### All Must Register To Vote In 1970

The registration period for voting in the 1970 elections run from October 1, 1969 through January 31, 1970. Registration in Hansford County is handled by the county tax assessor-collector.

One of the major registration problems of the assessorcollectors stems from the tendency of the voting public to put off registration until the closing days of the period.

In 1968 Texas had the highest percentage of registered voters in its history, and yet only about 65 percent of the persons eligible to register were on the registration rolls and only 49 percent voted in the presidential election.

No one can vote in 1970 elections without having registered. Anyone over 21 years of age on the day of the election, who has been a resident of the State for at least one year immediately preceding election day, and who has been a resident of the county for at least six months immediately preceding election will be eligible to vote IF they register. All persons meeting these requirements for voting must register by January 31, 1970. They cannot register after that date.

Persons who will become 21 years of age by January 31 must register by that date and cannot register later. Persons becoming 21 after Jan. 31 may register during the regular period, and may also register at any time afterward but must have been registered for 30 days before they can vote.

Persons who were residents of Texas on October 1, 1969, must register by January 31, 1970, regardless of whether they will have met

the one-year residence requirement by that date and regardless whether they will have lived in the county of present residence for six months. Persons moving into Texas after Oct. 1, 1969, may register during the regular period, and may also register at any time afterward but must have been registered for 30 days before

Persons must be a resident of the county for at least six months preceding elections before they can vote on local issues (this is not required for voting on statewide offices and issues.)

A person must register as a voter of the county by making an application to the county tax-assessor-collector, J.B. Cooke. The application may be made either by mail, or by personal appearance in his office. There is no charge for registration.

All residents of Hansford County who registered last year have received a registration application in the mail. This form must be signed & returned to the tax office. All those who have not registered here previously, may call at the tax office in the court house, or request an application by mail. All applications MUST be signed.

All persons over 21 years of age are required to register in order to be eligible to vote in any 1970 election. The 1970 voting year begins on March 1, 1970 and ends on February 28, 1971. This is the period for which the registration is effective.

AUSTIN -- The 1969 mourning dove banding success by ecological regions was reported recently by Ted L. Clark, project leader for

dover research for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as the "most successful pre-hunting banding per-

iod yet achieved. Leg bands were attached to 7,765 mourning doves by 70 cooperators in 47 representative counties, in the 10 ecological regions of the

Some regions, because of their size, received more attention than those not so large. In the Rolling Plains, 2,951 birds were banded. Some of the leading counties in this region were Shackelford where 849 birds were banded, followed by Wilbarger with 634 and

Cottle with 500. There were 740 doves banded in the Cross Timbers and Prairie Region and, of these, 511 were banded in Archer County.

The Trans-Pecos total was 672 with Jeff Davis

The other regions and the number of birds banded are listed as follows: Post Oak Savannah, 613; Pineywoods, 599; Blackland Prairie, 589; Edwards Plateau, 555; High Plains, 526; and South Texas Plains, 520.

Band recovery data enables technicians to determine movements, ages, and habitat preferences which are important to proper management of mourning doves.

Saturday night. The Buffaloes are returning home after a one game swing on the road and have pushed their season record above the . 500 mark at 2-1. The Buffs downed Wichita State's stubborn Shockers, 24-14, in Wichita, Kans., Saturday afternoon.

Besides their explosive offense, led by Shaw and fellow All-America candidate center Bill Pierson, the Aztecs' de-fense against the rushing game

has been fantastic this year. Los Angeles State was held to a minus 50 yards rushing and San Jose State had a min-

us eight yards on the ground. West Texas came out of the Wichita game with no injuries and Kerbel started his squad working Monday with a heavy emphasis being placed on pass defense and a rushing offense.
Buff fullback Duane Thom-

as bulled for 42 yards against the Shockers and became the seventh leading rusher in the school's history. Those yards give him a career total of 1,516-212 this year. He replaces Joe Walden in the seventh place and needs only 57 yards to take over the sixth position, currently held by Bob Ratliff.

The fifth leading rusher, Charlie Sanders, has 1,828 yards.

Olan Thompson paced the Buff ground game at Wichita with 82 yards and caught four passes for 40 yards. Quarterback Clarence Redic connected on 10 of 22 passes for 148 yards and threw his first interception of the year.

#### Good Season Expected For Prairie Chickens

WHEELER--Open season on lesser prairie chicken in the Panhandle counties of Collingsworth, Donley, Gray, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts, and Wheeler will be Oct. 11 and 12, says Jack Parsons, wildlife supervisor for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department,

A harvest equal to last year and the year before is expected provided there is no decline in the number of participating hun-

Prairie chickens decreased in number over the years, and 1967 was the first open season held in many years. Project leader Dick DeArment says 240 hunters bagged 375 birds that averaged 1.6 pounds each.

During the 1968 season there were only 201 successful hunters, but they climaxed the season with 317 birds that averaged 1.5 pounds each.

DeArment says the courtship grounds this year reveal an increase of 25 per cent, so the harvest is expected to remain about the same as the previous seasons.

The prairie chicken bag limit has been set at limit of four, after the first day's hunt. Only shotguns and longbows and arrows may be used, and it will be illegal to fail to present each prairie chicken lawfully taken to one of the Department's check stations prior to

10 p.m. on the date taken. It shall also be unlawful to possess any prairie chicken except during the open season that does not have affixed thereto a tag applied at a Department check station. The stations will be maintained in the cities of Higgins, Allison, Wheeler, McLean

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



SPOTS AND STAINS-A LAUNDRY PROBLEM

Treatment of spots, stains, and heavily soiled areas is one of the most important steps in producing successful laundry results. The trend to easy care fabrics, push-button laundering, and tailormade laundry aids have created the tendency of the homemaker to overlook spot and stain removal as a part of the laundry procedure. Pretreatment is still necessary, and frequently when stained garments are tossed untreated into the washer with the rest of the wash load, some stains may be set in forever. Many synthetic fibers and finishes stubbornly retain certain soils which cotton or linen readily give up in a regular wash. Pretreatment of oily soils on polyester and permanent press items is absolutely essential. Certain protein-type stains can be set by hot water if not treated first in a cool soak, no matter what the fabric. Stubborn stains may need repeated treatment, some may need a long

soak. A routine part of prepara-tion should be the treatment of all spots, stains, and heavily soiled areas before a garment is added to the wash load. There are many stain removal aids available. Correct usage of them will produce excellent restuls, but a little "know-how" is important. The following guidelines and chart should prove helpful.

1. Keep stain removal chart or book handy for quick reference.

2. Assemble a stain removal kit and store it with the chart or book in the laundry area. Keep the supplies in a convenient place but out of the reach of children. Include a bowl, measuring cup and spoons, brushes, medicine dropper, and syringe. You will need four types of removers on hand: Absorbent materials, soaps & detergents, solvents Y chemical stain remover.

3. Act promptly -- fresh stains are easiest to remove. 4. Identify the stain and fabric. Save hangtags for fiber content information.

5. Use correct treatment -the same one doesn't work for all. Methods may include soaking, sponging, applying a stain remover, or a combination of these steps.

6. Always test an inside seam for fastness to chemical stain removers. Chlorine bleach should be used in ass. plastic, or enamel tainers rather than metal and never mixed with ammonia or products containing ammonia. 7. Use all stain removers

according to package directions. Some are flammable, some are poisonous, and some can be destructive to fiber. Observe all cautions for use and storage.

8. Rinse thoroughly when using stain removers. Follow treatment with a complete wash and rinse cycle when using a solvent. Never put garments treated with solvent into a dryer without washing first.

#### More Permits Due For Aoudad Sheep Hunters

WHEELER -- Aoudad sheep permit issuance to landowners in the rough, bouldercluttered Palo Duro Canyon area will be upped approximately 23, from the 93 of last season to 116 this year, says Dick DeArment, project leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Hunting the hefty exotics, originally from the Atlas Mountains of Africa and the only wild sheep on that continent, is for the intre-pid and the stalwart, De-Arment said, since the sheep range runs in two directions: straight up and straight down. Hunters have spent as much as 26 hours in bagging their tro-phy, and few of the big animals that may weight as much as 300 pounds on the hoff are bagged with the well-known one-shot treatment. Even when the trophy is spotted and bagged, getting a 40-pound head and cape up a mountainside isn't easy, and other trips are necessary for

the meat.
Since the Department made the initial 1957 sheep release of 44 animals, trucked from the McKnight Ranch near Picacho, New Mexico, offspring of Hearst Ranch stock from San Simeon, California, bio-logists have noted both the increase and spread of the herds. By 1961 the population was estimated at 200, and the aoudad was declared a game animal under SB 171 on March 4, 1963. That same year landowners were issued 42

permits and 36 were utilized by hunters who tallied up 9 trophies, 6 rams and 3 ewes, for a 25 per cent

Jack Parsons, wildlife ipervisor, said last year's hunt totaled 93 hunters who saw 278 sheep and harvested 33 of them after spending 2.5 shells per animal, and an average time for each animal of seven hours. Lasy year also produced the maximum ram horn length of 32 inches, a respectable size since the world's record head had 34 5/8-inch horns from an aoudad found dead in the home African mountains.

Biologists have kept a sharp eye on the sheep each year, in part by a hold-your-breath helicopter census, and spreading of the herds is an obvious thing. Records reveal one large ram bagged in Armstrong County during the 1964-65 hunt that fielddressed 270 pounds, a year when 49 of the 50

permits issued were used. Permit issuance for Armstrong, Briscoe, Floyd and Randall Counties will be November 5 this year. Season will open January 3, 1970, for five consecutive days, closing on January 7.

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
