The Spearman Lynx will open their 1970 football season, at Lynx stadium, m Friday night, at 8 p. m. The Lynx will be hosting the Sunray Bobcats. The Bobcats will be slight favorites to win the game, according to many observers.

This is a non-conference game. The starters for the game will be un-decided until game time. The temporary Lynx roster is printed in this paper.

A summary of the team is printed below.

## Lynx's Lusby Leads Way

Ronnie Lusby leads the experienced Lynx. Lusby, a 6-1, 210 lb. senior was honorable mention all-state tackle last season. A consistent ballplayer, Lusby has been all-district for the past two years. Coach Anthony said "He's a complete defensive ballplayer. He's big, quick, good reactions and likes to hit." That's a lot of compliment from a coach.

Tommy Loveday, at 5-9, 175 and Robert Archer 6-1, 170 pound seniors give additional authority to Spearman's offensive and defensive line. Loveday started at guard last season. Archer made his letter as an offensive end.

Coach Anthony's returnees should give the Lynx the needed experience for the expected three-way battle for the district title. The Lynx's good size, line and running back depth will keep them in the race all the way. A total of eight lettermen return from a strong 1969 team.

Every coach has big question marks before a season opens. Coach Anthony is no exception. Spearman opens against Sunray on September 11 at Spearman. The Lusby led Lynx have five tough games before meeting their first conference foe on October 16 at Phillips.

The first five games could be the proving ground for this strong 1-AA contender. The district title is within their reach.

Fans will remember the classy Bobcat team of last year, and they Cats will once again be favored to whip the Lynx, even though the game is rated a toss-up in most football camps. Complete fun-don on the Sunray team, is printed below:

## Cat's Lean on Defense

The Sunray Bobcats came roaring back in 1969 under the able tutoring of outstanding coach Don Beck. Beck brought Sunray along to a sparkling 9-1 record just missing the district throne room by a scant point. The only loss of the year came at the hands of White Deer, the eventual 1-A king, 7-6.

The Bobcats are back for another title push in 1970. They will count much of their success on how well ten seniors lead the younger 'Cats and if the defense can hold opponents as well as the 1969 troops did. Sunray's stingy defense allowed but 46 points to ten opponents last season. All in all, thirteen lettermen return and of these, four starters both ways can be found. Ricky Keith will be handling the quarterbacking duties. Keith started both ways for Sunray last year. He is 5-10 and weighs in at 171 pounds. Also counted as possible starters in the backfield will be Kerry Cartrite (5-8, 128), Billy Northcutt (6-2, 175), Leslie Teaff (5-10, 157) and Kenny Keisling (5-9, 152).

Two boys will have a battle for the center position, a 5-8, 153 pounder Kent Wright, who will have a slight edge on Gary Sanders (6-2, 177), but only in starting experience.

The guard positions are ably filled by Gary Bain (5-8, 178) Gary Woodall (6-1, 173) and Dale Grave (5-9, 151). Dan Sutterfield will return to a starting role at tackle along with Mark Greer, who moves up to take the departed Allen Mullins place. Mr. Greer indeed has his work cut out for him, but has plenty of size to take care of the job. He is 6-2, 205, and Sutterfield is 6-0, 178. Gary Noble will start at an end position for the Bobcats. Noble is 5-11, 175. The other end position is up for grabs.

If all goes as expected, look for miracle worker Don Beck and his staff of Buddy Sharp, Bud Brock, Tex Nolan, Don Whittenburg and Joe Britt to do their tricks again and come up with the winning formula.

## Snakes Prepare For '70

New coach Jerry Elbert comes to Stinnett from Lubbock where he served as an assistant. Elbert will greet five offensive and five defensive starters when two-a-day workouts begin in August. Elbert lists his weaknesses as experience and size and his strengths as none to be found. However, those who follow Rattler football fortunes are in high hopes that the new coach can find the winning combination.

Among the lettermen coming back are Steve Gary, senior center, Steve Bennett, a 6'5" senior and Coy Johnson, a 6'2" senior end. Dub Pool will anchor a guard position. Pool is a 5'9" senior. Johnson, Pool and Gray are listed as outstanding line prospects for the Maroon and White clad Rattlers this fall.

The backfield will find two familiar faces back in the fold. They are Nathan Sargent and David Shelton. Both stand 5'8" tall and Sargent is a junior, Shelton is a senior. Sargent is listed as an outstanding back prospect for Stinnett.

Look for the Rattlers to improve on their 2-8 records of a year ago.

## 22 More Students Enrolled This Week

With the enrollment of 22 new students since the first day of school, August 24, the student count in Spearman Public schools has reached 1,184.

Some later students may still enroll, but probably not more than half a dozen since Labor Day week end has ended all vacations until Thanksgiving holidays.

A round-up of figures from the schools Tuesday morning showed a total number of 420 students in elementary school, 395 in Junior High and 369 in High School. These figures are compared with August 24 enrollment of 418 in elementary, 386 in Junior high and 358 in High school.

The second grade holds the honors as the biggest class in the entire system with a four grade total of 113 students. Three of the rooms have 28 students, the other one has 29. Second grade teachers include Thelma Vaughn, Jackie Graham, Zetha Blackburn and Fern Robinson. This year a teacher's aid has been added for the 2nd grade. She is Mrs. Patty Abston. The aid for the first grade teachers is Mrs. Betty Uptergrove. These aids assist the teachers with various chores which

would otherwise take them away from class room duties.

Runner-up honors go to the first grade where 108 students are enrolled. The third grade has 101 and the fourth grade has 98.

Largest of the Junior High school classes is the sixth grade with 106 pupils. There are 93 in the fifth grade, 96 in the seventh and 93 in the eighth grade.

The sophomore class in high school is the largest there numbering 105. There are 97 freshmen, 80 juniors and 87 seniors.

The VIP in Spearman High School this year is 90 pound, 5-foot tall Miss Dung Thi Phuong Trinh from Bien Hoa, Vietnam. She is a foreign exchange student, the fourth to attend Spearman public schools, and was brought here under the auspices of the local chapter of the American Field Service.

The Student Council of Spearman High school play the biggest role in securing a foreign exchange student and must pay the greatest amount of her expenses. The majority of the money raised for this project comes from the Halloween carnival sponsored each year by the Student Council.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Lee Uptergrove are Dung's American parents. They met her at the Amarillo airport Thursday evening.

She enrolled for her classes Friday morning.

The American pronunciation for Dung Trinh is Yume Ching. The Vietnamese "D" is spoken as "Y" and the "ng" as an "m". In her family name the "Tr" gets a "Ch" pronunciation, and the "inh" becomes "ing."

Miss Ching says she has long looked forward to studying in America--the land of science and civilization. Her hopes are to become a Doctor or an Engineer and upon completion of her studies, she said, "I will surely use my knowledge to help the Vietnamese people who have long suffered due to a one-fourth century war."

Yume says her best subjects are English and literature, though Government is very interesting to her. She loves to sing and

took chorus in her own school. She is very fond of basketball, but says of the sport "I am not the right size for a basketball player."

She said she has read many books about the United States and its great farming and "had a big dream about coming over to the U. S. and living on a farm."

Miss Ching, whose religious affiliation is Buddhism, is very proficient in the English and French languages. She speaks very good English, but has some difficulty understanding it if the language isn't spoken to her slowly.

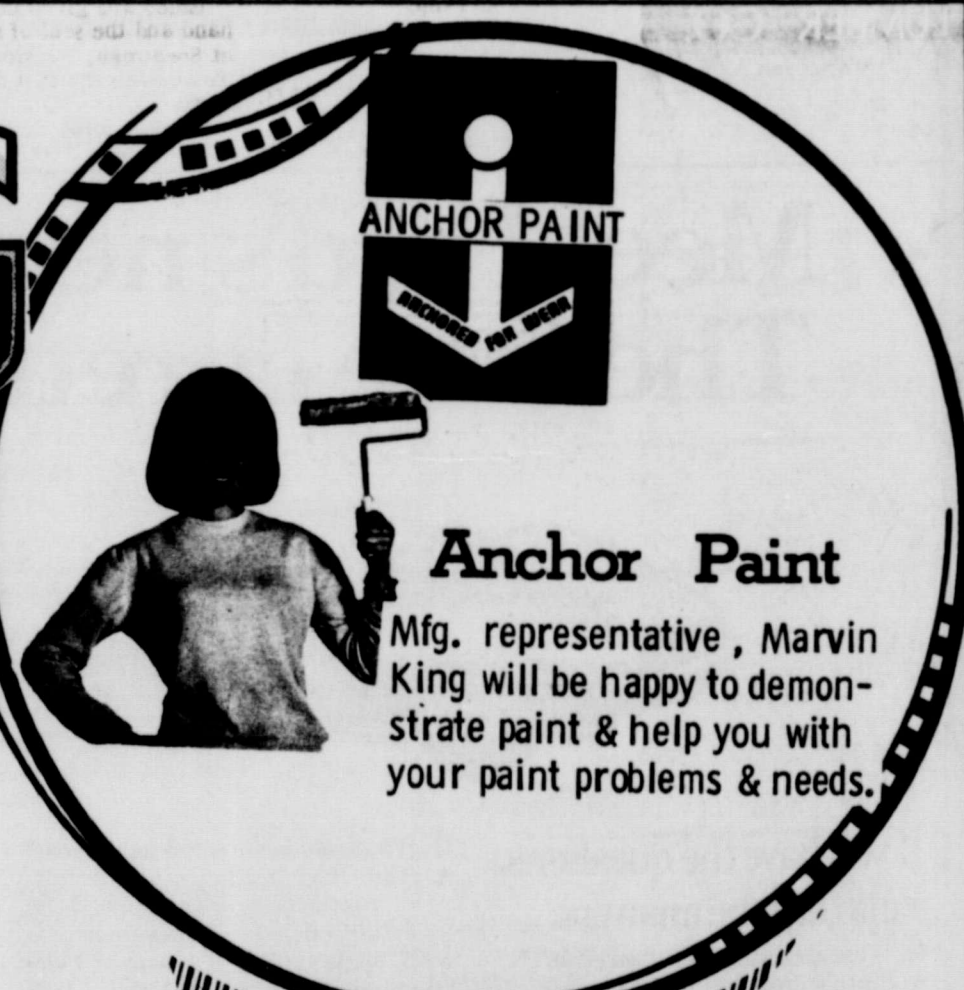

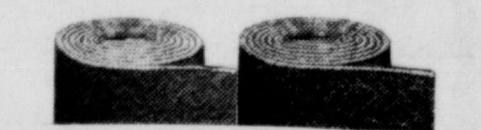

Registration Sept. 8 At Vocational School

The School of Vocational Arts of Amarillo College will continue registration through September 8, 1970. Monday will be a Holiday.

The first day of Registration showed a 27% increase over last year with 352 registrations as compared to 277 for 1969-70 school year.

The greatest increases have been in Air-conditioning and Refrigeration, and in Commercial Electronics both day and night, but substantial increases are indicated in every Skill Program including Welding, Industrial Electronics, Diesel Mechanics, Auto Mechanics, and Vocational Business Classes.

The School is fully approved by the Veterans Administrations and Texas Education Agency for both Day and Night Classes.

4-H'ERS CAN'T BE WRONG ABOUT DOGS

At last count there were over 26,000,000 dogs in the United States, accounting for 40 per cent of the pet population. In fact, the canines are so highly thought of that they have their own week: National Dog Week, September 20-27.

The national 4-H dog care and training program, supported by Ralston Purina Company, last year enrolled 87,000 boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19, according to figures compiled by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Popular with city and suburban youths and rural youngsters as well, the program teaches them to better understand animals, and to become aware of the problems and responsibility of their care and training.

A variety of activities may be undertaken by the young dog fancier. Among them are obedience training, grooming, reading for shows, hunting, health and nutrition, and even teaching young and old dogs new tricks.

The project also develops pride of ownership and leadership among boys and girls who may not otherwise have the opportunity to own other animals.

Volunteer adult and teen leaders, veterinarians, kennel owners and professional dog handlers share their experience and know-how with the 4-H'ers.

Participating in the program certainly is its own reward. But youths who excel also earn honors and nationwide recognition.

How "Red" Got His Name

Everybody knows somebody named "Red." You probably have a friend with that nickname but, if not, there are still plenty of "Reds" you know -- aren't there? "Red" Grange, "Red" Skelton, and "Red" Buttons, for example.

"Red" apparently has been popular as a nickname for a long time. There is extant a very interesting record of a man nicknamed "Red" who lived about 1900 B.C.

This man was called Edom, which in an early Semitic language meant "red." There is some indication that Edom may have had red hair -- but, if he did, that isn't where he got his name.

He was a grandson of Abraham, though his clan was later lost by intermarriage into the Arab nations. Edom became a powerful man. As head of a large tribe of descendants, he ruled a sizable area of southern Palestine around Mount Seir.

Brother Vs. Brother

In spite of his political significance, however, the best known -- and most important -- thing about "Red" was how he got his name.

When "Red" was young, he was a real outdoorsman, a thoroughbred hunter-camper type.

The trouble was that "Red" had a twin brother, who was just as different from "Red" as black from white.

His brother was a mamma's boy. He stayed around the house and yard all day while "Red" went out hunting. A quiet boy, he was just the opposite of his strong and active brother. But what he lacked in strength, he made up in cunning. He was a sly schemer.

Sunday School Lesson for September 13, 1970

As their father grew older, he became increasingly jealous of his older brother's greater rights of inheritance--for "Red" was the first-born of the two and the first-born was entitled to the birthright.

The family was divided -- mother and younger twin, Jacob, against father and older twin, Esau.

The day Esau got his nickname was bad from the beginning. After being out all day on an unsuccessful hunting trip, he returned home, famished and empty-handed, to find Jacob cooking a pot of red soup.

With almost criminal callousness Jacob withheld the food from Esau until he vowed a transfer of his inheritance rights. By this foolish and indifferent selling of his birth rights -- which were as much spiritual as physical -- for a pot of red soup, Esau became known as Edom, that is, "Red."

Change Is Possible

How would you like it if every mention of your name always called to mind the most foolish thing you ever did in your life?

Like it or not, we are named by our actions. Not so clearly as Esau, probably, but just as effectively we develop reputations that stick in people's minds as long as our names do -- sometimes even after our names have been forgotten.

Yet, whatever your birth, family circumstances, economic pressures, or bad decisions have made you into, it can be changed. Lives can be changed, and reputations with them.

The later lives of Esau and Jacob demonstrate this. All it takes is your will and God's power.

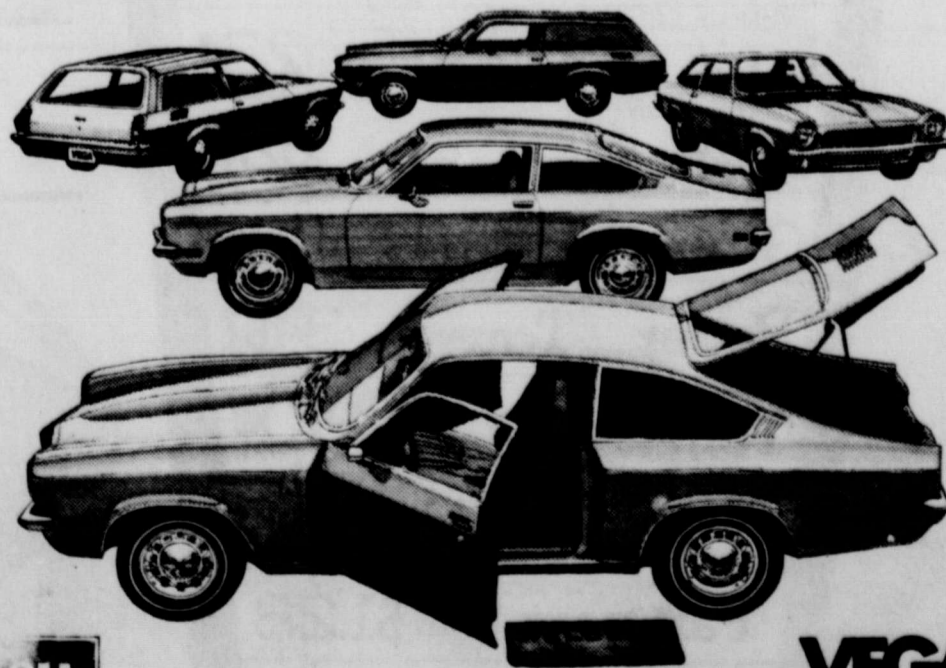

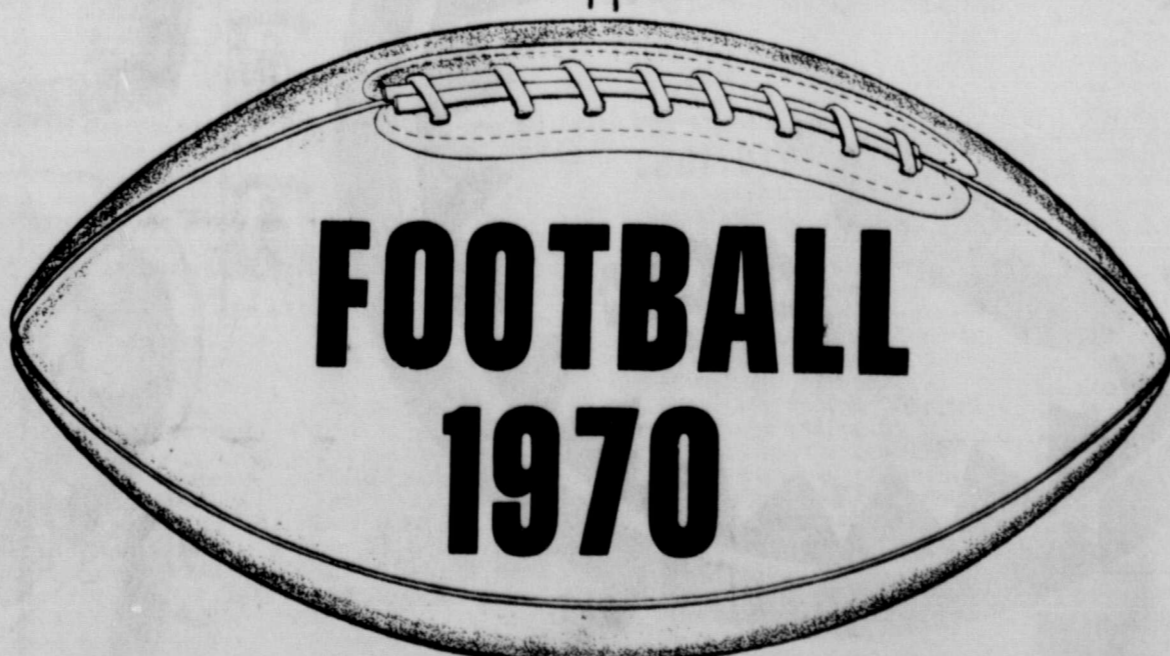
