BUSY SCHOOL-BOARD MEETING HELD HERE MONDAY EVENING

The Spearman school board had a busy session Monday evening, with some 60 persons attending the meeting. The 60 people were there to recommend to the school board that they hire Colie Huffman, who is interested in moving to Spearman from Shamrock. The group had as their spokesman Dick Countiss, local lawyer.

School board president Chalmers Porter explained to the group that they had certain procedure for hiring personnel, and later implied that the salary asked by Mr. Huffman may be above the amount that the school will meet. No coach can be paid more than the Superintendent, Principal, or head of the respective departments.

Mr. Countiss went ahead to say to the school board that Mr. Huffman had 22 years experience behind him, he was a winner, he had the respect of all

of his players, he was an excellent classroom teacher, and most important, he earned his respect from the boys. Also, Countiss stated that local law enforcement officers certainly wanted a strong disciplinarian as head football coach, as they could influence many boys to become outstanding citizens.

School board members stated that regardless of the man they hire, if the sports fans do not get behind him, the program will be a failure in Spear-

The school board will be interviewing 6 men for the coaching job this Wednesday night. The six men are Coach Wilson from Lampasas, Coach Borenstein from Hereford; Coach Huffman, Shamrock; Coach Overton, Del City, Okla.; Coach Booth, Farweil; and Coach Rawls, West Texas State. The school board should be able to decide on a coach by this weekend.

In other school board business Tuesday night the minutes of the previous school board meeting were approved.

The resignation of Mrs. Fern West was accepted.

Mrs. Zady Belle Walker was hired as Special Ed. teacher for the coming year.

The bus routes for next year were approved.

The school agreed to participate in regional media center for 1971-72.

The board had quite a lengthy discussion on salaries for teachers for the coming year. The school will continue to pay \$1100.00 above state and eliminate extra pay, for extra assignments. It seems that there is a surplus of teachers in the state now but in order to keep good, top grade teachers, the school board will continue to pay \$1100, 00 above state, the same as last year.

At the present the hospital is paying its way. "If we can create a Hospital District, we would have access to needed funds without having to raise the tax value in Hansford County, if the Hospital ever needs additional funds for operational expense, " Judge Lee said.

Voters To Consider 4 Amendments May 18

Voters will go to the polls May 18 to consider four proposed constitutional amend-

Hansford county voters may cast their ballots in Spearman at the county courthouse; in Gruver at the high school and in Morse at the school. Polls open at 8 a.m. and close at

7 p. m. One of the most pressing matter before the 62nd Legislature when it convened in January, 1971, was the provision of sufficient funds to meet state welfare needs. Restricted by a constitutional ceiling on welfare spending from state funds, the legislature found it necessary to propose a constitutional amendment for immediate consideration by the Texas electorate to make it possible for welfare recipients to continue receiv-

ing their monthly payments. The legislature acted promptly in proposing an amendment which would remove the ceiling from welfare expenditures for three classes of recipients -the needy aged, the needy blind, and the needy disabled. A new ceiling of \$55 million would be established by the amendment for the fourth class of reci pients -- needy dependent children and the ceretakers of such children.

Three additional amendments have been proposed and

will also be considered at the same election. Listed below. in the order in which they will appear on the ballot, are the four proposed constitutional amendments to be considered

by the Texas electorate on Amendment No. 1-Establishing a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the legis-

lature, state officers, and legislative officers and to investigate violations; to recommend compensation for members of the legislature and the Lieutenant Governor; and to recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process.

Amendment No. 2-Providing that the legislature may propose amendments to the Constitution in called as well as regular sessions of the legislature.

Amendment No. 3-Remov ing the limitation on the total state appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy blind, and the needy disabled, and setting a limitation on total state appropriations during a fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.
Amendment No. 4-Author-

izing the issuance of \$100 million in bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes; providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6 percent.

Draft Number Is 125 for June


Selective Service System said Thursday the highest random sequence number that any local board may call in June will be 125, the same as May.



Postmaster Elmon Jacobs said today that increases in most postage rates will take effect May 16 as the new Unit-ed States Postal Service begins its task of achieving self suf-ficiency as required by the Postal Reorganization Act. Mr. Jacobs noted that gen-

eral postage rates have not

been increased since 1967 when Congress passed what was to become its final legislative act in this respect.

He pointed out that, earlier, requests for rate increases were proposed to Congress in 1969 by both President Johnson and President Nixon. In addition, President Nixon pro-

posed an increase again in 1970, although none of the proposed increases was acted

ipon by Congress. Mr. Jacobs explained that the new increases -- authorized on a temporary basis until the newly created Postal Rate Commission can make recommendations to the Governors of the Postal Service on permanent changes -- will raise first-class letter rates from 6 to 8 cents an ounce, and airmail letter rates from 10 to 11 cents an ounce. Post cards will go from 5 to 6 cents each and airmail post cards will go from 8 to 9 cents each.

The increases will be borne more by business than by individuals, the postmaster pointed out, since about 75 per cent of first class and air mail is from commercial

mailers. In addition to increases in first-class rates, second and third class will also go up on May 16. However, the full in-creases proposed by the Postal Service will not be put into effect on a temporary basis, in second and third class, since the postal reform legis-lation contemplates that such increases be phased over 5 years--or ten years for non-profit organizations--provided

Congress appropriates the ne-cessary funds to ease the transition to full rates.

Because of the phasing pro-vision, the increases to become effective May 16 for second and third-class will generally be only 1/5th of the total increase which has been proposed by the Postal

No changes are made in the rates for parcel post, which is the principal component of fourth-class mail. However, initial increases will be made in the "book rate" which is classified as fourth class.

The new temporary rates also make changes in other postage rate categories and special service fees, such as special delivery and registered

mail.
The Postal Service advised the public in February that it intended to make the temporay increases if the Postal Rate Commission did not make the recommended decision within 90 days of the request by the Postal Service.

Recently the Rate Commission confirmed that it will not be able to make a decision within the 90 days, and Sunday, May 16, was selected as

the date on which the rates would become effective. When the domestic changes

go into effect, there will be conforming increases in letter rates to Canada and Mexico.







\$286,000 Spent Here For Cigarettes

What have Hansford County residents been doing lately about their cigarette smoking? To what extent have the campaigns conducted by the Public Health Service and others led them to cut down on their consumption or cut it our completely

The findings are that many

of them have quit permanently and many others are trying to do so. As for the large remainder, however, they are smoking as much as ever.

According to a survey made by the National Center for Health St tistics, the ones who are cutting down on their cigarettes are the light smokers -those who use no more than 10

per day--and elderly people.

There was a marked increase, however, on the part of those who smoke one or more packs

In Hansford County, in the past year, cigarette sales came to approximately 681,000 packs, according to a breakdown of regional figures released by the Tobacca Tax County ed by the Tobacco Tax Coun-

Related to the local population over age 18, this was equivalent to 170 packs per

Compared with some areas of the country, this was low, and compared to others, high. The average nationally was 202 packs. It was 172 in the West South Central States.

A decline has been noted in the number of women smokers in the last few years. There are now some 300, 000 fewer female smokers than there were in 1966, survey figures show, despite a population increase of three million adult

According to Dr. Daniel Horn of the National Clearing House on Smoking and Health, giving up cigarettes seems to be more difficult for women than for men. And, even when they do quit, they find it hard-

er to stay quit.

How much does the average Hansford County smoker spend per year for cigarettes? Approximately \$71, it is estimated... For the local community as a whole, the total is close to







ation had learned the need and the great importance of belief in, and reliance upon the Almighty God.
A lot of this spirit was lost in the generation born after Mrs. Womble's; even more

of it lacking in my own gen-eration; and in the younger people of this day and time we see almost a complete absence of it.

We need their influence, and encouragement, and hope Without it, the world is worse

The finality of death scares many people. But I tell you, one day we will wake up in a world where there are none of these old-timers left, and

that is what scares me. If you are one of the fortunate ones to have known and associated with Lula Womble, your life is better for it. She was one of the greatest Christian women I have ever known. But more important than this--

she lived what she believed.
WE WITNESSED SUNDAY what could have been the most tragic accident on record. We took our cousins out to their plane and just as they were coming down the runway ready for take-off, two little boys on motor bikes pulled right out in front of them. Annual PEP Meet Set For May 14

According to Grisham, all members of the Board plus other agricultural and industrial leaders in the 25-county PEP area are encouraged to attend. Purpose of the annual meeting will be to elect new officers, review accomplishments during the past year and plan

future PEP activities. Reports of each of the three task forces will also be includtask forces will also be included on the program, adds Grisham. These task forces and the chairman of each are Agricultural Industry, W.B. Griffin, Borger; Agricultural Production, R.B. Dawson, Tulia; and Family Living-Youth, Edd McLeroy, Dimmitt. Each of the three groups has sponsored an educational conference or seminar during the past year.

seminar during the past year. The Executive Committee of the area economic program is composed of Leo Forrest, chairman; R.C. (Dick) Cline, vice-chairman; Ed Garnett, secretary-treasurer; and Grisham. All are from Amarillo. Garnett serves as area farm management specialist for the Extension Service which is responsible for administering PEP and for guiding its efforts.

The 25 counties in PEP are Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and

PEP was organized several years ago with its long range objective of boosting the social and economic development of the Panhandle area. explains Grisham. In the past year, PEP has also joined in the support of '3,76 in '76" a program designed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to increase agricultural income in the state by one billion dollars by 1976. Agri-culture was a 2.75 billion dollar industry in Texas for the 1968-69 crop year. The PEP area contributed \$452, 534, 100 to that total, and the area's agricultural income is expected to reach-\$682, 250, 840 by the 1975-76




