WHEAT FEED GRAINS

Four Lynx Teams In Clean Sweep

The farm program includes a set-aside program for wheat that offers a great deal more flexibility in the selection of crop acreages than under past programs. The wheat title of this law requires establishment of a domestic farm allotment. This domestic allotment will be comparable to that portion of your wheat allotment on which domestic wheat certificates were issued under past programs. In order that you may estimate the size of the 1971 "domestic" wheat allotment for your farm, multiply your 1970 farm allotment by 43.3 percent. (The resulting figure will approximate your farm's share of the National Domestic Allotment unless your allotment is reduced for failure to plant in past years.)

The domestic allotment under the set-aside program does not represent a limit on the acreage of wheat which may be planted, but will be used for the following two purposes: (1) to determine the amount of wheat certificate payment for your farm and (2) to determine the number of acres to be set aside from crop production to qualify for such payment.

Wheat certificate payments will be issued to participating farmers on a number of bushels determined by multiplying the domestic wheat allotment by the wheat yield established for the farm. To earn these certificates and become eligible for a CCC Loan on your entire wheat production under the 1971 wheat program, you must sign up, and set aside an acreage of cropland from crop production equal to a specified percentage of the "domestic" allotment. (The exact percent will be announced at a later date. It will be between 60 and 75 percent and will not be more than 75 percent.) In addition, you must maintain the conserving base established for the farm. The balance of your cropland acreage can be devoted to wheat or any other crop you desire (except that acreages of tobacco, rice, peanuts, ELS cotton and sugar cane are limited under those respective programs). The land which you set aside must be cropland meeting requirements that are acceptable to the county committee and no crop can be harvested from such acreage unless certain crops in short supply, to be announced later, are permitted.

You are not required to plant wheat in order to earn a certificate payment as has been required in recent years. However, if you plant less than 90 percent of the domestic allotment, your domestic allotment for 1972 and subsequent years may be reduced (except if you participate in the wheat and feed grain programs, or in the wheat program if you have no feed grain base, feed grain acreage in excess of the feed grain base will be counted as wheat for allotment retention purposes).

The Congress recently passed legislation which provides for a new farm program. This legislation includes a set-aside program for feed grains that offers a great deal more flexibility in the selection of crop acreages than under past programs.

Corn and grain sorghum will be considered feed grains for purposes of the set-aside program. Barley will not be included in the program for 1971. As under previous programs, a feed grain base will be established for your farm. This base will be approximately the same size as the one established for your farm in 1970 except that your 1971 feed grain base will be smaller than your 1970 base by the amount of barley acreage included in your 1970 base.

The feed grain base under the set-aside program does not represent a limitation on the acreage of feed grains which may be planted, but will be used for the following two purposes: (1) to determine the amount of price support payment for your farm and (2) to determine the number of acres to be set-aside from crop production to qualify for such payment.

Payment will be made to participating farmers on a number of bushels determined by multiplying 50 percent of the feed grain base by the feed grain yield established for the farm. To earn this payment and to become eligible for CCC Loan on your entire 1971 feed grain production, you must sign up and set aside an acreage of cropland from crop production equal to a specified percentage of your feed grain base. The Department will tentatively plan for a 20 percent set-aside. (The exact percent will be announced at a later date but it will not be more than 20 percent.) In addition you must maintain the conserving base established for your farm.

The balance of your cropland acreage can be planted to feed grains or any other crop you desire (except that acreages of tobacco, rice, peanuts, ELS cotton, and sugar cane are limited under quota programs). The land which you set aside must be cropland meeting requirements that are acceptable to the county committee and no crop can be harvested from such acreage, unless certain crops in short supply, to be announced later, are permitted.

You are not required to plant feed grains to earn price support payment as has been required under prior programs. However, if you plant less than 45 percent of your feed grain base, your base for 1972 and subsequent years may be reduced (except if you participate in both the feed grain and wheat programs, or if you have no wheat allotment and participate in the feed grain program, wheat acreage in excess of the allotment will be counted as feed grain for base retention purposes).

New Lunch Room Policy

The Spearman Independent School District has recognized the need for helping meet the nutritional needs of its students. The Spearman schools serve a well-balanced nutritious lunch each school day. The charge to students who can pay is 35¢ in the elementary school, 40¢ in the junior high, and 45¢ in the high school. However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the school will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those children determined by the school Principal and County Superintendent to be unable to pay the full price for their lunches.

Families who feel that their children may be eligible for free or reduced price lunches are urged to apply. Copies of the application form will be sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies may be obtained at each Principal's office. The completed application, signed by the Principal of the school where the student attends. Such applications will be reviewed promptly and within five school days the family will be notified in writing as to the decision made. All information provided on the application will be held in the strictest confidence.

Any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches, such as prolonged illness in the family, unexpected expenses due to fire, flood, or any other disaster of this nature; seasonal unemployment and similar emergency situations, will also be considered.

If a family is not satisfied with the decision made on their application, it may request a hearing to appeal the decision. This request may be made orally or in writing to the President of the Board of Trustees at the Superintendent's office and may be reviewed by any interested person. Decisions for approval will be based on the following Income Scales:

Council Considering New Trash System

The City Council met in regular session Monday night for the only meeting scheduled in December.

Councilmen heard departmental reports for the month of November, prepared to let bids for two new pickups and looked at films demonstrating the latest system in trash disposal.

The council is looking into the idea of converting to a new "containerized" trash disposal system and feel it might be economically feasible to convert. No plans were made, but those present looked at various types of containers and trucks. City Manager Foshee said many cities have gone to the new type of trash pick-up and have paid for it rapidly because it does away with much manual labor.

The proposed system would place 2 to 3 large containers in each alley to be used by several families. The mechanical truck, operated by one man, picks up the containers, unloads them into the truck and places them back on the ground. These new trash receptacles have hinged lids which does away with files and prevents all trash littering down alley-ways.

Manager Foshee said the council was only considering the change over due to the

HELPFUL HINTS FROM ME, TO THEE

Pick a new fashion beat as you plan for holiday parties. And remember whatever you choose, think about the total look. Begin at the top with your hair. Curl, braid, ribbon or bow it. Add the neckline news of chokers and dog collars. Don't forget to give some thought to the finish line; legs should match with the right shoes or boots. You may add some of this year's accessories to last year's dress. Take last year's mini and add velvet pants.

The legend of the Christmas stocking claims that St. Nicholas threw gold coins down the chimney, and the coins fell in to stockings hung before the fire to dry. Gold coins have been replaced with gold goodies--oranges and tangerines. Orange magic stored in Christmas stockings packs a double wallop. They're fun to peel and eat, but most important, they provide vitamin C, magic.

A special Christmas treat for friends is a basket of fresh oranges and lemons. To make the baskets, buy chicken wire at hardware or garden shops. Use wire clippers to cut strips 24 inches long and 12 inches wide. Intertwine the wire ends to form a cylinder. Close the bottom and form into a bell shape. Spray with gold paint, then fill with fruit.

Holidays mean good food, good times, and saying goodbye to good linens and garments decorated with cranberry stains, turkey gravy and candle wax. But a few helpful hints on stain removing can restore beauty to soiled garments.

Cranberry stains are one of the hardest to remove. Promptly take stained garments and linen to a professional drycleaner. Swift action will usually provide results. To remove gravy from a washable fabric, either sponge the material with cleaning fluid or soak it in the fluid. If stains remain, wash the cloth in warm suds and rinse. For dry cleaned fabrics, sponge with cool water, let dry then sponge with cleaning fluid or cleaning powder. If candle wax drips on a washable fabric, remove excess wax with a dull knife. Place a towel under the stain and wet it thoroughly several times with a commercial drycleaning solvent. Dry and launder in heavy suds. For nonwashable fabrics, remove excess wax with knife and sponge with a commercial drycleaning solvent.

Mr. and Mrs. Holt and Mrs. Loftin attended memorial services.

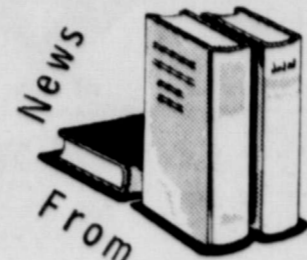

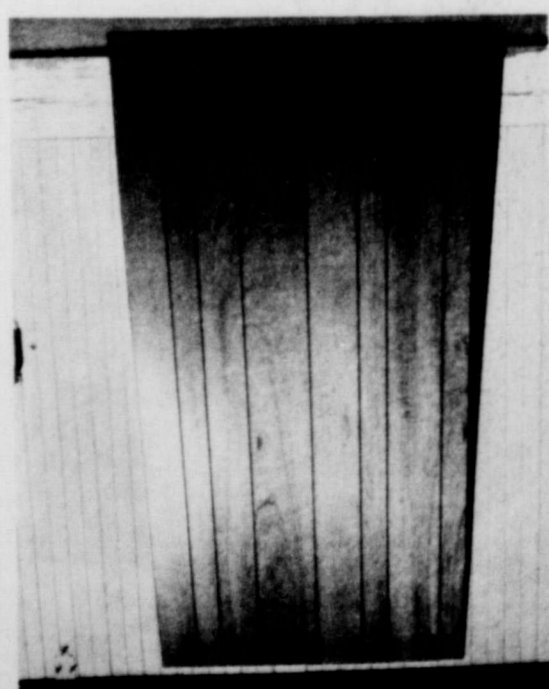

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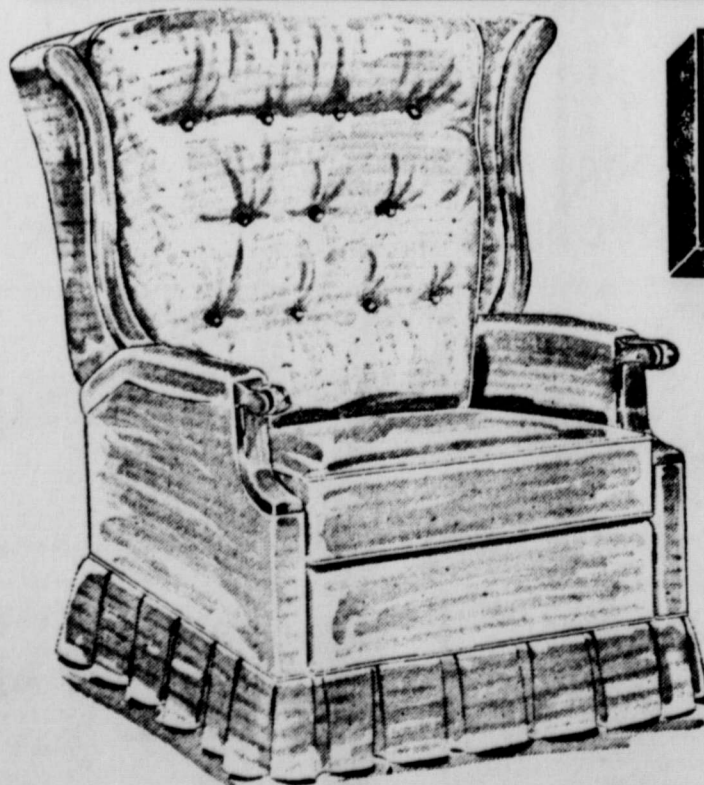
