## Fleeing Prisoners Take Pickup In Spearman

Two convicts who escaped jail in Guymon, Okla. late Sunday night, were apprehended in Lamesa Monday.

A fellow prisoner reportedly broke out of his minimum security cell, took keys from the jail office on the top floor of the Guymon courthouse and released the pair. The accommodating prisoner did not leave the jail.

Guymon authorities notified Sheriff J.B. Cooke about 11:30 p.m. Sunday night concerning the escape and Cooke and his deputies along with Spearman City Police officials set up road blocks all night long on the two Guymon roads leading into Spearman.

Apparently the escapees detoured road blocks, for they did get to Spearman where they stole a pickup belonging to Pan American Oil Co. and drove the truck to Abilene. There they abandoned the truck and stole another pickup and drove it to Lamesa where police officials apprehended

them Monday. Charles E. Howell, 29, and Billy Eugene Sage, 32, stole a white pickup belonging to the City of Guymon to make their get away. This truck had not been located as of Tuesday night of this week.

The men were convicts and were being held in custody at Guymon as witnesses in a District Court trial. Sheriff J.B. Cooke said complaints for motor vehicle theft would probably be filed against the two in Hansford County.

Howell was serving a term in the Oklahoma Penitentiary on a conviction of burglary. Sage was a prisoner at Huntsville where he was sentenced for stealing mercury from oil field gas meters in Hansford, Texas and Hutchinson counties. Texas County Sheriff Bob Toombs went to Lamesa Tuesday to return the escaped convicts to jail in Guymon.

Boss Lion Dan Desimone said today he wished to remind all Lions and ladies to be present tonight, Thursday Feb. 12, for the Sweetheart banquet.

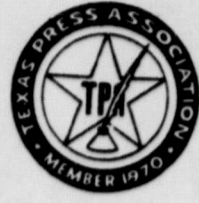
This is the annual ladies night banquet. The meal will be served by the Methodist women at 7 p.m. in the fellowship hall at the Methodist Church.

In other school board business, it was learned that the principals contracts will come up for renewal in March, and the teachers contracts will come up for renewal in April.

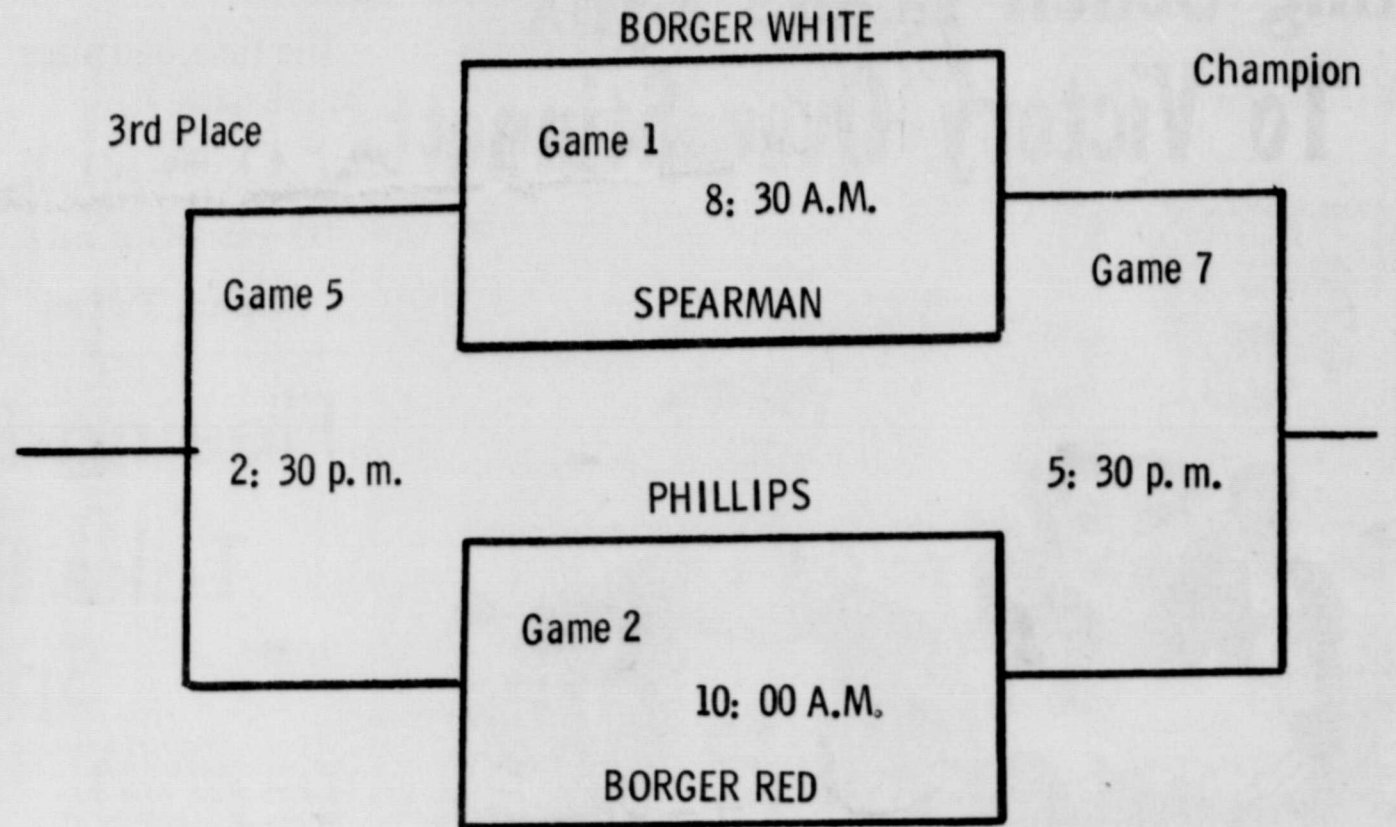

Deadline for those interested in filing for school board, is 5 p.m., Wednesday, March 4th. The election will be held April 4th.

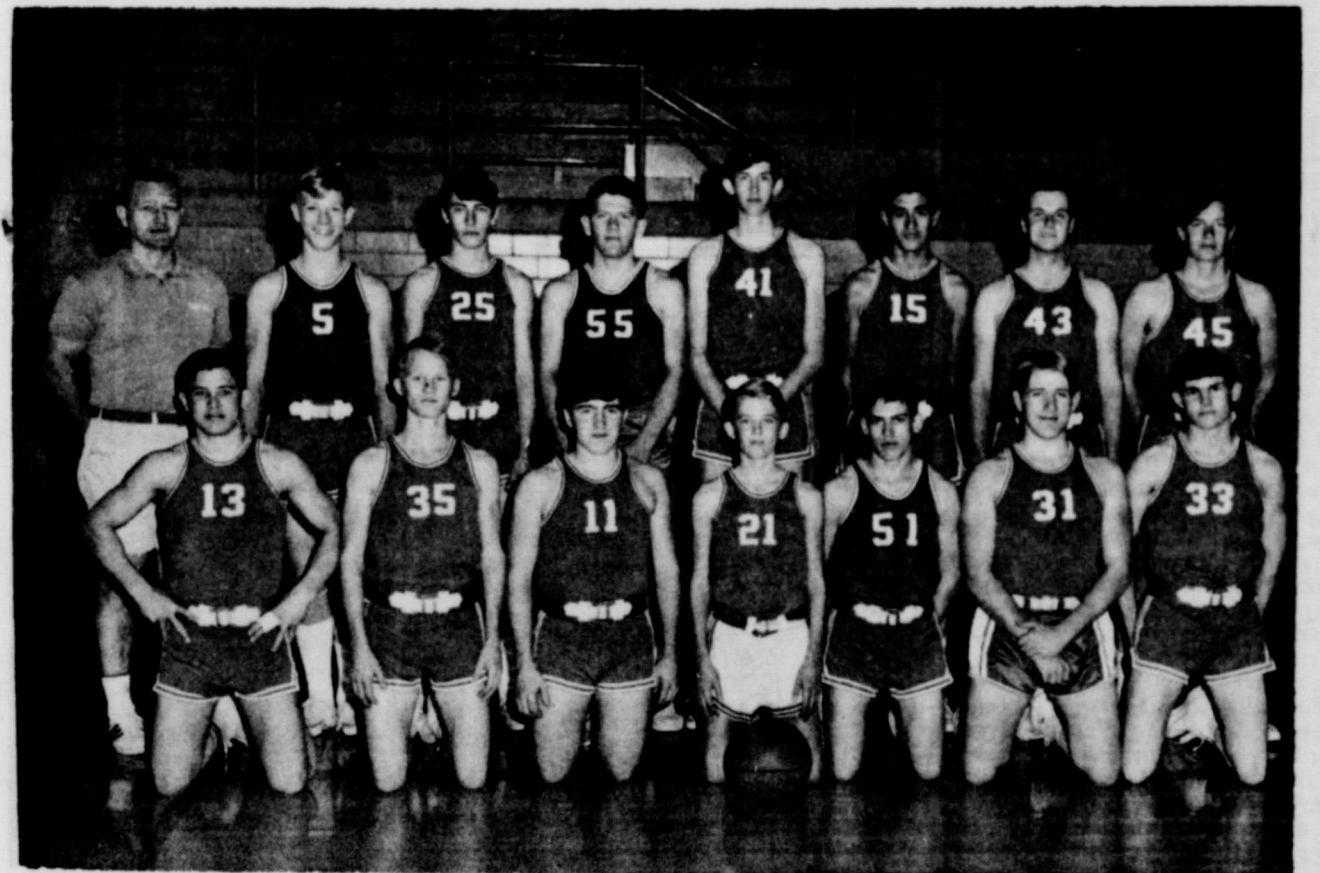
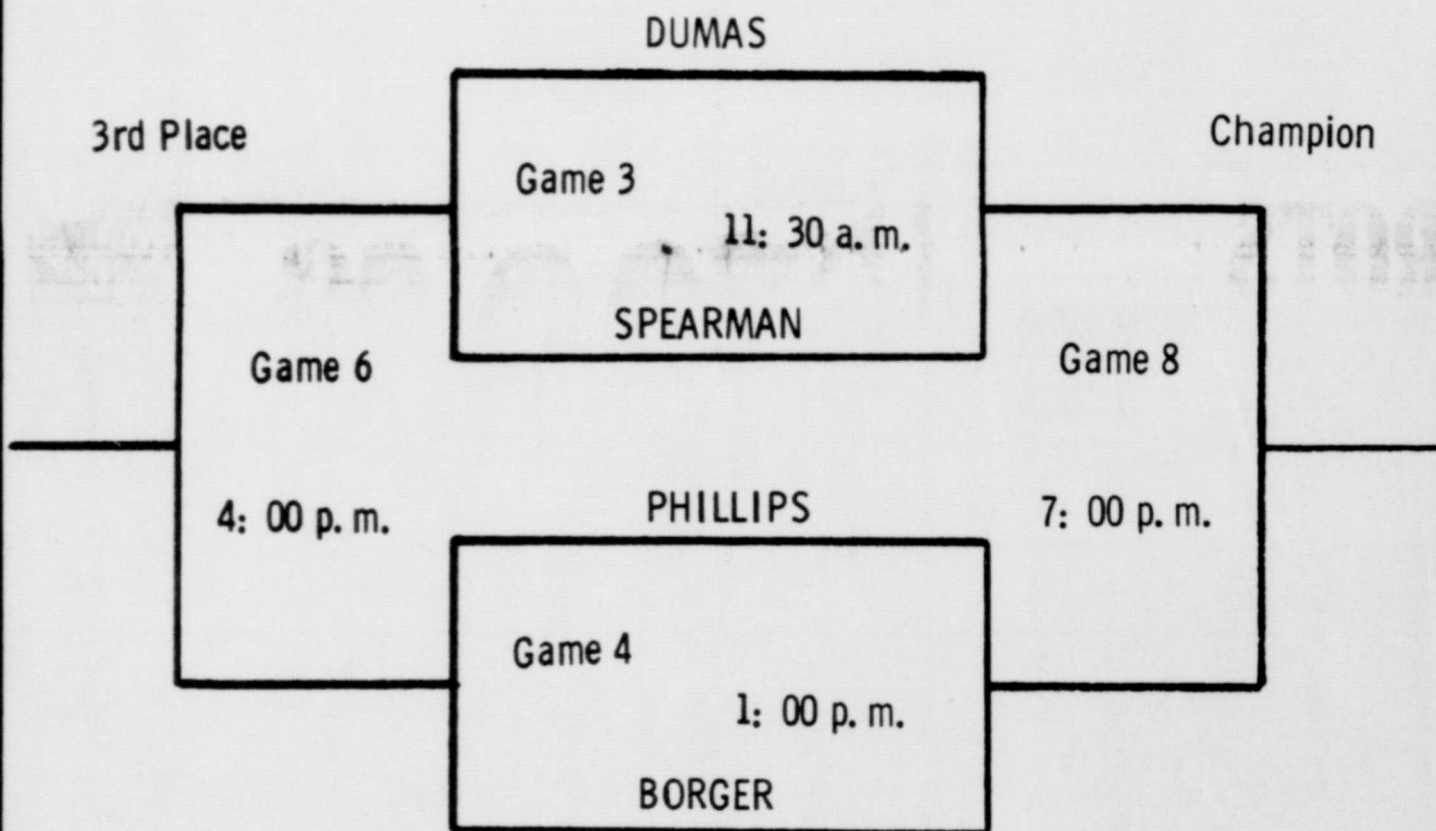
The school board voted to requisition a new activity bus, similar to the one they now have.

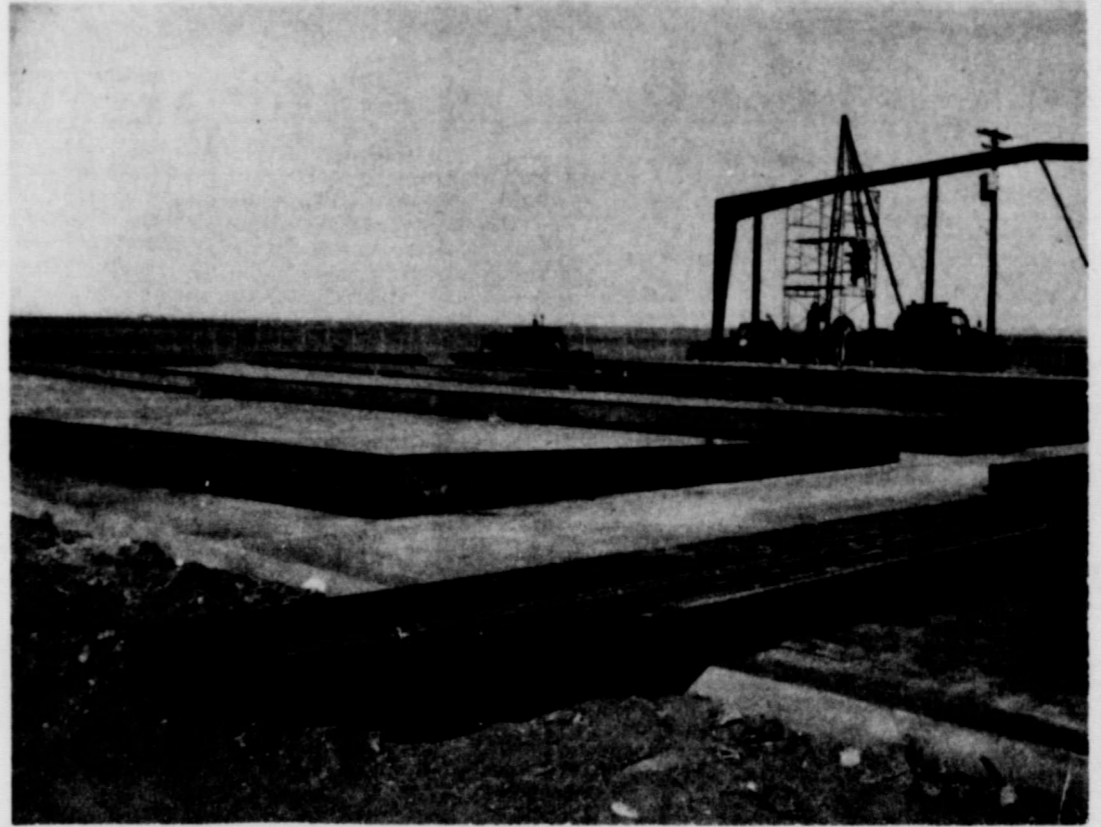
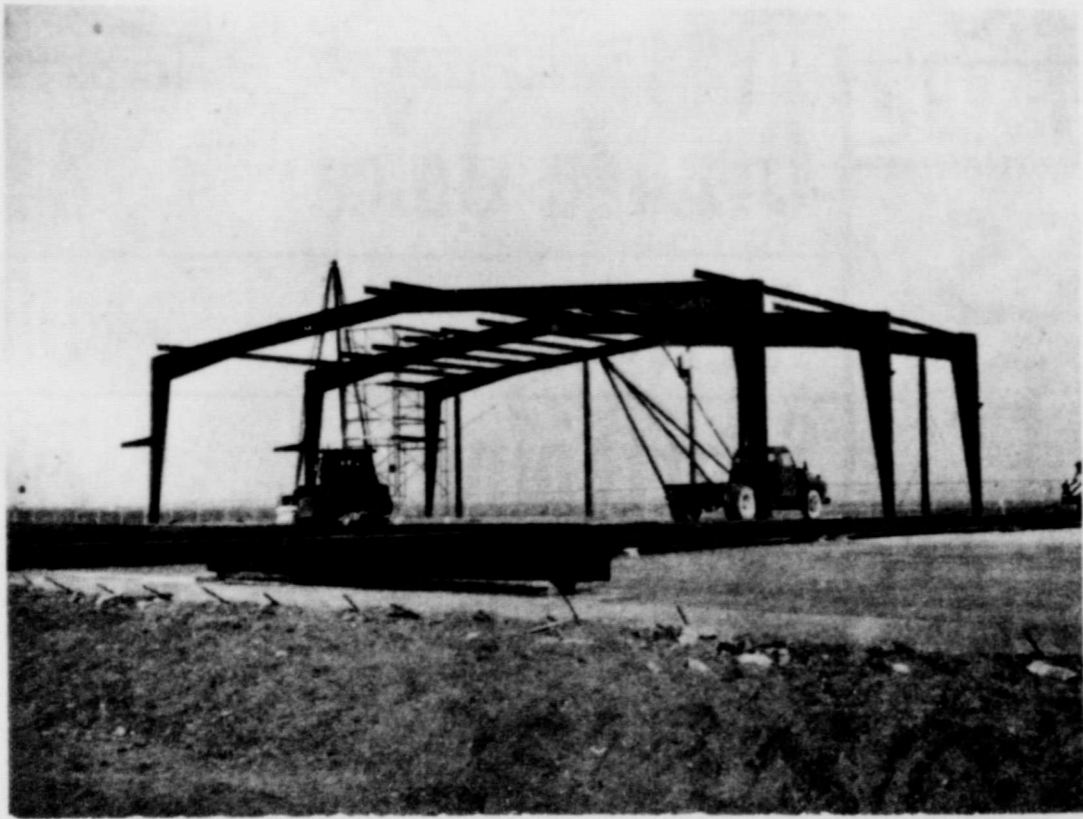

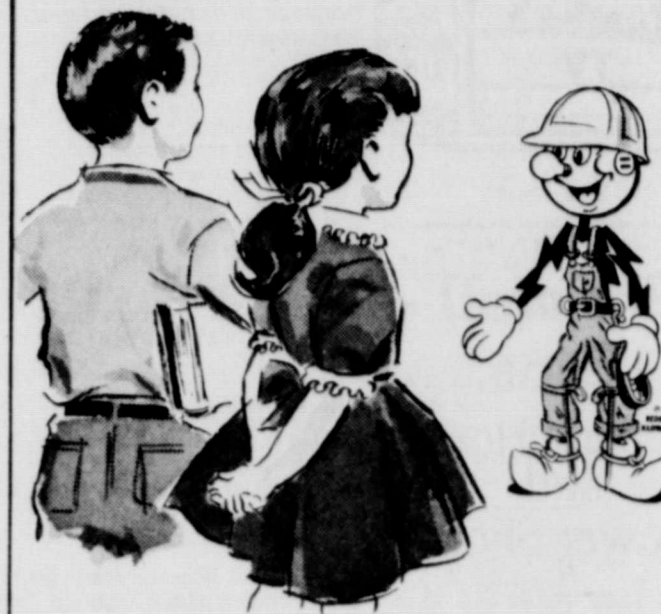
The day-long confab will be brought to a close with a "question and answer" period in which all program speakers will participate. Smallwood

## Pro News Men Have Human Side, Too

The hard-nosed, cold-facts atmosphere in which KVII's Pro News men work might suggest that the men themselves should be stern and insensitive.

A casual chat in a rare calm moment reveals quite a different picture. Jim Pratt, for example, as KVII's Managing Editor, Jim must put his twenty-two years of broadcasting experience on the line before each newscast; it's up to him to determine which of the thousands of daily happenings will be of greatest interest to area viewers. It's the kind of job that would make a lesser man grumpy.

But Jim Pratt is a big man with a big friendliness. He approaches his awesome duties with the calm confidence that big men always seem to have. In the whirlwind of frantic activity before every newscast, Jim can be seen at the center of the storm, guiding his staff steadily through preparations for the next newscast. He is the calm, collected, cool man who, in the busy, hectic atmosphere of a film studio, decides a script question for one of the reporters, explains to the producer how the sequence of shots will go, and diplomatically fields a call from a complaining viewer. While others in the same shoes might appear harassed, Jim is collected, cool, and in command.

"Woody," he said, "maybe it's like that little stem over there says—'Anyone who can keep his head in all this confusion just doesn't understand the situation.'"

Okay, count modestly as another Jim Pratt trademark. He does, indeed, understand the situation. Associated Press and UPI awards for best newscast, best story, and award of merit are testaments to his understanding of the situation. His understanding of the situation won him the CBS News Fellowship to Columbia University and the I.M.A. Man of the Year Award in 1963. When he says something, he knows whereof he speaks.

As a political science scholar, Jim expresses concern for the future. The sociological lag must catch up to the technological advances, he says. "If not, the population explosion will produce self-annihilation or cause legalization of genocide." To Jim and Dorothy, his wife of twenty-three years, the future is an important matter: "We have four daughters who'll have to live in it."

Roger Davis, the other half of the anchor team on Pro News, through his efforts on the Hotline feature designed to expose and correct specific problems revealed by viewers, has provided the individual citizen with the means to get action on his grievances.

In "real life"—that is, off-camera—Roger is the same naturally serious, but gifted with a subtle, sharply-honed wit that contrasts pleasantly with the gentle, honeyed humor of Jim Pratt. It was Roger who started the good-natured feud with Pratt as to whether a broken area in street pavement was a "chuckhole" (as it is known in this area) or an "egghead" (as ex-former boy Pratt maintains). To this writer's knowledge, the question remains unresolved.

Such exchanges between the two provide brightness and optimism to lighten the often disheartening character of today's news.

In the more entertaining world of sports, Woody Van Dyke sparred with Alvin Karpis in a "Woody" round robin featuring a Darrell Royal on fourth down. Woody jumps in with both feet. Controversy swirls in his wake. After each of his reports, the ring of the newsroom phone is inevitable. And inevitably the comments run the gamut—from, "Hey, Woody, you're absolutely right, give em the dickens, why do you let the other guy win?"—to "kinda ding-ding, sportscaster are

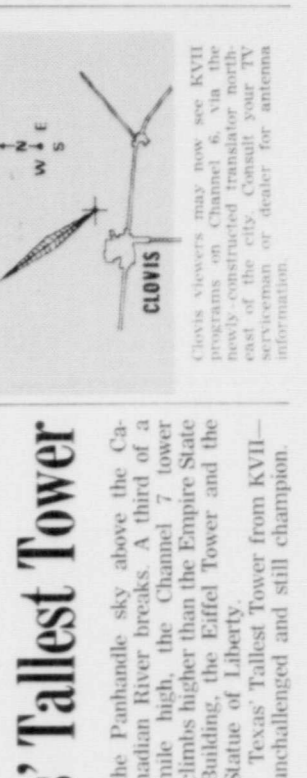

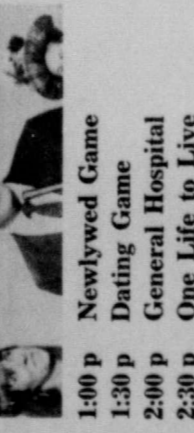
