C flight was won by Bill Gray, Perryton who shot an 81; 2nd place went to Sam Robinson, Booker, with an 85; third place went to Gene Head, Perryton with an 86.

The D flight was won by E. J. Copeland, Spearman, with an 89; Bob Doffer, Chief of Police of Perryton won 2nd with a 90; Tony Hester of Spearman was third with a 91.

Eight golfers from Gruver entered the tourney and Bus Sims, tourney chairman, was extremely proud of these West Hansford County golfers. The golfer coming the greatest distance to play was Tommy Short, Alpine, Tex. Tommy shot a 33 in his first round on the fine Hansford Club course.

Porter Randall Here Aug. 27



Are all Russians Communists? How "popular" is Communism with the Russian citizen? How does the economy of Russia compare with the economy of the United States? These are some of the questions Porter Randall will answer in his "Reporter's Report on Russia" after 50 Years of Communism" when he appears in the Spearman High School Auditorium on the evening of August 27.

Mr. Randall will also be taking his audience on a trip to East Africa by way of a photographic safari in his film "Africa Safari". The "Dean of Newscasters in the Southwest" has made more than 50 journeys overseas to such places as the Holy Lands, the South Seas, the Orient, Asia, South America, Russia, Scandinavia, and Eastern Europe. Of all his travel adventures he favors the photographic safari through East Africa... a tour which he directs nearly every January. He is currently planning five more tours for travel abroad in the year ahead.

Porter Randall's own travel films on both movie and 35 millimeter slides are shown nearly every night of the year in schools, civic clubs, and churches. He averages about 200 personal appearances each year. Following his appearance in Spearman he will make another Friday evening in Hereford.

Mr. Randall is one of the most sought-after speakers and lecturers in the South. In addition to his travels and personal appearances, he maintains a regular newscast schedule, three times daily, on the Texas State Network.

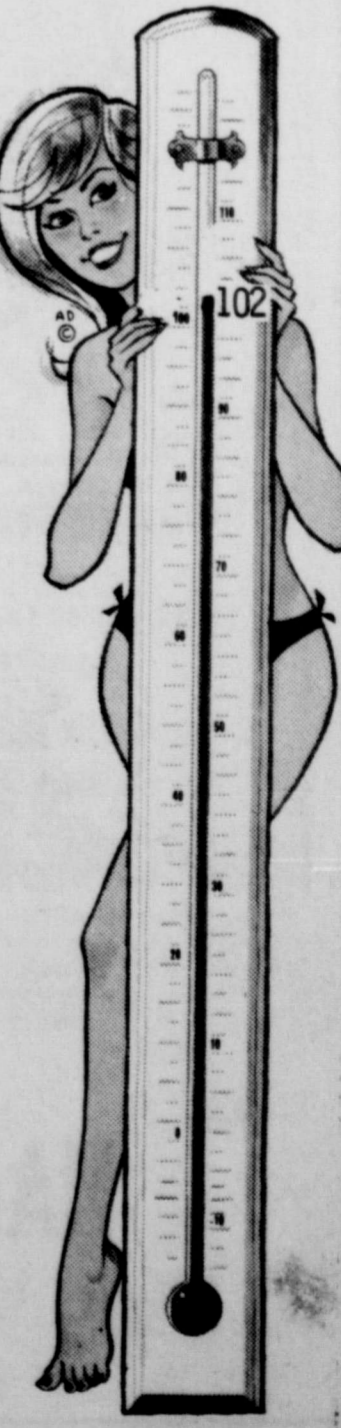
BLOODMOBILE IN GRUVER SEPT. 2

STORM STRIKES AREA SATURDAY

A heavy rain, accompanied by high winds, and lightning, struck Spearman at 4:30 p. m. Saturday. A total of 1.10 inches of rain fell, as a squall-like cloud stopped over Spearman, causing some damage in the area.

The A & W Root Beer lost part of their awning during the storm. Irvin Davis reported that six light bulbs were burned out by lightning, and two fires, one at Dedmon residence, and one at Gordon Cummings residence, were apparently caused as direct results of the lightning.

The Dedmon home had "hot conduit" in the garage after the storm, and luckily someone saw the smoke, and the Spearman fire Dept. arrived on the scene, in time to keep the hot wires and conduit from burning the house down.

Sunday morning, at 10:15 the Cummings residence also began to smoke, and this apparently was caused by lightning damage to the electrical system at the house.

Superintendent James Cunningham said that lightning hit so close to his residence on South Bernice, "it turned on my television set" and we couldn't get it off. Finally had to un-plug the set. Also, temporary in-ruption to the TV Cable system, just before the Cowboys football game Saturday evening sent football fans into "minor shock", but TV cableman Goodheart came through in plenty of time to get TV to his customers.

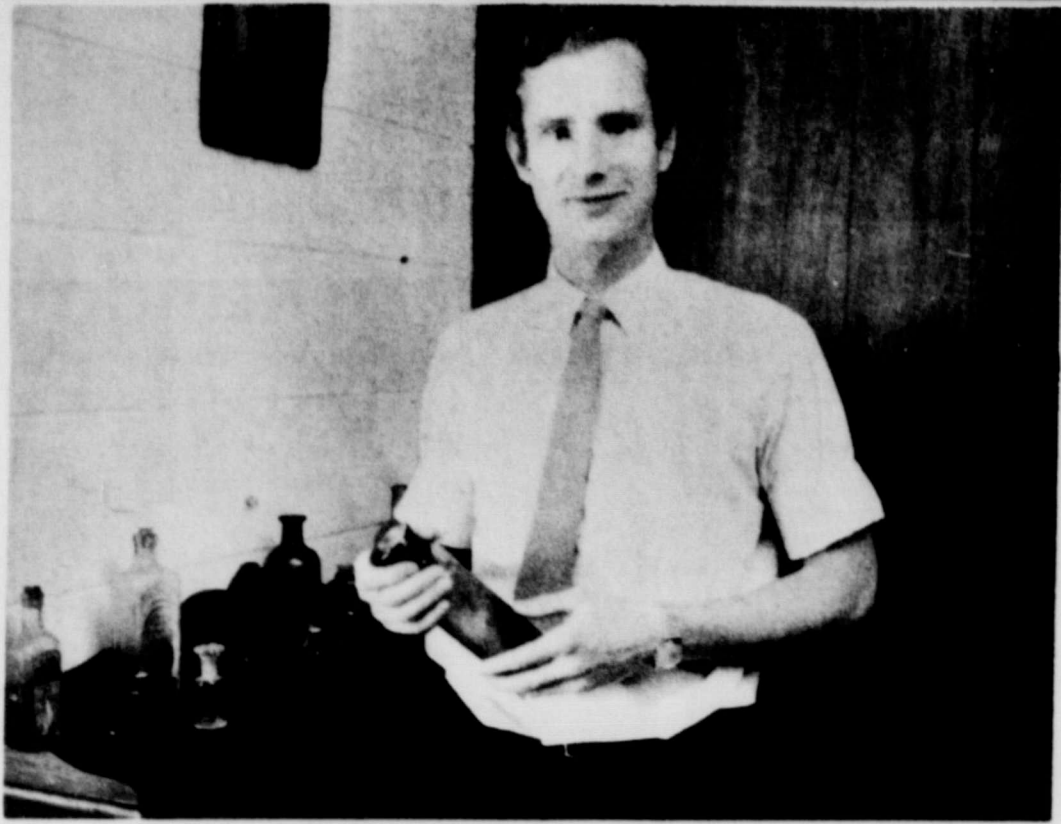

English Student Working Here

David Ashton, 24 years old, of Manchester, England is enjoying a 6 month apprenticeship working with the doctors of the Panhandle Veterinary Clinic. David has been working with Dr. Rinker and Dr. Latta in Spearman. He always wanted to come to the states and this opportunity arose whereby he could take his ap-

prenticeship and of course he jumped at the chance. He is now attending Cambridge University Veterinary School. He is taking a full 6 year course and will be a senior this year. He likes all phases of the work and has not decided for sure whether to major in small animals, or

another phase of veterinary medicine.

David says that farming in England is much more intense than in this country. Their wheat averages about thirty "heavy hundred-weights" per acre. A heavy hundred is 112 lbs., or the equivalent of

55 bushels per acre here. In England, the counties pay all tuition for students who are accepted in the universities. Of course, it is different here, as most parents can tell you. David thinks cowboys are really keen, and he also enjoys the cattle sales, or auctions. But he says, "I can't understand the auctioneer." Probably the thing that impressed him as much as any-

thing was the feedlots in the area. In describing the feedlots, David says, "acres and acres of cattle, going of into the distance." We enjoyed visiting with this young vet student, and wish for him the best of luck, and hope that he will come back some time, and visit with the cowboys, and farmers in the Hansford County area.

UNION CHURCH HAS NEW PASTOR

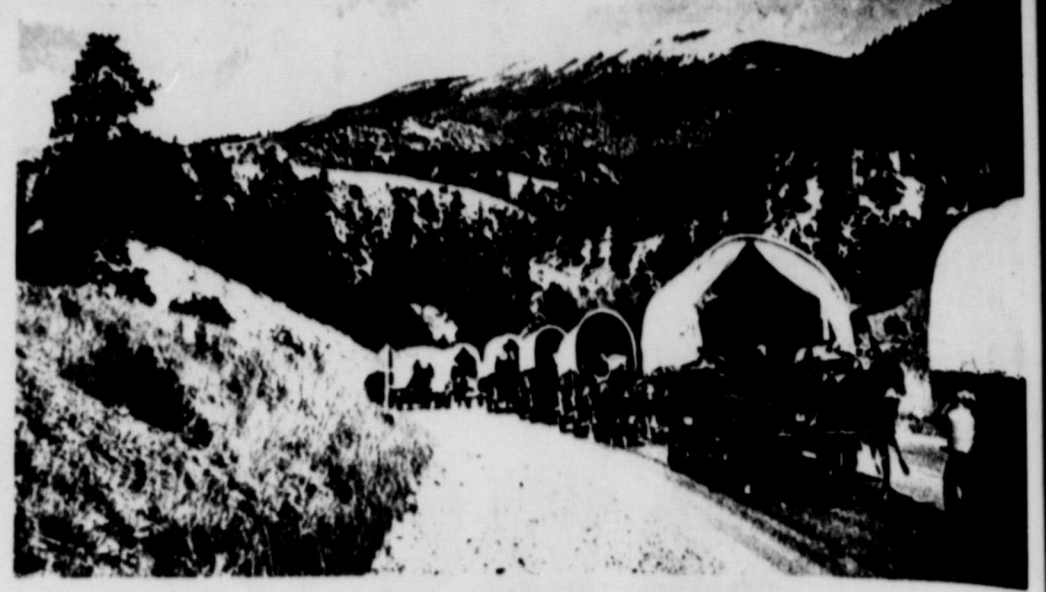
The Union Church at 21 S. Endicott will welcome its new pastor Sunday, August 23, when Rev. Ray Christenson will be in the pulpit.

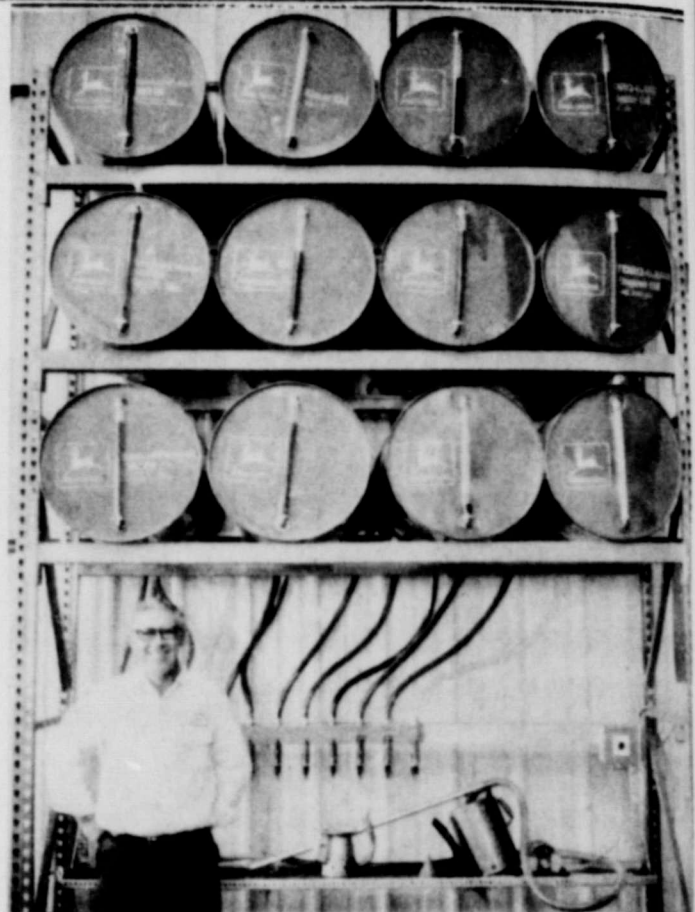
THE ROLLING PLAINS MULE TRAIN, INC.

Get Me See

Jar and bottle collectors all have the same problem. Having been bitten by the bug it is impossible to turn down any good find and you simply have to bring home all those you dig up. So, what to do with all of them?

Ruth Lackey was a collector of old bottles long before her husband, Major, got interested. His collection of figurals are the newer bottles and he went so wild for these that Ruth (for lack of room) had to give up or slack off on the old ones.

I think Jessie Davis would like to collect fruit jars but he swears he never will for they are too large and take up too much room. And I could name dozens of others who are wondering what to do with those they have... and are quite sure they will not stop gathering up more of the same.

Well, thanks to my good friend Sibyl Baley Underwood out Albuquerque way, we collectors can relax because she sent me a clipping which solves our problems of "too many bottles".

We'll simply build another room on our house... out of bottles. And the price lumber is today, we can build this bottle room cheap. And think how colorful it will be!

In the state of Nevada there are several bottle houses still standing. When early settlers came to that parched desert country in quest of gold and other ores, they brought a mounmenthal thirst. And when they finished drinking, they didn't always throw those beer and whiskey bottles away. Some they made houses of.

Bottle houses still survive in the old mining camps, some in remarkable preservation. Many others have vanished, victims of vandals, the elements or survenir hunters. Bottles are building materials. In that country where wood and brick were scarce and expensive, empty booze containers were free, abundant and had many advantages.

Held in place with adobe mortar, they let in the light and kept the occupant warm in winter and cool in summer! The bottles, 12 to 18 inches long, were laid in horizontal rows, one row atop another, packed in moist adobe clay. Most bottle house builders didn't plaster the outside walls but left the bottle ends exposed to admit light.

There was just one "must" in the bottle building biz... put the open end of the inside. The whistling and moaning of the wind in the open necks would drive you crazy. Miners who made the mistake of putting the necks outside quickly came back and plugged them with adobe.

Goldfield still has several bottle houses on its main street, but many others were washed out in floods or destroyed after a fire that burned over 52 blocks back in 1923.

North of Tonopah in Round Mountain, bottles form both ends of a partially underground storage cellar. Silver Peak, west of Goldfield, has a bottle house built into the side of a bank. The bottles were once plastered over, but the material now is weathering away, exposing them.

Nevada's best known specimen is at the ghost town of Rhyolite, beautifully crafted in 1906 by saloon owner Tom Kelly. He used 51,000 bottles. Pale tones of green, blue and amethyst blend with browns and turquoise. The place is still occupied and carefully kept up by owner Tommy Thompson.

See there--doesn't that idea sound interesting? And pretty? So, collect away guys and gals. We will just use all our duplicates to build that bottle house.

Old-time recipes and remedies fascinate me. The following were popular and widely used during the early 1800's, until middle 1900. If you wish to try them, do so at your own risk.

For toothache: The worst toothache may be speedily and delightfully ended by the application of a bit of clean cotton saturated in a solution of ammonia to the defective tooth. Sometimes the late sufferer is prompted to momentary laughter by the application, but the pain will disappear.

If I had a toothache I'd be half tempted to try this just to see what there was about amonia that would make one laugh.. especially in this situation.

Off hand I can think of absolutely NO one who would be in need of treating leanness, but if you fall into the Twiggy group, you might be tempted.

For Leanness: It's caused generally by lack of power in the digestive organs to digest and assimilate the fat-producing elements of food. First, restore digestion, take plenty of sleep, drink all the water stomach will

bear in the morning on rising, take moderate exercise in the open air, eat oatmeal, cracked wheat, graham much, baked sweet apples, roasted and broiled beef. Cultivate jolly people, and bathe daily.

And, finally, here is one of the very earliest recipes for sour dough starter: 1 pound flour, one fourth pound brown sugar, salt, 2 gallons water: boil one hour and bottle when warm. Sometimes yeast cakes were made by mixing the liquid with corn meal and rolling the mixture flat. These cakes were then cut into squares and stored in fruit jars and used as the leavening agent in bread.

The National School Lunch Program was designed by Congress as a means of providing nutritious, reasonably priced lunches to school children. The program contributes to better understanding of good nutrition and improved food habits.

The Type A lunch requirements provide the framework for nutritionally adequate school lunches. Each Type A lunch shall contain as a minimum: one half pint whole milk, two ounces protein rich foods, three-fourths cup fruit or vegetables, one slice enriched bread, one teaspoon butter and other foods needed for energy and to satisfy the appetite. Each lunch is planned to provide one-third or more of the nutrients boys and girls need each day.

Since studies show that Vitamin A and Vitamin C are frequently short in the children's diet, special attention will be given to include a Vitamin C food and Vitamin A food twice each week.

The Spearman Schools have two lunchrooms serving the same Type A menu each day, with a choice of meat items served at the High School lunchroom. Chocolate or plain milk is available at either lunchroom and extra half-pints, other than the one served with the lunch may be purchased by students for 4¢ through the Special Milk Program. Iced tea and ice cream novelties are available for students and faculty at the high school lunchroom.

Prices for school lunches will be: Grades one through four, 35¢; Grades five through eight, 40¢; Grades nine through twelve, 45¢; faculty and visiting adults, 60¢. (No government subsidies for adult lunches.)

Lunchroom tickets are available in 5, 10 and 20 denominations. No price reduction is made when tickets are purchased. Tickets are available at either lunchroom. A refund for the amount of unused lunches on a ticket will be refunded only at the end of school year or when a student is withdrawn from school. There will be no refunds on lost tickets. Present ticket to manager for refund when necessary. High school students may

not "charge" for their lunches --one (1) charge will be permitted in grades one through eight --because of the age of the student.

Tickets for school lunches will be available at the School Lunchroom and Elementary School Building during registration August 20. Parents are encouraged to purchase tickets during registration to avoid waiting in line on opening day.

Spearman's two lunchrooms have sixteen ladies employed--nine full-time employees and seven part time. Mrs. Frank Mach is manager of the Elementary-Junior High Lunchroom and Mrs. John Wilde is the manager of the high school lunchroom. Mrs. J. B. Higgins is supervisor of the School Lunch Program.

School lunch menus will be printed in the Thursday newspaper each week.

Attend Workshop In Hereford

The workshop was sponsored jointly by the Hereford Independent School District, Paso Education Service Center, Region XVI, Amarillo; Texas Education Agency, School Lunch Section, Austin.

Some 230 personnel from the Panhandle and South Plains attended the workshop. Mr. Charles Hicks, Chief Consultant of School Lunch Program, Texas Education Agency of Austin was one of the principal speakers.

Among topics discussed were breadmaking, quantity sandwich making, Time & Work Management, Learning from Labels, Safety in the Kitchen, Weighing and Measuring of Ingredients, Techniques in Food Preparation.

Mrs. Higgins said the workshop was very beneficial.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)

General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)

General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

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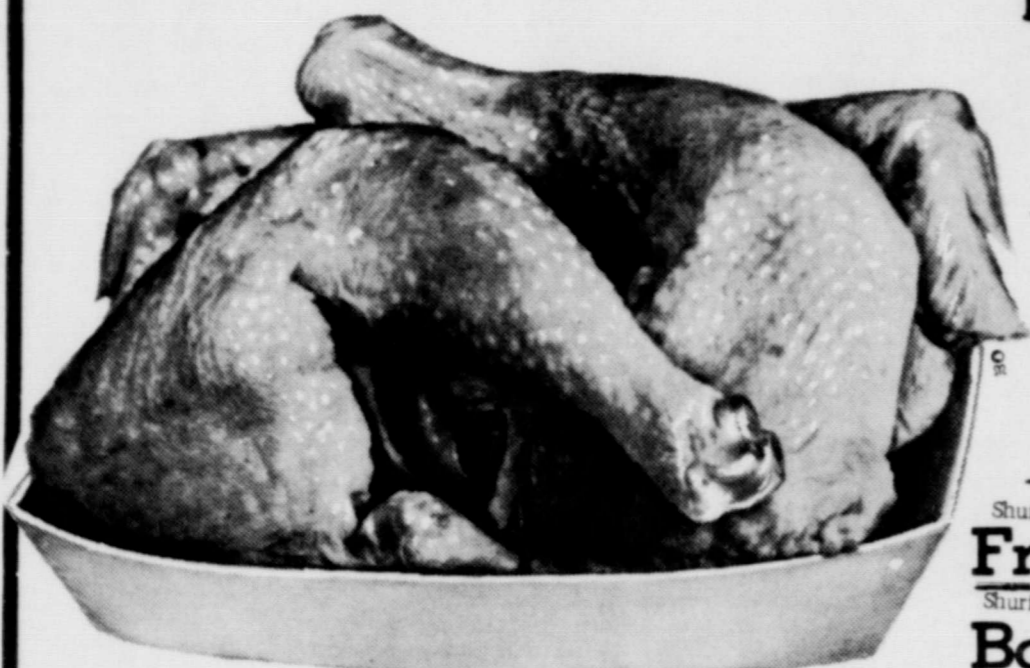
