This stock exchange puts Caprock holdings on the American Security Exchange, thereby allowing private individuals to buy shares in the Amarex Corporation.

According to reports, the Caprock stockholders now own controlling interest in the Amarex corporation.

The merger involved the exchange of 600,000 shares of Caprock stock valued at six million dollars.

Caprock Industries, Inc. was formed late last year by a group of farmers and cattle feeders on the North Plains to develop two lots. Caprock No. 1 is located 11 miles southwest of Gruver and Caprock No. 2 in under construction west of Spearman. The cattle feeders merged their plans for the feedlots earlier this year with a grain elevator operation in Spearman before any work started on the two lots.

a person working at least one hour a day. The state law says that a man-day is any day during which an employee Wage Law Explained performs agricultural labor for at least four hours for

> The third difference is the exemptions for persons work ing with livestock. Under the new law, employees working with dairy operations and production of livestock are exempt from the law. A notable exception, however, is that workers in feedlots are not exempt. The federal law exempts workers in range production of livestock where

hours are hard to calculate. Agricultural employees living on the premises in quarters furnished by the employer must receive at least \$30 weekly in cash. The new law also says that any person whose earnings or productive capacity are impaired by age, injury or mental or physical deficiency may work at wages not less than 60 percent of the minimum wage.

In the case of this reduced pay rate, the employer must secure a medical certificate from a physician. However, this provision does not apply to persons employed in agriculture as piece rate workers.

Issuing false earnings statements by employers is a misdemeanor and can draw a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$500 or between five and 30 days in county jail or both. Failure to pay the applicable minimum wage will make the employer liable for twice the unpaid wages plus attorneys' fees and costs

Mallett emphasized that the new state law does not interfere with the right of employees to bargain collectivefor wages that are higher than the minimum established in the law.

The state law lists several exemptions that differ from the federal statute. Information on the state law can be obtained from the local county agent or from the Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin.



# Let Me See ... by Sysil

Everywhere, everbody is talking about the weather. Most predict a bad winter but I don't know what they base their predictions on unless its on the "extremes" of weather we no collar. Answers to "Snoopy", this year. If you rememner, we had no spring to speak of; we simply jumped from winter into summer. And what a summer. Broke all records so far as length of hot tempera-And we have had no fall. Just when our blood reached the boiling point, we woke up to winter. The ash trees in my yard which usually turn slowly to a beautiful yellow gold in the fall this year just dropped leaves the color of old dirty shoes,

According to the farmer's Almanac, many blossums on plum trees in the Spring, heavy fruit crops in the Fall, oak (and other) leaves remaining on trees in December indicate a severe Winter is coming up. The thickness of Fall fur on most animals, goose bones, pigs' melts, distance between caterpillar stripes also are Winter predictors. When hornets build nests high off the ground, expect deep snows. Bees, spiders and ants are predictors and there are more. If you have other interesting badwinter predictions let me have them.

Since I was a child our winters have changed considsiderably. Kids in Spearman used to get sleds and ice skates every Christmas. The lake just east of town was frozen every year so solid the whole town skated. on it and boys who were lucky enough to have automobiles could slide them clear across the ice pond. We could walk over the fence next to our house on top of the snow and my grandmother had a side of og meat hanging outside from the eve of the house all winter.

Weather does funny things. We spent the weekend in Lubbock and just after the ballgame Saturday it began to rain. I have never seen such rain. About 9:30 it began to snow, and I have never seen such a snow. It didn't stick to the ground there, but just a few miles north a carload of Borger football boys were turned back by the Highway Patrolmen who told them Abernathy had 4 inches and the roads were too bad for travel. With that sort of weather in Lubbook we just knew the northern Panhandle was hav-

ing blizzards. Winters just aren't what they used to be. But then nothing is. I wonder some-times if it isn't our memory which plays tricks on us. I remember how we used to make snow ice cream when I was a child. Mom would scoop up a big dish pan full of snow and concoct in a few short minutes the most delicious ice cream. I made some last March when we had all that snow. It just didn't taste the same. Have you ever had your mouth to water for something you recall tasting so delicious as a child? breakfast cereal branflakes taste nothing now like they did when I was a child. My sister and I got so tired of biscuits and every Saturday mother let us go down town to Gus McLain's Bakery where we paid 5¢ for a loaf of day-old bread. took this home and soaked slices of it in can milk, then drenched it in sugar. Man was that delicious! I wouldn't even try it now. A taste similar to this however, is Eagle Brand milk and I could devour a whole can of this anytime. Time was when none of us worried about what we ate, just so we got enough of it often. Other tastes I remember as a child was the soup and
