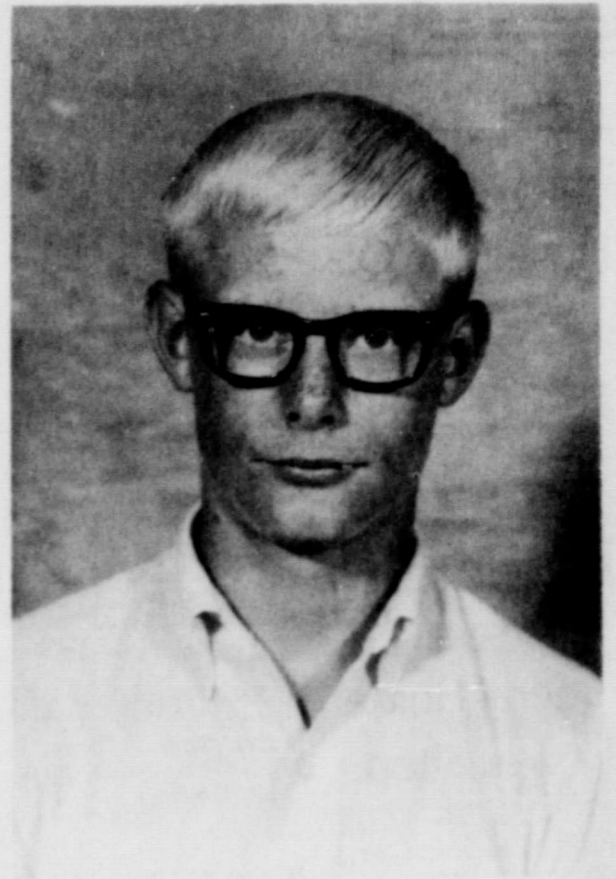
Honor students of Spearman's eighth grade graduating class were named this week by Junior High principal G. W. Robinson.

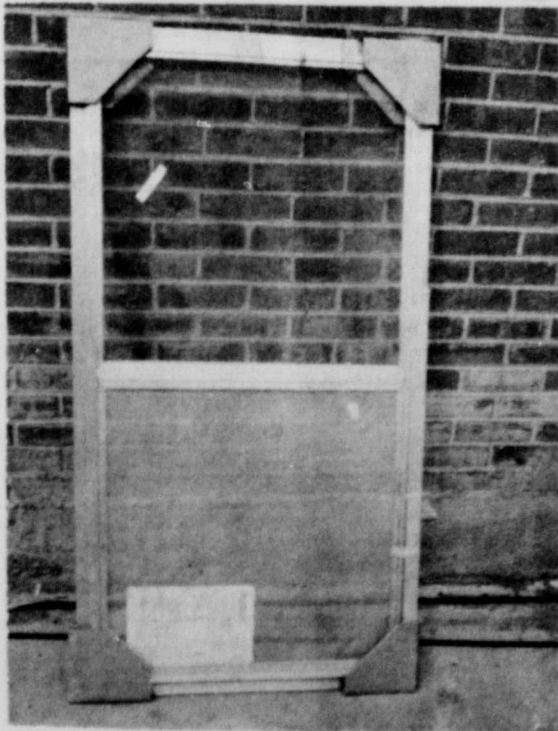

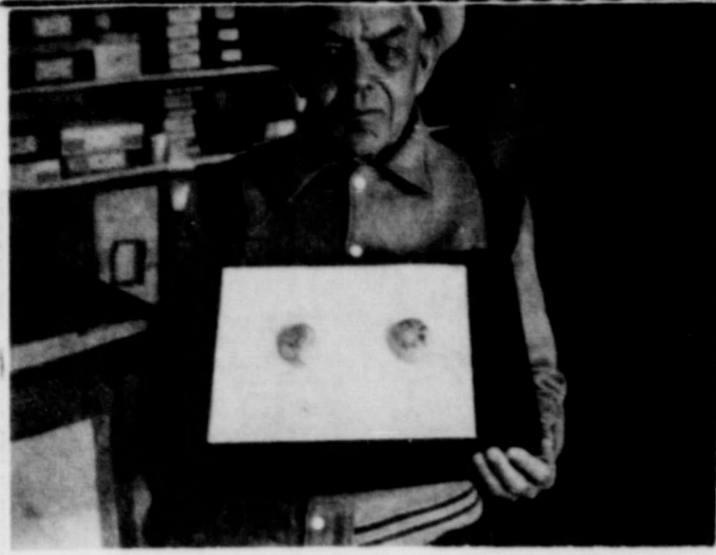

The nation is spending \$127 per person per year to wage the war in Vietnam, but only 93 cents for cancer research. Did you give to Spearman County Cancer volunteers when they called at your home recently? If not, send your check to me, I'll see that it's taken care of. Help yourself with a check-up, and others with a check.

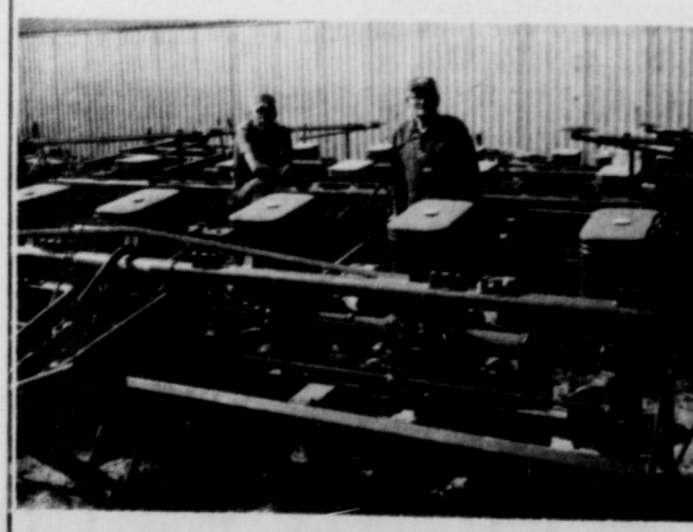

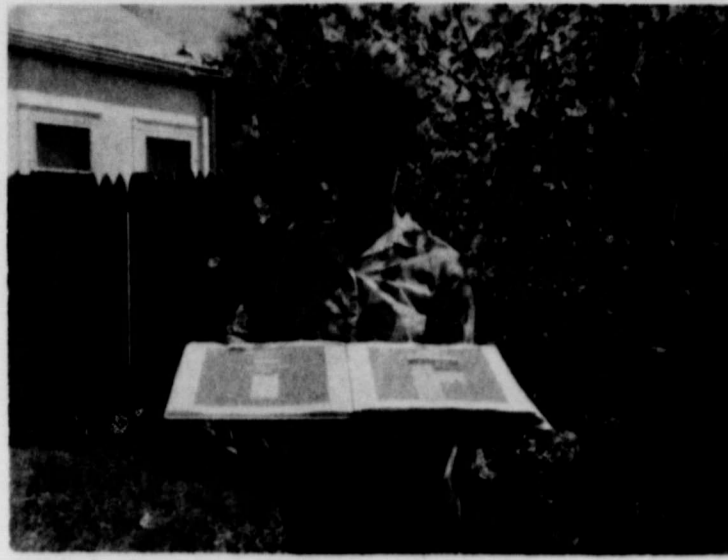

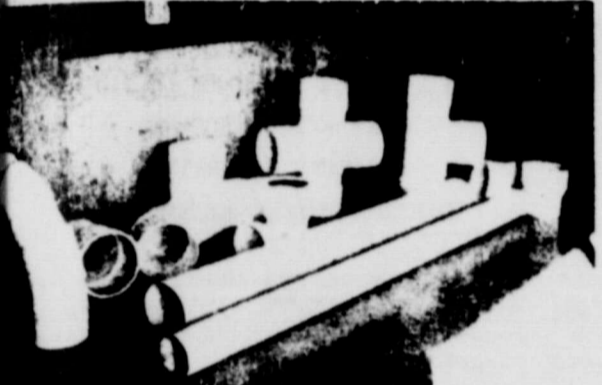
### PROBLEMS OF A CORN FARMER

"Had to spend extra money last fall because of DeKalb corn," he moaned as he pointed to a big, new storage bin on his place. Before I could ask for an explanation, he continued, "Never had planted DeKalb before last year and just wasn't set up to store as much corn as that darn DeKalb produced. When I saw how the stuff was pouring out of the field I had to put in a rush call for an extra bin to hold it." "What a minute," I said. "That seems like the kind of 'problem' that would make you smile." "O yeah," he shot back. "That's not the half of it." "What do you mean," I questioned. "See that new tractor over there?" he asked, as he pointed to a shiny 5020 sitting near the shed. "Also had to buy that because of the DeKalb corn." "Huh?" I replied brilliantly. "Yes sir," he went on. "The way that DeKalb kicked out the yield I had so much extra corn to sell that I knew it was going to put me in a higher tax bracket. "Didn't know what to do about this at first so I tossed it at my tax man. The tax man said he often had that sort of problem brought to him by farmers. "He said all his clients who grow DeKalb seem to have trouble staying in a lower tax bracket, so he said he usually advises them to buy a new tractor or combine or something like that in order to get a 7% investment credit. He said he figures that's why implement dealers are always telling folks to plant more DeKalb corn. "It still sounds like you've got a pretty good deal, all things considered," I said in trying to cheer up my friend. "Like heck," he cracked. "It's also affected my home life." "Aw come on," I laughed. "That's right," he declared. "My wife took some of the extra money I made off the DeKalb corn and bought herself a lot of new clothes and now she wants me to take her out all the time. "Besides that, she was always calling the DeKalb dealer and telling him to make sure he was going to have plenty of seed for us this year. "It made me a little jealous when she phoned him all the time like that since most of those DeKalb dealers are good-lookin', likable fellows." "That's what I've heard," I said. "Just as I was about to leave my friend's place a stock truck drove in with a bunch of cattle. "There's another problem I ran into by planting DeKalb last year," said my friend as he motioned toward the truck. "I cut so much silage and got so much grain from that DeKalb corn that my heavy cattle were all fed out and ready for market before the feed was gone and I had to go out and buy some more cattle to use up the rest of the feed. "See what I mean when I tell you how DeKalb threw me all off," he mumbled. "I'm just not used to harvesting that much corn." "Look," I said. "I'd better get out of here so you can unload those cattle." "I sure hope things go better for you this year," I yelled as I drove off.
