### ADDITIONAL \$180,000 NEEDED NEXT YEAR

The Spearman School Board met in special session Monday night to discuss budget needs for 1970-71. This move concerning the financial situation for 1970-71 is brought about by the fact that the 1969-70 budget shows a deficit of \$76,947 between anticipated receipts and estimated expenditures.

It is estimated that an additional \$180,000 in tax revenue will be needed for 1970-71 due to the deficit for this year, losses in gas tax revenue and increases in minimum foundation program expenditures as voted by the last session of the legislature.

To raise this additional revenue it is estimated that an increase of \$13,000,000 in assessed values will be required.

The Board requested the tax office personnel to prepare a breakdown of the tax rolls showing various classes of property. This information will then be used by the Board in determining an equitable manner for producing the required additional assessed values.

### CITY BUDGET HEARING DATE IS SET

Members of the Spearman City Council met in regular session Monday night with Mayor D.E. Hackley presiding and calling for departmental reports. Bids were let for a new Police car and a new Ambulance. These bids, published in this issue of the newspaper, will be received by 8 p. m. September 29.

Corporate Judge Robert Ragsdale reported 41 cases filed in August with total fines assessed \$409.00. These were paid for by themes \$33.; \$25.00 worked out; \$10. jail time; \$16.50 suspended; \$16.50 still owed, for a total of \$308.00 paid.

City Police issued 47 traffic tickets in August, investigated 8 motor vehicle accidents for a total of \$1,337.00 property damage, made six arrests and investigated one theft of \$513.00 in money.

The fire report for August showed three in-city calls: one grass fire, one car fire and a mattress fire where boys had been smoking in an abandoned house.

The budget hearing has been set for September 29 at 8 p. m. when the proposed Budget for the fiscal year 1969-70 will be reviewed.

Animal control officials report 6 animals held over from July, 27 picked up in August, 29 destroyed, 2 held over in the City animal shelter.

With a short discussion of the Regional Planning Commission the meeting adjourned.

This is a point we in America have ignored too long. Let us time we started to make some noise about it.

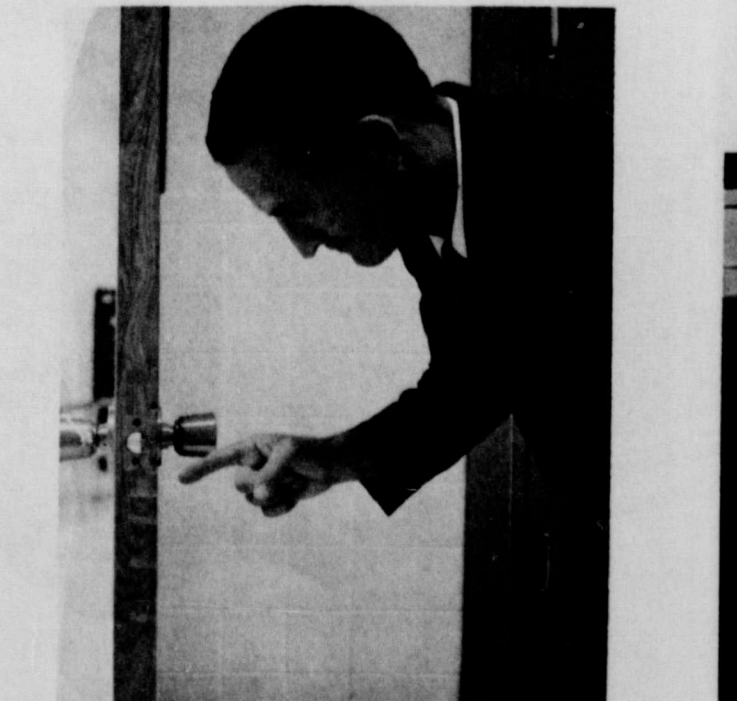
Let us stand up for the Christian principals by showing NASSA officials we outnumber Madalyn O'Hair and her fellow atheists.

Spearman police officers are investigating the burglary of Spearman Elementary and Junior High Schools which occurred some time Sunday night.

Chief Leland Wood was notified of the burglary early Monday morning. Upon investigation, Wood found that entry had been gained into the cafeteria at the grade school by breaking out a window in the dining hall. Burglars entered the junior high school through an open window in the auditorium. They forced their way into the Principal's office, into several classrooms and into the elementary school building where they took about \$10.00 in change from the Coke machine.

Police Chief Wood said mostly, the thieves just pilfered through the school buildings, taking money from teacher's desks and Coke machines. They ate candy bars found in various desks, leaving the wrappers strewn about the floor.

To cool cookies--after cookies are baked, remove from baking sheet and cool. Clean brown paper bags (like your groceries come in) make a good surface for cooling cookies or other baked products if you do not have cooling racks. Cut bags open and spread flat on kitchen counter or table.

Hot cocoa is good with Old Fashioned Sugar Cookies: BEST-EVER COCOA 1/2 cup cocoa 2/3 cup sugar 1/8 teaspoon salt 3 cups water 2 tall cans evaporated milk (3-1/3 cups)

Mix cocoa, sugar and salt in a large saucepan. Stir in water. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Turn heat low and simmer 5 minutes. Stir in evaporated milk and heat to serving temperature, stirring occasionally. (Or if preferred, chill and serve.) If desired, add 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

To Use prepared Cocoa Mixes: Follow directions on package and use half evaporated milk and half water to make the amount of milk called for.

Add flour mixture and evaporated milk alternately to sugar mixture, stirring to mix well after each addition. Stir vanilla. In another bowl beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold into batter lightly but thoroughly. Drop batter by rounded tablespoons 3 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Flatten each cookie with back of spoon, keeping shape as round as possible. If you wish, sprinkle each cookie with a little sugar spiced with cinnamon or nutmeg. Bake in preheated moderate oven (375) degrees for 10 to 12 minutes, or until slightly

### Grain Sorghum Referendum Ballots In Mail

AUSTIN--The Grain Sorghum referendum ballots for the October 6th producers check-off vote were approved today, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White. Grain Sorghum producers in a twenty-nine county area of the high plains and panhandle will be involved in the referendum vote, White said. They will be required to complete three major sections on the ballot. The first section includes the self-assessment proposition. Candidates for a

twelve-man Commodity Producers Board are listed in the second section. Growers must indicate last year's production in the third section of the ballot. "All voters," Commissioner White stressed, "are eligible to vote on members of the Commodity Producers Board regardless of whether they voted 'yes' or 'no' on the referendum proposition. The decision of the Board will affect all

producers in that area if the referendum passes." Growers who had no production during the last crop year are still eligible to vote, White explained. However, they must certify on the ballot that they are new producers. Ballots must be mailed to the polling sites before midnight, October 6th. They will be counted by a committee consisting of

the County Judge for the area affected, a representative of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a representative of the Texas Department of Agriculture, observers from the Grain Sorghum Producers Association of Lubbock, and other persons deemed necessary. All election proceedings must be approved by the Commissioner of Agriculture.

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### WTSU Buffaloes Open Season Saturday Night

WTSU, Tex. -- West Texas State University's Buffaloes will begin their 10th season under Coach Joe Kerbel at 8 p. m. Saturday in Buffalo Bowl at the Northern Arizona University football stadium. Northern Arizona will be facing a club with a new coaching staff and an aggressive romp Saturday afternoon.

Northern Arizona, former-Flagstaff State of Flagstaff, and past California Poly, will play Saturday in Flagstaff. Former professional football player John Symanek took over as head coach of the Lumberjacks this fall. On his coaching staff is former pro football player Lamar McHan. This will be the first year Kerbel to have the double duty of head football coach and director of athletics. He has been pleased with the progress of his ball club during a pair of scrimmage sessions, but is looking forward to leading his team in an actual game.

The Buffs return only four players offensively from last year's team which had an impressive record, but Kerbel feels the replacements have outstanding potential.

Leading the offense is All-American candidate Duane Thomas, a 6-2, 220-pound back who is the 10th leading rusher in West Texas State's history.

Thomas has 1,304 yards in two years--gaining 596 yards in his sophomore year last fall.

The NCAA record-setting halfback Eugene Morris, but Kerbel feels he has a pair of excellent replacements in Thompson and Ralph Thompson (no relation).

Thompson has rushed for 200 yards in each of his two seasons. Rocky, on the other hand, has been injured, but is expected to be ready for Saturday night. Both are speedsters--Rocky runs a 9.5 in the 100-yard dash during an intra-team track meet last fall while Thompson is a 9.7 sprinter.

At the quarterback post is Clarence "Pokey" Brown, a former all-stater at Ector High School. He has limited his duties last year as a freshman to place-kicking and was the leading kick scorer in action with 67 points.

Senior letterman Coachman has been impressive with their passing and early drills.

Halfbacks, flanker Jackson and tight end Walker are all accomplished pass receivers. Split back Flynn injured a knee in Saturday's scrimmage and will probably miss the game. He will probably be replaced by either squad-mate Daryl Wynn of Follett or sophomore Mike Milne.

Defense returns eight regulars, including four defensive backs. Quarterback Billy Lantow and Gary Conner return as well as Anderson and Ray Brown at the safety position.

Offensive and little Matias will again handle the placement kicking, although Rocky Thompson has considerable talent along with him. Roland Reichert will again do the punting for the Buffs. He averages 41.1 yards per kick.

Northern Arizona quarterback Bobby Stuart, a transfer from the University of Texas at El Paso, hurled three touchdowns in leading the Lumberjacks past Poly. He hit

on 14 of 25 passes for 231 yards.

End Bobby Gray had seven receptions for 144 yards and two scores.

The Lumberjacks rolled up a 19-0 halftime lead and then coach Symank filled the field with reserves during most of the second half.

Northern Arizona's aggressive and large defensive line limited Poly to 128 yards rushing and 45 passing. Poly was able to complete only five of 19 passes during the contest.

Saturday's game will be Hereford Night, with grade school children from that city being admitted to end zone seats free of charge.

### PUEBLO Crewman Will Tell Experience Of His Captivity

Former PUEBLO crewman Lee R. Hayes, who spent eleven months of 1968 in North Korean prisons, will describe his experiences and the lessons he learned during his captivity in a public speech at Crockett Jr. Hi Auditorium, 4710 Floyd, Amarillo, Texas, on Sept. 26th at 7:30 p. m. His calm and deliberate description of capture and imprisonment, and his analysis of the factors that produced the shame of the PUEBLO, have received warm praise from shipmates and eager listeners alike. The speech, which is entitled "REMEMBER THE PUEBLO!", is part of a three week tour in the area and is sponsored locally by the Amarillo Area TRAIN Committee (To Restore American Independence Now).

Describing himself as "a former average American who did not appreciate our marvelous heritage until I temporarily lost it," Hayes now spends all of his time reminding his countrymen that the price of liberty is eternal vigilance. "We will remain free only as long as we are willing to defend our freedom," Hayes declares. "Yet today, instead of adhering to what we know is right, we seem all too willing to appease our enemies, compromise our standards, and even send aid to the Communists."

A severe critic of appeasement, Hayes recalls his own prayer that U. S. bombers would retaliate against his North Korean captors even if the retaliation meant my life in the process! He adds, "One direct consequence of our policy of appeasement regarding the U. S. S. PUEBLO occurred on April 15, 1969, when these same North Koreans shot down an unarmed Navy plane, killing 31 of our men."

Upon his release from Communist captivity and his return to the United States, Hayes determined to learn why the PUEBLO had been sacrificed; why the most powerful nation on earth signed a false confession to get the crew released; and why the United States continues to stumble from disaster to disaster while the Communist world grows in power and prestige.

Today he is convinced that the problem--and the solution--must come from within this country. "I believe that our heritage is being deliberately subverted by men who claim to oppose Communism, but whose policies and programs continually strengthen our enemies and weaken us," he states.

Because of his conviction that more Americans must become aware of the threats to our freedoms, Hayes decided against reenlisting in the Navy and instead is working to alert our people to the dangers we face, and he offers them a positive program to work on.

Hayes said that "my year of captivity will have been worth every minute if I can

help to restore American principles to our foreign policy. Once this is accomplished, there will be no more PUEBLOs, no more 'no-win' wars, no more betrayal of our friends, and, in time, no more Communist threat to us." The TRAIN Committee (To Restore American Independence Now) is part of a nationwide network of Committees formed to examine the purposes and conduct of U. S. foreign policy. TRAIN agrees with the late General Douglas MacArthur that "appeasement but, bet, new and bloodier war," and is dedicated to an education effort in support of the principles which have made the United States such a great nation. Tickets to hear Lee Hayes will be available at the door for \$1.50.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ: September is here and back to school time has finally arrived for Mama--or much too soon for Junior. Going back to school does create one small income tax problem for those students who worked during the summer. Nowadays this includes most of the senior high school students, as well as college students on summer vacation. Ordinarily the students worked in jobs that required their employer to withhold income tax and social security tax from their pay check. The law requires their employer to issue them a W-2 within 30 days after they leave the job. The students will need to carefully put away this W-2 until January 1, 1970. Ordinarily if they do not work elsewhere, they will get all of their income tax withheld refunded, provided they file a Form 1040 with the Internal Revenue Service. Of course they are not required to file unless they make \$600, but IRS can't send their money back until they do file. The students that lose the W-2's usually find that the employer will give them a duplicate--but only after at least one, and usually a series of tongue lashings.

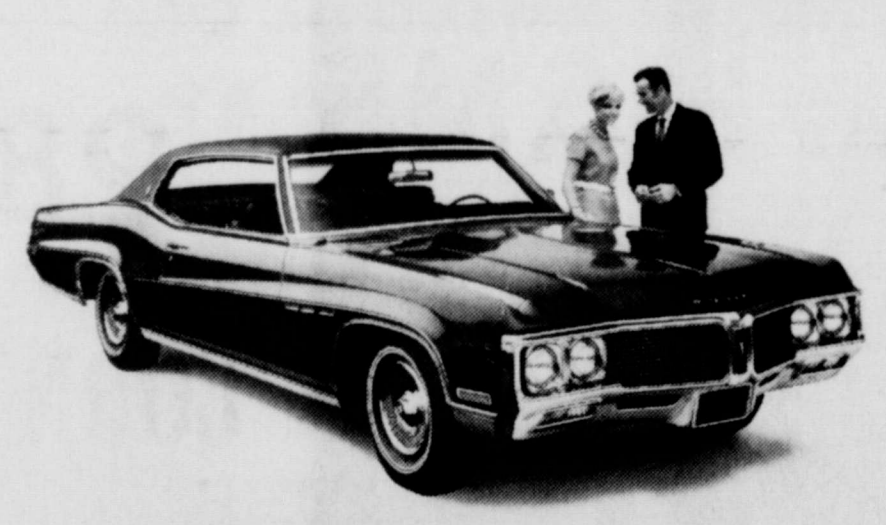

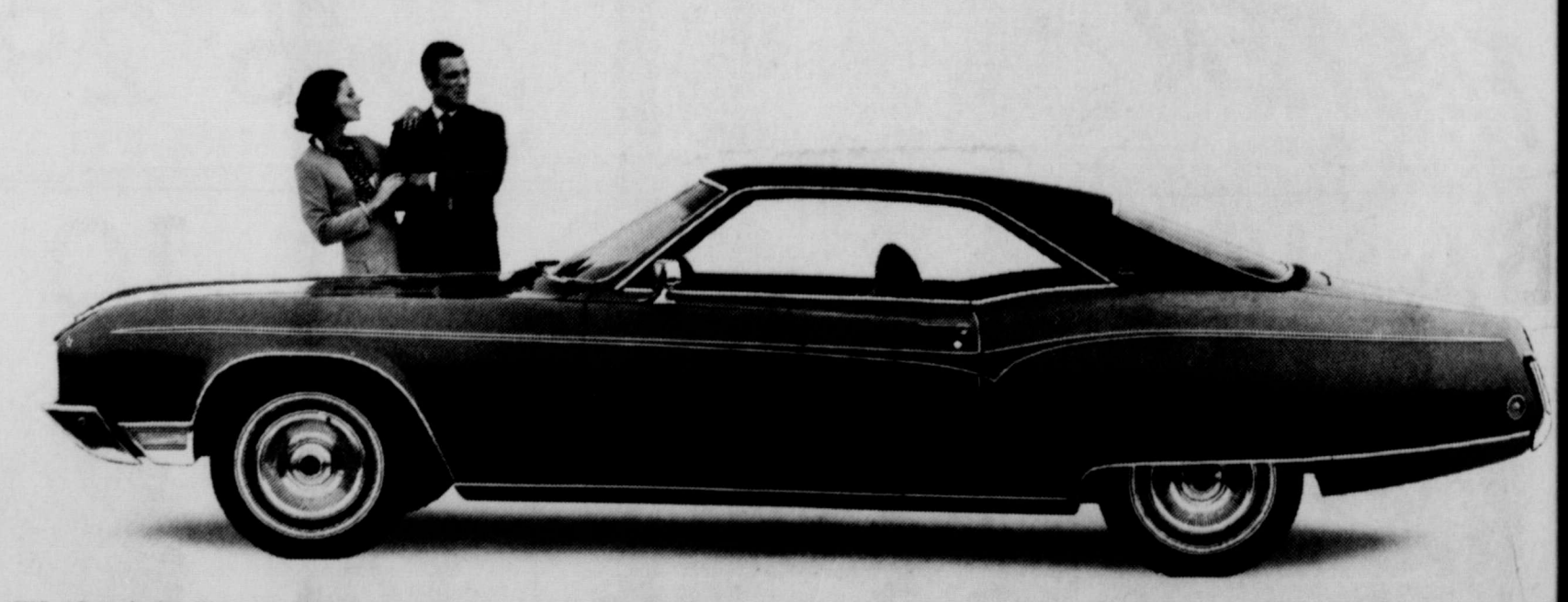

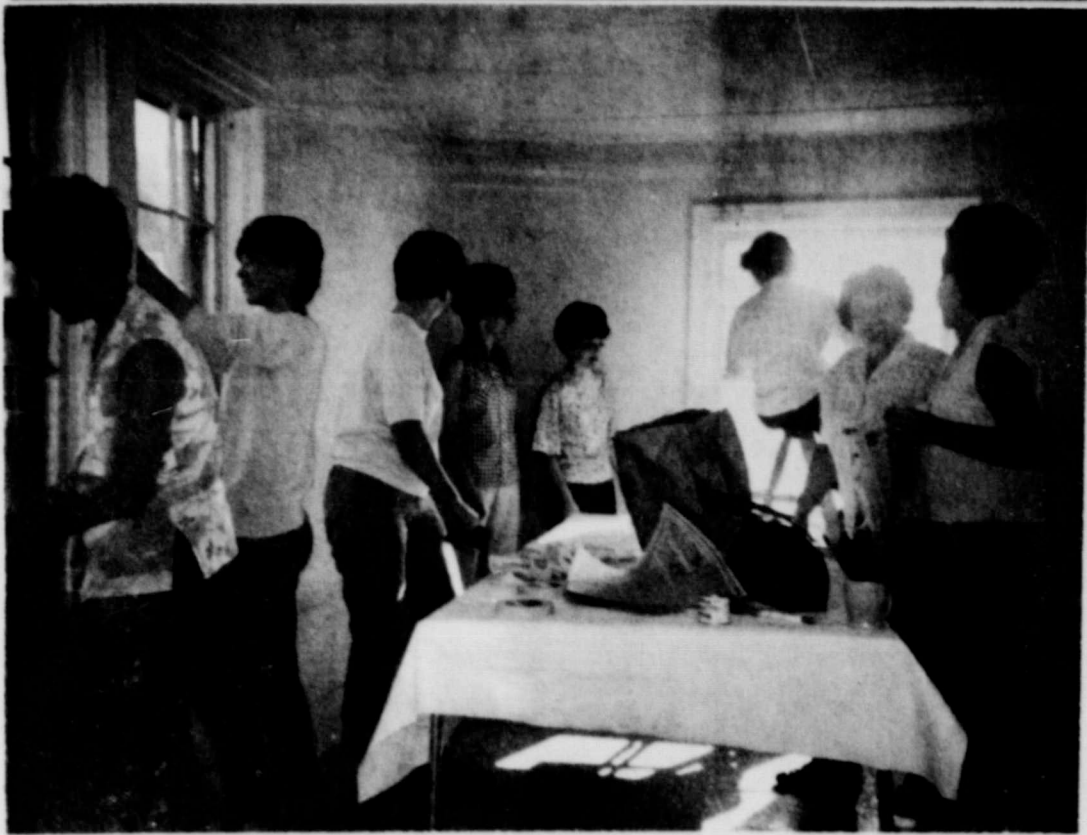
