Spearman Edges Perryton, 46-45

The Spearman Lynx, coached by former Borger High School basketball standout Allen Simpson, staged a sparkling second-half comeback in the opening round of the Borger Christmas Invitational Tournament Monday night to capture a narrow 46-45 victory over the Perryton Rangers.

Spearman, which trailed Perryton by a 26-19 margin at halftime, will battle the Big Spring Steers in the tournament semifinals today at 7 p. m. in the North Middle School Gymnasium.

Edgar Womble, 5-10 Spearman guard, was the key to most of the Lynx' success in the second half as he connected on crucial layup and free throw attempts.

Womble was high-point man in the game with 21 markers—12 of them coming in the second half alone. The flashy cager tied the game at 39-39 on a free throw with 5:19 remaining in the contest and put the Lynx in front, 40-39, on a second charity toss.

The two teams battled back and forth for another three minutes, and Perryton's Jerry O'Brien put the Rangers back in front, 45-44, with only 1:40 left in the game.

Junior Salinas came right back with a field goal for the Lynx to give Spearman a nar-

row 46-45 edge with 52 seconds remaining.

Perryton had a chance to go out in front again, but Randy Mitchell was called for traveling with 40 seconds left, and the Lynx took over. Trying to add insurance to Spearman's slim one-point lead, Womble was called for traveling to hand the ball back to the Rangers with only 14 seconds remaining.

O'Brien missed a jump shot with five seconds left in the contest. Perryton's Joe Ogden grabbed the rebound and narrowly missed a four-footer as the buzzer sounded, giving Spearman the victory.

O'Brien led Perryton with 17 points and was the only Ranger scoring in double figures.

Perryton was scheduled to play Clovis, N. M., in the consolation bracket of the tournament at 2:30 p. m. today.

Spearman Teams Win Opening Games In Tournament Play

Lynx Lose To Big Springs 56-51

Spearman's fine purple and white boys team lost to Big Springs in the semi-finals of the Borger Christmas Invitational tournament, but Big Springs knew that the Lynx were on the court. In fact, the Lynx led, or had the Big Springs boys tied for three of the four quarters, possibly the fact that the Lynx still can't make a large percentage of their free throws, was the cause of the loss. And, in the third quarter, with a 4-point lead, the Lynx made only 2 points; that was a basket which represented only one out of eight shots from the floor in the third quarter for the Lynx. However, the Lynx played excellent basketball and the crowd had their thrills during the game.

Borger defeated Artesia in the night-cap, and the Lynx will play Artesia Wednesday night at 7 p. m. for the third place championship. Borger will meet Big Springs for the championship right after the Spearman-Artesia game Wednesday night.

Spearman's two varsity teams won their opening games, during the holiday basketball tournament play. The Lynxettes won their 18th straight game at the Duncanville Tournament in Dallas, when Malakoff failed to show up to play their scheduled 11:30 game Monday morning against the Lynxettes. One of the Malakoff player's mother was killed in a car wreck and the team was unable to participate in the tournament. The Spearman girls tangled with the winner of the Cedar Hill-Krum game at 2:25 Tuesday. The gratis victory boosted the Lynxettes unbeaten record to 18-0. With the 35 games the Lynxettes won last year, they now stand at 33 games won and 1 game lost, for last year and this year.

The Spearman boys did exactly what local fans thought they would, when they won a 1-point thriller against the Perryton Rangers at Borger Monday evening. The Lynx took a 11-10 lead at the end of the first quarter, but at one point dropped behind the Ranger team by 10 points, only to rally at half-time, trailing the Perryton team 26-19. A third quarter rally kept the Lynx within 3 points of the Rangers, 34-37, at the end of the third quarter. A thrilling 4th quarter won the game for the Lynx, as they grabbed the lead with 5 minutes left in the game and held on to win 46-45. Perryton had the ball the last 14 seconds and missed two shots from the floor to end the game with the Lynx going into the semi-finals against Big Springs. The Lynx now stand 11-6 for the season, and are improving with every game. Edgar Womble led the Lynx scoring with 21 points.

Tim, a recent graduate of Utilities Man, a construction school at Darlesville Rhode Island, reports for overseas duty December 31 at Barbador in the West Indies.

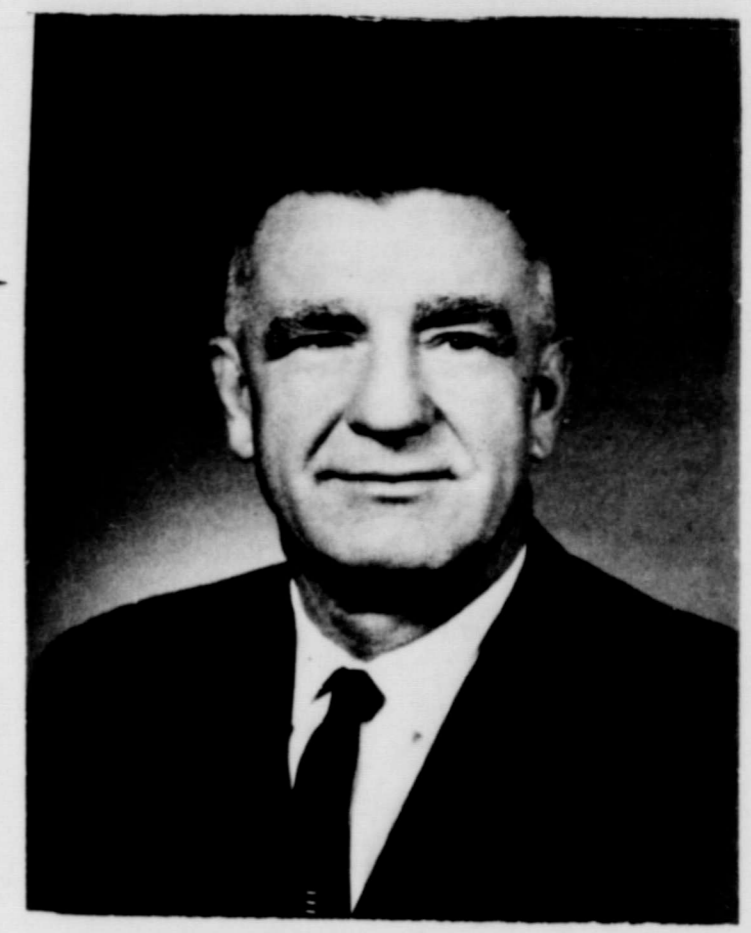
Former C of C Mgr. Visits Here

Berl Huffman Will Be Banquet Speaker



The Spearman Chamber of Commerce will observe its 50th Anniversary at the Annual Banquet on January 25, 1971 at 7:30 p. m. in the Spearman High School Cafeteria.

Speaker for the occasion will be "Coach" Berl Huffman, Director of Public Relations for the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association. Often described as a living legend, the popular Huffman's main duties now include speaking engagements, working closely with the class reunion programs, the Texas Tech Century Club and Ex-Students Association local chapters throughout the nation.

A 1928 graduate of Trinity University where he played halfback, Huffman first joined the Texas Tech staff in 1935 as a freshman football coach and head coach of basketball and track. He interrupted his coaching career for four years of service in the Air Force during World War II and then returned to Tech as assistant football coach and head basketball coach.

He left Lubbock in 1947 to become head coach at the University of New Mexico, a post he had until 1952 when he became manager of Albuquerque, New Mexico's Chamber of Commerce. He later directed the New Mexico Economic Development Commission and left that post to direct the Alamogordo New Mexico Industrial Development Corporation.

He rejoined the Texas Tech coaching staff in 1961 as freshman football coach and head baseball coach. He remained on the Tech coaching staff until his appointment with the Ex-Students Association.

At their Homecoming meeting in 1968, the Ex-Students Association Council unanimously selected Huffman to be awarded Honorary membership in the Association. This is the highest award the Association can bestow on a non-alumnus. In the long history of the Association only four other people have received this honor.

He and his wife have one son, Walter Berl '67 who is married to Ann Robinson '66. Walter and Ann have one son.

On December 18 after hearing again the beautiful Christmas story, pupils enjoyed a gift exchange, said "Merry Christmas" and "Goodbye" until January 4.

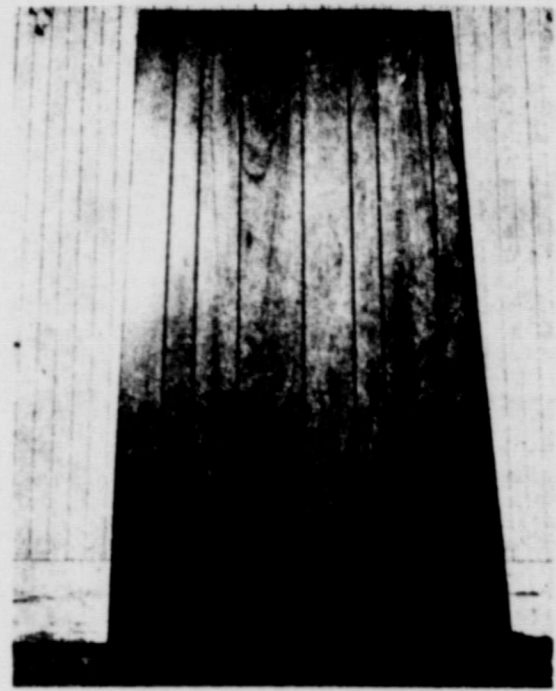

 The chemical has a high toxicity and may cause extensive damage to the liver, kidneys, lungs, heart and nervous system. It can be fatal if swallowed or inhaled.
 Carbon tetrachloride is a nonflammable grease solvent, and has been used in cleaning fluids and fire extinguishers for many years.
 USDA first warned consumers about the dangers of carbon tetrachloride for household chores in 1968. The present ban includes its use in fire extinguishers. When the chemical is exposed to a flame, the solvent changes into phosgene gas, a deadly poison.
 Check labels on cleaning supplies and fire extinguishers for carbon tetrachloride. If included in any of these products, dispose of them immediately.

expressway on Hollywood Road. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Wednesday in the Paramount Baptist Church. He was a member of this church. Graveside rites were held in Seagraves Cemetery in Seagraves.

He was a veteran of WW II, and held membership in the Farmers Union. He was a farmer and rancher.

Survivors include his wife, Mary; two sons, Lowell of Canyon and James of Olton; a daughter, Mrs. Bobby Phillips of Amarillo; two brothers and four sisters.

Texas Farm Bureau Names President

The new president of the 121,158-member Texas Farm Bureau is a successful North Texas "dirt" farmer and beef cattle producer.

He is J. T. (Red) Woodson of Gober in Fannin County. Woodson was elected president by TFB delegates at the organization's convention in November in Fort Worth. He succeeded Sidney Dean of Victoria who had served for three years.

Woodson farms 1,250 acres 890 of which he owns. A diversified farmer, his principal commodities are cotton, wheat, feed grains and Hereford cattle.

The new Texas Farm Bureau president is as much "at home"

on a tractor or handling cattle as he is behind a desk. As such, he brings to the presidency of the state's largest farm organization a broad background of practical farming experience and personal understanding of the farmer's and rancher's problems.

Woodson served as a member of the TFB board of directors from District 4 from 1957 until he was elevated to the presidency. He was vice president from 1962 until 1966.

A leader in the Fannin County Farm Bureau since he joined the organization in 1951, Woodson served as membership chairman and was president of the county unit in 1955-56.

A native of Gober, Woodson graduated from high school in nearby Bonham and attended Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, taking pre-med courses. He also attended East Texas State at Commerce. Returning to his hometown in the early 1930s, he operated a gin for 14 years before making farming his life's work.
