Lynx Win Conference Game From Ranchers 40-0, Friday Revival Date Set



Davis Pass for T.D. Friday Nite

Spearman's Jynxing Lynx won another football game Friday night, at Lynx stadium. When the dust settled and the fans left the stadium, the big Lynx had chalked up another victory, when they trounced the Boys Ranch Roughriders 40-0.

The Lynx opened play in the game, kicking to Boys Ranch. The Lynx held the ball when a Rancher 4th down try fell short of the needed yards for a first down. Quarterback Davis mixed a series of running plays with one long-gainer pass play to set up the Lynx first touchdown, with Smith going the last six yards for the TD. The try for extra point failed, and with 4:54 left in the first quarter, the Lynx led 6-0.

The Ranchers held the Lynx and forced them to kick, at the beginning of the 2nd quarter. The Ranchers returned the ball to the Lynx 44 yard line. On their first play from scrimmage, the Ranchers fumbled, and the Lynx took over on the 44 yard line. Behind excellent blocking, Quarterback Davis faked a keeper, and handed off to Smith, who dashed 56 yards for a touchdown. Davis passed to Jenkins for the conversion, making the score 14-0, with 11:32 left in the half.

Both teams played on an even par for the remainder of the half, with the half-time score standing at 20-0, Lynx favor.

On the first play from scrimmage, starting the 3rd quarter, Davis hit Archer for a 32 yard pass, and a first down on the 15 yard line. On the next play Smith pranced into the end zone for the TD. Smith also ran around end for the 2 point conversion, making the score 28-0.

The Lynx kicked to the Ranchers, the Ranchers fumbled and another Lynx touch-

down was made, as Smith scored from 6 yards out. The try for extra point failed, and the score was 34-0 with 6:17 left in the 3rd quarter.

Jenkins added another touchdown for the Lynx in the 3rd period, making the score 40-0. This was the final score, and the Lynx will be meeting the Stinnett Rattlers at Stinnett Friday night!

Time Change Due

This will be the last week of daylight savings time with the switch back to standard time coming at 2 a. m. Sunday October 27. The law specifies that the clocks shall be moved forward to start daylight savings time on the last Sunday in April and then returned to regular time on the last Sunday in October. Since the time change is 2 a. m. Sunday, the switch will generally be made by the early to bed population before retiring Sunday night.

Police Car Bid To Ford

City aldermen took bids on a new police car at the regular monthly meeting held October 14. The bid was awarded to Joe Trayler Ford company in the amount of \$2,363.82. Excel Chevrolet company submitted a bid of \$2,434.76.

Departmental reports were the order of business for the meeting and Corporate Judge Bob Ragsdale stated that 49 cases had been filed and a total of \$513.50 in fines assessed. These were paid for thusly: \$33 in student themes; \$10 jail time; \$50 was worked out for a total of \$420.50 paid.

City Police issued 54 tickets in October, investigated 7 motor vehicle accidents, resulting in one person injured and \$435.00 in total property damages; arrested one drunk; one Minor in Possession and one minor driving with no driver's license.

Animal control reported 7 held over from September, picked up 30 stray animals in October, destroyed 19, seven were paid out of the pound and 11 held over.

Firemen reported one fire call which resulted in a false alarm and attended two regular drills. Discussion was held on the progress being made at the new city water well and storage plant. Mgr. Darce Foshee reported the huge water storage tank was 75% completed. The new sewer plant, to be constructed soon, is still in the "paper-work" stage.

Xmas Gifts To Vietnam By Fast Cargo

1968 SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL
Tons of St. Nick's gifts will be going to members of the Armed Forces in Vietnam by special ship this year, thanks to a joint Pentagon-Post Office venture.

A fast U. S. cargo ship will be designated the "1968 SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL," sailing from Oakland, California next month with Christmas parcels.

To meet the sailing deadline and assure pre-holiday delivery of gifts sent with surface postage, items should be mailed during the October 14 - November 9 period. They should be marked "SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL" just below the stamps.

The "SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL" will sail during the latter half of November and stop at Da Nang, Qui Nhon, Cam Ranh Bay and Saigon, Vietnam. It takes approximately three weeks for a fast ship to cross the ocean.

All gifts should be packed in strong containers with adequate cushioning and correctly addressed, including APO and FPO numbers.

There are several options available for mailing to the military which can save money. Post Offices across the nation have free pamphlets which outline the mailing programs for servicemen and women overseas.

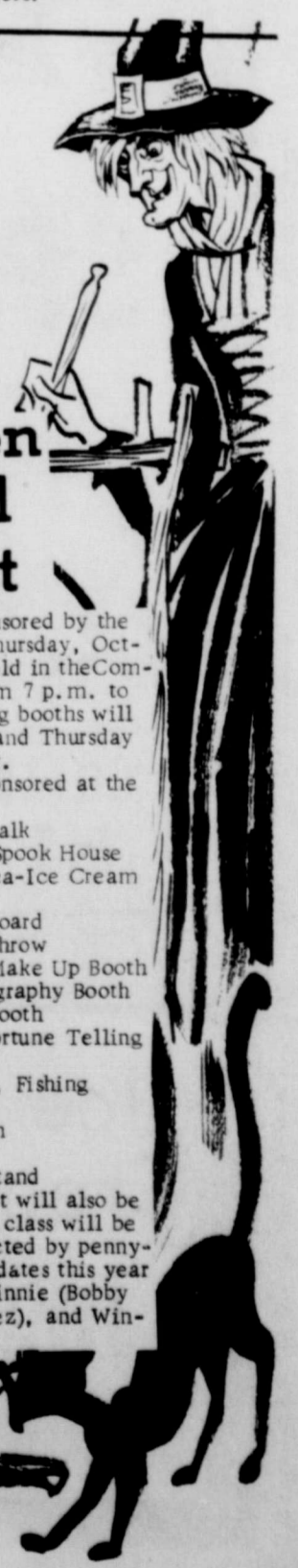
Halloween Carnival Oct. 31st

Welding Course Offered

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held Nov. 4, 5, 6, and 7, under sponsorship of the Spearman High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Cunningham, superintendent and Mr. Boone, director of vocational agriculture.

A&M University. Mr. Edwards holds two college degrees, a B. S. in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M and an M. S. in Agricultural Education-Animal Husbandry from Oklahoma A&M; and in addition, has several graduate hours at the University of Texas. "Many welding short courses in various parts of the State have been taught by Mr. Edwards and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Mr. Labay's office. The short course at Spearman is scheduled to begin Nov. 4th at 7:30 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the

series of four will be held Nov. 5, 6, and 7. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Edwards will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Herman Boone. Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Cunningham, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Boone. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions. Mr. Edwards states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the

operator in running a bead, striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding. "Short courses in welding, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University who coordinates the program for Texas A&M. "This cooperative program" states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educa-

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS ANALYZED

Amendments 12 and 13,
subject to the approval of
voters at the general election
Nov. 5, are listed below:
No. 12--"The Legislature
shall have the power to auth-
orize counties, cities and
towns to issue revenue bonds
for industrial development
purposes, or in aid thereof;
provided, that property
acquired from proceeds of
the bonds shall be subject to
ad valorem taxes. Legisla-
tion passed in anticipation
of the adoption of this amend-
ment shall not be invalid
solely because of its anticipa-
tory nature. The tax revenue,
the utility revenue, and the
revenue from services of any
county, city or town may
not be used to pay any bonds
issued pursuant to this auth-
ority nor the interest thereon."

Adoption of this amend-
ment would place Texas in a
competitive position with
neighboring states of New
Mexico, Okla., Louisiana
and Arkansas in inducing new
industries to locate in the
state. As proposed by the
amendment, the industrial
revenue bonds issued by cities
and counties would be repaid
through lease payments made
by industry for land and
plants, and therefore, would
not be a burden on the tax-
payer or state revenues. At
the same time, the availa-
bility of plants and plant
sites made possible through
revenues from the industrial
bonds would provide an in-
centive for new industries to
locate in Texas and would
stimulate industrial growth
and the overall Texas econ-

omy.

Amendment No. 13
concerns exempting from
ad valorem taxation certain
property temporarily stored
public warehouse. Under
present Texas law, the tax
assessment rate on stored
property in temporary custody
in houses, ranges from \$2
to \$5, 90 per \$100 valuated.
Presently exempt from tax
assessment is out-of-state
property consigned to a
state consignee, but the
property is not for sale, if
property is stored for more
than 30 days, (unsold wool
ranchmen in federal ware-
houses; rice in the Texas
producers stored in ware-
houses in the state, etc.)
States bordering Texas
sides have some sort of
port law, meaning, in some
instances, that a manufac-
urer can ship goods to a
border state, store
goods there and distribute
the goods in small quantities
(that which absolutely
must be delivered) to the
state of destination in Texas.
The manufacturer is able to
store his goods in the
border state, the manufac-

would make it possible for
