90,000 HEAD CAPACITY FEEDLOT PLANS DISCLOSED

Construction To Begin Soon

James P. Linn, Spearman Attorney, announced today that a new company, CAPROCK INDUSTRIES, is planning to build three feed lots in Hansford County, for a combined capacity of 90,000 head of cattle. Plans are for beginning construction immediately.

Local people associated with the company are RALPH BORT, Gruver Banker, DEAN CLUCK, Gruver Cattle Feeder and rancher, KENNETH IRWIN Gruver Banker, C. RALPH BLODGETT, Spearman Grain Dealer and cattleman, DONNIE THORESON, Gruver Rancher, BOB CLUCK, Gruver Rancher, MRS. D. C. CLUCK, Gruver Rancher, JAMES P. LINN, J. D. HELMS, AND RICHARD COUNTESS, Spearman Attorneys.

Non-residents having an interest in the Company are from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, Chicago, Illinois, and New York City, New York. In addition to the building of the feed lots, Linn disclosed that the Company is acquiring large grain facilities in the area, the names of which will be disclosed later.

The project will be the largest single cattle feeding operation ever launched at one time in the entire South-west. There are other cattle feeding operations in the Panhandle region which now have as much feeding capacity as the proposed Hansford County operation, but they were built to this size over a period of years through expansion programs.

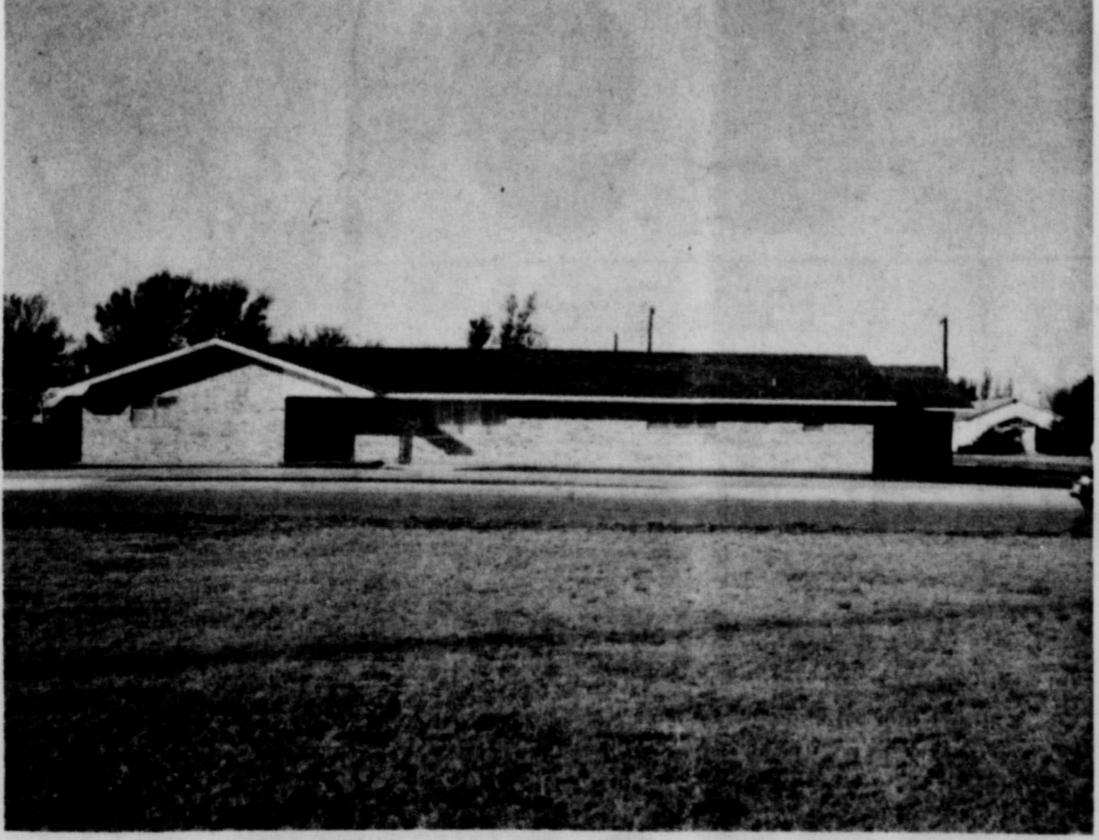
