## No Interest Shown In Local Races

This newspaper is printed at 5 p.m. Wednesday and at press time not much interest was being shown in the City Councilman and Mayor election, nor the school board election. Both elections are set for April 4 in the Junior High School building. Deadline for filing was midnight, Wednesday and a complete list of candidates for the two very important elections will be carried in Sunday's newspapers. Four candidates had filed for the city election. Mayor D.E. Hackley filed for re-

election and is opposed by Clarence Pettitt. In the City council race, incumbents E.J. Copeland and Richard Holton had filed for re-election. They were unopposed at press time. Terms expire this year for school board members Max Baggerly and Joel Lee Lackey who have both served two 3-year terms. Baggerly, who is not seeking re-election, said he had no particular reason for not running again other than he thinks six years is enough. "We need some new faces and new blood," Baggerly said.

As of press time Wednesday, only Joel Lackey, incumbent, has filed for re-election. If no one else files for the School Board, Baggerly will be required to serve until some one else has been elected. Of course, Baggerly could resign, forcing the board to appoint someone to serve the term. Scuttle-but predictions early Wednesday were that several would file for School Board, but were waiting until the last minute. More information will be carried in Sunday's paper.

## City Man Held In Hit-Run Death

Orvis A. Head, 39, is being held in Borger jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond set on a charge of failure to stop and render aid to a Borger man.

Elmo Clark of Borger died about 1:30 p.m. in North Plains Hospital of injuries suffered when he was struck by a pickup about 4 miles north of Borger on SH 136. He was struck while standing beside his truck.

Witnesses gave police a description of the pickup that struck Clark and Highway Patrol officers, with the help of Sheriff J.B. Cooke, were able to trace the vehicle to a Spearman resident who told officers he had loaned the truck to Head.

Head, a roughneck for Baker Taylor Drilling Co. here, was arrested about 5:30 at an oil rig near Canadian. He has lived in Spearman a short time.

Clark had lived in Borger about 20 years and was a truck driver for Redi-Mix Concrete Company. He was on his way to make a cement delivery at a ranch near Canadian when the accident occurred. He died one hour after being struck by the pickup.

Head is being held in the hit-and-run charge.

## Applications Being Accepted For Vocational Nurse School

Applications are being accepted from now until March 13th, for the third class of the school of Vocational Nursing at Hansford Hospital according to Hospital Administrator S. M. Anderson.

The class will start April 13th and those wishing to enroll should contact Joan McClellan, R. N. Inservice Director at the hospital, to arrange an interview.

Training is divided into a 20-week pre-clinical and 30-week clinical period. A two week vacation and or sick leave is also included in the course. During the pre-clinical period, students will be in class five days each week. Application experience will begin approximately four weeks after the program starts. Experience during the clinical period will be obtained in the hospital. The student will work a 40 hour week during this period and will be scheduled off duty on two days of each week.

Requirements for admission to the classes are: A U.S. citizen 18 to 55 years of age, two years of high school or the equivalent the equivalent being a general development test administered by a person designated to do so, good physical and mental health with a required physical examination, successful completion of a test given and graded by the Texas Employment Commission,

Those completing the course will then apply to take the State Vocational Nurse Licensing Board Examination, a requirement for becoming a Licensed Vocational Nurse.

The primary purpose of a Vocational Nurse School is to provide education and practice so as to prepare students to become safe competent efficient bedside nurses, which will enable the patients who occupy our hospital beds to receive better nursing care and therefore hasten their recovery. The training includes giving treatments and medications, observing and reporting patient's progress, bathing and feeding patients, and working in a team relationship with physicians, registered nurses, licensed vocational nurses and all other persons concerned with patient care.

## AA Spearman Slapped By 2nd Waco Outfit

Lightning does strike in the same place. And, antique Gregory gym in Austin saw the unbeaten Lynxettes from Spearman lose their 35th game to Waco Robinson 57-49, before a record crowd of enthusiastic girl's basketball fans. The proud Lynxettes were even greater champions after losing to Robinson, however, as they clapped for the Waco team, hugged each other and tearfully accepted the runner-up AA trophy.

Lynxette fans were just as proud of their team as you can be; this was a record 6th trip for the Dean Weese coached team, and this is a new AA record. Buna has made five trips.

But, as Mrs. Weese said, why "do they have to hit 75% to 95% against us in the finals?" Well, that is the only way that you could beat the Lynxettes. And, in 1968, we had Little Cypress beat, and they came back and "blew us out of the gym" the last half to beat us 52-43. In 1969, the Lynxettes lost to Midway Waco 56-55, after the official game was over. And, this year, we had the same hard luck; that is, Robinson just beat us at our own game.

Perennial power Spearman, undefeated through 34 games this season, went under Saturday afternoon at Gregory Gym and the Waco Robinson Rockets utilized their first trip to the state girls basketball tournament to claim a 57-49 victory and the Class AA championship.

It was the second consecutive year that the Lynxettes from the Panhandle lost to a Waco team in the championship game. Last year Waco Midway defeated Spearman in the final 56-55.

Robinson, which edged Midway in a special playoff for district honors, finished the year at 38-3 — with one of the losses to Midway.

Spearman came out after intermission with defense on its mind and sagged all three guards on Miss Snider.

The plan worked well enough to limit her to four points and Robinson to 10 in the third quarter, but the Rocket defense meanwhile tightened up to cut Spearman off with four and secure a 40-30 three-quarter lead.

Robinson finished with 13 turnovers to nine for Spearman but the Rockets settled down in the second half after yielding nine in the first two periods to only two by the Lynxettes.

With the ball-handling under control and its guards cutting off the Spearman forwards and forcing them to take outside shots, Robinson dominated the second half, leading by as much as 55-38 before the Lynxettes closed with a flurry to narrow the final margin.

Miss Lucenay snagged eight rebounds and Mildred Lewis added five as Robinson won the battle of the boards, 23-18.

Robinson hit 21 of 29 from the field and 15 of 23 from the free throw line to 17 of 36 and 15 of 21 for Spearman.

Miss Howe is the only senior on the Robinson squad while Spearman will lose all of its starting guard corps — Jyniece Callaway, Jo Kirkland, Lynn Hohertz — through graduation.

## Driest Months In 37 Years

So far, 1970 has been the driest year on record since 1933 when only .01 of moisture was recorded Jan. and Feb. of that year, 1933 ended with a grand total of only 13.90 inches of rainfall. The Weather Bureau here in Spearman recorded only .03 inch of moisture in January and none in February.

This newspaper has on file a record of rainfall in the immediate area dating back to 1880 and the first two months of 1970 ranks among the sixth driest in the past 90 years.

In 1880 the first two months of the year recorded .05 inch of moisture. The year ended with only 16.97 inches.

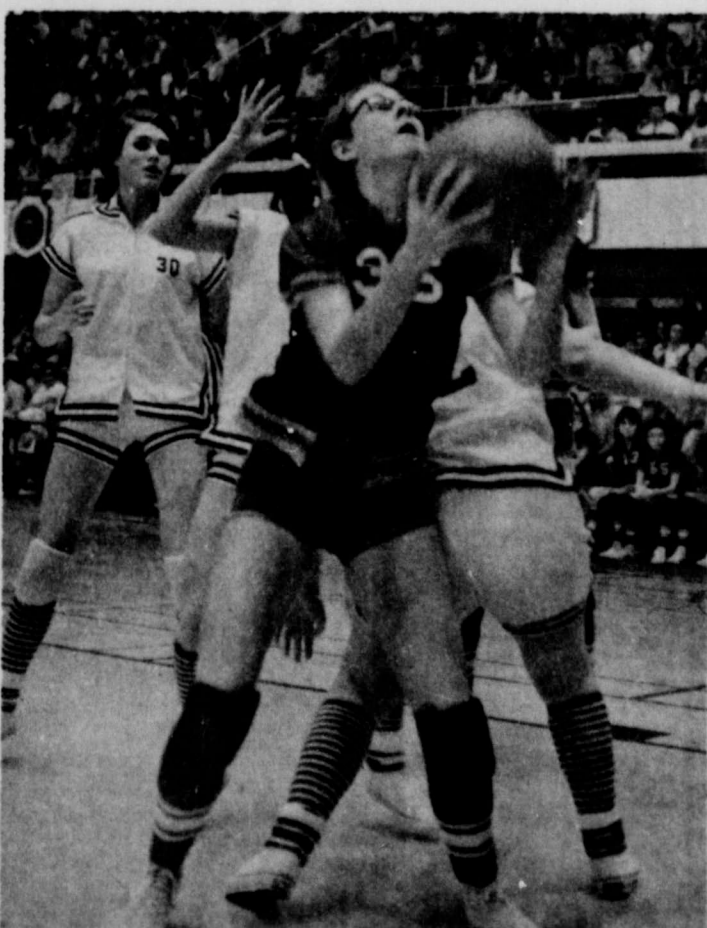
In 1887, .01 fell in January and .06 in Feb. That year 22.83 inches of rain fell.

In 1902, January moisture was .04 and none was measured for the second month and the year's total was 23.11.

In January of 1947 moisture totaled .05, and .04 was recorded in February. That year 23.13 inches of rain fell here.

The driest year on record is 1930, when the year's grand total of rainfall measured only 7.86 and a quarter inch of this sum fell in January.

The last good precipitation recorded here was back in October with a 1.17 total for the month. Not even a trace was measured in November and December saw only .12 inch. The past four months have been

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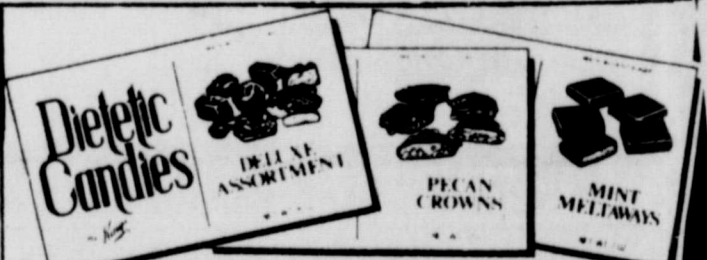
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### Texas Day Program For Study Club

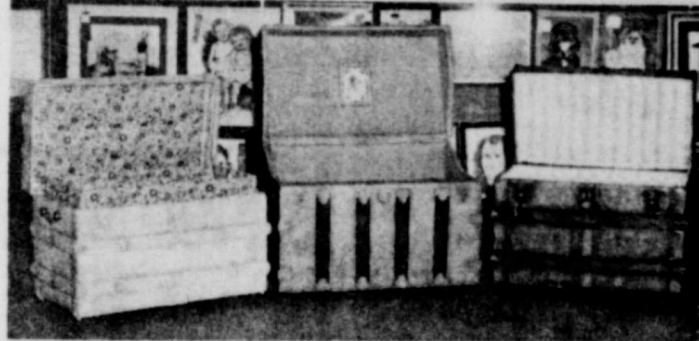

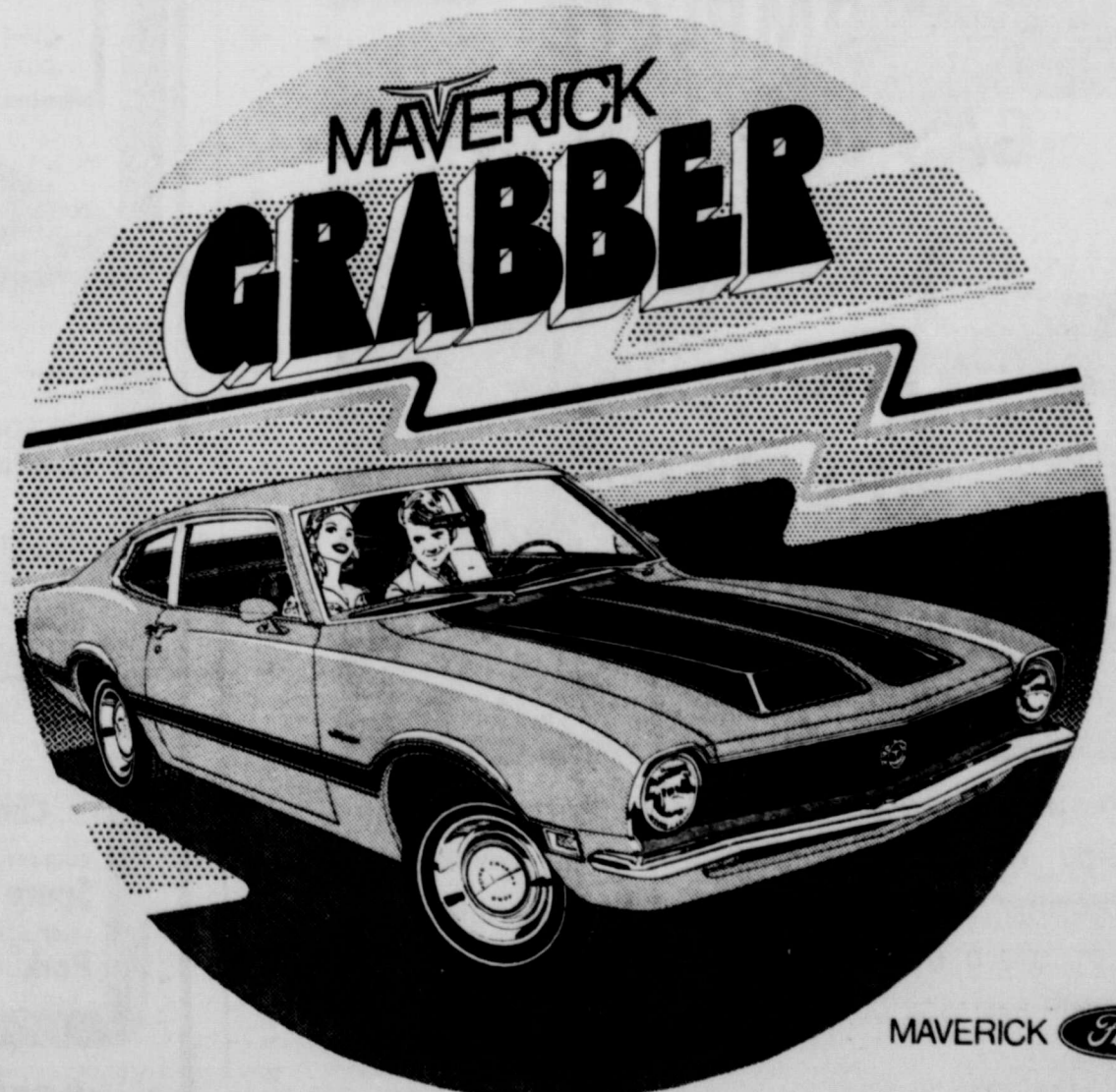

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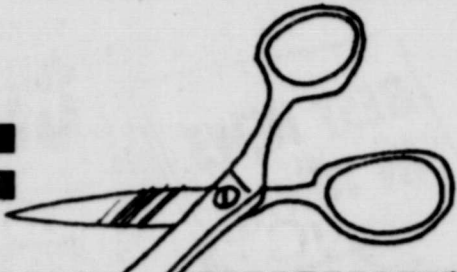
