

# Polls Open 8 A.M. Primary Elections Saturday

Tuesday at 5 p.m. was the deadline to vote absentee ballot for the May 2 (Saturday) Democratic & Republican primary elections. If the number of absentee voters is any barometer for election day turnouts will probably be light. Less than 25 persons voted absentee.

2,517 voters have registered in Hansford County. The number of persons eligible to vote in Saturday's election in each precinct reads like this: Precinct 1 (County court house) 888; Precinct 2 (Renner Ranch) 90; Precinct 3 (Gruver Elevator) 115; Precinct 4 (Gruver School) 617; Precinct 7 (Oslo) 76; Precinct 9 (Morse) 92; Precinct 10 (Spearman Jr. Hi School House) 939.

Polls open promptly at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Saturday. Democratic Primary voters will vote at the above polling places.

Republicans may cast their votes in Spearman at the county auditor's office in the court house, and Republicans in precincts 2, 3, 4, 7 and 9 will vote in the Gruver Junior High Cafeteria.

Republicans will not be able to vote for any county officials other than their County Party Chairman, Carl Cooper, They

will choose national, state and district candidates. Republicans to file in Hansford County include Bob Price for Congressman; Malouf Abraham-State Senate; Jack Hart of Gruver-State Representative; Bill Nix-State Representative; David Holt, State Representative and Carl Cooper of Gruver for Republican chairman of Hansford County. The complete Republican ballot was not available at press time.

## Hebrew Christian To Speak

## Hebrew Christian To Speak

Arnold G. Fruchtenbaum will be the speaker at the Community Bible Church in Gruver on May 1-3. The times will be at 8 p.m. on May 1 and 2 and at 11:00 a.m. and 7 p.m. on May 3. Mr. Fruchtenbaum is a minister with the American Board of Missions to the Jews, and the Beth Shalom Hebrew Christian Fellowship. He was won to Christ through that organization in 1957.

He received his training in theology at Cedarville College in Cedarville, Ohio, which is a Baptist institution. He studied Hebrew, archeology, and ancient history at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, working towards his Master of Arts Degree. It was during this time that the, now historic, Six-Day War broke out between Israel and the Arab nations.

His first hand observations of this critical period in Israel's history along with a thorough study of the Bible has brought him to certain conclusions about the role of the Nation Israel and God's plan of world redemption.

While he is still a young man, Mr. Fruchtenbaum's experience and insight has led to his being considered an expert on interpreting current events in the light of the Bible. He has often been asked by the Mission to serve as spokesman on these matters.

Mr. Fruchtenbaum will be speaking on the topics: "Christ in the Passover", "The Campaign of Armageddon", "From Hitler's Hell to God's Peace", and "How to Destroy the Jews". Everyone is cordially invited to attend these services.

The agenda included a discussion on insurance; appoint a member to PRPC Natural Resources Committee; Planning and zoning commission; Delon Kirk Property; Opaque projector; L. D. Burns engineering statement; Swimming pool contract and repairs; tank repairs; street repairs; and several other items not on the agenda.

Of interest to our readers, was the appointment of E. C. Abston, Max Baggerly, Jack Reed, Irvin Davis, and Guy Fuller to serve on the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Local insurance men will meet with the city May 11th, to discuss the insurance needs of the city.

The city voted to sand blast the swimming pool, and put on two coats of paint.

Tank repairs for two of the city's water storage facilities were also approved.

The commission voted to re-work 50 blocks of city paving, and re-work several bad intersections in the city.

The city had agreed to purchase 76.6 acres of land, in section 61, Block 4-T, at their regular meeting April 13th, to be used for a municipal golf course. Besides the golf course use, the new land will furnish water rights for the city, plus a location for trash liquidation if needed in the future. The land was sold to the city for \$200.00 per acre.

## Notice To Dog Owners

The Spearman City Council wishes to remind pet owners this week that there is a City Ordinance, No. 303, which states that it is unlawful for owners of dogs and cats to permit these animals to run loose. These animals must be restricted within a fenced yard or on a leash.

This ordinance simple means that pet owners are responsible for their animals, and if found in violation of it, can be fined not less than \$5 or more than \$100.

City officials have been receiving calls from irate citizens who complain of dogs destroying private property, barking at night, etc. Many people who walk for exercise have found it necessary to carry clubs along to protect themselves from roaming dogs.

The City of Spearman is without a "dog catcher" at present and because of this animals have been running at large, sometimes in packs. Because of the outbreak of rabies in various surrounding counties City health officials are very anxious that pet owners cooperate with the ordinance and keep their animals restricted.

This ordinance can be enforced by law, but City officials feel that persons who care for their dogs will cooperate by keeping them in the yard.

Irate neighbors and city gardeners have been known to poison dogs which destroy their yards and property. This may be the next step if pet owners do not heed this warning.

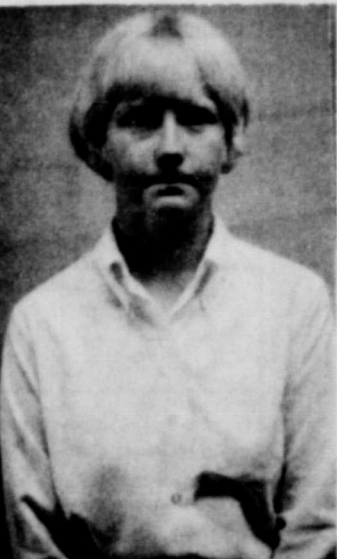

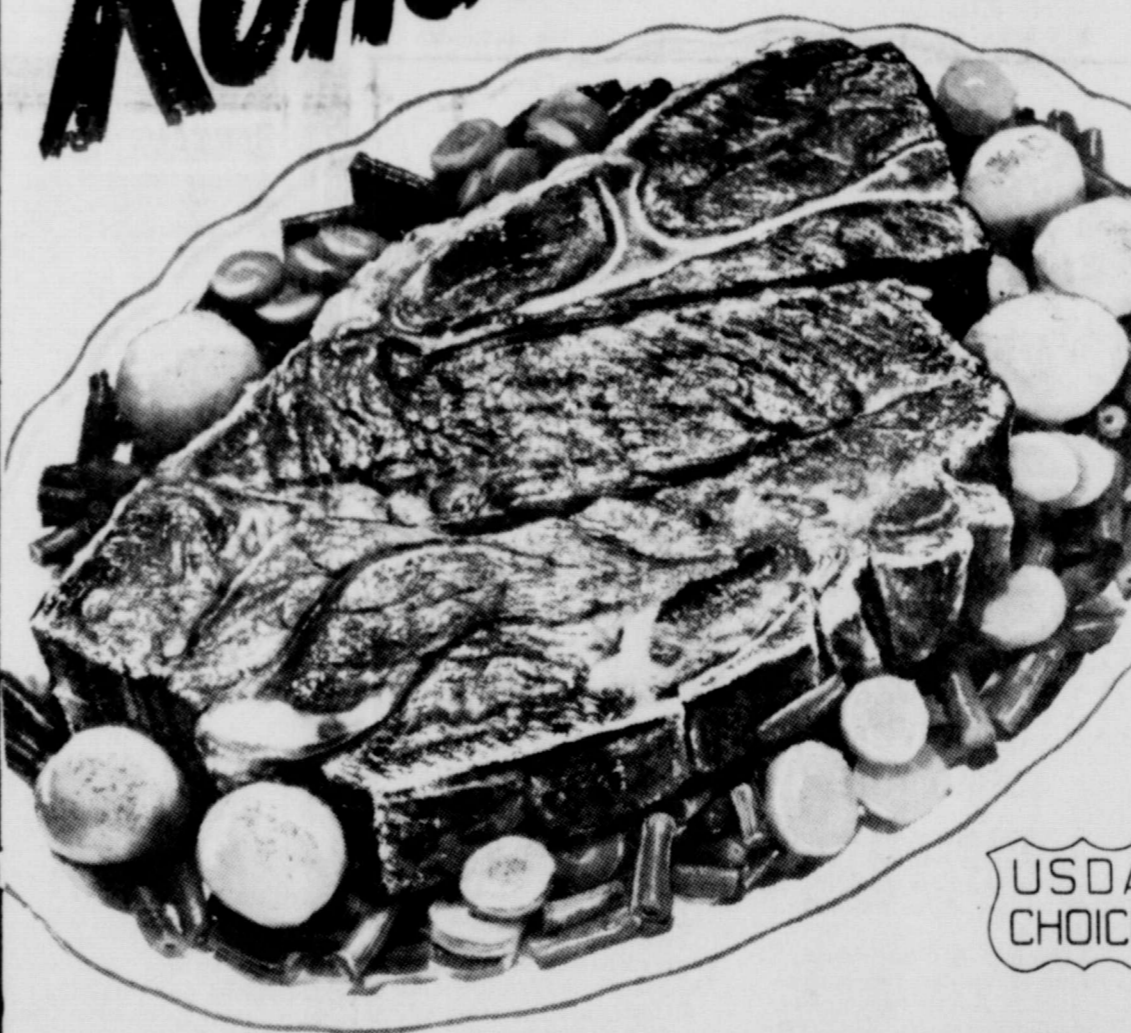

How did you celebrate "Earth" week? We heard a lot about it over radio and TV but I wonder if anyone did much in the way of cleaning up their premises, to help beautify what part of the "earth" belongs to them? Last week was clean up week in Spearman but not much of this went on in my neighborhood. City Manager Darce Foshee said that people didn't seem to cooperate this year with clean-up week as in years past. This is too bad for Spearman could really use some beautification. It is very discouraging however, to get your property all spruced up if your next door neighbor doesn't go along too.

We returned the past week end from a few days spent in Denton and Wise counties, Texas. I believe that the first time I've been there in time to see spring in full bloom and it is a very beautiful sight. The road-sides and fields were a mass of bloom with Texas Bluebonnets, Roses and flowering shrubs were abundant and the county side was green, green, green. It rained three inches while we were there and this goes a long way toward making the country beautiful. It must be nice to live in a climate where you don't have to turn your hand to get flowers and gardens to grow. Everything there looks like one huge hothouse. There's one big draw back. It is HOT. I guess you have to suffer some to

have things beautiful. Ran across a good idea for some civic group. . . a money making project which could help beautify the countryside. The Adolph Coors Co., Golden, Colo., has instituted a "cash-for-cans" program which is helping buy many much needed things in a Colorado town. And recently Tulsa, Okla., jumped on the band wagon and members of the Delta Theta Chi civic sorority there spend each week end scouring outlying city streets, country roads and parks for empty beer cans. More than 306,200 pounds of aluminum cans--more than seven million of them--have been turned into Coors distributors in 11 western states in only three months. That amounts to \$30,620 paid out by Coors at its established rate of 10 cents a pound for aluminum containers.

Adolph Coors Company of Golden, Colo., feeds the cans into a shredding machine and this is sent to Reynolds Metal Company plant in Alabama for recycling.

Just think, that foil you wrap around Sunday's roast may have at one time been an old beer can laying along side the road. Collecting these cans would be a good project for someone I should think.

The new generation is getting very concerned about the destruction of natural resources, pollution, beautification, etc. It is about time I would say, to become real concerned about this old earth. We take it for granted and more and more of it is wasting away daily, in more ways than one. A major portion of it is being covered over with cement and asphalt . . . and become a pile of junk. And it takes a mighty large piece of land just to stack wrecked autos. Too bad these can't be fed into a shredder and made into something useful.

The May issue of Farmer-Stockman magazine reprinted a 30 year old letter from an imaginary Indian who scorned the waste of white man. The letter was originally written by O.E. Enfield of Arnett, Oklahoma as an entry in a contest conducted by the magazine. Readers were invited to write a story to go with two photographs: one of a dilapidated farmhouse, the other of an eroded field.

### Enfield's letter follows:

"Both pictures show white man crazy. Make big teepee. Plow hill. Water wash; wind blow soil. Grass gone, land gone, squaw too. Papoose gone. No chuck-away, no pig, no corn, no cow, no hay, no pony. Indian no plow land. Keep grass. Buffalo eat. Indian eat buffalo. Hide make teepee, make moccasin. Indian no make terrace, no build dam. All time eat. No hunt job, no hitch-hike, no ask relief. No shoot pig. Great Spirit make grass. Indian no waste anything. Indian no work. White man heap loco."

### FRANK BUTCHER NOMINATED FOR CHEMISTRY AWARD

Mr. Frank Butcher, Spearman High School, is among twenty-eight high school chemistry teachers who have been nominated for the Outstanding Chemistry Teacher Award jointly sponsored by Texas Chemical Council and Manufacturing Chemists Association.

All public and private Texas high schools were invited to make nominations. Selection of a winner will be announced in May.

Mr. David L. Rooke of Freeport, acting president of Texas Chemical Council, said the annual award program is sponsored by Texas Chemical Council as a means of recognizing the outstanding work chemistry teachers are doing in the state's high schools.

The winner will receive suitable citations, medal, and a cash award of \$400 (\$200 each from TCC and MCA).

The judging committee will consider such factors as classroom enthusiasm and initiative; ability to interest students in chemical courses and chemical careers; development of new ideas or new devices for teaching; extra-curricular activities in the school and community to awaken an interest in chemistry; and continuing effort to keep abreast of latest developments in chemistry, both academically and professionally.

This marks the sixth year

that TCC and MCA have sponsored the Outstanding Chemistry Teacher Award Program in Texas. Winner of the first award in 1965 was Mrs. Elaine W. Ledbetter of Pampa High School, Pampa, Texas. The 1966 winner was Mr. Jesse A. Dorrington of Clear Creek High School, League City, Texas; the 1967 Winner was Mr. Gary A. Atwood of Bryan Adams High School, Dallas, Texas; the 1968 winner was Mr. Gilbert Boyer of Brazosport High School, Freeport, Texas; and the 1969 winner was Mrs. Frances K. Means of Eastwood High School in El Paso.

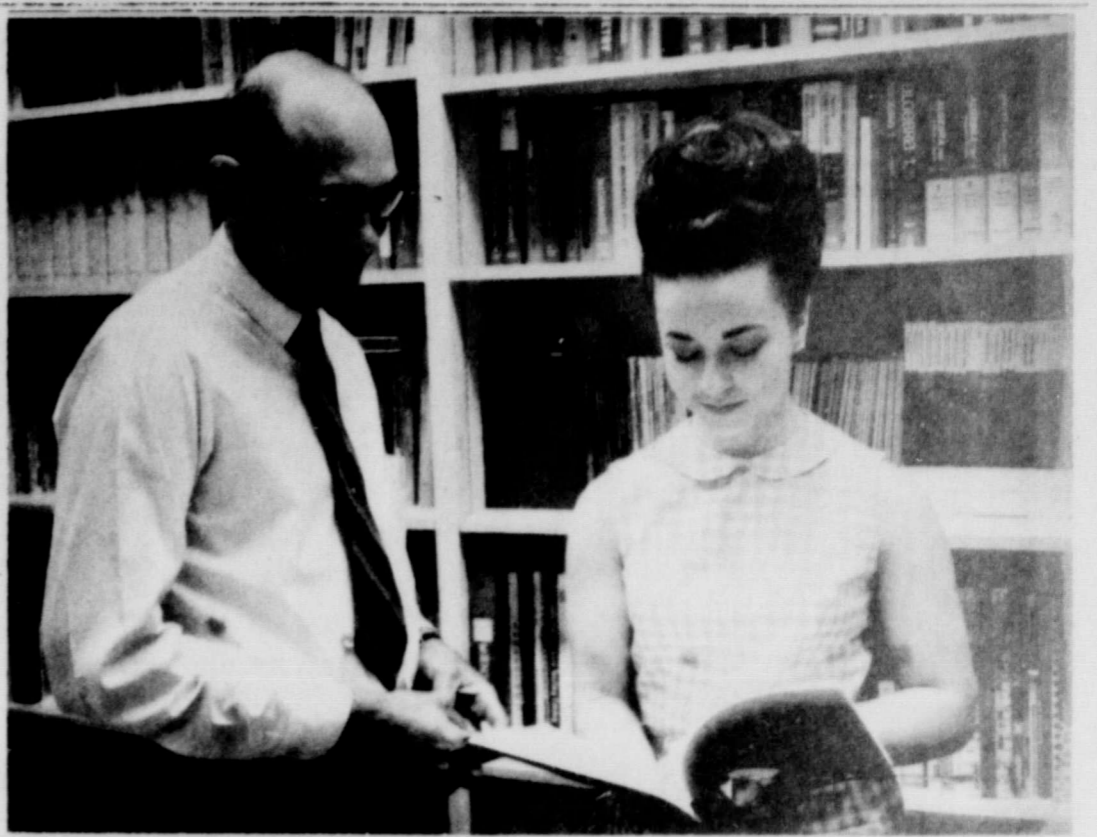
Miss Jackson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Jackson of Spearman. She plans to study medicine following graduation from high school.

### Texans Face Auto Insurance Increase

AUSTIN--Texans may face another auto insurance rate increase unless traffic accidents in the state are reduced by 140,000 in 1970, a leading insurance industry spokesman here said Wednesday.

Expressing overall support for Gov. Preston Smith's traf-

fic safety program, F. Darby Hammond, Executive Director of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service (SIIS), said additional measures were needed to strengthen the Governor's plan and reduce the carnage on Texas highways. He said the present program was not extensive enough to achieve this purpose.

"We must face our total responsibility regarding the terrible human losses suffered

chures to be included with each set of new license plates.

Outlining eight points in his letter to the Governor, Hammond said the SIIS improvement plan would require no additional legislation for implementation. He said inclusion of the SIIS recommendations would help bring much closer to reality the massive reduction of auto accidents necessary to hold the line on auto insurance rates.

The SIIS plan calls for:

1. A program of more intensive enforcement of traffic laws by the DPS and local police;
2. A driver information program aimed to promote improved driving skills and better knowledge of traffic regulations;
3. A program to urge all judges in traffic cases to take a harder line on all violators;
4. An evaluation of the Texas traffic courts;
5. A call for the Attorney General to instruct judges to stop granting stay orders that allow violators of the financial responsibility law to drive, and to deny occupational licenses to those with more than three traffic violations in three consecutive years;
6. Impounding the autos of those arrested for driving while intoxicated;
7. Encouraging expanded coverage in the media on improving driving habits and on traffic safety; and;

### CENSUS ASKS "WERE YOU COUNTED?"

Were you counted in Census '70?

With the 1970 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Manager R. L. Butler announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

If you think you or your family might have been missed, you are urged to notify the census district office by means of a "Were You Counted?" form. Area newspapers are printing these forms in their current editions as a public service. Prompt mailing of the "Were You Counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures giving the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the District Manager is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued from Washington later this year after returns have been tabulated by the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the District Manager. He

pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next Federal census.

"Representation in the U. S. Congress and the State Legislature is determined by the population count as ascertained in the census. Federal funds are allotted to States and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means under representation in the Federal and State law-making bodies and under allotment in government funds. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," he said.

### Rare Goose Seen In South Texas

ROCKPORT--An unusual visitor to South Texas, a red-breasted goose, has been seen and his identification verified on the Punta Del Monte Ranch in Kenedy County, eight miles north of Raymondville.

The red-breasted is considered a European goose and normally winters on the grassy steppes. He is found as a vagrant across Europe to Britain, France, Sweden and Iceland. It is believed that this is the first verified observation of the red-breasted goose in South Texas.

Four trained wildlife field men, J. L. McDougald, District Law Enforcement Chief; W. H. Gooch and D. L. Powell, Game Management Officers, all of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and Jerome S. Smith, U. S. Game Management Agent, made the observation.

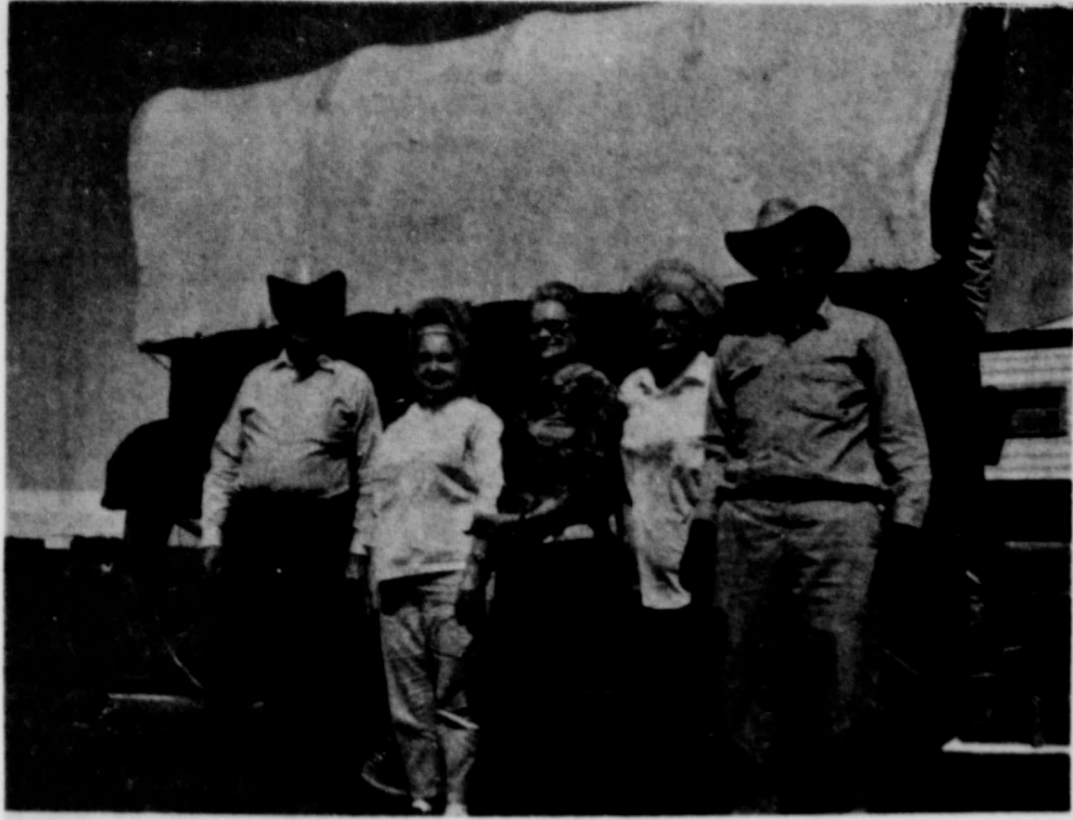

### ROLLING PLAINS MULE TRAIN PREPARING FOR TRIP TO GUYMON FOR CELEBRATION

It was early afternoon Tuesday afternoon April 28, 1970 when activity started on the rodeo grounds in Spearman. A passing stranger might have thought the area had reverted to the Old West but local people in the know realized it was the beginning of a rally of the famous Rolling Plains Mule Train.

Members of the club were setting up camp for the night before departing on their first major journey of the year.

Wednesday morning at the stroke of eight, Wagon Master Earl Riley gave the starting signals and the wagons started to move.

They will take a noon break to coffee up and water the mules after which they will proceed to the Mark Vantine ranch on Frisco Creek, eight miles South of Guymon. Entertainment will be in order tonight when the riders of the mule train will welcome square dancers from Texhoma, Booker, Guymon, Spearman and Gruver. Music will be provided by the Ridge Runners String Band along with Red Dinker and his Jeans and Jans.

The wagons roll out again Friday morning at seven and stop at the Colonial Inn in Guymon for coffee time.

Later on, they will be escorted to a point on Main Street. The escort will consist of the Guymon police and the Texas County Sheriff's posse. They will meet the Elkhart Trail Riders at that time and put on a 30 or forty minute program.

A group of visitors touring Swift and Company will be on hand for this entertainment. These visitors are from the East Coast and this will be their first opportunity to come face to face with Texas mules although they have probably seen Jack Asses in their part of the country.

The Rolling Plains Mule Train will then go to the Fair grounds where they will be treated to a barbecue. They will set up camp on the old football practice field South of the Fair building where pens will be provided for the mules. The members will dine, Friday night at 6:30 in the Dale Hotel Coffee Shop.

An early breakfast will be held Saturday morning with the Old Timers in the Ideal Food Store after which the travelers will hitch up for the parade.

One of the big events of the trip will be Friday night when the Rolling Plains members will be guests at the R. C. A. Rodeo.

### Panhandle Important Area for Game

AUSTIN--The rugged and rolling Texas Panhandle is experiencing growth as a major game-producing area of the State.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials point out that nine important game birds and animals in the 33-county Panhandle area have either remained stable in population or have extended their range dramatically in recent years.

Mule deer, white-tailed deer, pronghorn antelope, turkey, aoudad sheep, ring-neck pheasant, lesser prairie chicken and bobwhite and blue quail are found in many of the counties and all have a considerable economic impact.

Department project leader Dick DeArment of Wheeler reports that the white-tailed deer herd has done well, with some unusually large animals harvested recently.

A total of 1,337 pronghorn antelope have been killed in six Panhandle counties from 1965 through 1969.

Aoudad sheep released in the Palo Duro Canyon have increased from an original herd of 44 in 1957 to an estimated 600 in seven counties.

Ringneck pheasants are reported to be extending their range, and increases in the lesser prairie chicken population have been sufficient to allow limited open seasons in the past three years.

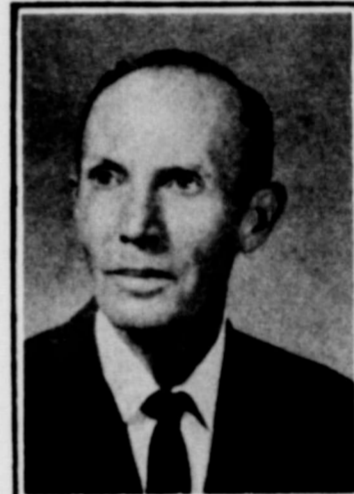



Bake (350° F.) an hour and 10 minutes or until done.

The Alabama and Coushatta Indians feel there is a right way and a wrong way to do things. They feel that the "Sit-Ins", "Demonstrations" and "Marches" are the wrong way. Last week the Chief, Fulton Battise, used the right way to get the job done.

Recently the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation made a presentation to the Economic Development Administration in Austin requesting loans and grants so that they could develop their tourist business to provide enough jobs and revenue to make the Reservation self-sufficient.

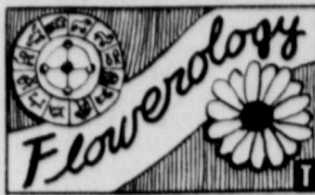
It was felt the proposal had merits but was not favorably received, so Chief asked the Texas Indian Commissioner, Dempsey Henley; the Polk County Judge, Peyton Walters and the Indian Reservation Supt., Walter Broemer to accompany him to Washington, D.C., where he could make his needs known by the proper persons. The Chief and his dele-

gation met with Senators Ralph Yarborough and John Tower, with Congressman John Dowdy, George Bush and Bob Eckhardt. The Chief was especially pleased when Senator Tower said "I will help you" and encouraged by the fact that Congressman Bush decided to visit the Reservation with a delegation to see first-hand his peoples needs.

Senator Yarborough is an honorary member of the Tribes and periodically visits the Reservation. Congressman Eckhardt is planning to bring a delegation to the Reservation also.

Chief believes that this is the way a democracy should work. He stated, "we come to Washington because you are our elected representatives and we have faith that you will help us. We do not believe groups should demonstrate as is now happening. We feel these matters should be taken to our leaders and let them help us. We ask only for help to help ourselves,

not for a hand-out". Texas' only Indian Reservation near Livingston has started a prosperous tourist business on a direct loan from the Small Business Administration and local Banks, but needs more loans to enlarge the business. The land cannot be used as a collateral for loans so the Tribes are asking Federal Agencies to make unsecured loans and grants for the project.


