

#### PRICE DENIES GRAIN PRICE STATEMENT

Dear Friends:

I have been disappointed this week to have received some letters and telegrams from Panhandle residents who believe I have advocated lower prices for our farm products. I assure you that nothing in voluntary commodity pro-I hope partisan politics is not being played in this problem in order to discredit my ef- to be maintained to protect of the district.

I have made no statement or implied threat that the Commodity Credit Corporation would sell its grain to drive down prices on grain sorghum. (As a matter of fact the disposal of this grain is entirely in the hands of the Commodity Credit Corporation which has sole responsibility for disposing of their stocks under the law.)

In answer to my inquiry regarding the method the Commodity Credit Corporation is required to use in disposing of its commodity holding under the present law and how it might affect our district and the State of Texas, the Department of Agriculture has advised me that:

"With the beginning of a new marketing year on October 1, 1969, CCC has lowered its grain sorghum sales prices by the amount of carrying charges for storage and interest costs. However, sales offerings are being confined to port positions during October and CCC will not be competing with new crop farm supplies in West Texas or other interior locations. I also have always felt

that the members of any farm or commodity organization have the right to take any lawful action they desire to obtain a fair price for their products. I have worked with all these organizations in order to find an equitable solution to the farm problem. I did not leave my farming and ranching operations in the Panhandle to come to Washington to work against the farmer.

We are in a unique posi-tion in our area because of the expansion of feed lot operations creating a local demand for our grain as well as livestock. I hope we will not jeopardize this expansion by fighting among ourselves.

This is a local problem between local businessmen, and I will not take sides. However, I stand ready and willing to do anything I possibly can to find an equitable solution to this problem. I am also sorry to hear that some remarks I made

#### FALL GRAZING OPENS ON DIVERTED ACRES

Acreage diverted under the 1969 feed grain and wheat programs may now be used for livestock grazing, John Trind-le, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, has announced. Grazing could begin on October 15, 1969.

He reminded farmers that under normal circumstances no grazing is permitted on acreage still under contract in long-term land retirement programs such as the Conservation Reserve and the Cropland Adjustment Program. In counties designated for emergency assistance because of natural disaster, county ASC committees may permit haying and grazing on these

Today's announcement affects only livestock grazing on land diverted under annual commodity programs. No diverted acreage may be harvested, again with the ex-ception of those counties designated for the emergency program, where both grazing and having may be permitted by county committees.

#### FARM CENSUS TO BE TAKEN BY MAIL

The 1969 census of agriculture will be conducted entirely by mail with no census takers involved, John Trindle, chairman, Hansford County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee said

According to the Chairman, the Bureau of the Census has announced that in January, 1970, every operator of a farm or ranch will receive a census form by mail and will be asked to fill it out and mail it back.

Chairman Trindle said the decision to use the mail method is the latest in a series of plans to gain efficiency and economy by using the mails to the greatest possible extent in conducting all censuses. He emphasized that the

completed questionnaire for each farm, ranch or other agricultural operation will be completely confidential. He urged all farmers to cooperate in the census.

The information obtained, without names or clues to identity, will be grouped in sta-

Chairman Trindle added that in addition to the number and acreage of farms, the agricultural census will ask farmers for an estimate of values of land and buildings, amount of time farm operators worked at off-farm jobs, and number of autos, trucks, tractors, combines and corn pickers.

#### JUDGE LEE SPEAKS TO ROTARIANS

Judge Johnnie Lee spoke to an attentive audience a the Monday noon luncheon of the Spearman Rotary Cl He spoke on the subj of C.O.G. "Council of Governments."

The speaker explained the C.O. G. is just another title for metro government.

Judge Lee stated that most, if not all, of the County Judges north of the Canadian River have oppos metro or C.O.G. for many years. He left no doubt as to his strong opposition of C.O.G.

He expressed several serious objections to such an organization. One objection: Although C.O.G. ha no authority to levy taxes, it has full authority to appropriate or assess money from each member for du He furthermore stated there are no restrictions in the act as to the amount of dues assessed. Based on the most common amount Judge Lee surmises the cost to the City of Spearman would be about \$500,00 per year and a probably equal amount from Hansford County.

During a meeting held in Spearman on Tuesday September 16th, attended by county judges and other officials from north of the Canadian River, the group voted against joining any C.O.G. and definitely again the Amarillo C.O.G. The speaker contended
