"Taking the Fifth"

"Taking the Fifth" has already become part of the nation's slang. This is an unusual mark of distinction for what is, after all, a technical rule of evidence. What does the expression really mean?

Literally, it means claiming the protection of the Constitution's Fifth Amendment, which says that "no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself."

The theory of the Amendment is that it is unfair to force anybody to tattle on himself. But this does not mean he may keep silent in the



courtroom whenever he pleases. He may keep silent only if answering might tend to incriminate him. Consider this situation:

A witness in a gambling case refused to talk, even after being granted immunity from prosecu-

"Even though I cannot be prosecuted," he told the court, "it could still be mighty embarrassing for me if I tell what I know.

But the court ordered the wit-Both canned chicken and ness to speak out. The judge said the fear of embarrassment, alone, was not a weighty enough reason to invoke the constitutional privi-

Furthermore, the privilege is strictly personal-only for the protection of the witness himself. Thus, a witness in an assault case was ordered to testify, despite his fear that he would be getting his cousin in trouble. The judge said stretching the Fifth Amendment to protect other people would unduly hamper the courts in getting the

facts they need to do justice. Still, the basic philosophy of the Fifth Amendment is deeply rooted in our legal system. In accordance with this philosophy, it is a general rule that the prosecuting attorney may not tell the jury that a witness who "takes the Fifth" must have a guilty conscience.

'A witness may have a reasonable fear of prosecution and yet be innocent," said the United States Supreme Court. "The privilege serves to protect the innocent who otherwise might be ensnared by ambiguous circumstances.'

55 Whooping Cranes Winter On Coast

AUSTWELL, TEXAS

There are now 55 wild whooping cranes wintering on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge near this small town on the Texas Gulf Coast.

Regional Director William T. Krummes of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife announced that Aransas Refuge personnel had verified the

new high count by aerial flights today.
One of the rarest of all Con

birds, the whoopers that winter on the Department of the Interior wildlife refuge had been as low as 15 birds in 1941. They have shown a slow, but highly encouraging, increase under complete protection and reached a mod-ern-day high of 50 birds last year, Krummes noted.

This year's flight consisted of 47 adult birds and eight young of the year, according to refuge personnel. Not since 1964, when ten young birds made the 2,000 mile trip from Wood Buffalo National Park in Canada have more than eight young been added to the flock in any one year. Noting that it was still possible that one or two more adult birds might be lingering along the flyway, Krummes said that the high total was the best news in many years for the millions of Americans who have concerned themselveswith the big birds gallant fight for survival.

All available information indicates that the U.S. Post Office is in serious trouble, ' but its troubles cannot necessarily be blamed entirely upon the postal system itself. As now constituted, it would appear that the Post Office Department does not have the means to do the job it has been assigned. Indeed, it can-

not be expected to continue -let alone to exceed -- the present level of postal services in the face of the tremendous increased mail volume. I would like to take a few minutes to look at some of the recent postal legislation and then to see what the future may hold in store for postal reform and "On May 27, 1969, Presi-

dent Nixon sent a message to Congress proposing specific reforms to the Nation's postal system. The following day Congressman Udall introduced H.R. 11750, designated as the Postal Service Act of 1969, to implement the recommendations of President Nixon's message.

'The Postal Service Act would take the Post Office Department out of the President's Cabinet and establish a government-owned postal system to be known as the United States Postal Service. "The Postal Service would

be run by a nine-men board of directors selected without reagrd to politics. Seven mempointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate for rotating 7 year terms. The President would designate one of the seven to serve as Chairman and serve in this capacity at the pleasure of the President. The seven would then select an eighth member to serve as chief executive office of the Postal Service and the eighth would select the ninth member to serve as chief operating offi-

er.
It is hoped that this new Postal Service would become entirely self-supporting, within perhaps five years, except for subsidies for which Congress chooses to appropriate funds on behalf of specified public-

service groups. The other bill I want to discuss is Congressman Dulski's bill, H.R. 4, the Postal Reform Act of 1969, which pro vides for reorganization with the framework of the Post Office Department. As you know

VA WIDOWS DUE BIGGER CHECKS

Bigger checks for app-roximately 168,000 widows are due in January, Donald E. Johnson, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, annou-

nced today. Signed by the President on October 27, 1969, a new law (PL 91-96) authorizes increases for most widows of servicemen and veterans who are eligible for dependency and indemnity compensation,

It will remove dirt, grease, These payments, Johnson explained, are authorized for widows of servicemen and veterans who died on or after January 1, 1957, of service-connected caus-

The new legislation does cleaner's two quart tank, turn not affect payments to suron the electricity and wait a vivors receiving compensation under laws that pre-

ceded the program. New dependency and indemnity compensation rates provide \$167 monthly for

the widow of the lowest ranking enlisted man compared to a minimum of \$135 at present. Similar increases are provided for eligible widows of other enlisted men and officers,

Effective December 1, the increase will show up first in checks received in January. This increase is automatic and no application is needed.

Widows with minor child-ren will get an extra \$20 j per month per child under the legislation. With few exceptions, they get nothing extra now. Forms for making application for children's allowances will be mailed to all widows automatically, Johnson

Recipients who are patients in nursing homes, or who are helpless or blind to the point that they need regular aid and attendance of another person, may receive an extra \$50 per month under the law.
