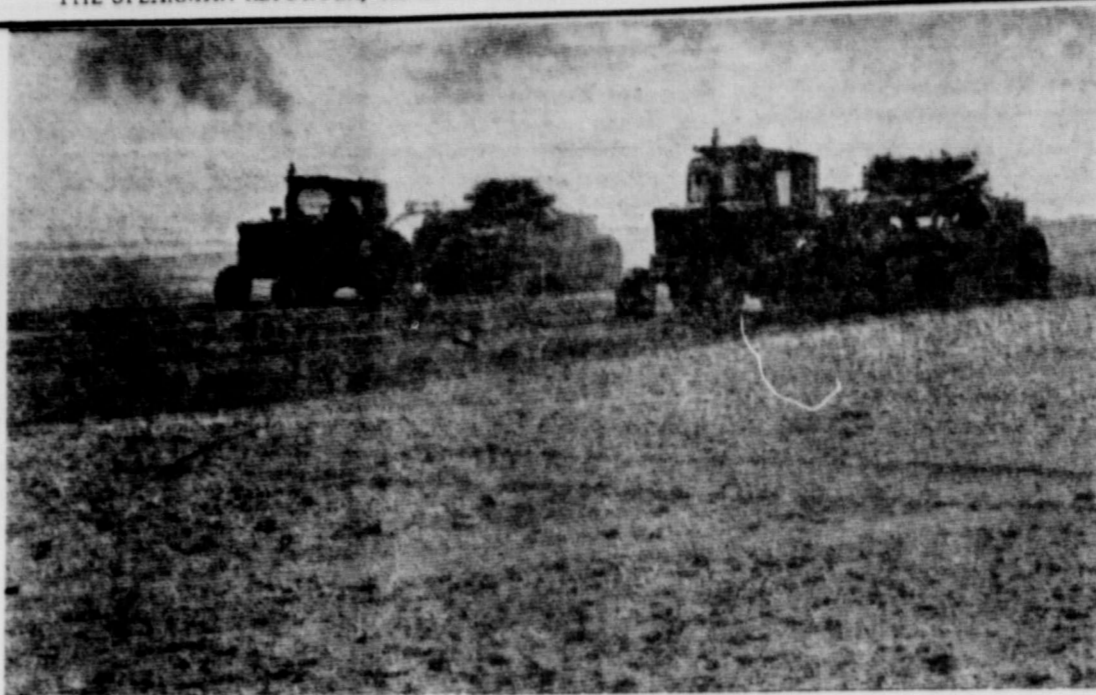

Willis Sheets Helps Make Plains Flatter And Wetter

The Western Kansas edition of the High Plains Journal, a newspaper printed for farmers in the Kansas, Colorado & Oklahoma Panhandle, reached us this week with a front page cover story about Spearman's Willis Sheets.

Front page pictures showed Sheet's four big rigs at work on land improvement practices on the John Scott ranch four miles south of Guymon. Sheets, soil conservation contractor from Spearman, was doing some face-lifting on the land to allow Scott to use improved irrigation practices to produce higher yields of grain sorghum.

The Oklahoma Panhandle --and adjacent areas of western Kansas, eastern Colorado and the Northwestern tip of Texas--is known as pretty flat country. But now this country is being made flatter--and wetter.

Soil conservation contractors like Willis Sheets are gradually leveling the land to table-top flatness so that ranchers and farmers of the area can utilize improved irrigation practices to raise higher yields of corn and sorghum.

Irrigation is not new to the area, but the trend is growing. As more deep wells are drilled wherever water can be found, more land is brought under irrigation. John Bailey, soil conservationist at Guymon, Okla. estimates 2500 to 3000 acres are being added per year for both flood and sprinkler irrigation. Not all the land is brought to grade; some is reshaped just enough to get water over it.

As an example of the trend, Sheets recently tackled 48 acres of good crop land on the John Scott Ranch south of Guymon. From standing position, this land looked flat. But from eye level, it showed heaves and impressions similar to rolling terrain.

This was not flat enough for the type of irrigation Scott wanted to use. So, Sheets and his crew moved in with four elevating scrapers and four diesel tractors to level, chisel, and plane the acreage in preparation for a new grain sorghum crop.

In three and a half days the scrapers stripped and moved 15,000 cu. yd. from the "heaves" and "depressions." They completed the job in five days.

Willis Sheets got into the soil conservation business in 1952 when he took an old Cat crawler to build dams in the Caprock of Texas. He built more than a hundred dams on the 100,000 acre Turkey Track Ranch. "That's

where they fought the battle of Adobe Walls," he says. From that and other jobs Sheets moved in 1963 into the land improvement business-making good crop land even better.

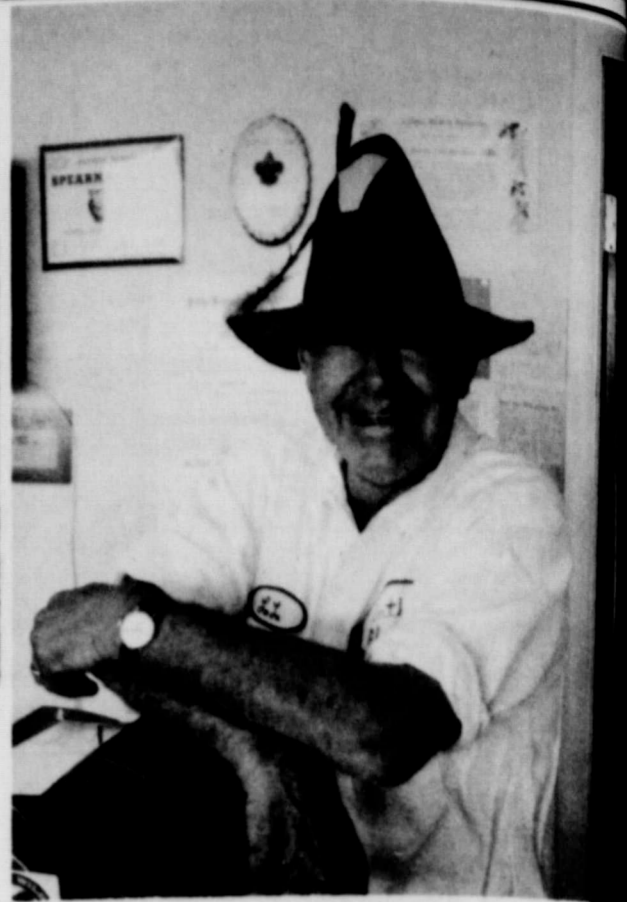
On jobs such as the Scott ranch, Sheets says each scraper moves 75 to 100 yd. per hr. "Of course, it depends on the haul distances," he explains. "Sometimes the hauls are up to a quarter-mile, but generally they average an eighth-mile. The normal job is 40 acres at a time."

Sheets predicts a bright future for the area. "This land improvement business is just starting--we're just scratching the surface". He means that literally and figuratively.

Nearly dust was flying from the paddles of the scrapers as they reworked the Scott land. Off in one direction were giant water wheels rolling in wide circles over already improved pasture land.

Stretching far away in the other direction was the dry flat land that wasn't flat enough--the opportunity for contractors such as Sheets and ranchers like Scott to convert once "Dust Bowl" land into productive and profitable crop and pasture land for the booming livestock population of the area.

Now I don't know what ever possessed Jake to rope the Bob Cat...perhaps he just was tired & bored from sittin' all day long on that tractor; or maybe his sportin' blood just got the best of him...but anyway, he decided to rope that snarlin', spittin' critter... and rope him he did. You've heard the old saying "got a wildcat by the tail & couldn't turn him loose". That was about the fix Jake was in for awhile.

Some times statistics can be interesting... and I read some this week which might just benefit husbands & wives who could be interested in saving money on doctor bills, or who may want to know why it's important to "kiss and make up."

Medical researchers at the University of Michigan came up with some interesting information concerning quarrels between husband & wife. They tested 97 couples and divided them into three groups: those who quarreled frequently, occasionally, and those who almost never quarreled.

The men who quarreled most often with their wives had the highest rate of ulcers. But their wives didn't get ulcers--instead they had a tendency to get arthritis!

And over in Germany they too have been researching the same type of husband & wife thing--but there they went about it in a different manner. The German medical magazine reported that the husband who kisses his wife every morning before he leaves for work enjoys better health, lives longer and earns more money than the husband who doesn't. (ever notice how many poor men die young around this town?)

The medical magazine published research conducted by several dozen physicians and psychologists over a two-year period, and summarized, "husbands who leave home in the morning without kissing their wives do so either because the couple has had a spat, or because they have grown apart."

In either case, the husband begins the day with a negative attitude. He tends to be moody & depressed. He is disinterested in his work &

surroundings.

The husband who kisses his wife every morning before he goes to the office begins the day with a positive attitude!

The research showed that the "kissing husband" is a safer driver, and is more efficient and better liked on the job."

It also revealed that, on the basis of live insurance company's actual studies, husbands who kiss their wives every morning can expect to live a median five years longer than those who don't.

They can expect to hold jobs paying between 20 to 35 per cent more, lose up to 50 per cent less time from illness, and be involved in "significantly fewer" car accidents.

A sampling of Germany's 100 top industrial managers showed that 87% never leave home in the morning without kissing their wives, even (as a number emphasized) "if we have had a terrible row at the breakfast table."

On the other hand, researchers tracked down another 100 German executives who at some point in their careers had been top management, but who had skidded to lower echelons.

In this group, only 17% reported they kissed their wives every morning, and 32 per cent said they almost never bother!

Now then, all you pale, sickly males who are not doing so well on the job---see how simple it is for you to be healthy & successful? Just kiss your wife every morning--whether you want to or not!

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS ANALYZED

This week's discussion concerning proposed constitutional amendments coming up for voter decisions at the general election, is amendment No. 8.

This amendment, which has never been amended since placed in the constitution in 1876, makes four basic provisions:

(1) It deletes fuel used in the Legislative and other departments of government, except the Judicial Department, from the contract purchase requirement. (2) It deletes repairing & furnishing the halls & rooms used for meetings of the legislature and its committees from present contract requirements. (3) It relieves the governor, the secretary of state and the comptroller from the tedium of approval of all such contracts. (4) It changes the reference to "deaf & dumb asylum" to "Texas school for the deaf" to conform with the change in name of this institution made by the legislature in 1948.

Beginning in 1919 with the creation of the Board of Control as the state purchasing agent, this agency in effect has exercised the function of calling for and awarding all state contracts. Compliance with the constitutional provision requiring approval of the governor, the Secty. of State and the comptroller has generally been perfunctory, although the Board of Control does give notice to the three officers when bids on printing or fuel are to be opened.

ARGUMENTS FOR

The Governor, Secty. of State, & Comptroller, all busy officials, should not be burdened with the strictly storekeeping function of approving purchasing contracts. Approval of contracts by these officials has, in actual practice, become a mere formality and something of a nuisance. Such "approval" is performed by ministerial subordinates of these officials, so that the requirement has in reality be-

come so much "red tape". Contract purchase requirements for fuel for the legislative & other departments of government were also a holdover from the reconstruction period, and since the capitol complex has its own central power plant today, this requirement in the Constitution is outdated. Removing the requirement by adoption of the proposed amendment would simply serve as a clean-up measure for the Constitution.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST

Even though the Governor, Secretary of State & Comptroller may be perfunctory in passing on purchasing contracts awarded by the State, the requirement that these officials act in this capacity serves as a check on those actually performing the service. Purchasing agents and officials unconsciously exert more caution under the knowledge that their actions are subject to review by high state officials. Although the present needs for fuel by legislative and other departments of government can be met without fear of graft and corruption, circumstances could change and, certainly, this provision as originally included in the Constitution of 1876, is not harmful.

Help Needed To Make Gifts For Soldiers

The Spearman chapter of the American Red Cross announces a need for money or various items to fill Ditty Bags to be sent to servicemen and women in Vietnam as Christmas gifts. The cost for each Ditty Bag, filled with necessary items, is \$2.00, including at least a part of the postage for mailing to Vietnam. The local chapter plans to fill and send at least 150.

Most of the necessary items can be purchased by the local Red Cross from local merchants at cost or slightly above cost, therefore a donation of \$2.00 will enable them to fill more Ditty Bags than if the citizen filled them himself. This does not mean that the Red Cross is discouraging the filling of Ditty Bags by individuals, it simply means that through their purchase of articles, at cost or thereabouts, more bags could be filled and sent. Articles needed for the bags are as follows: paperback books, stationery with self sealing envelopes, plastic bags (sandwich size), nail clippers, small can of nuts, plastic soap cases, ball point pens, plastic toothbrush holders, washcloth, comb, black pepper, pocket games and pre-sweetened Kool-Aid. Last year many merchants donated ballpoint pens which they give as advertisements, it is hoped to obtain pens this year in the same manner.

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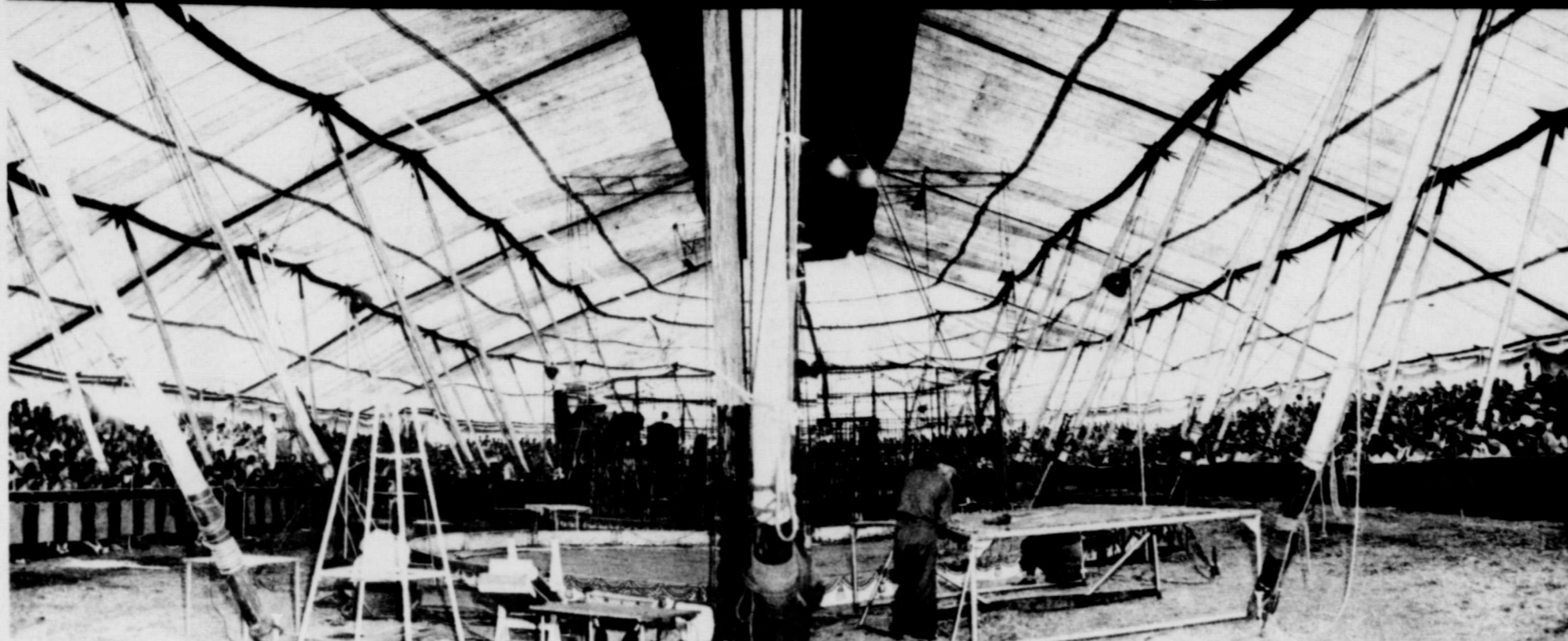
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Farmers Urged To Complete Forms For FB Convention

"Never has it been more important that the farmer speak in his own behalf," Joe Dan Bryan stated in letters mailed this week to the 575 members of the Hansford County Farm Bureau.

Bryan, president of the county organization, was urging FB members to complete an enclosed questionnaire and mail it back to the local office by Sept. 19 (today).

If enough of the questionnaires are turned in by this date, the summarization of the farmer's feelings could then be made into resolutions to be presented before the state convention Nov. 10-14 in Dallas.

"In a society which is rapidly turning its attention to the problems of the city and with such a definite change in the administration, it is very important that we restate our position as farmers," the Farm Bureau president said.

"urges every Farm Bureau member to attend the Hansford County FB Convention Tuesday Sept. 24 at 8 p. m. in the Spearman Jr. High Cafeteria, but more than that, he urged that these questionnaires be returned in time for the meeting Tuesday night.

The questionnaire mailed to county farmers this week concerned some issues facing agriculture, such as: Do you favor an extension of the Food & Agriculture Act of 1965? Would you be willing to accept a limitation on payments to get an extension of the act? What do you think should be done to prevent dumping of CCC stocks on the open market in competition with sales by farmers? And there are others.

If the "voice of agriculture" is to be heard, these survey reports must be returned so that local delegates to the State Convention can present the "attitudes of Hansford County farmers" concerning these important questions.

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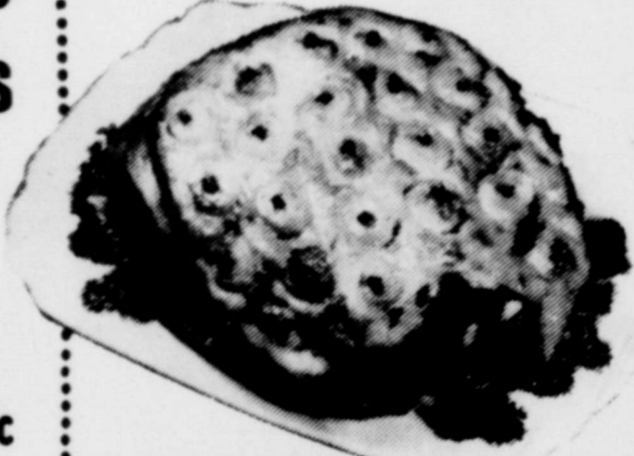
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
