



Older Than 65

Recommend Flu

COLLEGE STATION --Medical authorities recommend immunization shots for influenza, especially for peo-

ple older than 65 years. People with chronic illnesses and those in nursing homes or comparable environments should make a special effort to be immunized, says Minnie Bell, Extension family life specialist for aging at Texas A &M University.

Ideally, the shots should be completed by early December, she says. Two types of influenza vac-

cines are available. Each fights a type of flu which usually occurs every several years.



Open and Junior Dairy Show premiums have also been boosted. Junior Show awards include an extra \$1,000 to be distributed among Jersey, Guernsey and Holstein breeds, and open Dairy premium are up \$330.
