

Mystery Missile Falls Near Spearman Men, 3:30 Friday!

A double sonic boom, and the sound of an old World War II airplane crashing, was what Bill Douglas and James Umphress heard at 3:30 p. m. Friday. The two were working on a Shamrock lease, 6 miles North of Waka, when the bombardment started.

The extra loud, double sonic boom was heard in Spearman, but the ensuing "whirring" of a crashing airplane was not heard, except near the location where the 89 lb. piece of steel crashed into the ground.

The two men saw a large cloud of dust fly into the air, but never did find the scene of the crash, until Monday evening, when Roland Thurman, came upon the object buried 24 inches in the ground. Roland was walking out a maize row when he found the satellite part. The piece of steel dug a 24 inch deep hole, and apparently was white hot, as it hit the ground. The dirt in the hole, was burned black, and had the appearance of a campfire location. The piece of steel, was 27 inches long, 7 inches wide and 2 inches thick. Each end was burned, and there was a machined-hole in the middle of the piece, where it apparently had been bolted to some other part.

This same freakish thing happened at Pratt, Kansas, Gate, Okla., and Adrian. The government has since identified the pieces as parts of a Russian spy satellite. Others speculate that this is a part of the missile that was fired from Kwajalein, in the Pacific on Friday. The U. S. Air Force and the Federal Aviation Administration have launched an investigation today to determine the origin of the four chunks of metal found in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles and near Platte, Kansas.

The white-hot slabs of metal hurtled to earth Friday in a screaming dive, one-shaped like a cigar and weighing 150 lbs., hitting near an oil well crew about 3:30 Friday near Pratt. This was the same time the one hit near Waka, where the Spearman men were. Several oil field men in the area near Waka thought that road crewmen were blasting the caliche pits nearby, because of the many sonic booms made by the falling object.

The second weighing almost 300 lbs., and producing no less than five "sonic booms" fell just outside Gate, Okla., near Beaver. The third piece weighing near 80 pounds was shaped like a boomerang and looped over the head of Adrian, farmer George Gruhkey. This piece bore a stamped serial number, which has since

been identified as part of a Russian spy satellite.

The fourth piece, of course was the one that fell near Waka.

Kenneth Long, an Oklahoma farmer, said the space fragment zoomed earthward and slammed into the ground digging about a four-foot deep hole. The one near Waka, was about 2 feet deep.

Many area residents near Spearman reported hearing a boom noise followed by one or two more sonic booms, about the time the metal hit the ground Friday afternoon.

This large piece of white-hot steel could have started a fire or destroyed about anything that it hit.

Found 'Guilty' In Beating Death

Mrs. Rosa Navarro, charged with the beating death of her 13 month old son on June 2, was tried last week in Sherman County District Court at Stratford, Texas.

The jury returned a guilty verdict and sentenced the 19 year old mother to five years in the State penitentiary.

An investigation into the incident began June 2 when Mr. and Mrs. Navarro brought Felix Jr. to the Hansford Hospital in Spearman saying the child "had been hurt." The child was pronounced dead at the hospital and an autopsy ordered.

The autopsy, conducted by a pathologist at North Plains Hospital in Bonger, revealed the child died of skull fractures and had sustained numerous cuts and bruises. The initial investigation was

conducted by Hansford County Sheriff J. B. Cooke. Sherman County officials assumed the probe when it was determined the couple lived in Sherman County on a ranch 18 miles southwest of Gruver.

Living in the United States on a resident visa, the couple have two other children, Dora 4 and Felicia, 3.

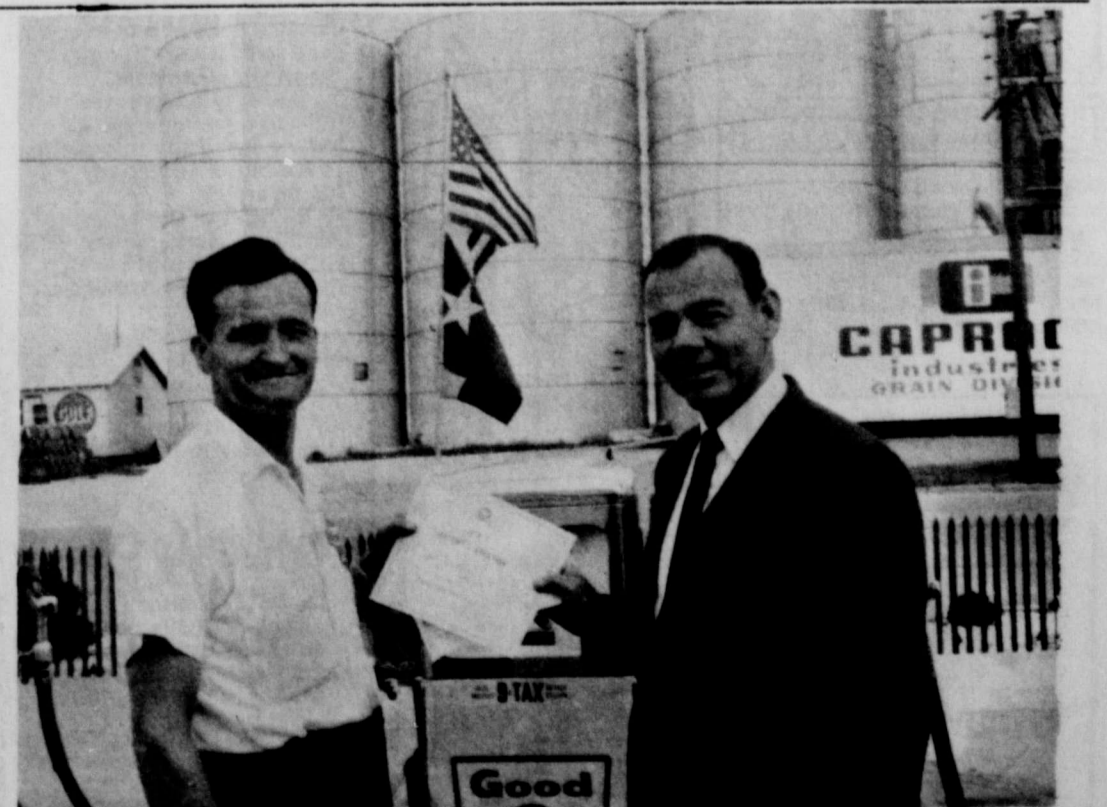
Funeral services for the child were in Hansford County Cemetery June 13.

Mrs. Navarro, who entered a plea of "not guilty" has been, and continues to be held in Hansford County jail quarters because at Stratford no jail facilities are available for women prisoners. The woman is under the care of a physician and this service is not available at Stratford.

The convicted woman's attorneys have 10 days to appeal the verdict.

Government Stops Milk

One thing the federal government is not subsidizing this year is the milk served to Spearman School children.

Until this year, under a Special Milk Program, children have been paying only 4¢ for a half-pint of milk served during a mid-morning break for students in grades one through four.

Congress recently sent the President House Bill 5554, which would extend the authorization for the Special Milk Program. The Bill became a law without the President's signature. In the Bill no appropriations were made available for the Special Milk Program.

Without being subsidized, the school cannot stand the loss. Starting Wednesday, September 2, the price of milk for the Special Milk Program went up to 8 cents per carton instead of four cents. Parents had previously been notified

that the cost would be only 4¢, but special letters were mailed to parents this week by Elementary Principal Allen Alford explaining the change.

All students eating at the school lunch rooms had been able to secure extra milk at the 4¢ price, but from here on it will cost them 8¢.

Lunch ticket prices remain the same. The price affects only extra milk.

Mr. Alford said he did feel that each child should have this milk each day and he felt it the responsibility of parents to write their congressman and let him know their feelings concerning the Special Milk Program.

Operation "Prairie Dog"

All Hansford County farmers & ranchers who are interested in eradicating prairie dogs from their land are invited to attend a special meeting Friday, September 4 at 1:30 p.m. in the county court room in Spearman.

County Agent Robert Adamson announced this week that Mr. Tom Sparks, will be available in this county to help eradicate prairie dogs on Hansford County ranches.

Adamson says Mr. Sparks "does more than control," as he guarantees 100% kill

on these dog towns.

Sparks retired from the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, USDA, recently and entered the prairie dog eradication business. He is a reliable man and will do a good job, according to Agent Adamson.

The charge will be \$4.50 per acre. Sparks furnishes all the poison, labor, etc. He will check the town several times after he treats it. Using carbon disulfide (High Life), Sparks treats each den, covering each hole after treatment so there is no danger to livestock.

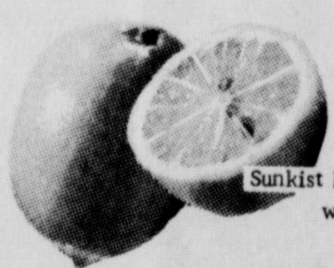
