"Didn't know what to do about this at first so I tossed it at my tax man. The tax man said he often had that sort of problem brought to him by farmers. "He said all his clients who grow DeKalb seem to have trouble staying in a lower tax

bracket, so he said he usually advises them to buy a new tractor or combine or something like that in order to get a 7% investment credit. He said he figures that's why implement dealers are always telling folks to plant more DeKalb corn." "It still sounds like you've got a pretty good deal, all things considered," I said in

"There's another problem I ran into by planting DeKalb last year," said my friend as he motioned toward the truck.

"I cut so much silage and got so much grain from that DeKalb corn that my heavy cattle were all fed out and ready for market before the feed was gone and I had to go out and buy some more cattle to use up the rest of the feed. See what I mean when I tell you how DeKalb threw me all off," he mumbled. I'm

just not used to harvesting that much corn. "Look, " I said. "I'd better get out of here so you can unload those cattle."
"I sure hope things go better for you this year," I yelled as I drove off.


