Group in 1971. The Texas December draft quota of 489 is the state's share of a national quota for 7,000 men, all for the army.

The state quota for pre-in-duction physical and mental duction physical and mental examinations in December is 3,376. Men sent for these examinations will be limited to those with random sequence numbers 1 through 195 from the drawing in December 1969 and numbers 1 through 100 from the July 1970 drawing for those born in 1951.

That seemed to say a lot to me, for if God can still accept us and love us "in spite of ourselves"...we are bound to give Him thanks. Another thing I find myself

being especially thankful for is the fact that I am just a common, ordinary, mediocre person with plain ordinary abilities, with usual, commonplace ideas and goals. It doesn't take much to make me happy (a new (old) fruit jar once in a while), I have no worries as to what to do with a vast amount of riches, nor problems as to where to store my jewels. I'm no educated fool struggling with ways and means to solve the world's woes. I am very pleased with the kind of life I live and all this has made for me a very contented, peaceful and happy existance. For this, I am thankful.

One of my favorite passages from the Bible is found in Proverbs 20 and it is typical of the kind of life I was taught to strive for, and this is another blessing for which I am thankful: "give me neither poverty nor riches; feed me with food convenient for me, lest I be full and deny thee, and say, Who is the Lord? Or lest I be poor, and steal....

I am thankful for the memories of an old fashioned grandmother who wore floral print housedresses and sensible shoes. She wasn't blessed with material things of this life, but my memory of her is one of peace and satisfaction. Most young-sters now days don't have an old fashioned grandma, and it is a shame for they were an important part of the past gen-

I am thankful for an oldfashioned mother too. One who taught me to find joy in small things and to strive only for contentment" in this life ... that this alone makes a man

# 1 Man Injured In Wreck

Joe Burt Wylie, 46, of 13 N. Kentucky Street, Perry-ton, is in Hansford Hospital this week recuperating from injuries received Sunday evening in a one-car turnover just east of Spearman.

Sheriff's officers who investigated the accident said the 1969 Chevrolet pickup truck driven by Wylie, was coming in to Spearman on highway 15. The pickup left the highway on the south side, flipped end over end through the bar ditch and came to rest in a wheat field. The truck was upside down and the driver was trapped inside.

# **ECLIPSE** WINDMILL AT MUSEUM

Dominating the view as a visitor enters the central unit of The Museum of Texas Tech University is an Eclipse wind-mill, which serves as a focal point at the entrance to the Pioneer Hall.

Long a landmark on the prairie, the windmill took its energy from the air to draw water from the earth, making settlement possible on the Great Plains.

The gift of Mrs. James Levi Dagley of Lockney, Tex., the Eclipse windmill was a highlight of the Life on the Plains Gallery in the original Museum building in the heart of the Texas Tech campus, and has

been reconstructed in the 25foot-high hall.

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Although an ancient form of harnessing nature's power. windmills were not used in connection with water wells until the mid-nineteenth century. Then, as the American frontier reached the arid and semiarid West, where surface water was scarce and ground water too deep for rope-and-bucket wells, the self-regulating windmill was invented.

The Eclipse mill in The Museum is typical of thousands which pumped water for cat-

tle, crops, industries and man. Other windmills are being acquired for installation on the grounds of the Ranch Headquarters outdoor museum, east of the new Museum building.
