GRUVER FRIDAY

The county football championship will be on the line at Gruver Friday night, 8 p.m. The Lynx from Spearman will meet the Hounds from Gruver at Old Hansford and meet the Gruver team.

This has been the annual game of the year for the county and this year will be no exception, as both teams are ready for the game Friday night.

The big question in Spearman is can Spearman with revamped offense outscore the high scoring Greyhounds? With both Lyon and to throw at the Hounds, fans think that the Lynx have enough scoring power to win.

On the other hand, the Hounds have looked impressive in all of their games, even the last to Wellington. They outgained the Skyrockets although they lost the game.

Last week Gruver ground-pounder Booker team 34-0 and the Lynx were losing a

heartbreaker 22-21.

The entire town of Spearman is expected to attend the game Friday night along with the big Spearman band and pep squad. Fans are urged to come out and back their Lynx team and help them win the big county championship.

Thursday evening at 7:30 the 9th grade will meet the Dalhart 9th grade at Lynx field. Friday afternoon at 4:30 the Dumas "B" team will come to Spearman. Both of these teams have had a good season and fans are invited to attend these games and then go to the big game at Gruver Friday night.

Youngsters Are Contest Winners

Editor Bill Miller, above, presented the check to Wayne who said he would buy a bond with it! Wayne, a first grader, had his dad call the games out to him and he selected the winners! He won second place.

One hundred and fifty-four people entered the football guessing contest this week, and once again, the winners are both youngsters. The youth either know more about the game, or are better at out-guessing the adults.

Gerry Harnish, 14 N. Hazelwood, won this week's contest hands down. Gerry, who is Manager for the Lynx squad, didn't miss one single game. He is the only one out of the 154 entries to have a perfect score sheet. His tie breaker guess was Spearman 21, Stratford 0. The correct score in Friday's game was Spearman 21, Stratford 22.

All Must Register To Vote In 1970

The registration period for voting in the 1970 elections run from October 1, 1969 through January 31, 1970. Registration in Hansford County is handled by the county tax assessor-collector.

One of the major registration problems of the assessor-collectors stems from the tendency of the voting public to put off registration until the closing days of the period.

In 1968 Texas had the highest percentage of registered voters in its history, and yet only about 65 percent of the persons eligible to register were on the registration rolls and only 49 percent voted in the presidential election.

No one can vote in 1970 elections without having registered. Anyone over 21 years of age on the day of the election, who has been a resident of the State for at least one year immediately preceding election day, and who has been a resident of the county for at least six months immediately preceding election day will be eligible to vote if they register. All persons meeting these requirements for voting must register by January 31, 1970. They cannot register after that date.

Persons who will become 21 years of age by January 31 must register by that date and cannot register later. Persons becoming 21 after Jan. 31 may register during the regular period, and may also register at any time afterward but must have been registered for 30 days before they can vote.

Persons who were residents of Texas on October 1, 1969, must register by January 31, 1970, regardless of whether they will have met

the one-year residence requirement by that date and regardless whether they will have lived in the county of present residence for six months. Persons moving into Texas after Oct. 1, 1969, may register during the regular period, and may also register at any time afterward but must have been registered for 30 days before they can vote.

Persons must be a resident of the county for at least six months preceding elections before they can vote on local issues (this is not required for voting on statewide offices and issues.)

A person must register as a voter of the county by making an application to the county tax assessor-collector, J.B. Cooke. The application may be made either by mail, or by personal appearance in his office. There is no charge for registration.

All residents of Hansford County who registered last year have received a registration application in the mail. This form must be signed & returned to the tax office. All those who have not registered here previously, may call at the tax office in the court house, or request an application by mail. All applications MUST be signed.

All persons over 21 years of age are required to register in order to be eligible to vote in any 1970 election. The 1970 voting year begins on March 1, 1970 and ends on February 28, 1971. This is the period for which the registration is effective.

DEATH CLAIMS ABBYE OWNBEY

Word was received in Spearman late Monday evening of the death of Mrs. Abbye Ownbey, 79.

Mrs. Ownbey died of an apparent heart attack while in Pagosa Springs, Colorado where she had gone to take hot baths.

Mrs. Ownbey, a long time Spearman resident, had moved to Canyon about 3 months ago where she could make her near relatives. She and her husband, the late James Bly Ownbey, had been residents of this area since the early 1900s.

Funeral services will be held Friday, October 10 at 2 p.m. in the First Baptist Church, Spearman. Burial will be in the Holt Cemetery in the family plot.

Armyworm Horde Eating Area Crops



A corps of armyworms has invaded volunteer and seeded wheat fields, infested some late grain sorghum and literally pockmarked the Texas Panhandle.

The pattern of infestation, the number of insects and the extent of damage are unknown, but farm leaders and agricultural agents have expressed concern about worms that have been stripping wheat at the tops of seedling wheat.

Dr. Bill Clymer, extension area entomologist with the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service, said reports from his headquarters in Lubbock have been about both true armyworms and seeds are similar in appearance and habits and attack small in the southwest part of the county, but the situation is not to the alarming stage yet.

He said forage sorghum was heavily infested and farm-sorghum fields to some extent were either turning usual or turning into "high" damage in wheat.

The armyworms, it seems, were first detected on the plains and have since moved to a dark cloud, especially in the Panhandle region from "high" seeded wheat and "extreme" and "extreme" reports have been made to the extension agent, said the worst infestation in the southwest part of the county, but the situation is not to the alarming stage yet.

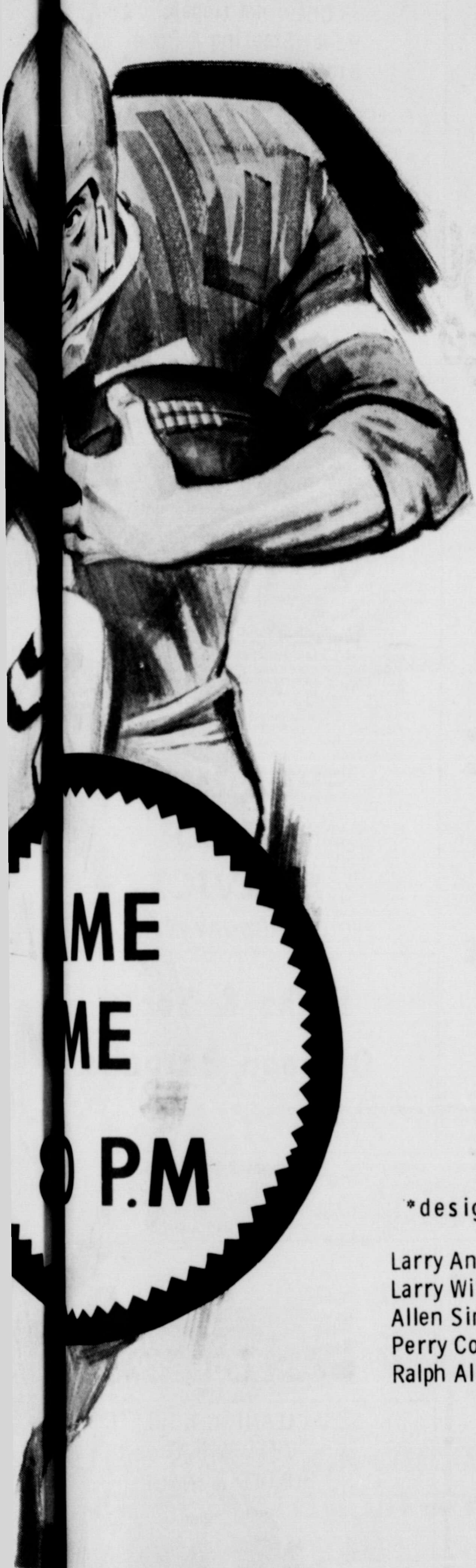

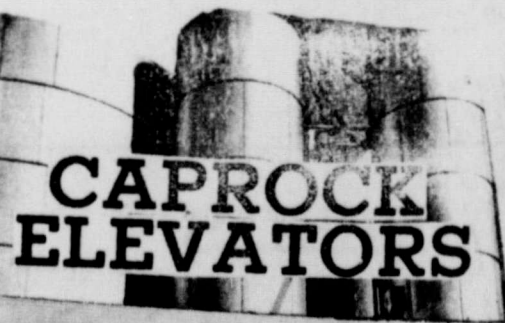

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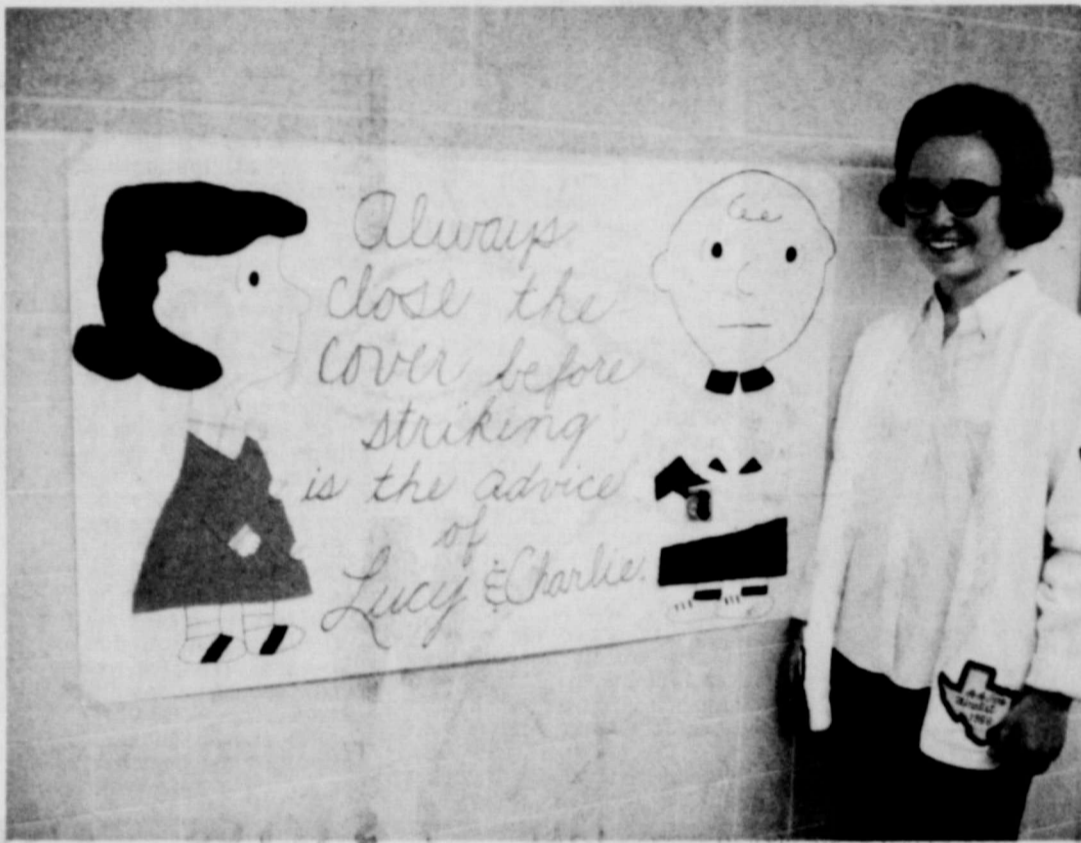

AZTECS TO INVADE BUFFALO BOWL SAT.

CANYON, Tex. -- West Texas State University football coach Joe Kerbel has said the San Diego State Aztecs will be the finest club to play in Buffalo Bowl since the stadium opened in 1958.

Kerbel could well be correct as the Aztecs have a record to back him up. Led by quarterback Dennis Shaw, San Diego State has romped past a pair of foes this season, winning 49-0 over Los Angeles State and 55-21 over San Jose State, and hold a 37-1-1 mark in their last 39 games.

Shaw, who is considered by some professional scouts as the nation's top pro quarterback prospect, and his teammates invade Buffalo Bowl for an 8 p.m. battle Saturday night.

The Buffaloes are returning home after a one game swing on the road and have pushed their season record above the .500 mark at 2-1. The Buffs downed Wichita State's stubborn Shockers, 24-14, in Wichita, Kans., Saturday afternoon.

Besides their explosive offense, led by Shaw and fellow All-America candidate center Bill Pierson, the Aztecs' defense against the rushing game has been fantastic this year.

Los Angeles State was held to a minus 50 yards rushing and San Jose State had a minus eight yards on the ground.

West Texas came out of the Wichita game with no injuries and Kerbel started his squad working Monday with a heavy emphasis being placed on pass defense and a rushing offense.

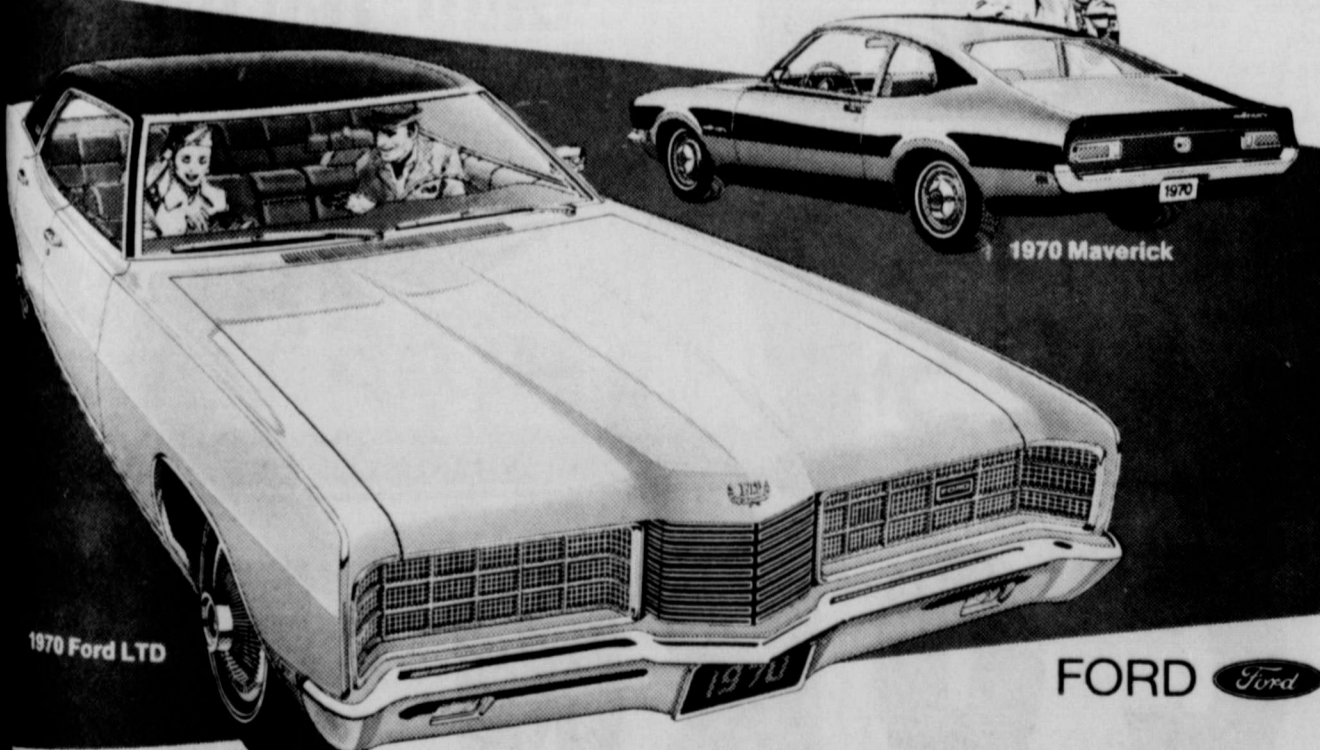
Buff fullback Duane Thomas bulled for 42 yards against the Shockers and became the seventh leading rusher in the school's history. Those yards give him a career total of 1,516-212 this year. He replaces Joe Walden in the seventh place and needs only 57 yards to take over the sixth position, currently held by Bob Ratliff.

The fifth leading rusher, Charlie Sanders, has 1,828 yards.

Olan Thompson paced the Buff ground game at Wichita with 82 yards and caught four passes for 40 yards. Quarterback Clarence Redd connected on 10 of 22 passes for 148 yards and threw his first interception of the year.

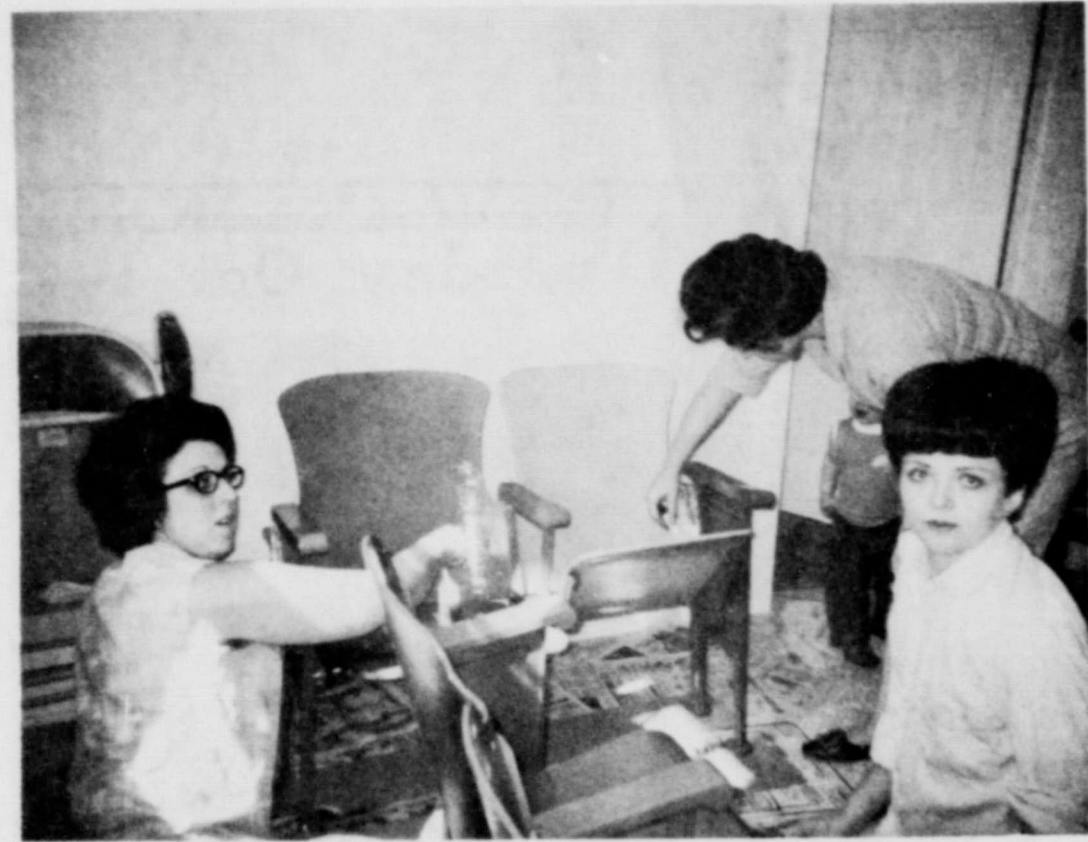

SLIDE TRIP THRU EUROPE IS AVAILABLE

A trip through Europe and the Soviet Union is available for High Plains area residents through a slide presentation by Dr. Douglas Owen, oilseeds scientist, High Plains Research Foundation.

Dr. Owen has the slide program available that shows the trip he took this summer with the National Oilseed Producers and Processors Institute.

In the presentation, Dr. Owen shows the collective farm complete with school, dairy farm, swine operation and crop fields he toured at Bruholvetska, Soviet Union. He pointed out that the collective farm was one of the highlights of the trip due to the "friendliness of the people." Good Season Expected For Prairie Chickens

WHEELER--Open season on lesser prairie chicken in the Panhandle counties of Collingsworth, Donley, Gray, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts, and Wheeler will be Oct. 11 and 12, says Jack Parsons, wildlife supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

A harvest equal to last year and the year before is expected provided there is no decline in the number of participating hunters.

Prairie chickens decreased in number over the years, and 1967 was the first open season held in many years. Project leader Dick DeArment says 240 hunters bagged 375 birds that averaged 1.6 pounds each.

During the 1968 season there were only 201 successful hunters, but they climaxed the season with 317 birds that averaged 1.5 pounds each.

DeArment says the courtship grounds this year reveal an increase of 25 per cent, so the harvest is expected to remain about the same as the previous seasons.

The prairie chicken bag limit has been set at

two, with a possession limit of four, after the first day's hunt. Only shotguns and longbows and arrows may be used, and it will be illegal to fail to present each prairie chicken lawfully taken to one of the Department's check stations prior to 10 p.m. on the date taken.

It shall also be unlawful to possess any prairie chicken except during the open season that does not have affixed thereto a tag applied at a Department check station. The stations will be maintained in the cities of Higgins, Allison, Wheeler, McLean and Childress.

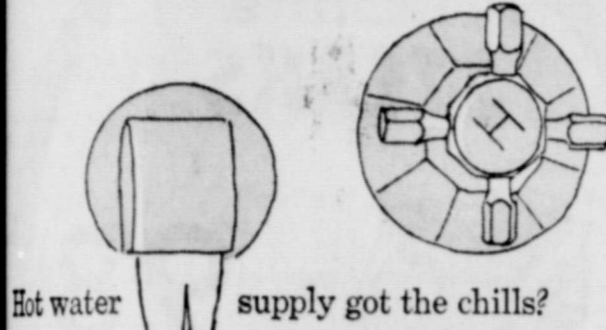

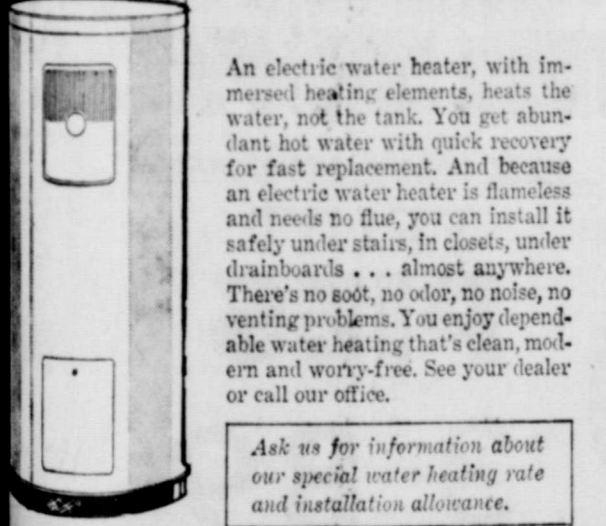

Jack Parsons, wildlife supervisor, said last year's hunt totaled 93 hunters who saw 278 sheep and harvested 33 of them after spending 2.5 shells per animal, and an average time for each animal of seven hours. Last year also produced the maximum ram horn length of 32 inches, a respectable size since the world's record head had 34 5/8-inch horns from an aoudad found dead in the home African mountains. Biologists have kept a sharp eye on the sheep each year, in part by a hold-your-breath helicopter census, and spreading of the herds is an obvious thing. Records reveal one large ram bagged in Armstrong County during the 1964-65 hunt that field-dressed 270 pounds, a year when 49 of the 50 permits issued were used. Permit issuance for Armstrong, Briscoe, Floyd and Randall Counties will be November 5 this year. Season will open January 3, 1970, for five consecutive days, closing on January 7.
