Golf Club Votes To Raise Dues

To \$9.00 Per Month, April 1

The Hansford County Golf Club held its annual meeting at the county courtroom in Spearman Monday night. President L. M. Womble presided at the meeting which was well attended by county golfers.

Secretary Ann Sanders read the minutes of last year's annual club meeting. Also, the last director's meeting minutes were read and it was learned that the directors had voted to raise the dues from \$7. per month to \$9 per month. Golfers voted to go along with the directors and raise the monthly dues to nine dollars.

Treasurer Bob Crawford informed the delegation that the club had received \$21,933.64 in dues and other income for the year, but had spent \$24,307.70. However, it was noted that the club had spent \$3,000 on pipe for fairways and \$3,500, for carts which showed the balance in the red. Actually, the club operated very efficiently last year, and president Womble, the directors and Secretary Anne Sanders were given a vote of thanks from all present for their efforts of the past year.

Assets of the club include a 1951 tractor, 8 golf carts, a 1955 pickup and some items in the pro shop. All those items, plus a new \$1,700 fairway mower. President Womble asked and urged members to purchase their needed items at the pro shop. This money is used to help keep up the golf course and the prices are below competitive prices in the area on most items.

Womble noted that the fine job being done by golf course managers Servando and Bertha Salinas, is the key to the success at Hansford Golf Club. These two fine people, and their entire family, are a great asset to the county and the city of Spearman and their work is appreciated by all.

Womble complimented the unusual courtesy that golf club members use throughout the year on the local course. "Members have been extremely courteous and have taken extra good care of the greens and fairways," he said. This is what makes for a good golf course.

E. J. Copeland was elected to serve as new president for the club. Two new directors were also named: Kenneth Irwin and Jack McWhirter. They replace Don Smith and Granville Boyd whose terms expired.

1970 directors include Mack Mauldin, Charlie Patton, Kenneth Irwin and Jack McWhirter. Bob Crawford will remain as treasurer. Directors will appoint their own secretary.

In other business before the house, the club voted to change all 4-somes, to 5-somes and 6-somes, with most members using their own discretion as to whether to play 4, 5 or 6 in their group.

It was learned at the meeting that about one-third of the paying members of the club are made up from the Gruver area and members were glad to learn that Kenneth Irwin was voted in as one of the new directors. Irwin is vice president of Gruver State Bank and the Mayor of Gruver.

Voters Return Incumbants

A 10 inch cover of snow hampered somewhat the turnout of voters for Saturday's election to choose two Spearman School Board trustees, two City Councilmen and a Mayor for the city of Spearman.

Only 441 people cast ballots in the City election, 588 votes were cast in the school board election.

Voters returned E. J. Copeland and Richard Holton to two year terms on the City Council. They were incumbents. Dr. D. E. Hackley, Mayor incumbent, was also returned to office. His opponent, Clarence Pettitt, received 120 votes; Hackley 316; Holton 355, Copeland 365 and many many write-ins received one vote each.

In the race for school board trustees, Incumbent Joel Lee Lackey was returned to office with 385 votes. The other winner of the 4-man candidate list was Ray J. Martin with 287 votes. Sonny Windom polled 195 votes and Jimmy Greene 269. Lackey and Martin will serve 3 year terms.

Write-in names to receive one vote for school board included Junior Lusby, Bobby Joe Grayson, James Lair, Jim Fowler and Jimmy Vernon. F. O. Crawford was named as County school trustee.

SHS Science Record Best In U. S.

At the regional science fair held the past week end in Amarillo, students from Spearman High School took home several top awards in competition with youngsters from 24 Panhandle counties.

The project exhibited by Mark Massie was judged to be one of the two best overall exhibits and he will be sent to the International Science Fair in Baltimore, Maryland, May 16-15. His project placed first in the boys chemistry division and was entitled "A Laser Initiated Photochemical and Physics given by the Panhandle Plains section of the American Chemical

Society. In addition, he received an Air Force certificate of achievement.

Devorah Jackson of Spearman won first place in the girls medicine and health division and received an award from the Amarillo Rotary Club sponsoring her attendance at the Junior Engineers and Scientists Summer Institute at New Mexico State University. The Panhandle District Medical Society judged her project to be the best exhibit in the medicine and health area and awarded Devorah expense money to attend the Texas Medical Association con-

vention.

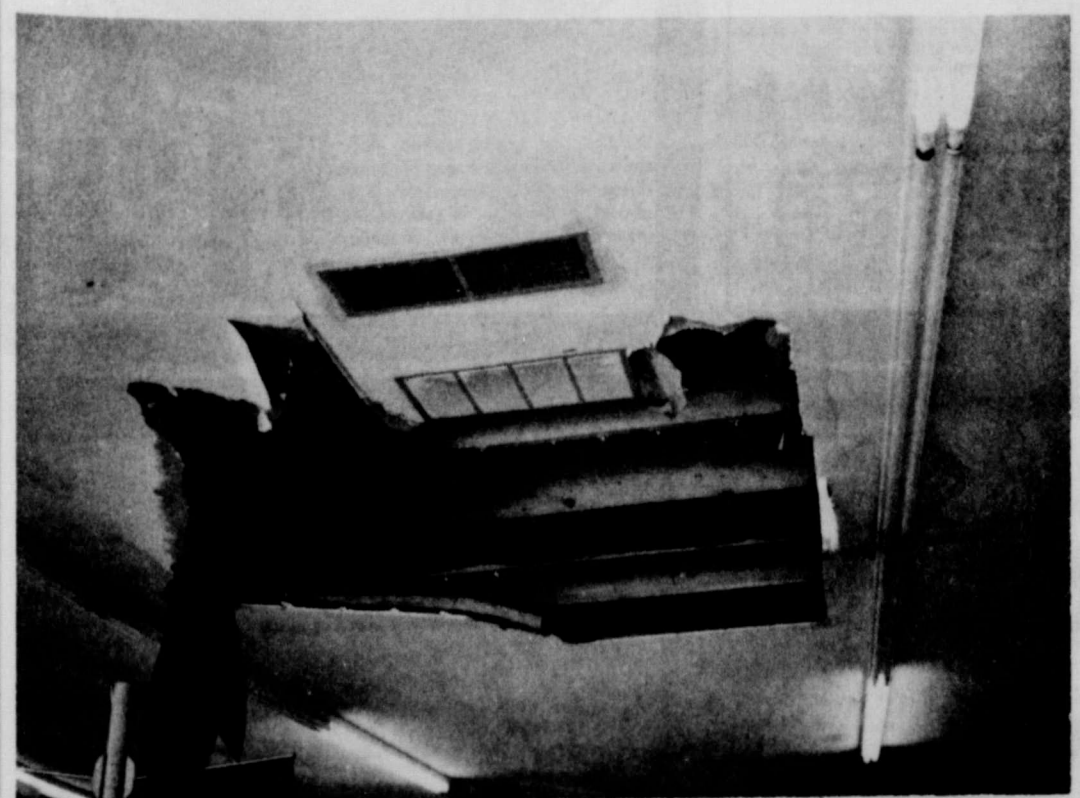
Vicki Rosenbaum also placed first in the medicine and health division and won a special award from the Texas Veterinarian Auxiliary. She will now compete with other students from across the State at Texas A&M University June 12 for various awards and scholarships. Tommy Reger picked up a second place ribbon for his efforts in the boys botany division and Billy Giles, exhibiting in the Junior High boys medicine and health division, won a first place.

As a result of their successful participation in an earlier fair at Panhandle State College, Miss Jackson and Miss Rosenbaum will join Mark Massie at the International Science Fair. This gives Spearman three representatives in this competition involving students from all parts of the United States and many foreign countries.

His work in science this year has won Mark Massie trips from coast to coast. In addition to his journey to Baltimore, he had won the Navy Science Cruiser Award earlier and will

visit San Diego at the expense of the Navy this summer.

This was the fourth consecutive year for a Spearman Science student to win the Amarillo Rotary Club award, and the fourth consecutive year for a Spearman Student to receive the Navy Cruiser award. Spearman High School now has sent seven students in the past three years to the International Science Fair, the best record of any school in the U. S.

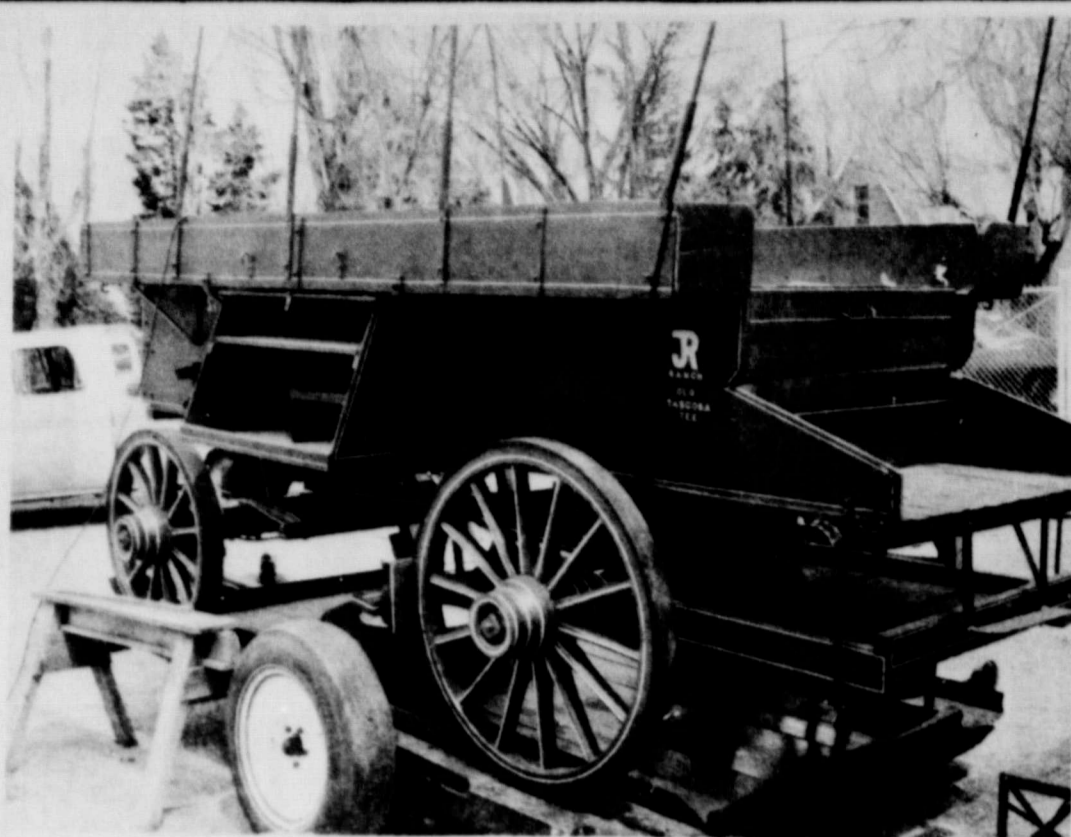
ing emergency treatment, to St. Anthony Hospital in Amarillo. He died following surgery for the stomach wound.

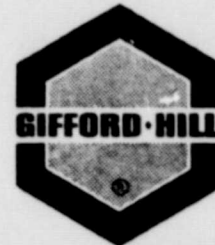

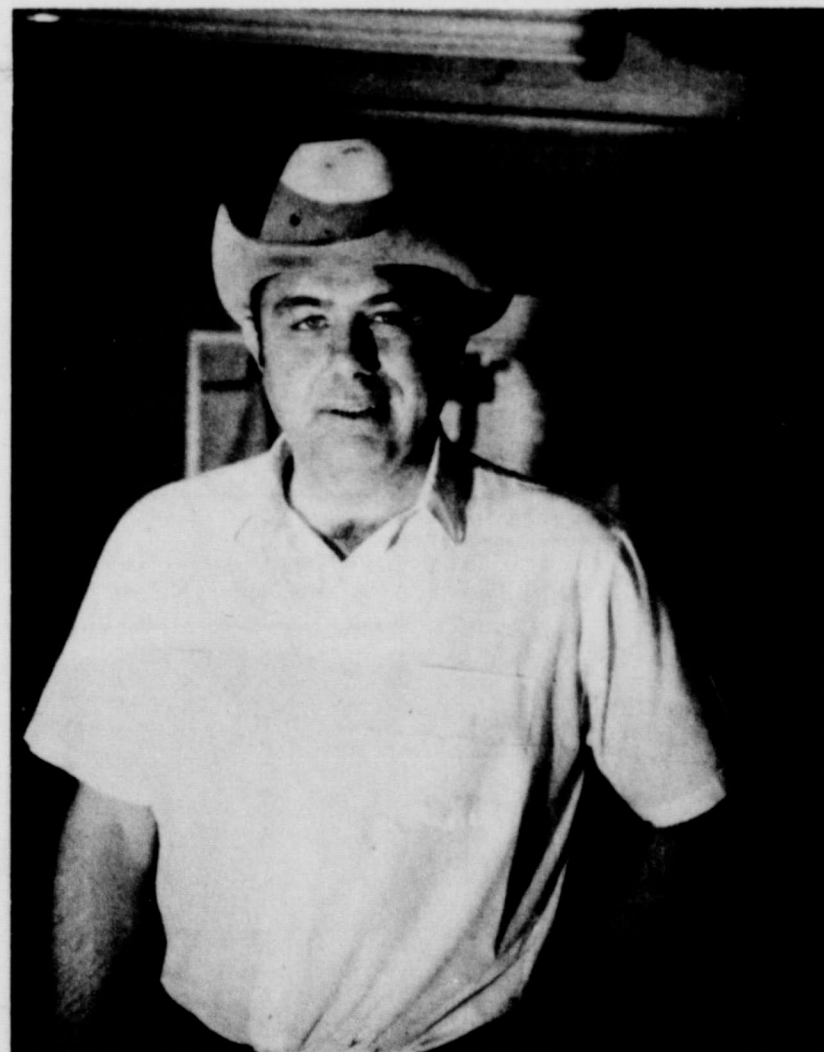

Teacher Aides To Be Permanent

AUSTIN--Many Texas public schools, faced with teacher shortages and crowded classrooms, have been using "teacher aides" to lighten the load.

While these classroom assistants are not certified nor trained to teach, they can operate machines and equipment, assist in libraries, check papers and keep order while teachers work individually with students.

They've proved so helpful, in fact, that the Legislature saw fit in 1969 to pass a new law which will make "teacher aides" a fixture in Texas public schools beginning next September.

The provision for teacher aides is contained in House Bill 240, the Minimum Foundation Program amendments of 1969, authored by the late Rep. George T. Hinson of

Mineola in the House, with a companion bill by Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris in the Senate.

The law states: "Effective for the school year 1970-71 and thereafter there shall be provided one teacher aide for each 20 classroom teacher units earned by a school district. For the school year 1970-71 an aide shall be paid a monthly salary of \$300 and shall receive such salary for 10 months." This will mean about one teacher aide for every 500 students in the schools.

Jewell Harris, Abilene classroom teacher who last month became president of the 127,500-member Texas State Teachers Association, feels that adding teacher aides in the Texas schools will bring immediate and dramatic improvement in their instructional programs.

Driver Classes Scheduled

Driver instruction classes are scheduled to be held Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, April 13, 14 & 16 in the County Courthouse, Hansford County Courthouse.

Class time will be from 7 to 9 p. m. for the instruction by DeRay Uselton, Texas Department of Public Safety Driver License Patrolman.

Purpose is to prepare the unlicensed person to pass a state required test for being licensed to drive, stressing safety rules and laws of the road.

Uselton said, concerning the classes: "If you have never made an application for a license, or at one time applied for a license but had some difficulty in passing the examination and discontinued the attempt, we would like to encourage you to attend these classes."

There are approximately one million licensed drivers in the state who have never taken any kind of test to qualify for a license because they received their license years ago when all you had to do was sign for one. You may already have a license and once tested, but feel the need to review your driving rules and laws, we encourage you also to attend.

In the near future, probably later this year, every licensed driver will be required to pass a written exam and some will have to take both written and driving as well as having eyes tested when renewing their license.

have persons working for you, or members of his family, that are unlicensed, we would like to ask you to encourage them to attend these classes.

"The need for a program such as this has been brought on by an unusual number of accidents and deaths over the state caused by unlicensed drivers."

"The percentage of accidents and deaths is much higher in this category than those licensed to drive."

"Texas death count on the highways last year amounted to a number almost equal to the Spearman population. If this project will aid in the prevention of just one death, it is worth the effort."

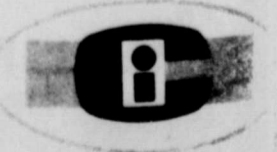

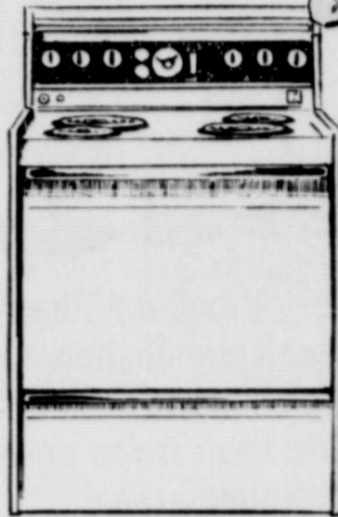

In the girls singles, De-Anna Sheets lost to Lakeview in the finals.

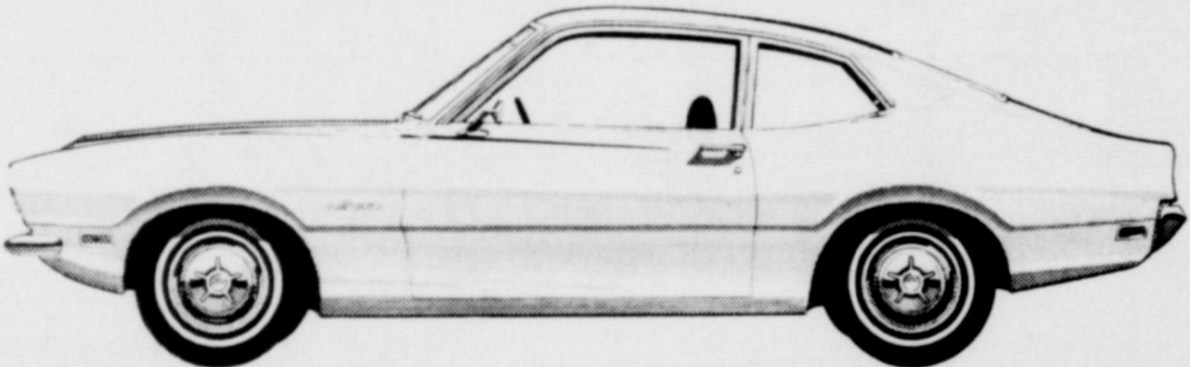

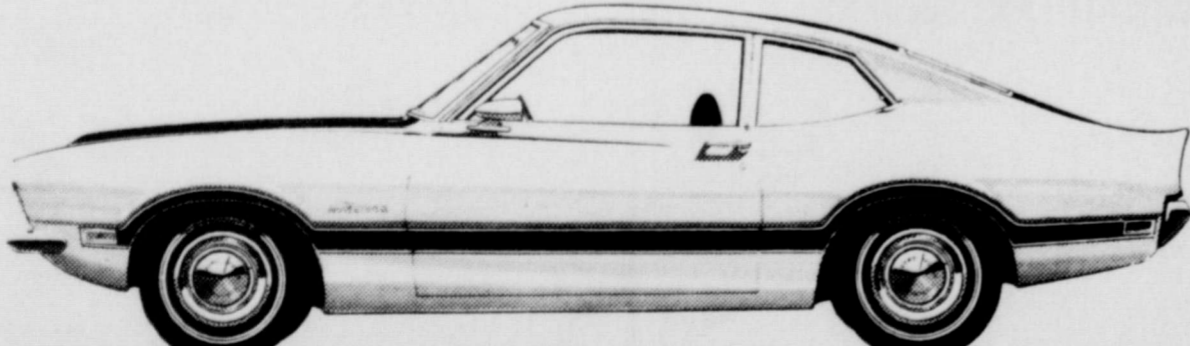

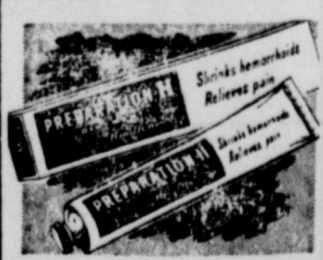
