

## Suspect Arraigned On Attempted Murder Charge

The Hansford County Sheriff's Dept. and city police were called to the W. E. Jones residence at 204 Townsend in Spearman at 8 p. m. Saturday evening to investigate a shooting. William Eric Jones, 49 years old had been shot 3 times. Mrs. Willie Lee Jones, also 49 years old, and the wife of William Eric Jones, was held as the suspect in the shooting.

Officers stated that Jones had been shot on the right side of his chin, with the bullet coming out a point just below his right ear; also, he had been shot in the left shoulder with the bullet exiting out the left shoulder; the third bullet entered the abdomen, 1 1/2 inches above and 1 inch to the left of the navel, and exiting to the rear of his right side. The intestine was punctured 5 or 6 times. He was rushed to Hansford Hospital where the attending physician worked some 3 1/2 hours to save the victim, whose condition is termed critical as of Monday.

City officer Bingham, Deputy McFarlin and Sheriff J.B. Cooke met at the apartment of Harbert Clark, just behind the house at 204 Townsend to investigate the shooting.

No motive for the shooting was given and it can only be assumed that all concerned were drinking, and the problem stemmed from "too much" liquor.

The suspect, Mrs. Willie Jones, was arraigned and charged for "attempt to murder, with malice aforethought." She was released on \$7500.00 bond.

Officers surmised that Mrs. Jones shot 4 or 5 times, with an Italian made .25 caliber pistol, hitting the victim three times.

He has seen the city grow from a population of 1100 to nearly 5,000. A member of the Methodist church, he has served on many civic committees and service organizations and the Chamber of Commerce. He served the board of the National Foundation for Birth Defects and is past president of the Lions Club.

A graduate of Oklahoma University, Mr. Davis has two children; Mary Lou Wyson of Spearman and Delia Kay Combost of Memphis, Texas and six grandchildren.

Jesse is very accommodating and goes out of his way to help his fellow man, always on call to fill a prescription for the sick or ailing any time day or night. Everyone loves and respects Jesse Davis, the Man Of The Year.

The Woman Of The Year, Mrs. E. A. Greever, was born October 24, 1888 near Carthage, Mo. In 1911 she married Mr. and Mrs. Greever immediately started for the Panhandle of Texas to their new home located 8 miles east of Spearman where they still reside. At this time Spearman was not on the map, and the couple traveled by buggy. This has been their home for 59 years.

She has two children, W. R. Greever, and Mrs. Tom Sutton both of Spearman, 7 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Her main goal in life has been to help others--both spiritually and also with the material things of life. She preached her first sermon on Easter Sunday in 1923 at Range, Okla. and was pastor of the local Union Church for many years. She was instrumental in building the local Apostolic Faith Church in Spearman which is her church home at present.

Mrs. Greever has published a book of hymns and a book of poems, all given by divine inspiration. She does not sell these books but gives them to her friends and those who are interested.

She calls on the shut-ins at Pioneer Manor in Spearman twice a week and at the Senior Village in Perryton at least once a week. She still does her own housework without outside help and drives her own car whenever she wants to.

Mr. and Mrs. Greever have been wonderful citizens, boosters of Spearman area all their lives.

The Woman of The Year is indeed a true Christian, loved by everyone and she, in turn, loves everyone.

## School Census Is Underway In School District

The school census for the 1970-71 year is underway in Spearman Independent School district according to Supt. James Cunningham.

State law requires that all youths who will be six years of age and those who will be 18 or less on September 1, 1970 be listed in the school census, whether they are in school or not. All must be listed on blanks which have been distributed in the schools. If parents do not get one of these census blanks, they are to call the elementary school office.

The school census will continue through January 31.

"This is an aid in planning for next year's school need regarding teachers, class planning and etc. which needs to be completed in the spring prior to the opening of school," Supt. Cunningham.

Every eligible child must be counted in order to receive the State "per-capita" funds which amounts to about \$100.00 per child.

These census figures are used by the state in computing the amount of State aid each school district is to receive.

## MUSIC CLUB OFFERS SCHOLARSHIP IN MEMORY OF SUSAN LARSEN

Spearman Music Club members have chosen to name a Music Scholarship in memory of Mrs. Susan Uptergrove Larsen. It will be called the Susan Uptergrove Larsen Memorial Scholarship and will go to a graduating student of Spearman High School who wishes to further his music education by majoring or minoring in music at the college of his choice.

To honor the memory of

the late Susan Larsen, and her great love for music, and the contribution she made to this community through her life and talent, this decision was made by the membership of the Spearman Music Club.

The scholarship fund is growing due to the fact there were no music majors graduating in this city last year. The award of the scholarship will be made during graduation exercises in the spring.

## School Band Program Has 321 Participating

The band program in the Spearman schools has a total enrollment of 321 students in grades 5 through 12. Band directors is Mickey Owens, assisted by Frank Porter. This is Owens' first year at the helm of the band program.

The fifth grade band has 60 students. This is known as the beginners band. Here the students study instrumental music for the first time. Here they learn to read music and to play that music on their instrument. While in this band, the students learn to play melodies, both as a solo and as in a group.

The 6th grade band has 62 students. This band is a carry-over of the 5th grade band. While in the 6th grade band, the students have a complete review of what they learned in the 5th grade. After this the students are introduced to new ideas and materials which aid them in progressing on their instrument. The idea of both these bands is to teach the student to play his horn as well as possible. At the end of the school year the 6th grade band enters a contest in which it competes for the first time with other bands from surrounding schools.

The junior high school band is made of 88 7th and 8th grade students. This band is truly a performing organization, the student's continue receiving instructions on their instruments, but most of the attention is put on the band as a unit. This band annually marches at a home football game, gives concerts, assembly programs, plays at junior high pep rallies and participates in concert and sightreading contest.

The high school band is composed of 111 students. All students in this band have had at least four years of preparation on their instrument and are capable of playing them fairly well. Very little time is spent helping the individual student on his instrument, more emphasis is put on group playing. This band performs at all high school football games, plays at pep rallies, gives a Christmas concert as well as a spring concert in addition to participating in all Interscholastic League Contests. This fall the band received a Division I rating at the marching contest in Canyon. At the present, preparation is underway for concert and sight reading contest which will be in the spring. At the end of each school year the band takes an extended trip to a band festival. For the past several years the band has gone to Enid, Okla. but at the present plans are being made to take the band to the band festival at Six Flags Over Texas.

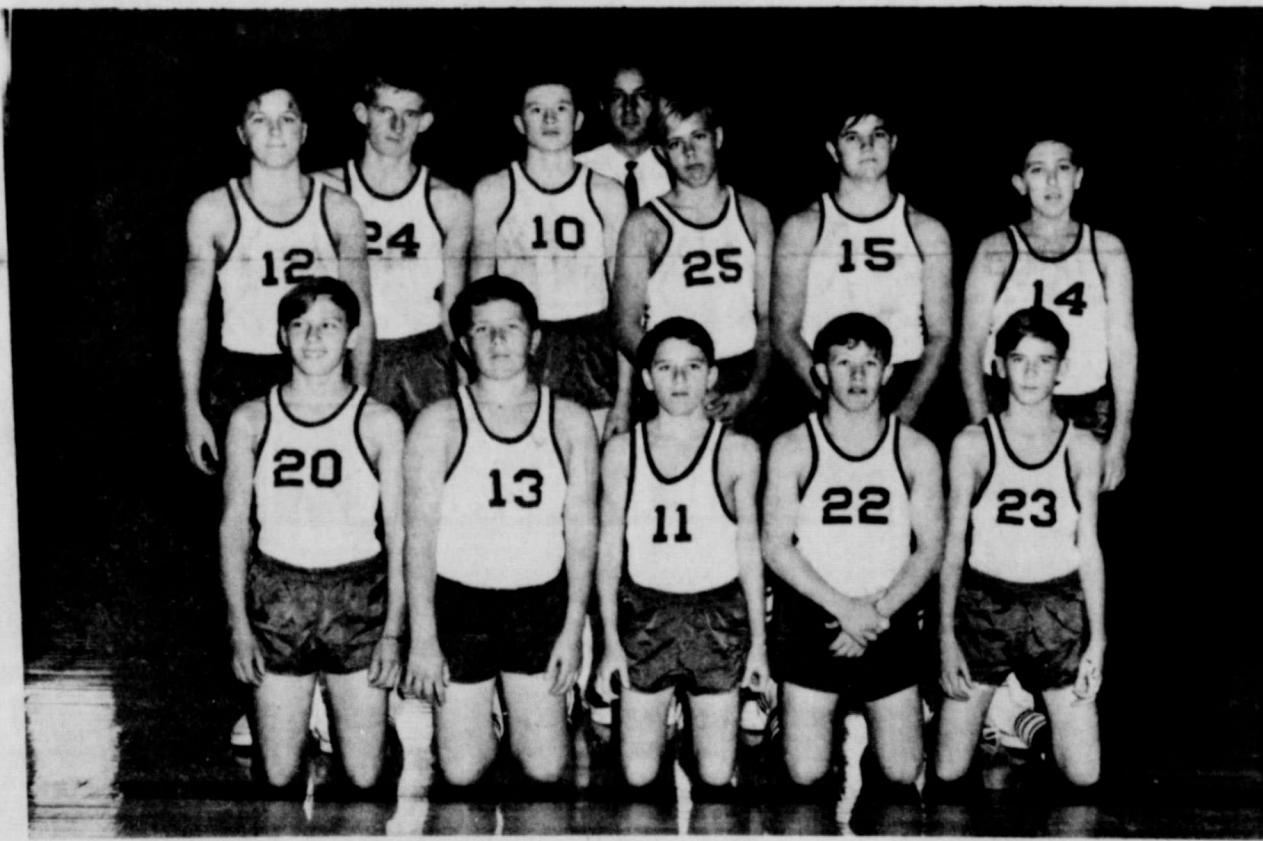
