



Following his engagements in India he will visit Tel Aviv and spend five days in the Holy Land. From there Rev. Shoemake will visit Rome and Amsterdam.







everywhere) this summer has been lousy. In a note this week from Mrs. Pearl Reed, she tells how she enjoyed her recent visit with old friends in Spearman. "The library is beautiful and I am proud of any little part I ever had in it. Mrs. Reed was Librarian for the local library for many years and from time to time has sent me contributions to give to this local facility to help it expand and move into its new quarters.

In a letter this week from Mrs. Jack R. Allen of Perryton, Kathy tells of a new book recently published by the Ochiltree County Historical Survey Committee which will be of interest to old timers as well as new comers. The book is replete with the early day history of the old town of Ochiltree and is es pecially rich in family histories and pictures, having a story on practically every family who lived in that County before 1919. To a lesser extent, it tells of Gray, Okla., which town, together with the town of old Ochiltree, moved to the new Santa Fe railroad to form the town of Perryton in 1919. There are stories of early day schools, of farming and ranching and the oil development. The book contains a foreword by Spencer Whippo, member of a pioneer family, Mayor of Perryton and Chairman of the County Historical Survey Committee, who, together with his sister, Mrs. R. T. Correll, wrote much of the early history. Mrs. Irvin Hergert served as Editor of the interesting volume. The book costs \$12, 50, has 653 pages and may be ordered from the Ochiltree County Chamber of Commerce.


J.D. Wilbanks had recorded 2.44 for the three-day rainfall and about the same was reported by James Mar-
