"YOU NAME IT"
by Billy Miller

Did you read Ann Landers column in the Amarillo paper Tuesday. It was just terrific, and I want to feature it in my column this week.

Ann's article starts out: DEAR READERS: If you are looking for a laugh today, you'd better skip Ann Landers. And, here in part I want to say: "Who among us has not lost a loved one to cancer? More Americans died of cancer in 1969 than were killed in the four years of World War II. Of the 200 million Americans alive today, 50 million WILL DEVELOP CANCER."

How many of us have asked the question, "If this great country of ours can put a man on the moon why can't we find a cure for cancer?" One reason is that we have never launched a national campaign, a united effort, against this killer disease. Another reason is money. The funds designated for medical research in America are grossly inadequate. Government grants for medical research have virtually dried up.

The lion's share of the tax dollar is going to defense. The following statistics shook me. They tell an interesting and shameful story about the priorities in this country. In 1969 for every man, woman and child in the U.S., our government spent: \$125 on the war in Vietnam; \$19 on the space program; \$19 on foreign aid; \$96 on cancer research. Soon a bill will come before the US Senate which calls for the establishment of a National Cancer Authority. This bill, S-34, will be sponsored by Senators Edward Kennedy and Jacob Javits. The proposed National Cancer Authority would be an agency similar to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. This conquest of cancer bill demands that the highest priority be given to devise better methods of prevention, diagnosis and cure of cancer at the earliest date.

Today you have the opportunity to be a part of the mightiest offensive against a single disease in the history of our country. If enough citizens will let their senators know they want Bill S-34 passed, it will pass.

I urge you to write our two U.S. Senators, Republican John Tower and Democrat Lloyd Bentsen, Senate Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20510, and tell them to vote for S-34. Your message need to consist of only three words: "Vote For S-34; and sign your name, please."

Help your editor, and your town fight cancer... This is the very best opportunity you will ever have to help stamp out cancer. Remember tell your two U.S. Senators to Vote For S-34.

Shelters Listed In City



IT CAN HAPPEN HERE---this is a picture snapped last spring of a tornado which swept its way through open country just west of Spearman. For safety, Spearman citizens are urged to work out self-protection plans within their homes in case the tornado alert sounds here.

The City of Spearman does not have adequate tornado shelter, but local civil defense officials this week named places which will be available in case a storm alert is sounded here.

If a tornado alert is sounded for this city, citizens may take shelter in the following buildings:

The east-west corridors of the high school building. The east-west corridors downstairs in the junior high school building. The dressing rooms under the concrete bleachers at the varsity gym, located behind

the junior high school building. The hallway in the basement of the Courthouse. The tunnels which run beneath the Equity Elevators.

These buildings, located in various parts of Spearman, are known to have only "limited shelter space" and civil defense personnel urge citizens to work out plans for self protection within their own homes if at all possible.

Responsible people have been appointed to get these city shelters open and ready in case a tornado alert is sounded in Spearman. The tornado alert signal for

Spearman is a three to five minute constant blast of the siren. This whistle will be sounded if a tornado is sighted.

Citizens will remember that last year, and once the year before, the tornado alert siren sounded here, but this alarm was not touched off by civil defense observers. The alarm was set off when a driving rain storm shorted out telephone cables in the control circuit which activated the siren in the south part of town. The telephone company has replaced a lot of cables in that end of town since then.

For the 10th consecutive year, Guymon celebration officials paid a visit here last week to issue a special invitation to Spearman's Mule Train to participate in that city's annual celebration parade May 1.

Tom Johnson, Stuart Wise and Bob Pratt met with the Rolling Plains Mule Train officers and made plans for the upcoming festivities in Guymon, Okla.

The Mule Train, which has gained national recognition, will gather in Spearman the night of April 27th and set up camp at the local Rodeo arena. The next morning the mule train will leave Spearman at 8 a. m. Some 18 mule-drawn covered wagons will make the overland trek to Guymon; many to join the train along the way. The first night will be spent (April 28th) on the Ken Wilmoth Ranch 6 miles north of Gruver.

April 29th, the second night of the trip, camp will be set up on the Mark Vantine Ranch, some 8 miles south of Guymon, on the Frisco Creek. Mule skinned enjoy an old-time "blow-out" at this camp with a camp fire gaiety including a square dance. George Peterson's western band will furnish the dance music. As a rule, some 500 visitors from all over the area come out to the camp that night to enjoy the

fun. Everyone is invited. The camp site is easy to find. Frisco Creek is on highway 136, some 21 miles north of Gruver, and about 8 miles south of Guymon.

The morning of Friday, April 30, the mule train arrives in Guymon about 10 a. m., to be met by Point Rock Riders out of Elkhart, Kansas and escorted to the Fair Grounds to camp over night. The train will march in the Pioneer Days parade in Guymon at 11 a. m. May 1.

Although not every member of the Rolling Plains Mule Train will be able to march in the Spearman celebration parade, those who can will be there.

Guymon treats the Mule Train like royalty, furnishing special meals and "free tickets" to the Rodeo.

Social Security Tax On Farm Labor Increased

COLLEGE STATION--The social security tax to be withheld from farm wages increased to 5.2 percent on January 1, 1971 according to James I. Mallett, Farm Management Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The taxes withheld from wages must be matched with an equal amount by the employer and sent to the Internal Revenue Service.

When the social security tax withheld plus the employer's contribution reaches \$100 or more at the end of any calendar month, the total amount must be deposited by the 15th day of the following month in a Federal Reserve Bank or a commercial bank authorized by the Internal Revenue Service to accept social security tax deposits.

There are statutory penalties for failure to make the required timely deposits.

Mallett explains that a farmer is required to withhold social security tax on any farm employee who works one hour or

more on 20 days or more, or who earns \$150 or more during the calendar year. However, the farmer is exempt from withholding social security tax for farm labor crews, self-employed individuals performing custom services, his own children under 21 years of age, or for a husband or wife working for their spouse.

The farm employer is responsible for depositing the total social security taxes due whether he withholds the tax from the employees wage or not, Mallett said. The receipt for social security tax deposits and Form 943 is filed with the Internal Revenue Service in January of each year.

Payroll records, including the name, social security number, amount and time worked, the amount paid and the tax withheld, should be kept by the farm employer on each employee. It is also important to keep a copy of Form 943 which is used to report social security taxes, reminds Mallett.

DRIVERS OF FARM VEHICLES EXEMPT UNTIL JULY 1ST.

AUSTIN--Drivers of farm vehicles are temporarily exempt from compliance with new safety regulations established by the U.S. Department of Transportation's Bureau of Motor Carrier Safety for drivers involved in interstate commerce, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White says that considerable confusion has developed among farm vehicle drivers following adoption of the new safety standards, but that an amendment to the regulations adopted January 1st, 1971, exempts drivers of farm vehicles for a six-month period until July 1, 1971.

Commissioner White says that according to the amendment, farm vehicle drivers must be 18 years old, rather than 21 as required in the general safety standards, and that other provisions of the regulations--including written examination, road tests and physical examinations--will not apply. White pointed out, however, that farm vehicle

drivers are defined as persons who are at least 18 years of age, are driving a vehicle owned and operated by a farm, and are being used to transport produce from the farm or apply to the farm. In addition, the vehicle being driven must have a gross weight, including load, of 10,000 pounds or less and is not used in the operation of a for-hire carrier.

Commissioner White advised all farm vehicle drivers to be aware of the exemption deadline of July 1, 1971, at which time a determination will be made as to the proper interpretation of the regulations as they apply to farm vehicle drivers. The sent interpretation is based on the crossing of state lines of farm vehicles.

\$58,000 Hike In Local S-S Checks

The Hansford County residents who are receiving social security checks each month, how much will the monthly-increased rates mean in dollars and cents? That will their benefits amount to, on average, compared with what they were previously?

It is estimated that the 10 percent rise in retirement benefits, approved last month by Congress, will add approximately \$58,000 a year to the total that local residents have been collecting.

The estimate is based upon the number of local area, covered in the latest annual report of the Social Security Administration. It lists the number of retired and disabled persons on the pension rolls, as well as their dependents and amounts being paid.

All of them will be aided by the new legislation. Those who have been receiving no more than \$768 a year, the minimum, will be getting \$845.

The maximum for an individual will now be \$2,557 a year and for a couple, \$4,114.

Local residents who have been getting \$100 a month of

\$1,200 a year, will now receive \$1,320. Those at the \$1,800 level will get \$1,980 in the future.

Prior to the new change in rates, pension payments in Hansford County averaged \$1,036 per recipient per year, according to the Social Security Administration.

This year, with the increase, the average will rise to \$1,140 per beneficiary.

Total payments throughout the local area, based upon the number who were on the pension roll as of the early part of 1970, will add up to about \$634,000 this year, a considerable rise over the prior total of \$576,000.

The increase in benefits is retroactive to January. The bigger checks will start going out during the first week of June. The additional amounts for the months prior to June will be issued soon afterward.

There will be no immediate rise in payroll taxes to pay for the larger benefits. The only adjustment provided for is a change in the income base subject to such taxes from \$7,800 to \$9,000 effective next January.

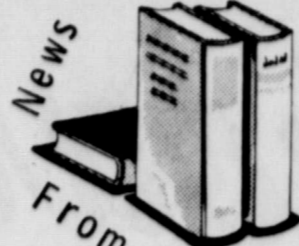

Indian Skeleton Discovered Near Spearman Area

Jerry Scroggs of Spearman was fixing fence for a rancher, south of Spearman last week, and discovered an almost complete skeleton of an early day plains Indian. Rolla Shaller, with the Plains Museum from Canyon, and his crew were at the Hansford County Sheriff's office Monday of this week and pieced the skeleton together. Shaller stated that the Indian was probably one of the early day corn farmers, in the year 1200-1400 A.D. This particular Indian was buried about 1/2 mile from the Indian village and down wind from the village. However, there was no pottery, or arrows buried with this Indian and this puzzled the anthropologists. The Indian was about 30 years old, and this was made by checking his or her teeth. They did not know whether the skeleton was male or female.

This was a very interesting discovery and the skeleton was taken to Canyon for further research. The skull indicated that this Indian might have died from a tumor, because of the indentation into the skull bone, from the inside. Or, he could have been murdered? Who knows? Anyway, it is very interesting to know about these early day farmers, and possibly after much study and research, the experts at Canyon can give us a complete story on this Plains Indian.

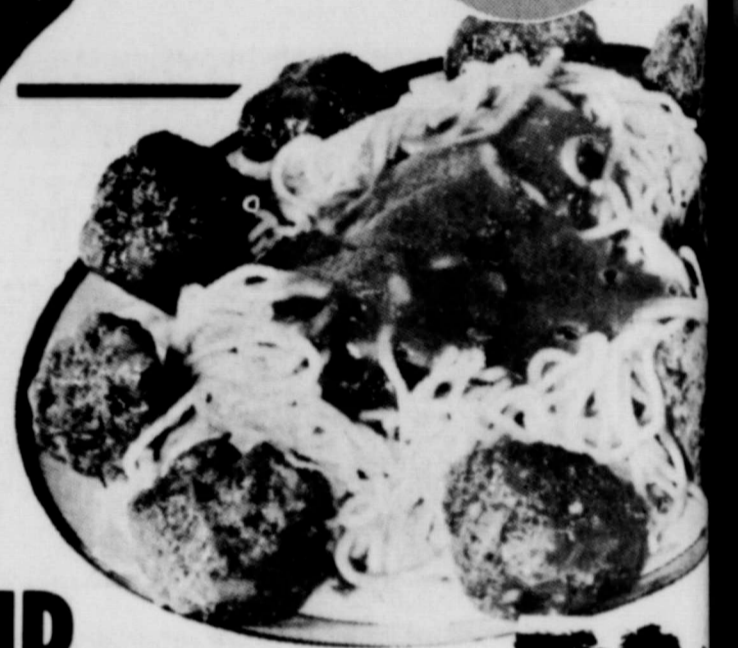

A Texas Wheat Producers research and promotion referendum will be held May 11. A total of 14 persons have been selected for the ballot for the nine-man board. The Wheat Producers Board election will be held May 11,

in connection with a wheat research and promotion referendum in which producers in a 34-county area will decide whether or not to assess themselves not more than five mills per bushel on their production for research and pro-

motion. After a public hearing in Austin, March 5, the Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White, certified Texas Wheat Producers Association to hold such a referendum and election. If two-thirds of the wheat producers voting in

the referendum favor the self-assessment program, the nine-man producers board will have total authority for the collection, use and accounting of all funds and implementation of programs designed to strengthen wheat growers income. Nelson said that it is envisioned that programs would entail new research on drought-resistant wheat varieties for better early grazing and grain production, foreign market development through such organizations as Great Plains Wheat, Inc., which is pushing for better trade policies and more export sales of U.S. wheat, disease and insect studies for more efficient production or gain more sales volume for Texas produced wheat.

Each name submitted for inclusion on the producer board ballot was, according to statute regulations, supported by the signatures of ten other producers of wheat in the 34-county area, Nelson said.

Those names which will appear on the ballot for the May 11 election of a Wheat Producers Board are: John Cogdell, Crowell (Foard); W.R. Moore, Jr., Munday (Knox); Dwight Hamilton, Olney (Young); Winston Wilson, Quannah (Hardeman); Kenneth Kendrick, Stratford (Sherman); Delbert Timmons, Perryton (Ochiltree); C.L. Edwards, Panhandle (Carson); Henry I. Harnly, Pampa (Gray); N.F. Renner, Spearman (Hansford); Frank Zinsler, Jr., Hereford (Deaf Smith); Leo Witkowski, Hereford (Castro); Otis Harman, Tulia (Swisher); Melvin Sachs, Friona (Farmer); and Davis Brown, Adrian (Oldham).

Job Gray, assistant director of marketing for the Texas Department of Agriculture, will be the principal speaker along with Charles Vincent of the Department and Association officials.

Several representatives of the Texas Wheat Producers Association will attend the meeting. The program is expected to include new research on drought-resistant wheat varieties for better early grazing and grain production, foreign market development through an aggressive marketing program and other programs designed to strengthen wheat prices.



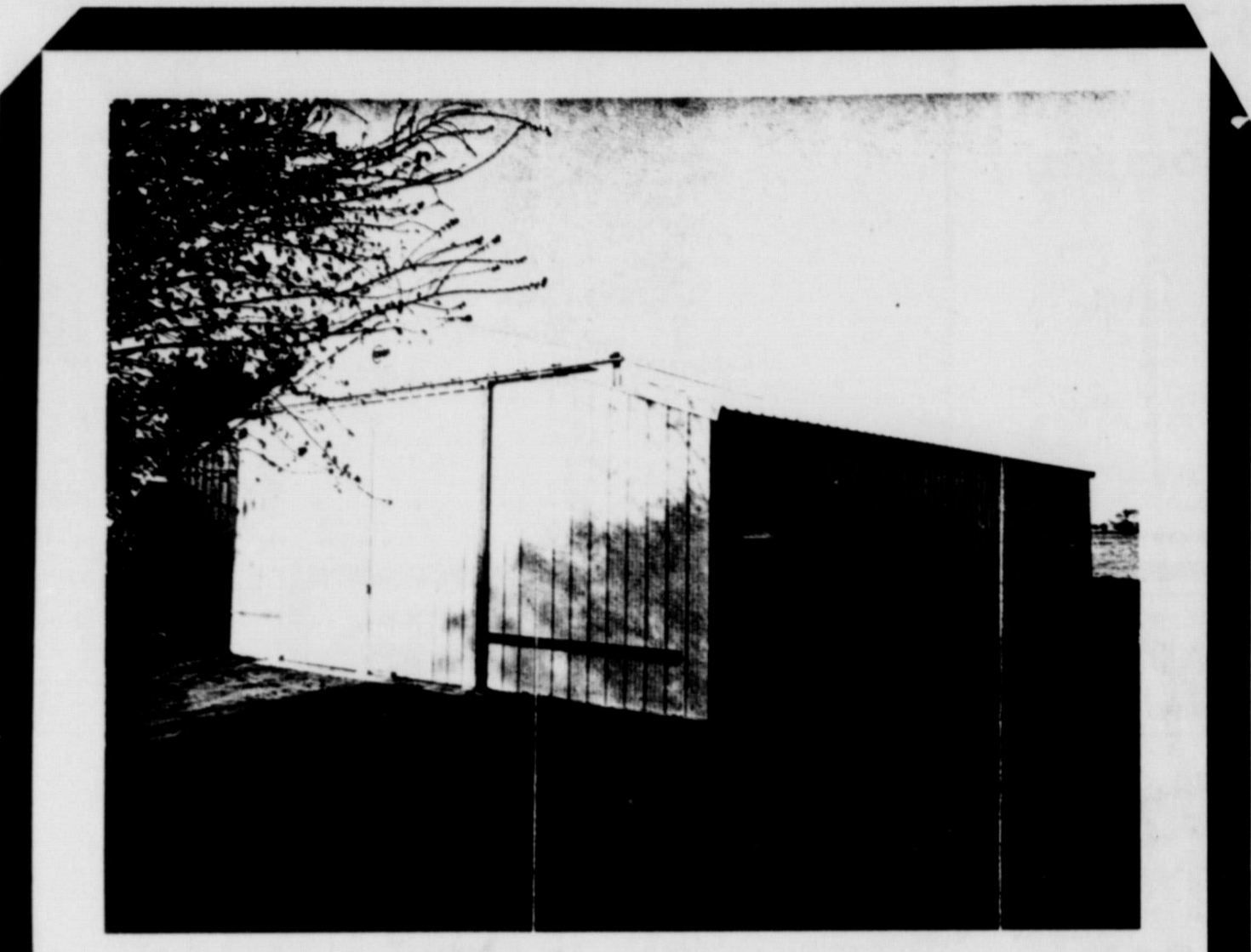


