whipping, shelling nuts, mak-ing candied fruit peel. I remember she too, came up with about the same menu annually. Chicken though. Never a turkey. I remember the first turkey I ever baked for just Billy & L. I cooked that poor bird practically all day. We ate the dressing and gave the bird to the cats. Now I cook a big one in 31 hours. Takes longer than this to bake a hen.

America has not always celebrated Thanksgiving. For at least 47 years of our history a national Thanksgiving day was not even proclaimed. Thomas Jefferson did not believe in the observance and refused to call for a day of Thanksgiving, From James Madison (1809) to Abraham Lincoln (1861) there was no Thanksgiving day set aside. Nor has it always been in November. Only since the days of President Lincoln. 1861-1865 have November & Thursday been the American custom.

This week I have had the pleasure of looking over an old book called PRACTICAL HOUSEW FERY by Marion Harland, published in 1874. It is a combination of common sense in the household. plus some delicious sounding "receipts". If I were to depend upon this book to prepare my Thanksgiving menu, I must first stalk a stately wild turkey until I have inveigled him up to a blind by imitating the call of his harem or younglings. If I can overcome the spellbinding pity of admiring his beauty, place gun at shoulder and finger on trigger, and shoot. Draw & wash the inside with strong soda water, stuff with rich forcemeat, bread

crumbs, bits of fat pork. Moisten with milk, beat in an egg and some butter. A!low a pound of butter for basting while roasting to a golden brown. Dredge with flour at last, froth with butter and serve. Lay the boiled giblets whole, one under each wing. Garnish with small fried sausages, not larger than a dollar. Send around current jelly. BREAD: having set your

sponge overnight, sift dry flour into a deep bread-tray, and strew a few spoonfuls of fine salt over it. Make a hole in the middle of the heap. pour in the risen sponge (which should be seamed in many places on top) and work down the flour into it with hands. Spend 30 minutes kneading -- this kind of useful gymnastics is grand exercise for the arms and chest. Set aside to rise. Knead again for 15 minutes. Put into loaves and if your ovens are in good condition, one

hour should bake the bread. I had the good fortune last week of coming into the possession of one of these old wooden, handmade bread trays. These are very rare, and this one is a beauty. I just might try my hand at this breadmaking. PUMPKIN PIE: 1 qt. stewed

pumpkin pressed through a sieve. 9 eggs, 2 quarts milk, 1 tsp. cinnamon and the same of nutmeg. $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups white sugar. Beat all well together and bake in crust

without cover. PLUM PUDDING: 1 pound each of butter, suet, sugar, 2½ lbs. flour, 2 lbs. raisins, 2 lbs. currants, 1/4 lb. cit-ron, 12 eggs, 1 pt. milk, 1 cup brand, ½ oz.cloves, ½ oz. mace, 2 grated nutmegs. Mix all thoroughly; wring out your pudding cloth in

out your pudding cloth in hot water; flour well inside, pour in mixture and boil 5 hours. I can confidently recomment this as the best plum pudding I have ever tasted. I have made it and if anyone is interested in learning more about it, call me and I'll give details. It keeps forever and is even better six months old. CAKE: Use none but the best materials for making

cake. If you cannot afford to get good flour, dry white sugar, and the best family butter, make up your mind to go without your cake and eat plain bread with a clear conscience. Always beat egg yolks

whites separately. Stir butter & sugar to a cream. Do not use fresh & stale milk in the same cake. It acts disastrously. Don't delude yourself, and maltreat those who are to eat your cake, by trying to make soda do the whole or most of the duty of eggs. There is no disgrace in not having time to mix and bake a cake. You may well be ashamed of yourself if you are too lazy, or careless, or hurried to beat your eggs, cream your butter and sugar or measure your ingredients, Yet, if failure is your portion, what then? If the cake be uneatable, throw it away upon the first beggar-boy who comes for broken meat, and say nothing about it. If streaky or burned, cut out the best parts, make them presentable as possible and give them to John and the children as a "second best" treat. Then keep up a brave heart and try again. For a real treat, you could

serve with the menu, Nas-turium-seed, pickled. They are an excellent substitute for capers. Take the green seed after the flower has dried off. Lay in salt and water 2 days, in cold water one day; pack in bottles and cover with scalding vinegar, seasoned with mace and white pepper-corns, and sweetened slightly with white sugar. Cork and set away four weeks before you use them. Happy cooking.
