Everything is ready in Spearman this Friday night, for the game-of-the year, as the un-beaten Wheeler-Dealer Mustangs, meet the un-beaten Spearman Lynx at Lynx stadium, with the kick-off at 8 P. M. Friday night.

Both teams have proven to be much above the average, with Wheeler already showing their bristling backfield, to the tune of victories over Lefors and Wellington. The Lynx have like-wise been impressive in their wins over Sunray and Canyon.

The game shapes up as a battle of the outstanding set of running backs from Wheeler, against the fabulous Lynx line. Even Canyon could only manage 58 yards against the fantastic Lynx line. But, no team has been able to contain the fleet backs from Wheeler. And, this will be the only fast backs that the Lynx have met this year. Although, both Sunray and Canyon did have plenty of power, they did not have a man who could speed past the Lynx, like Wheeler apparently has.

Jimmy Cole, Gary Fisher, and all-state candidate Roy Don Chick, will be in top shape for the Friday night conflict at Lynx stadium. The Lynx will be ready this time, however, and local fans feel that they should win. It just "ain't" possible to penetrate that good old Lynx line most fans think.

Most surprising to the news-men who have been watching the purple Lynx, is their kicking game. The Lynx have a fine kicker in Robert Archer, but the specialty team of sophomores who go down on the kicking team, are even more impressive.

To pick a star from their first two games, would be impossible, as the Lynx have played as a team. Every time a long run has been made, down-field blocking has been precise. In fact, the Lynx seem to be far ahead of their opponents on coaching assignments. That is, they just seem to know their plays to a T.

The Lynx will out-weigh Wheeler, and this could be a big advantage. But, speed and passing is about the only worry any defensive team has. So far this year, however no team has really been effective on their passing, as the Lynx line has completely destroyed the passers. Sunray tried 34 passes on Spearman, and never did threaten, and Canyon only completed one effective pass on the Lynx... so they are pretty good on pass defense. They have yet to be tested on fast backs. The Mustangs will give them that test Friday night.

Wheeler Mustangs gird for another successful season in 1970. New coach Jim Bateman, who takes over for Jake Cottrell, inherits a talented group of backs led by fast stepping Roy Don Chick. Chick stands 6-2 and packs 180 pounds of toughness. He rates as an all-state potential. Chick's running mate is Dave Britt, a locomotive type who can steam over as well as around opposing people. Britt is 5-11 and 180 pounds. Both of these boys are seniors. Also counted upon heavily is Rod Weatherly, a 5-10, 160 pound quarterback.

Leading the way for these powerful backs will be Bill Tucker, a tough 155 pound center. Tucker was all-district in 1969 and is ready for another good season. The guard slots will be filled by Carroll Watson and Noel Glazner. Robert Brickey and possibly Jackie Johnson will be at tackle. End positions are up for grabs. Darrell Hanks, a 6-1, 150 pound junior, Jerry Beatty, a 5-9, 150 pound sophomore and sophomore San Miller, a 5-9, 155 pound swiftie will have a nice battle for a starting position.

Coach Bateman rates speed and size as the Mustangs' weakness, but counters with desire and good backs as strengths, so look out.

Wheeler finished the year in '69 with 7-3 record and 1970 could see the Mustangs finish as well. Look for Wheeler to be in the thick of things in November in District 2-A.

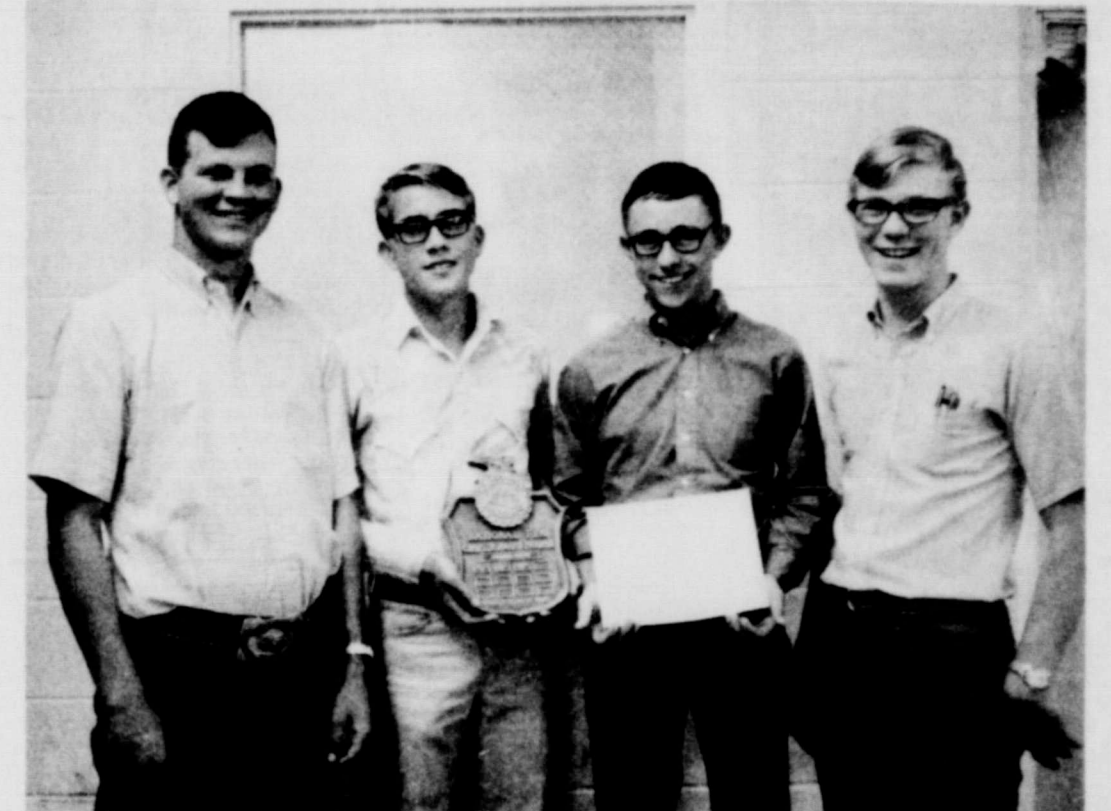
Sheriff Attends Conference

Food for thought . . .

EDUCATION AND THE CHURCH

Read 1 Timothy 4:1-8

"Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations, . . . teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. . . ." Matthew 28:19,20

The church has always been the champion of education. Many of the world's greatest universities were founded by the church. There were times in history when only the church kept the lamp of learning alive.

Today the church has largely abandoned this high calling. It is to be commended for having promoted other agencies of education, but it is tragic that the church itself is defaulting her Lord's command to go out into the world and teach.

Everything the church attempts, must begin with education. Evangelism is her chief task, but "faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes by the preaching of Christ." (Romans 10:17) Faith consists first of all in certain knowledge. A person has to know what he believes in.

Besides this, any worthwhile program of reform or improvement has to be preceded by instruction. There is the classic story of a man who mounted his horse and rode off wildly in all directions, which is an apt picture of the church's frenzied horsemanship when she tries to do something without having a Bible-based goal or direction. Activism without principle or purpose is as futile as a witch's dance, and it is just about as pitiful as the uncontrolled movements of a drunken man.

If the church expects to get anywhere, or even stay alive, she must get back to systematic and sustained study of God's Word: not just on Sunday in divine worship, but during the week by means of such instruction as classes in doctrine. The so-called Sunday school ought to be worthy of its name—a place for learning the Scriptures, rather than an hour of religious entertainment.

Prayer

O God, revive Thy church. It has tried to be all things to everybody, and is in danger of being nothing to anyone. Help her to mind her own business, the business of teaching about the King. In His name, Amen.

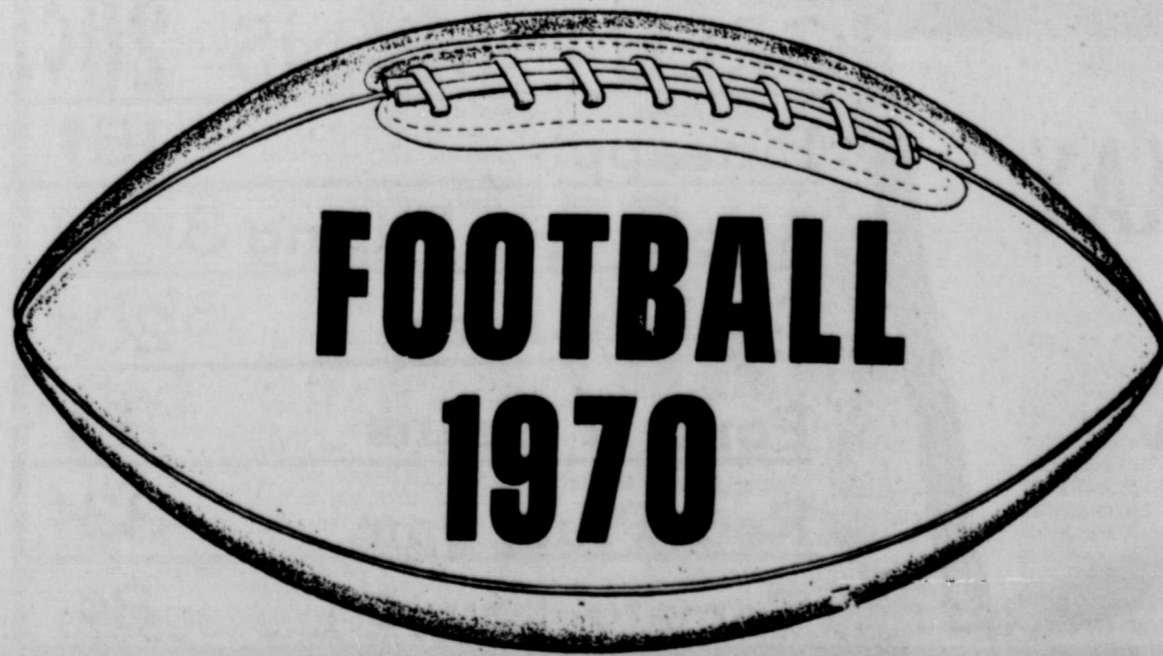

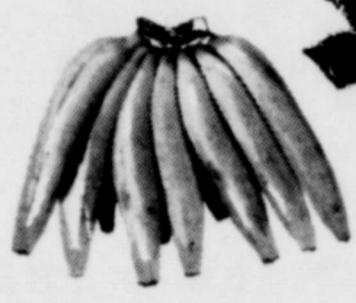

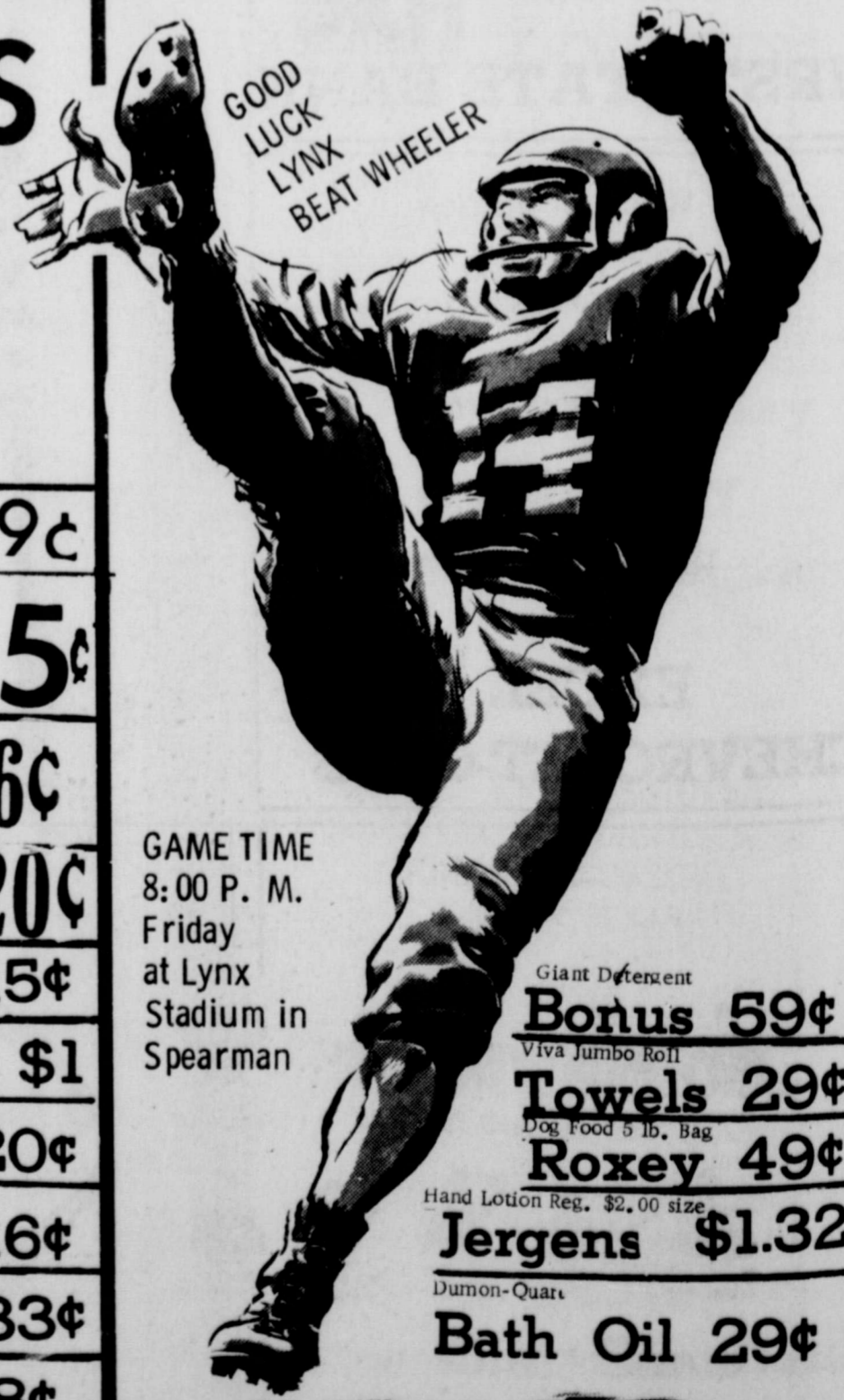
