The Future—No-Know?

The future concerns you. What do you know about it? It appears sometimes that there is nothing about which man is not already widely informed or about to make discovery. But there is one thing — the future.

A recent article in a national magazine made passing reference to the "fact" that science is in the process of resolving "the few remaining mysteries of life."

Well, to that writer and to any like thinkers I propose a simple test: prophesy tomorrow. But before you do, let me make clear what I mean. Foretelling the future can be performed on four levels.

Prognostication The lowest level is prognostication. When a physician indicates, after a physical examination, that you will "get well" or "get worse," that's prognostication. Prognostication is a relatively simple process of anticipating future events on the basis of present irresistible causes. Its simplicity arises from the fact that the observer has seen all this happen before and he knows by experience the events that necessarily follow.

Projection A bit more difficult than prognostication is projection. When a business decided to produce 15 per cent more rubber balls over the next six months than it did in the previous half year, its conclusion that that many more would sell was arrived at by projection. Projection is a process of second-guessing the future on the basis of selected present indicators that, applying appropriate principles and formulas, suggest certain events. But they are not always reliable. The Hudson Institute claims it can give "surprise-free" projections, but there are

many who do not believe. Remember the Packard Prediction. Less stable still than prediction is prophesy. When an oligist suggests that the world will be only one race of worldwide, by A.D. 2000, but the matter is speculative. The cause-effect relationship for predictions are more questionable. Perhaps you read some of the more century predictions that a universal peace.

Prophesy The final and highest of foretelling the future is prophesy. There is a qualitative difference between prediction and prophesy. In fact, the two. First, prediction is self in the soul of a man's perceptions, both conscious and unconscious, forming a picture in his mind. It must come from within man, by revelation.

The second difference more significant. Unlike prediction, projection, and prophesy is not a matter of knowing the future. Prophesies come because the source of the revelation causes them to. Prophecies are given some generations in advance and are precise, down to details, even including dates.

A moment ago, I asked you to prophesy. Are you ready? Bible has over 1,000 prophecies that you can investigate — and 1,000 more ones that you had better investigate, because they are yours. Copyright Dave Llewellyn

Coach Anthony stated that the tracksters will run in the big Amarillo track meet over the weekend, with Lemons probably running at 2 p.m. Friday and Saturday.

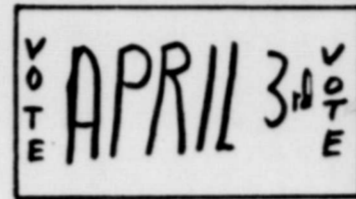

Spearman Golf Team May Be Top AA Team In State

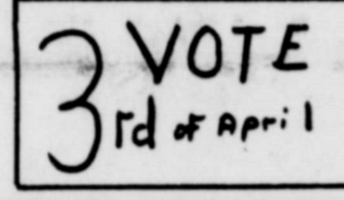

Passing of An Old Land Mark



Saturday morning April 10th at ten a.m. the auctioneer chant will be heard at the corner of Hancock and Main Street in Spearman. Spectators will hear the voice of Quinton Jenkins, well known Panhandle auctioneer as he puts the contents of the Old Brandt building under the hammer.

What are the contents? The history of the building will give you a clue as to some of its contents. It was built in Old Hansford around 1914 to house the firm of P. M. Maize and Company. This was a general store selling everything offered by general stores of that era. Mr. Fred Brandt Jr. was connected with the firm and in 1919 (when the town moved) the owners moved the building to its present site in Spearman.

According to one old timer on the local scene; "That building was put up by a Mr. Dillow who was a top notch builder. When a two by four would do the job he would use a two by six and when Dixon stipulated yellow pine, he meant it had better be yellow pine."

Mr. Brandt added a line of groceries to his wares upon establishment in Spearman however groceries have disappeared from any of the remaining stock.

In 1946 young Billy Brandt came out of the Navy and opened a sales and service operation for radios and television sets. Many old radio and TV sets are still in the store along with numerous tubes and parts.

Among the contents to be auctioned is a huge coal stove. This old stove is still in excellent condition and, if you look in the catalog from which it was purchased, you'll note that it's described as the largest heating stove built in the entire world.

Other contents? Buttons, bows, phonograph records, bottles, jars, old shoes, handkerchiefs, store fixtures, old captain's chairs, socks, old books and many things you haven't seen for a long long time.

What happens to the lot and building? They too will be sold at auction. After that, who knows what will happen to the old building? Will it be just another passing of an old land mark?

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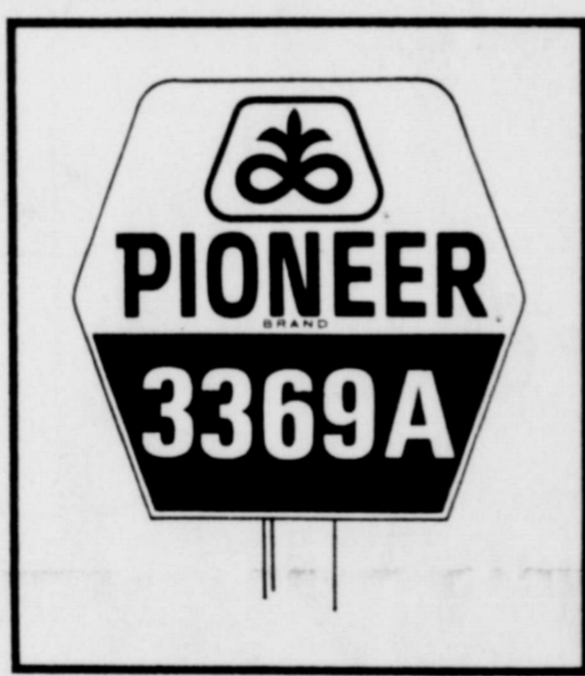

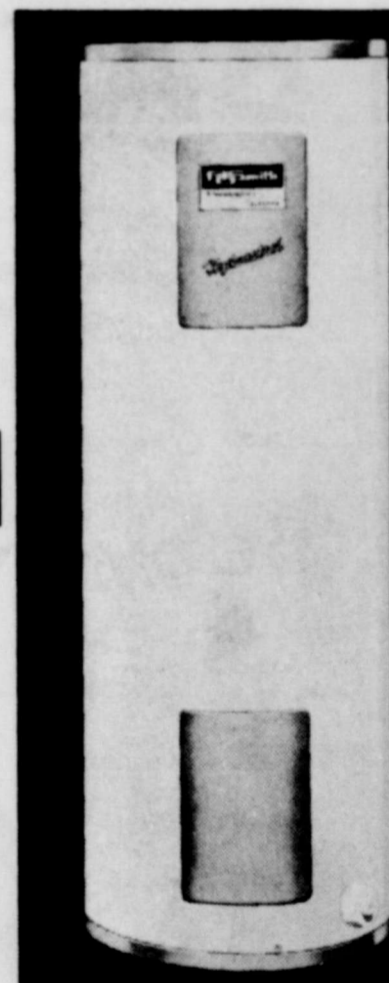

Federal Tax Bite \$3,058,000 Locally

Taxes are again in the spotlight in Hansford County, what with the day of reckoning, April 15th, just around the corner.

Uncle Sam will be present that day, hand extended, to receive all offerings in the form of personal income taxes based upon 1970 earnings.

The big question in each taxpayer's mind, as he struggles with the various forms and schedules he must fill out, is how big the bite will be this time.

Last year, approximately \$3,133,000 in personal income taxes left the local area, bound for Washington.

This time, based upon Government estimates, the overall amount is expected to be somewhat less. This is so due to the favorable factor of a smaller surtax, 2 1/2 percent, and despite the fact that many people earned more money in 1970 than in the previous year. The reason is that there were many more people than usual who were unemployed.

As a result, the Government expects to collect \$88.3 billion in personal taxes, or \$1.9 billion less than last April.

Hansford County's share of the tax load was determined by an unofficial breakdown of the payments received from the State of Texas as a whole, which totaled \$4,475,000,000.

Local residents contributed close to 0.07 percent of that amount, or about \$3,133,000.

This year, in line with the changed economic situation and with the revised figures contained in the budget that was recently submitted to Congress, the personal tax returns from

the local area will be around \$3,058,000, it is estimated.

Large as this amount is, it may be the smallest sum they will be called upon to pay on an annual basis, for some time to come.

The expectations for the next fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1971, run considerably higher. The budget counts on personal income taxes reaching \$93.7 billion, which is \$5.4 billion more than at present.

For Hansford County residents to be able to carry their current share of that tax load and, at the same time, maintain their present standard of living, their 1971 incomes will have to be about 6.1 percent higher than they were in 1970.

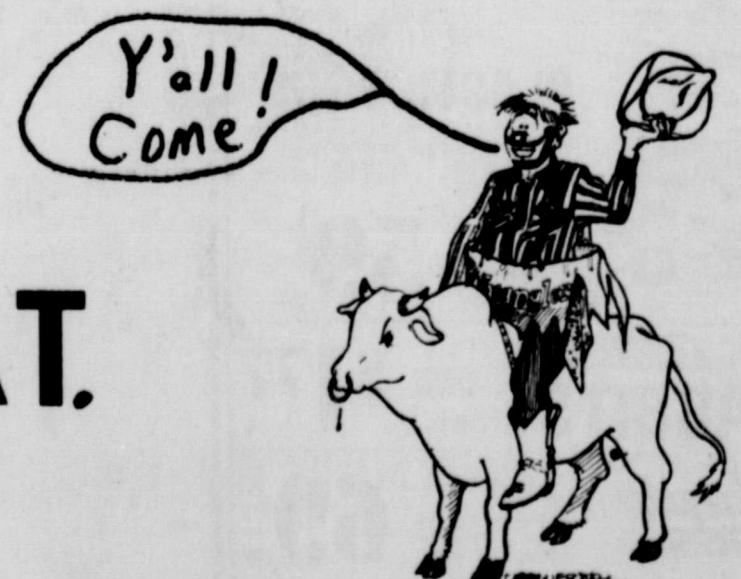
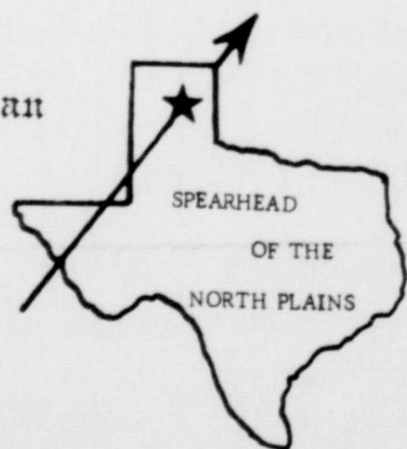
