





'Copters Don't Fall, They Go Safely, Down

Mike Crawford enjoys his "choppers."
"They don't just fall out of the sky, as most people think if an engine fails," he declared this week. "They can make it safely to the ground, free-wheeling."
This veteran helicopter pilot knows his job well. He runs an aerial spraying firm in Spearman, with headquarters three miles north of town, where he bases his two

used Hughes Tool Co. helicopters.
His operation includes a mobile truck unit, complete with landing pad. He can go anywhere and send up his choppers, then refuel them amazingly fast and send them up again.
He and his other pilot, Jack Yoder, also a veteran, fly their 'copters at a speed of 60 miles-per-hour. They hover along a row crop, too,

when such action is called for.
He claims the maneuverability of his aircraft is an advantage over fixed-wing aerial spray aircraft.
"It's fascinating work," Crawford said of his work. "We're just getting started. Started in April. He and Marvin Jones, his partner, think a bright future is ahead for the helicopter spraying business."

Crawford added, "Right now we concentrate on the local three-county area--but we hope to expand; we can go anywhere."
Operations of the business include running pipeline (looking for breaks in oil and gas company pipelines) and possibly aerial mosquito spraying over cities or farms where irrigation ditches breed the pests.
Both pilots are Vietnam war veterans.
Crawford during his stay overseas flew scouting missions in the fast, small Bell H-13 'copters. He got used to being shot at while he searched out enemy positions, gun emplacements and troop concentrations on scouting forays.
"I was real lucky," he said the other day. "Only took two hits on my ship in the year I was there. Yoder was not quite as lucky; he

was shot down, twice."
Scouting is perhaps the most dangerous of air warfare activities in Vietnam. No fighter cover. Pilots are alone and vulnerable to enemy fire.
"We went up against pretty bad odds," he said matter-of-factly.
But those days have gone, and now he and fellow pilot Yoder are happy to "cover an acre every 15 seconds" while spraying with their 'copters.
Helicopter spraying, he further pointed out, is a relatively new technological innovation. "Helicopter spraying began only in 1963," he noted.
Crawford is well-qualified to run his operation. He started flying in high school, and took ROTC flying training in college at West Texas State University. He spent two years total flying in Vietnam, returning from service

with the U. S. Army in 1966. He and his crew feel now-days just as they did in Vietnam--that they're performing a valuable and needed service on the High Plains.

Soybean Futures Reported

Hansford County farmers dealing with or contemplating planting of soybeans were happy to hear of a 17-cent-per-bushel advance in soybean futures this week on the Chicago Board of Trade.
At the close, nearby options were under strong selling pressure but there was some strength in the new crop months.
Corn and wheat futures closed generally lower than previously. And Oats and rye also were on the weak side along with soybean meal and oil.
Strong buying activity in soybean, corn and wheat pits sent prices sharply higher within minutes after the opening.
Soybeans advanced 4 and 1/4 cents; corn, 2 3/8 cents and wheat 1 1/2 cents. From these levels soybeans then slid nearly 8 cents while corn came down 2 cents and wheat 3 1/4 cents.

Cattle Feeding To Benefit Hansford Area

With the cattle feeding industry booming as it is in the Hansford County area, new businesses cannot help but follow, bringing needed dollars to Spearman and Gruver businesses.
That's the prediction of ranching fold and big-city businessmen alike.
Spearman Chamber of Commerce spokesmen report there is a definite "need for additional packing plant capacity in the Spearman area."
Spearman, officials point out, "has all the resources necessary to support additional facilities of the industry... plentiful water, ample feed grains, excellent transportation facilities, favorable tax structures, and an ideal climate."
The county has, for instance some 380,476 farming acres; 12,000 dry-land milo acres; and 107,000, irrigated acres; among other advantages.
Area killing capacity includes packing plants in Guymon, Amarillo, and Pampa. Three are located in Amarillo. Yearly capacity for the county is 394,450.
The county is "smack in the middle" of the booming feed-lot industry--one which virtually sprang up in the Texas Panhandle overnight, during the past few years.
Chamber of Commerce leaders at the moment are seeking ways to bring meat-packers to Hansford County.
Should they succeed--and hopefully they will one day--new families, jobs and dollars would flow into the county.

Accent on Health

Are the so-called "childhood diseases" limited only to children and do adults have an immunity to them? Not so, says the Texas State Department of Health. The childhood diseases are a myth. The fact is that these diseases are so contagious among children that most people have had them by adulthood and thereby have developed immunity. But adults can and do catch them, and when they do they are sometimes much sicker than children. Two of these so-called childhood diseases--mumps and German measles (rubella)--have special dangers for the adult patient. Mumps can be damaging to both adult men and women, and German measles, when occurring in the early part of pregnancy, can result in damage to the unborn child. A new vaccine may eventually lead to the eradication

of German measles, but there is a danger until all women in the child-bearing years have been immunized against it. So, if you are exposed to any "childhood" disease and believe you have never had it, ask your doctor what you can do to protect yourself. It is extremely important that you and your children keep protection against smallpox up to date. True, the absence of smallpox in this country has led to a lack of public concern about this serious disease, and large segments of the adult population are unvaccinated or require boosters. In some parts of the world smallpox continues to be a serious problem. If just one single undetected smallpox case should be introduced into a U.S. community, it could touch off a serious epidemic. Is it true that a baby is protected by his "natural immunity" acquired from his mother? Some of a mother's natural or acquired immunities, if any, can be passed on to her unborn infant as her blood courses through the placenta that nourishes him, but this inherited immunity

remains effective for only a short time. In the case of whooping cough, a highly contagious disease that is especially dangerous and often fatal for small babies, there is evidence that immunity is only occasionally passed on. Every parent, advises the State Health Department, should plan an immunization program beginning at six weeks of age against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, poliomyelitis and smallpox. Booster shots to maintain complete protection should follow at prescribed intervals throughout childhood and, in the case of certain diseases, well into adult life.
