BODY FOUND IN DEATH VALLE

Former City Woman Victim Of Flash Flood

Word was received by the Sheriff's office here Tuesday that the body of a former Spearman woman and her traveling companion had been uncovered in flood debris in the Death

Valley desert of California. Officials identified the body of Mrs. Marie Madden, long time Spearman resident. The 49-year old woman, who had worked for the past few years in the Palo Duro school lunch room, Amarillo, was enroute to Sacramento, California, according to her relatives here. Officials said evidently the automobile was caught in a flash flood and swept into a deep creek. The automobile was uncovered Tuesday March 4 by roadgrader crews while clearing away the flood debris. Both Mrs. Madden and her companion had been dead since approximately the 26th day of February, according to coroners, who ruled the

cause of death as drowning. Funeral services are ten-tatively scheduled for Fri-day afternoon March 7 in the Spearman Union Church. The time is pending, with Boxwell Brothers Fun-

eral Home of Spearman. The deceased, a long time Spearman school lunchroom employee, moved to Amarillo several years ago and worked with various school cafeterias

in that city. She recently made plans to move to California to make her home and was enroute to Sacramento when the accident happened.

She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Haralson of Spearson; two sons, Billy Madden of Spearman and Way-ne Madden of Jal, N. M.; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Miesner of Spearman; brothers, J. D. Haralson of Spokane, Wash., Carver Haralson of Cheyenne, Wyo., a sister, Alma, of Spokane and another sister Mrs. Isabelle Burk of Amarillo. Ten grandchildren also survive.

Spearman's fine Lynx team brought down the rafters at the Coliseum in Lubbook Saturday morning, as they came from behind 15 points, to with-in one point of victory over Cranes Golden Cranes. And, as all of the Spearman fans knew, the only way that one of Coach Simpsons teams would lose, was for a very unusual thing to happen, and it did! In the heat of the battle, and with only 17 seconds left in the game, Spearman called timeout, and it was the 6th time out for the Lynx, who had the Crane team all but beaten! And, the officials had to walk over to Coach Simpson, and his fine team and say, "Coach, I have some bad news, you have called too many time outs!" Spearman was trailing by one point at this time, and Crane made their free throw, and also got the ball on the technical time

out call! Crane went ahead to win the game 61-57, but the game was finished under protest, as Spearman's Super Superintendent vaulted a 9-foot retaining wall, and charged the score-keeper with the mistake of not telling the team's captain that he had already used up his time outs!

With only 29 seconds left in the game, a Crane player had slammed the ball down on the court in one of the officials face, and Coach Simpson and Spearman fans felt that the Lynx should be shooting the technical; and Coach Simpson was signaling to the referee asking him for the technical, when the players became confused and thought he was calling a time out! Most fans thought that the Crane coach had called the time out, as he was on the side lines in shock along with everyone else!

But, whatever fans thought, the Lynx did themselves right proud, but almost defeating one of the finest basketball teams that ever played in the coliseum. And, as far as the Spearman Reporter is concerned, they really won the game, as it isn't possible to beat these boys this year!

For those of you who weren't there, the team just played magnificiently The Golden Cranes, held a 15 point lead in the final

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

A week or so ago I made a plea via this column for the Spearman Barbers to donate their services to the men patients at Pioneer Manor Rest Home. I just thought it would be a nice, neighborly thing to do, especially since most of the
