## NEW 7-11 STORE OPEN FOR BUSINESS

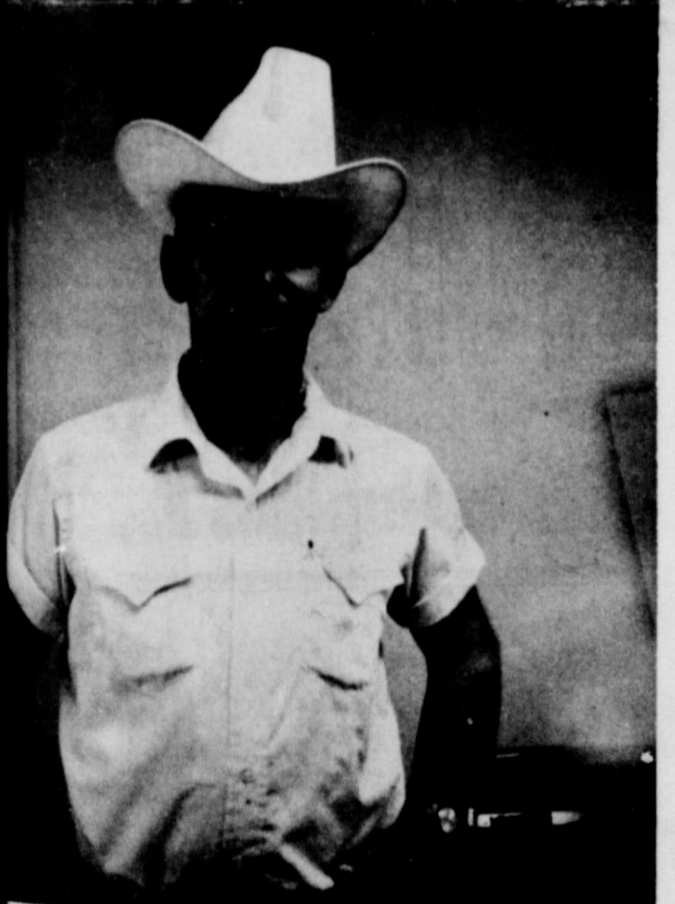

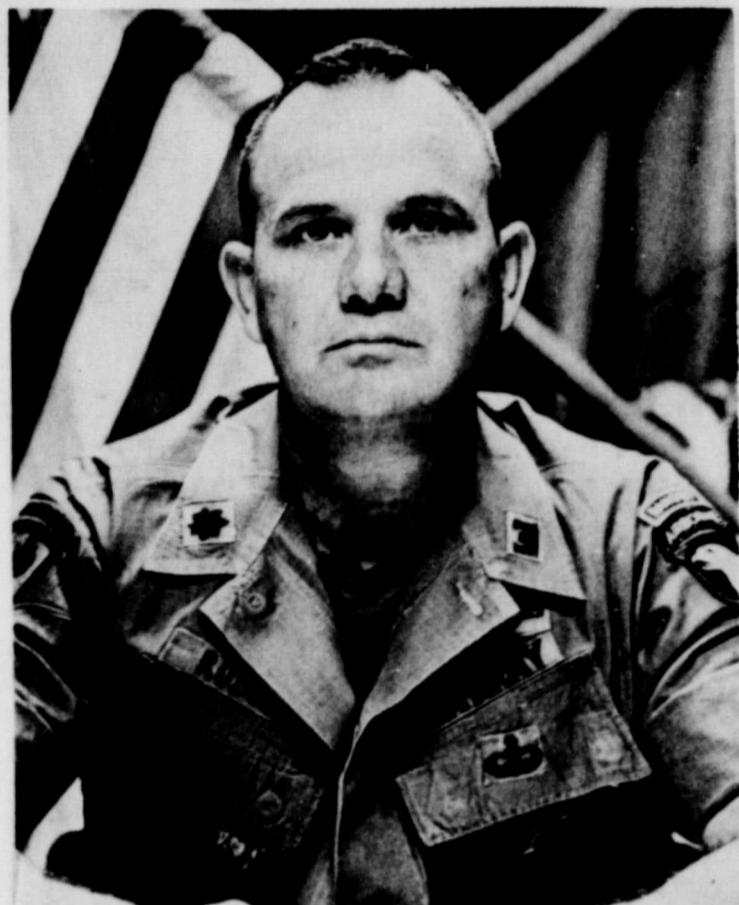

## "Tex" Martin, Professional Instructor First Session Set For Rodeo School

"Tex" Martin moved to Spearman this year where he has set up headquarters for the Martin Rodeo School, Inc. Associated with the business with Tex will be Charles Martin and James Martin. "Tex" Martin has been a rodeo professional since he was 13 years old. He turned professional in 1946 and has made the big RCA Rodeos both at home and abroad. He has competed in Australia several times, in Hawaii 2 years and in the U.S.A. who receive honor of performing in the World Series. Seven times he has been a national champion. He is a graduate of Sul Ross State College at Alpine. He received his degree in Range Management and Biology. His wife is Lami. They have three children, Shelly,

aged 10, Debbie, 8 and Nance, aged two years. Rodeo training schools have been in progress across the nation for several years and the demand for the art of "riding broncs & bulls" in and around the Panhandle area drew Mr. Martin to Spearman. The first session of the Martin Rodeo School is set to begin July 12 through 23. A \$20.00 daily rate will be charged students who will be instructed by the professional rider. The Martin men have leased the Spearman Rodeo arena for training school sessions. Each Sunday at 7 p.m. Bareback, Saddle Bronc and Bull riding contests will be staged. A charge of \$150.00 an event, with \$75.00 for each additional event has been set. Jackpots will be given each Sunday. Martin said they had plenty of good live stock--from the most gentle to the "hard bucking" kind for the beginning or advanced rodeo students.

## GARY WOLFE TO PREACH BAPTIST YOUTH REVIVAL

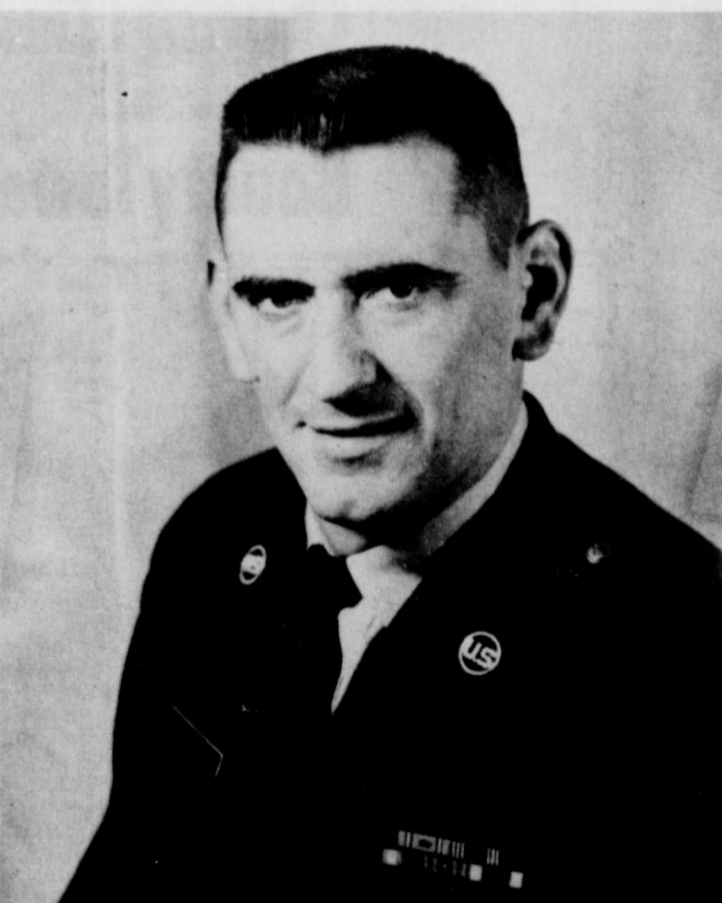

## STAFF SGT. ROY L. DEVERS CITED

The Air Force Commendation Medal (first oak leaf cluster) has recently been presented to Staff Sgt. Roy L. Devers. Staff Sergeant Roy L. Devers distinguished himself by meritorious service as Fuel Distribution Controller, Fuel Management Branch, 635th Supply Squadron, U-Tapao Airfield, Thailand, from May 3 1970 to May 3 1971. Sergeant Devers' outstanding professional skill and dexterity were instrumental in controlling and monitoring the various fuels functions occurring simultaneously throughout his tour of duty. The complexity of the fuels system and immense aircraft servicing rate, which exceeded one million gallons of fuel daily with a sortie rate of approximately 90 aircraft, attest to the workload being experienced. ## Weather

June ended with a total of 1.53 inches of rain which fell in five separate showers during the month. Although June temperatures on a whole were quite pleasant, two days during the last week saw the mercury climb to a 100 degree mark. The rain which fell in the evening of June 30 and measured 1.81 inches, will be credited to July moisture since all rain which falls after 6 p.m. is charted the next day by weather observer Bill Haden. Moisture totals for the first 6 months of the year stands at 5.27 inches, some 5 inches below normal if the yearly average is to be reached. The 1.81 which was recorded July 1, brings our years total to 7.08 however. The hottest day for the year was charted July 6 when the thermometer climbed to a sizzling 103 degrees.

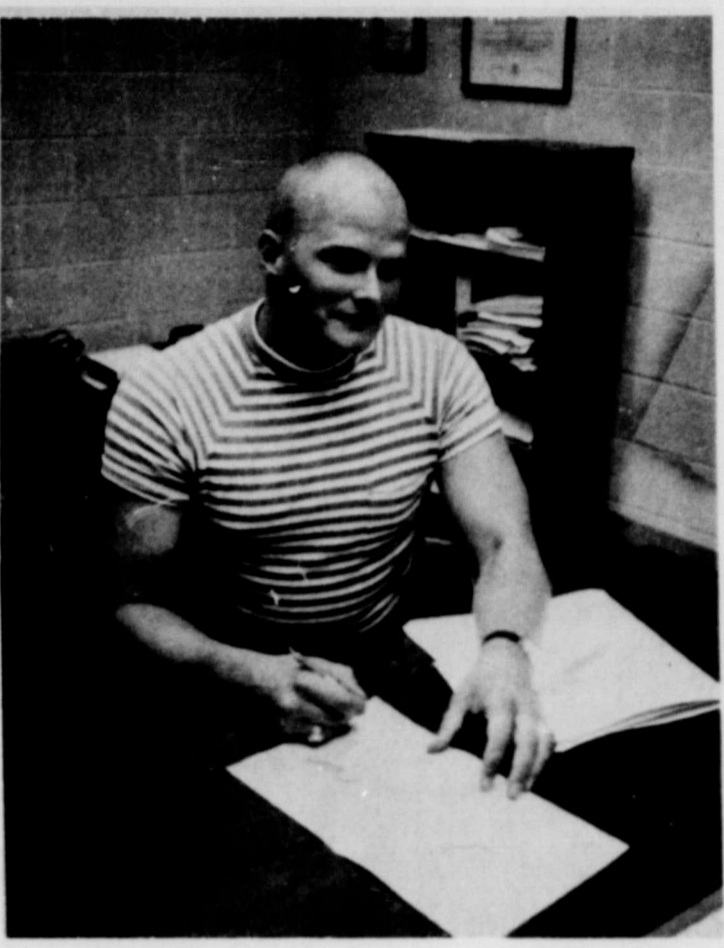
## Man & Wife Arrested

## Suspects Demand Trial

The District Courtroom in Spearman Tuesday afternoon was the scene of what was probably the county's first "examining trial." At least it is the first one Sheriff J.B. Cooke and T.D. Sansing can remember during their many years of service here. Frank Edward Linscott, James Richard Richardson and Dalton Eason, arrested June 15 on drunk charges and later charged with "theft over \$50.00" requested the trial. County Attorney T.D. Sansing, acting for the State, explained that the trial was not to determine whether the men were "guilty or not guilty" but was for the sole purpose of determining whether or not there was sufficient evidence to bind them over to the Grand Jury. Richard Countiss, local attorney at law, was the acting defense attorney. Witnesses called included Z. Q. Bingham, City Police Sgt.; Lee Phillips, County Sheriff's Deputy; C.W. Smith, Kenneth Mitchell and Jimmy Beeson. Eason did not appear in court. He had previously been released on bond. These men allegedly took tools from the farm residence belonging to C.W. Smith. The tools were appraised at "over \$50.00." Presiding Judge J.P. Vernon ruled "sufficient evidence" and set Linscott & Richardson's bonds at \$2,000.00 each.

He participated in track, was a member of the National Honor Society, class officer and named the Rotary Citizen of the year. He also, was the high ranking boy in his class, and Golden Gloves champion in high school and college.

Besides being an outstanding coach and athlete, Mires was on the Dean's Honor Roll, freshman class vice president and the outstanding classroom teacher at Canyon in 1969.

His coaching record at Dalhart from 1964-1968 included 36 wins, 4 losses and 1 tie. In 1968-69 he won 19 and lost 1 at Canyon while coaching the junior varsity.

While at Canyon in 1970 he won four games and lost six.

His 7 year record as assistant and head coach includes 59 wins, 11 losses and 1 tie.

Mr. Mires comes highly recommended to the Spearman School system as a fine coach and very, very dedicated Christian man.

The country up that way has a lot going for it. For one thing there has been an abundance of rain lately. Everything is simply lush, and for this time of year that's unusual. I got a real chuckle out of this little item. Parents of school age children should contact their physicians soon and begin the children's immunization program before they enter school. Texas school children will soon be among the best immunized in the country. The Texas Legislature recently passed a state law requiring immunizations against childhood dis-

ease as a condition for entering school. In the past, this has been up to the school districts, but now it is a State law. Elementary students will be required to be immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, polio, smallpox & measles. All children under 12 must be immunized against rubella. The number of required immunizations is fewer for junior high, high school and college-level students. Junior high & high school requires shots for diphtheria, polio, tetanus and smallpox. College requires full immunization against polio if the student is under 19, and immunization against diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox within the past 10 years. Immunizations will be required of students in kindergartens that are associated with elementary schools, academies, schools for the blind, deaf, mentally ill and mentally retarded. The only children exempt are those with religious conflicts, or medical problems. The Texas Board of Health has set January 1, 1972 as the date by which all children's immunization series must have begun. This new state law will have a great impact, eventually, on all the population of Texas. This brings to mind, that when we get to be the healthiest state in the union we'll have to think up a new motto. Maybe then we can entice newcomers with something like "Move to Texas--we're immunized." or "Don't get polluted--come to Texas instead." Or maybe--"Texas--the big-shot state."

From the ladle and pail, we have advanced to the sanitary, easily stored, time-saving metal can, which today serves literally all households of America. To what degree do cans contribute to solid waste? Solid waste in the U.S. in 1970 totaled 360 million tons of discarded materials from homes, commercial and industrial establishments, and government facilities. Of this total, only 1.6 per cent is attributable to cans. Why all the environmental concern about cans then? The can often dramatizes and bears the onus for much of the overall litter problem in America because it's readily identifiable on the landscape. However, in reality, the concern should be about the mounting problems of solid waste disposal, and recycling the valuable materials in that waste, such as metal. We spend \$4.5-billion annually to collect and dispose of solid waste. The value of the metal alone in that waste is \$5-billion. Today, citizen groups are collecting used metal cans of all types and returning them to the major can producers as the first step in the recycling process. Recycling is the salvaging and recovery for reuse of selected waste products. It's important to understand that the reused material doesn't necessarily mean reuse in the same form. The recovered and recycled cans may ultimately be processed into metal for airplanes, autos, tools, appliances, as well as cans. All types of cans are being collected in this national program--steel, tin plate, and aluminum. These include beer and soft drink cans, pet food cans, soup cans, all kinds. They all have scrap value. What happens to the money? The can people give it to worthy local environmental projects.

# 18 - Yr. Olds Can Vote In All Elections

NEW AMENDMENT NOW IN EFFECT

In a special release to Tax Assessor-Collector J. B. Cooke this week, the Secretary of State formally notified all persons, 18, 19 or 20 years of age who are presently registered to vote for federal elections only, that they could NOW vote in ALL elections.

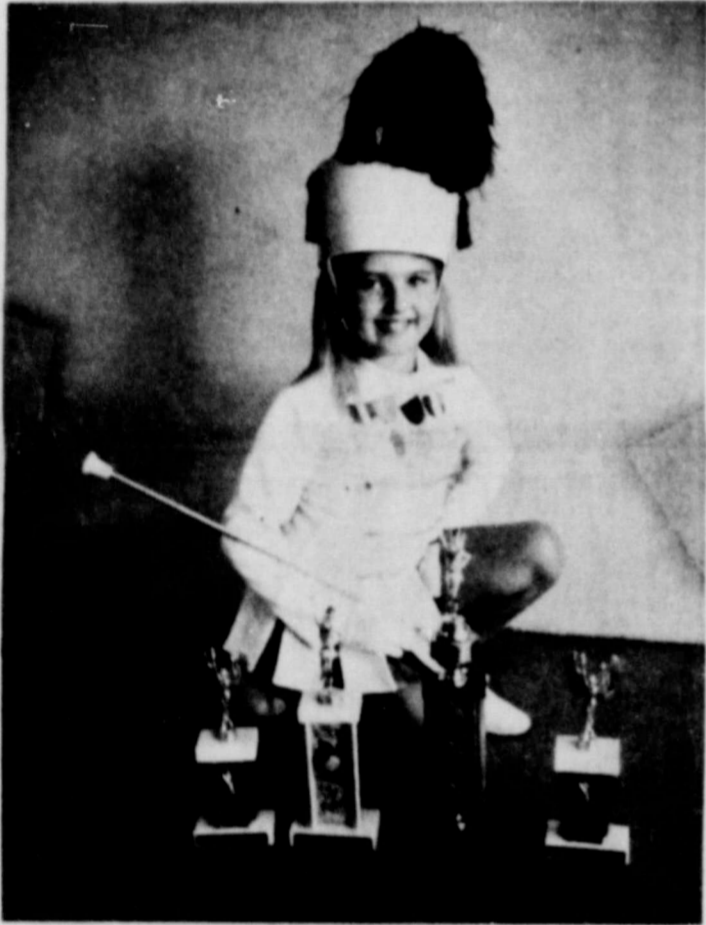
The 26th Amendment to the United States Constitution lowering the voting age to 18 in all elections has been duly ratified by the state legislatures as prescribed by the Federal Constitution. The Federal Register in Washington, D.C., confirmed July 1, 1971 that this new amendment went into immediate effect.

This United States Constitu-

tional Amendment overrides Article VI of the Texas Constitution insofar as it requires an otherwise qualified voter to be 21 years of age to be eligible to vote.

Thus as of July 1, 1971, any registered 18, 19 or 20 year old may vote in ANY election—federal, state, county, city or other political subdivision.

Persons who turned 18 years of age after the close of the regular 1971 registration period may still register for the current voting year. The certificate is effective for any election held 30 days after registration, according to Martin Dies, Jr., Secretary of State.

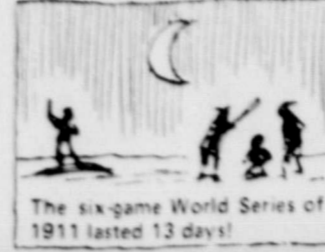

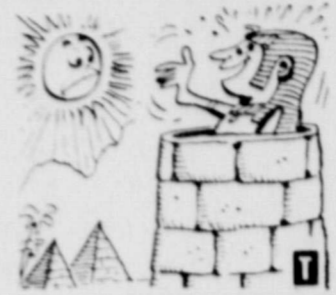

Building towers have been the subject of high-level considerations for ages. At first, the term was given to a lofty building originally designed for defense. It later was used for any structure whose height is its most important dimension, whether isolated or part of another building.

The two earliest uses of lofty buildings were military and religious. In one case, they were constructed to give a raised platform from which a defending force could discharge missiles on an attacking force, at



At the same time remaining protected from it. In the case of

religion, it was used in connection with the sun, moon or star worship, apparently in the effort to raise the worshipper or priest as near to heaven as possible.

Among the more remarkable clock and other towers today is the English Clock Tower in Buenos Aires, a city that has many towers honoring the countries represented in its population. The Eiffel Tower in Paris, built for the exhibition of 1889, is 984 feet in height. And the Clock Tower of the Houses of Parliament in London contains the famous Big Ben bell.

Today, a game called "Tower Climb" helps playful youngsters aged 7 to 12 to engage in high life. It takes a lot of skill to win this exciting game by Milton Bradley. Trying to maneuver your pips with your probes up the tower and over the wall ahead of your opponents, you play individually or on a team. Coordination does it.

The game, like towers through the ages, is tops.

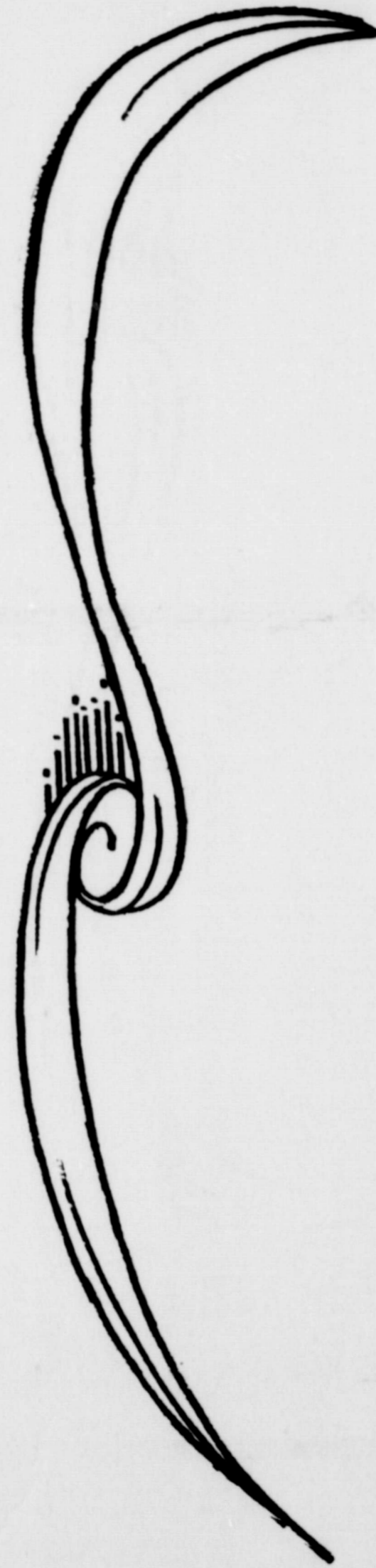
