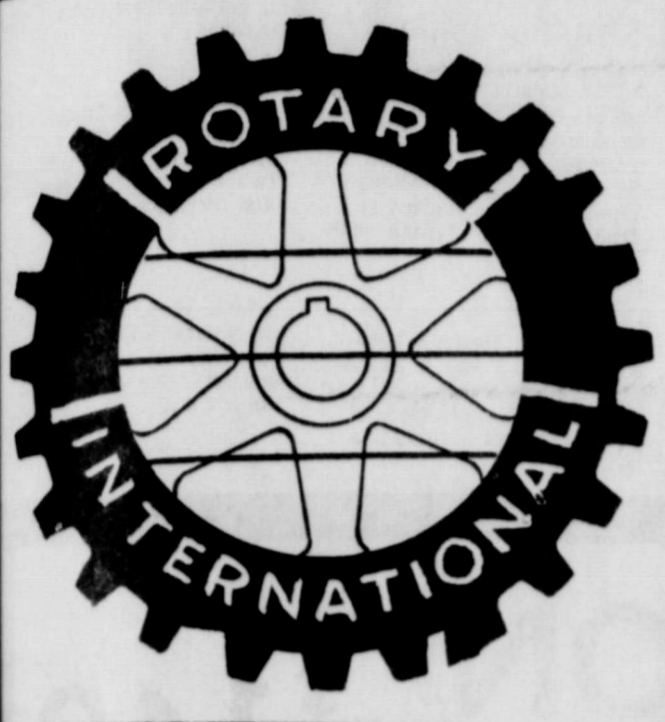

ROTARY CLUB TO RECEIVE CHARTER

The newly organized Rotary Club of Spearman will hold its Charter night this evening in the fellowship room of the First United Methodist Church of Spearman. Admitted to membership in Rotary International, World Wide Service Organization on June sixth 1969, the local Rotary Club celebrates its admission with charter-presentation ceremonies attended by Dr. Jack Rodgers, Rotary District governor from Odessa, and delegations of Rotarians from the Rotary Clubs of Borger, Canadian, Shamrock, Dalhart, Dumas, Canyon, Rawls, Lubbock, Slaton, Floydada, Odessa, Amarillo, Panhandle, Pampa and Hereford.

Mr. Rodgers will present the Charter to Coy Palmer, President of the Spearman Rotary Club, and welcome Spearman Rotarians into Rotary's global fellowship of more than 653,000 business and professional men who belong to 13,682 Rotary Clubs in 146 countries.

The Rotary Club of Spearman represents a cross section of the business and professional life of this community, since the basis of membership in a Rotary Club is the selection of men from each recognized business and professional activity in the locality. This principle of membership was begun in 1905, when the first Rotary Club was organized in Chicago, Ill., by Paul P. Harris, a young lawyer. It is the core of Rotary and imposes on each Rotarian the obligation of representing his vocation not only in the Rotary Club, but also in the community at large.

Upon becoming a member of Rotary International, The Rotary Club of Spearman adopted the same objectives of other Rotary Clubs around the world. These goals relate to the promotion of fellowship as an opportunity for service, the practice of high ethical standards in business and professions, the betterment of communities, and the advancement of international understanding, good will and peace.

Miss Johanna Brigitte Eichholzer, who wishes to be called "Hanni" will be arriving in the United States August 18 via TWA charter. She will be making her home for the next school term in Spearman, in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Max Baggerly and family.

Hanni, who will be 18 years old on October 28, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Heinrich Eichholzer of Graz, Styria Austria, where she has attended two years of high school. Upon completion of the senior year in Spearman High School, she will return to Graz, Styria for one more year in the educational institution there.

A Roman Catholic by faith, Hanni's favorite academic subjects are mathematics, history, geography and music. She plays the piano and guitar and enjoys all types of music from classical to pop music. Her favorite sports include skiing, skating, swimming, football and basketball. She hopes to become a teacher.

Following is her letter to the Spearman chapter of the American Field Service, which is the committee responsible for bringing Miss Eichholzer to this city:

My name is Johanna Brigitte Eichholzer, May I introduce you to my family.

Sorghum Growers Should Be Alert For Greenbugs

Sorghum growers should be on the alert again this year for the pesky and destructive greenbug. This tiny pest which sucks the juices from the sorghum plant and did such widespread damage in the Sorghum Belt last summer is back at it in many areas.

If there are greenbugs in your fields be prepared to spray--but do so only after you have positively identified them. Unless you're certain you have the greenbug you might be destroying beneficial insects by spraying. There are several other insects--primarily the corn leaf aphid--which resemble the greenbug.

Some key identifying characteristics of the greenbug are: a length of about 1/16 inches, a general light green color with a dark green stripe down the back, green legs with black tips, and black cornicle tips (the cornicles are two small tubes at the rear of the body). There are both winged and wingless greenbugs.

The greenbug feeds under leaves and near the ground. In contrast, the corn leaf aphid which is similar in appearance to the greenbug, but lacks the dark green stripe down its back, usually feeds in the whorl on new growth.

If you do identify a greenbug infestation, how do you decide whether its severe enough to spray?

Texas A&M, Oklahoma State, Kansas State and the University of Nebraska all offer these general tips:

1. If plants are up to 6 inches high, spray when there is visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on lower leaf surfaces.

2. Beyond 6 inches and up to pre-boot, spray before any entire leaves are killed.

3. From pre-boot on, spray when greenbug numbers are sufficient to cause death of more than the two lower, normal-sized leaves.

For spray materials, Wayne Fowler, agronomic education director for DeKalb AgResearch, Inc. reports that the most frequently recommended chemicals are Diazinon, Malathion, Ethyl Parathion, Phosdrin and Systox.

Fowler says the Diazinon and Malathion can be applied as a ground spray but he advises that the other three are sprayed from the air. He warns against using the methyl form of Parthion because of potential damage to the plants.

After a first spraying farmers should keep a close watch on their plants and be alert to a reinfestation says Fowler. It may be necessary to spray again. If another application is required, be certain the chemical can be used a second time in a season. Some materials are labeled for one spraying only.

Be certain to check with your local extension personnel or your seed dealer on any

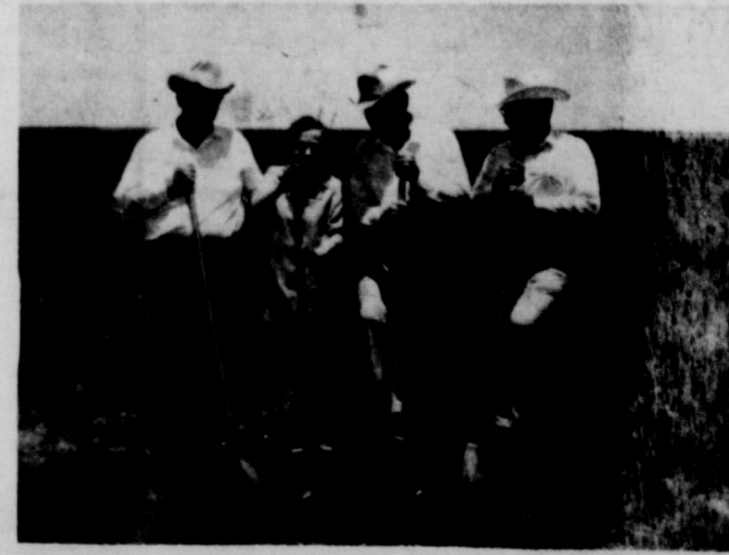

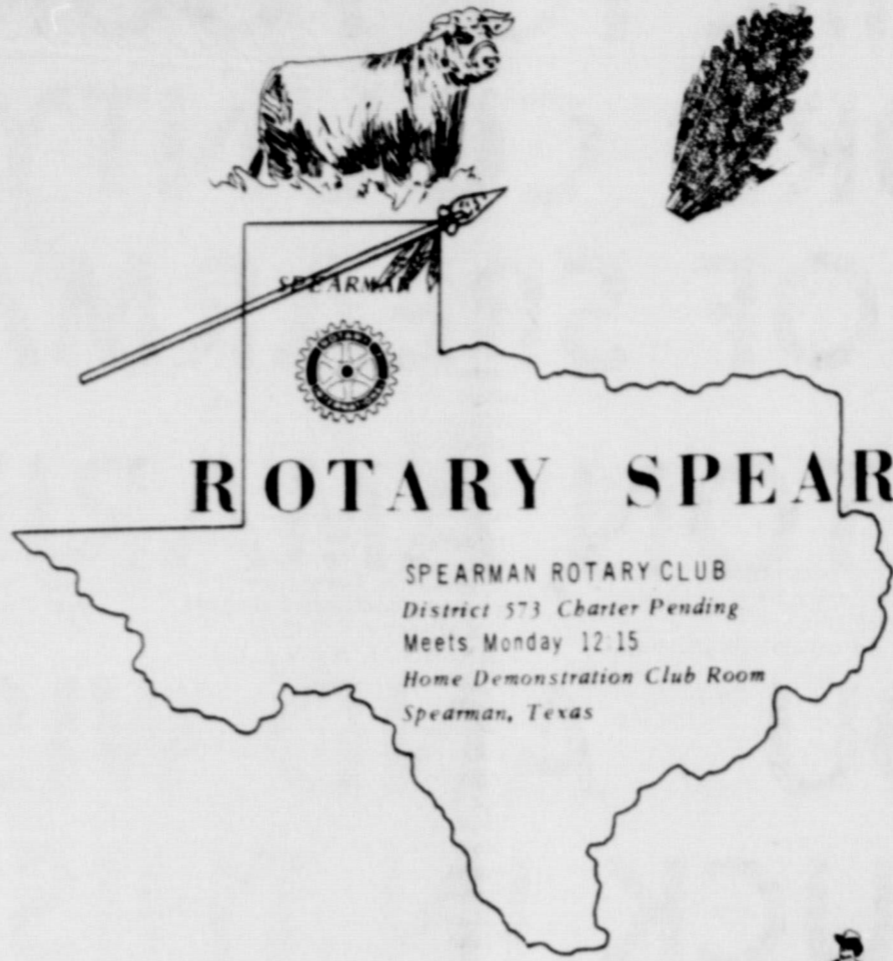

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee

by Vivian C. Warminski
County Home Demonstration Agent

Start Father's Day, June 15
with a "Dad-size breakfast.
Breakfast is the most impor-
tant meal of the day. Give
him an extra bit of attention by
spotlighting scrambled eggs
varying them by adding herbs,
spices or fruits.

Even the novice homemaker
can feel confident about pre-
paring scrambled eggs. Success
comes quick and easy.

Regardless of how many eggs
are scrambled, allow one ta-
blespoon milk and a scant of
salt for each egg. Add pepper
as desired. Use only enough
fat to cover the bottom of the
skillet lightly.

Mix eggs, milk, salt and
pepper with fork or beater.
Mix thoroughly if a uniform
yellow is desired. Heat fat in
skillet just hot enough to sizzle
a drop of water. Keep in mind
that for cooking eggs, as in
cooking most protein foods, low
heat is best.

Pour in egg mixture. As
mixture begins to set at bottom
and sides, gently lift cooked
portions with a spatula so that
the thin, uncooked part can
flow to the bottom.

To assure best texture and
appearance, avoid constant
stirring. Cook until eggs are
cooked throughout but are still
moist and glossy - about three
minutes.

Add a gourmet touch to scram-
bled eggs with some of the fol-
lowing ideas.

1. Lightly brown sliced mush-
rooms in fat before adding eggs.
2. Add finely cubed or
shredded cheddar cheese when
eggs begin to thicken.
3. Add pinch of favorite
herb as poultry seasoning, mar-
joram, chives or minced pars-
ley.
4. Add drained pineapple
chunks when eggs begin to
thicken.
5. Lightly toast chopped
nuts in the fat before adding
egg mixture.
6. As mixture begins to
thicken, stir in chopped meat
such as bacon, luncheon meats,
frankfurters, or chipped beef.

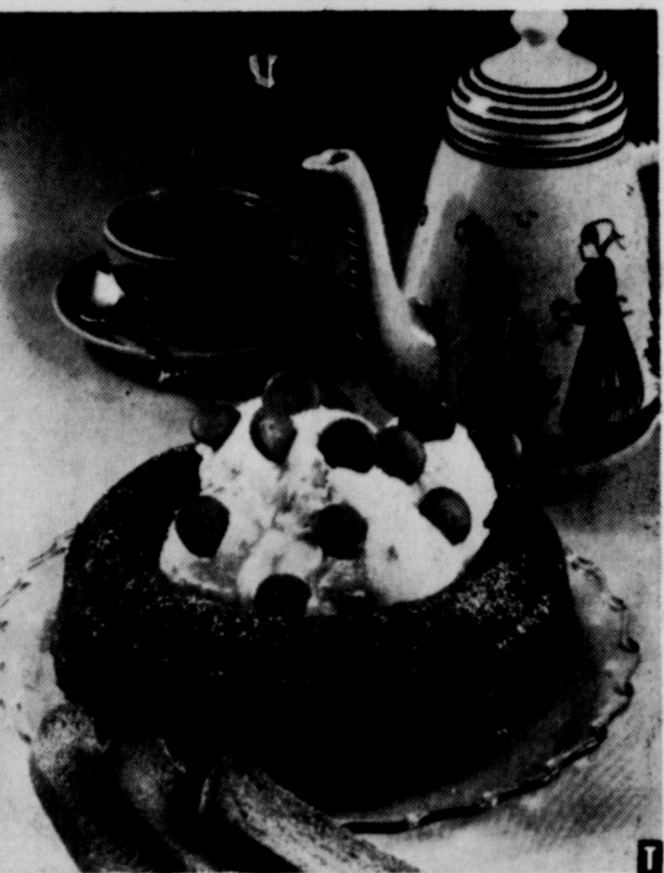

The cakes tend to be less sweet than American cakes and are often made with ground nuts, chocolate, a touch of liqueur, lots of eggs, butter and whipped cream. Capture Viennese flavor in this moist light ring cake made with finely rolled zwieback in place of flour. To serve, pile scoops of butter pecan ice cream in the center and garnish generously with chocolate candies.

CHOCOLATE-ALMOND RING
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/4 cup granulated sugar
4 eggs, separated
4 ounces sweet cooking chocolate, finely grated
4 ounces unblanched almonds, finely ground (1 cup)
12 NABISCO Zwieback, finely rolled (about 3/4 cups crumbs)
1 teaspoon baking powder
2 tablespoons brandy
2 tablespoons milk
1 quart butter pecan or vanilla ice cream
Malted Milk Crunch
Beat butter or margarine until creamy. Add sugar, then egg yolks, beating until light and fluffy. Combine next four ingredients. Stir with brandy and milk into egg mixture. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Fold into chocolate mixture. Pour into a well greased 6 1/2 cup ring mold. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350 F.) about 40 minutes, or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan for five minutes. Loosen around edges; then turn out on rack to cool. To serve, fill center with ice cream and garnish with Malted Milk Crunch. Make 12 (2 1/4 - inch) wedges.

World's Meanest Mother

She recalled the painful years when she was growing up. "I had the meanest mother in the whole world," this anonymous person wrote. "While other kids ate candy for breakfast, I had to have cereal, eggs and toast. When others had Coke and candy for lunch, I had to eat a sandwich. As you can guess, my dinner was different from other kids. "My mother insisted on knowing where we were at all times. You'd think we were on a chain gang. "I am ashamed to admit it, but she actually had the nerve to break the child labor law. She made us work! We had to wash all the dishes, make beds, learn to cook and all sorts of cruel things. I believe she lay awake nights thinking up mean things to do to us.

"She always insisted on us telling the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth. By the time we were teenagers she was much wiser, and our life became even rougher.

"None of this tooting the horn of a car for us to come running. She embarrassed us no end by making our dates and friends come to the door to get us. I forgot to mention, while my friends were dating at the mature age of 12 and 13, my old-fashioned mother refused to let me date until I was 15 and 16.

"My mother was a complete failure as a mother. None of us has ever been arrested, or beaten a mate. Each of my brothers served his time in the service of his country. And who do we have to blame for this terrible way we turned out? You're right, our mean mother.

"Look at all the things we missed. We never got to take part in a riot, burn draft cards and a million and one things that our friends did. She made us grow up into God-fearing, educated, honest adults.

"Using this as a background, I am trying to raise my children. I stand a little taller and I am filled with pride when my children call me mean. You see, I thank God He gave me the meanest mother in the whole world."

Research Scientist Speaks To Students

"The Russians are ahead of us in the quest for controlling thermonuclear fusion, the awesome power of the hydrogen bomb, for peaceful purposes," Dr. A. E. Robson, research scientist at the University of Texas at Austin, told 500 science students and their teachers attending the Ninth Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools on the Austin campus the first week in June.

Noting that the Russian scientists recently have been able to contain plasma heated to ten million degrees for one-fiftieth of a second, Dr. Robson said that "one-fiftieth of a second may not sound very long, but compared to the containment of only one-ten-thousandth of a second attained in prior experiments, one-fiftieth of a second seems like an eternity."

"By profiting from Russian achievement and by using techniques familiar to University of Texas scientists in the new center for plasma physics and thermonuclear research being built here, we feel that we can double the temperature and triple the time of containment," Dr. Robson added.

"The source of the hydrogen bomb's energy is nuclear fusion," Dr. Robson told his listeners. "This is the joining together of the nuclei of light elements to form heavier ones, and is unlike nuclear fission which derives energy from splitting the nuclei of heavy elements in atomic reactors.

"In fusion research, we are attempting to control this energy release for the generation of electric power. Ordinary water, which is abundant, cheap and virtually inexhaustible, contains deuterium (heavy hydrogen), the basic fuel for nuclear fusion."

The symposium was co-sponsored by the University and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, which is supported by Community Public Service Company and nine other investor-owned Texas utilities.



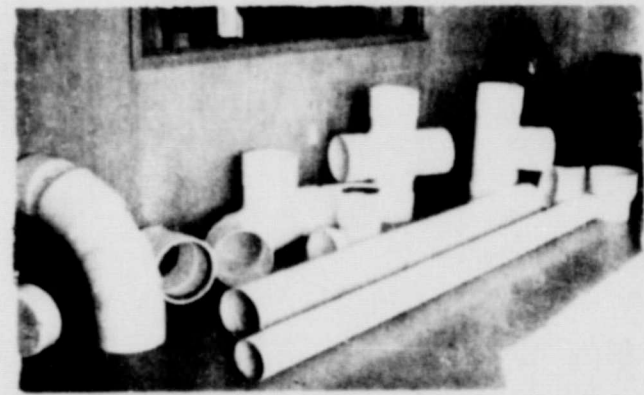

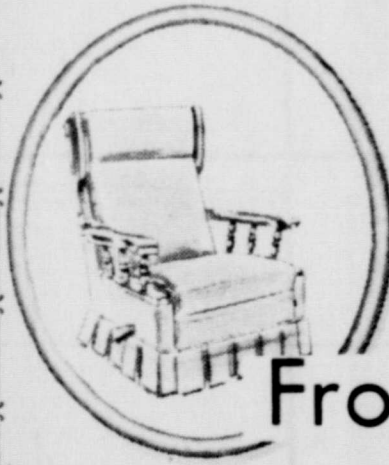
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
