Mr. Castleman, 85, was severely injured in a farm accident some 10 days ago when he was thrown from a tractor and dragged 20 yards by a one-way plow. The accident occured on his farm 2 miles north of Canyon. His son, Brad, was with him and witnessed the accident. Brad drove up to the field where his father was plowing just before the mishap. The elder Castleman saw him and stopped the tractor, and, somehow, must have engaged the clutch and was thrown backwards off the tractor in front of the plow. The son ran after the tractor and got it stopped. "I finally got my father out from under the plow but I could not lift him", Brad said. Two passing motorists saw the accident and stopped. One stayed with Brad while the other went for an ambulance.

Mr. Castleman was taken directly to Northwest Hospital by ambulance where he remains this week recuperating from a broken jaw bone, severe head lacerations, fracture of the left arm and severe injury of the left shoulder, fracture of seven ribs and lung injuries.

#### Soil Moisture Favorable

COLLEGE STATION --With an adequate supply of soil moisture in nearly all areas of the state, now is the time to be seeding rangelands to restore forage production, says Dan Rodgers, Extension range specialist at

Texas A&M University. The Trans-Pecos region is about the only area that is now short of soil moisture, he adds.

Seeding with native grasses following mechanical brush control is an effective means of achieving long-term reduction of brush density, said Rodgers. Texas county agricultural agents in 1968 conducted 2, 000 result demonstrations throughout the state on 75,000 acres resulting in successful establishment on 76 percent of the demonstration

areas, noted the specialist. Yet this large acreage in seeding demonstrations represented only 10 percent of the acreage where brush was controlled mechanically as cooperative extension result demonstrations, he said.

Years of research plus the trial-and-error efforts of progressive ranchers show that all dense, brushcovered ranges without a natural seed source of better grasses must be artificially seeded to assure rapid restoration of forage production. Good

grazing management alone can make little progress without a seed source of good grasses. Thus, new seeds must be planted and the area deferred to assure seedling establishment, emphasized Rodgers.

The range specialist pointed out the importance of observing certain, wellestablished principles to assure successful grass seeding, following mechanical brush control.

He noted the use of good quality seed, planted at the proper time and depth, are among the most important considerations, Controlling competitive plants and planting on a weed-free firm seedbed also help improve the chances of a successful stand estab-

Deferring grazing until seedlings are well established is important to insure restoration of the rangeland, he said.

Broadcasting of grass seed following rootplowing can be a successful method of seeding, especially if the land is

#### Cong. Price Introduces Bill To Repeal Gun Control Act

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price introduced a bill today to repeal the Gun Control Act of 1968. He had previously sponsored another bill to eliminate

ammunition registration.
"I opposed this legislation when it was enacted and still believe it violates the constitutional rights of the individual citizen to own and bear arms," Price said.

"I voted against the bill in its original form as it was passed by the House and again after it had been amended by the Senate and gutted by a House and Senate Conference Committee," Price said. The bill was the result of a wave of misguided emo-

tionalism and a surrender to the bleeding hearts who believe that registering the guns of peaceful and lawabiding citizens will have any effect on the crime rate or act as a deterrent to any criminal who owns or wants to own and use a firearm."
"There is no evidence

that even suggests that the present requirements are making any significant contribution to the fight against the criminal use of firearms," Price said. "The new law has only subjected law-abiding citizens to har-assment and inconvenience not to mention storekeepers and legitimate gun dealers who have been injured or put out of busi-

"The Federal Firearms Act, which this bill would restore, had all of the safeguards of the Gun Control Act as far as deterrence of criminal ownership or use of firearms," Price said. 'And, that is the only basis I can see for any firearms legislation.

Today I succeeded in passing without a dissenting vote Senate Bill No. 524, the obscenity, pornography, and lewd movie bill. In view of various Supreme Court decisions which have been so farreaching, "foggy", and difficult to understand, it was a peculiarly difficult piece of legislation to write. But the Attorney General was kind enough to render me great assistance in this regard in order to get around and comply to the greatest extent possible with those decisions.

My provocation for writing the bill came from two letters addressed to regular staff physicians at the M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston, containing pictures and pornography one would be shocked to see or find even in a house of prostitution. When I showed these folders and pictures to the Senate Jurisprudence Committee, members were shocked in disbelief. The second inspriration for

the introduction of the bill was because a University of Texas English professor showed moving pictures of nude women, making all sorts of sexual gestures and other things too shocking to mention here. There were two students in this Junior English class at the University, and I have tape recordings from each of them -- a young man and a young woman. I played this tape recording for the same Committee and it seemed beyond their comprehension that a movie like this could be shown in a Junior English class in the greatest educational institution in the south. One of these days, I am going to insist that the General Investigating Committee investigate this whole sordid mess.

In passing, I asked each of these students what their parents would think if they knew such things had happened in class, and they each replied they would be afraid to tell their parents for fear they would take them out of school, and they would like to go on and finish. The past ten days have been filled with what was formerly the most controversial legislation the Senate ever had, but most of the bills seemed to "sail" right on through

MINIMUM WAGE. First. a motion was made to reconsider a vote exempting agricultural workers on the minimum wage bill. To my amazement, the vote was reconsidered and the exemption for labor in agricultural pursuits was completely eliminated. VOTER REGISTRATION,

There was a constitutional amendment proposed by the same group of Senators and carries a four-year limitation. If the people pass it, then legislation will follow where voters in some categories will not have to register but once every four years. I can never forget all the argument that was made about the fact that the price of a poll tax restricted the voting by the poor, even at 25¢ registration fee. When this bill was first passed providing for annual registration, absolutely free of cost, 500 people had registered in the City of San Antonio. A district judge there had some question in his mind about the legality of some registrants -- caused an investigation to be made -- and more than 450 of the first 500 of those who registered gave false addresses -- they could not be identified -- they could not be found -- with the inescapable conclusion that fraudulent mass voting was in the offing. Under our

present law, blank registration forms may be clipped from any newspaper, signed by the prospective voter, and mailed to the county clerk's office. The most it can cost is 6¢. This should make it easy enough for any honest voter to cast his ballot for the person of his choice. I can't forget a story a lady of our area, a graduate of the University of Chicago, told me about how machine politics operated in that city. In Mayor's, councilmen's and presidential elections, the racket groups drove to the slums in their large automobiles, with plenty of iceddown soft drinks, candy and sandwiches for their children -- and baby sat while their parents went to vote. Maybe they voted their convictions but I seriously doubt it. Personally, I oppose this fouryear registration because heaven knows how many 'dead people" will be casting their ballots in similiar political machine-guided elections.



#### TEXAS POLITICS by M. Abraham

I'm writing this at the end of the week and it seems like Monday was about two weeks ago. We took up the House Appropriations bill and it wasn't really too bad a bill. However, there were a number of items in there that I didn't like and we tried to make some changes without

It's smaller than the Senate bill so now a Conference Committee of five members from each house will work out the differences. It will be real interesting to see just what comes out. I remember last session that they came up with about 30 million dollars more money and a bunch of things that were not in either

of the bills. We had a rough day Wed-nesday which included a 5hour Revenue & Taxation Committee hearing on the proposed chemical tax. We had something like 34 people appear from all types of industry including a number of farmers. I think that this bill won't get anywhere

That's the funny thing--not really funny --- that very few of the tax bills we have heard so far have much chance of passing as presented. But the fact still remains that we are going to have to figure out some way to come up with a bunch. Maybe next week I can have a little more to say about taxes and the teachers pay

Now, let's talk about the amendment to allow Liquorby-the-Drink on a local option basis. You may remember that I have given you quite a bit of information about this proposal and it has been a real difficult decision with lots of pressure. They needed 100 votes on final reading to pass it. Wednesday they got 95 votes and then with a lot of work they wound up with 101 votes

Orth said the forest industry, through 19 regional and national associations, has asked for better management of government forests, for amendment of the JonesAct and for quick action by the Department of Commerce on lumber standards.

The forest industry owns just 17 percent of the softwood sawtimber in the nation," Orth said. "Yet, because the industry practices intensive wise use through scientific forestry, it harvests more than two and a half times as much from its lands as does the federal government. And the timber managed by industry has a better

The forest industry also manages its land for maximum production of wild-life, Orth said. "More than 95 percent of the industry land is open for public recreation, " he said. One program which will mean more to forest growth in

the South is development of breeds of "superior trees," Orth said, "These are products of forest genetics research on a cooperative basis by industry, the government agencies and the schools of forestry,' he said. "There already are millions of super seedlings in production which will blanket the South with bigger and bet-

ter trees in a few more years.

Another program, due to get underway soon, will follow recommendations of the Southern Forest Resource Analysis." "Two years of research have gone into this program supported by Forest Farmers Assn., Southern Pine Assn., 'Orth said. "The recommendations based on the analysis will benefit the South's one million small for-

est owners. Orth said the South's forest industries must get a majority of their timber from the nongovernment, non-forest industry owners. "These owners control 141 million acres of the 198 million acres of commercial timberland in the region," he said. "There is a pressing need for better management of most of this tim-

Since obscenity is not pro-tected by the first amendment of the Constitution and since Congress has a responsibility to protect the public interest I believe there are compelling reasons for Congress to take the initiative and deal with the problem. It is for these reasons that I introduced a bill on Monday, April 28, 1969, to suppress traffic in obscenity, particularly pornographic material that is sent to young people through the mail.

The bill I introduced makes

it a Federal crime to disseminate through interstate commerce or the mails obscene matter to minors under the age of eighteen. Moreover, to protect families my bill prohibits the unsolicited mailing of obscene material to people with minor children living with them. Pre-sently, adults are protected under the pandering advertisement statute (39 USC 4009) . Under this statute, adult patrons decide for themselves what they consider is sexually offensive publications, and legal orders are issued directing the mailer to remove the complaining patron's name from the company's mailing

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





CAN SAVE TAX DOLLARS (Dallas, Texas) -- Taxpayers can save themselves tax dollars at income tax filing time by keeping good records throughout the year.

Those who maintain good records are less likely to overlook deductions to which they are entitled, Mr. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in Northern Texas, said.

A good system for keeping records is to get a supply of large envelopes or folders, label them according to the types of income and deductions you have, and accumulate the information, Mr. Campbell said.

Taxpayers who itemize their deductions on Form 1040 must have available cancelled checks, receipts, statements and other data to sup-

port the claimed deductions. Mr. Campbell said that, in addition to saving tax dollars, good record keeping makes preparation of the tax return a much easier task.

#### Automated Patient Care

While medicine is making stirring efforts to save lives through heart transplants, a dramatic advance has been made toward day by day patient care through the use of unique dictating equipment developed by Nye Systems of Seattle, Washington.

With the need to make reports at almost any time of the day or night by doctors, nurses and administrators, which required transcription for both present and future reference, information on patients was frequently unavoidably delayed. Too, often, because of the need to transport dictating discs, tapes and belts, reports

were actually lost. The Nye System, already installed in 1,000 hospitals

throughout the country, is

the first unit ever to provide the facility of simultaneous dictation and transcription. system contains a sealed unit which automatically records the reports and erases them after they are transcribed. When the doctor is ready to dictate. he simply picks up a handset, presses a button and starts talking. At the same time, an "alert" flashes on at a Transcriber Station, and transcribing can start immediately, with the typist keeping within seconds of the speaker. Do you gamble with your life when you head out onto a city street or highway in your automobile?

You may be doing just that if you don't hook up your seat belt, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Prevention of accidents is a function of the Health Department through the Division of Civil Defense and Traffic

With summer vacations just ahead, now is the time to start thinking about safety and working toward good seat belt habits.

Traffic claimed 3,481 persons in Texas last year and the injury total was placed at 216, 972.

Nationally, 53,100 persons were reported killed in traffic accidents in 1967, last full reporting year. Of these victims, 35, 300 were drivers or passengers in automobiles. If all these persons had been using safety belts, the National Safety Council estimates that at least 8,000 to 10,000 of them would still be alive.

Some people feel they don't need safety belts for low speed, "neighborhood" driving. But studies show that nearly half of all fatal accidents occur at impact speeds of 40 miles per hour or less and that three-fourths of all traffic accidents happen within 25 miles of home.

The main advantage to wearing a safety belt is that it can help prevent the 'second collision" when car occupants are thrown around inside the vehicle during an accident.

After the car stops suddenly, people without safety belts continue traveling in the direction the car was moving and ordinarily strike part of the interior. The driver moves forward in a seated position. His legs which are sometimes trapped under him may be turned, twisted and fractured. His abdomen and chest may strike the steering wheel and column. His head may hit the windshield or his face strike the steering wheel.

The right front seat passenger, who doesn't have the steering wheel before him, crashes into the windshield and instrument panel during a collision. Safety belts can minimize such collisions inside the car.

In a crash, safety belts can also keep you in your car, thus increasing your change of survival by five

ty belts, the State Health Department advises the use of safe driving habits. Don't drive while drinking or while sleepy or tired. Obey all traffic laws and don't speed to reach your destination sooner. Be especially alert and slow down at night or in bad weather.

#### Who Pays For What In **Automobile Accidents**

DALLAS -- The question of who pays for what in highway accidents has faced motorists since the days when horseless carriages brought drivers and owners of frightened livestock into violent confrontations.

In recent years, society has decreed that individuals had better be able to pay for damage they cause to others on the highways or lose their driving privileges. Every state now has regulations which make it very prudent for motorists to carry some sort of liability insurance or be able to prove they can pay in some other way for the damage they cause.

Texas is about average in its financial responsibility requirements. It is among the 40 states in the U.S. which require that every driver be responsible for up to \$10,000 for bodily injury he causes to one person, up to \$20,000 for bodily injury he causes to more than one per-

son in the same accident, and up to \$5,000 for property damage he may cause in each auto accident. These financial responsibility requirements are usually abbreviated in the following way:

While these are the basic limits in Texas, the Insurance Information Institute points out that motorists may purchase liability coverage up to 100/300/50 for an additional premium.

Texas is among the leaders requiring a new development in automobile insurance that provides further protection for the liability insurance buyer, the Institute said. He must be offered what is called uninsured motorists cover-

This coverage enables the buyer to collect from his own insurance company if he or his family suffer damages legally attributed to an itresponsible driver who cannot pay. This also protects him if he is injured by an automobile when he is walking or riding a bicycle or if he is injured by a hit-and-run driver. He is protected just as if he were injured by someone who did have basic limits of liability insurance.

While this coverage must be offered the insurance buyer in Texas, the Institute said, any policyholder may refuse by written notice.

Most drivers also carry collision and comprehensive insurance. These coverages protect the motorist from losses resulting from damage to his own car. Such damage may be caused by collision -- running into a tree for instance -- or fire, theft, vandalism, floods and many other perils.

Another widely used insurance protection provides medical coverage for the driver and his passengers, up to the limits stated in the



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


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
